which claim to support cancer research, but actually expend only a few percent on research. Generally the person operating the scam gets a big salary, while the research gets almost nothing.

At least one scam operator makes a practice of moving every three or four months, and changing the name of his organization with each move. Presumably he

A good business letter can win interview or make a friend for life. interview or make a friend for life.

competent, articulate and profes ional. On the other hand, bad business correspondence can blow a us money. Why, then, are so many pad or mediocre business letters written? I believe there are three reasons: 1) We don't care, '2) we
feel too busy to compose good letfeel too busy to compose good let-

The majority of us probably fall into the last two categories. We care about our business image but good writing skills.
Because of our hectic pace, we need a simple method of learning and remembering the basics of
