## Crop Certifications Due In July

The Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service is currently accepting acreage reports for the 1994 farm program and other uses. All spring seeded crops planted for harvest, grazing, or cover crops for ACR and/or Conserving use acres must be reported. Producers should certify zero to protect based even though no crops are planted. Farmers have until July 15, to report acres and intended use of all spring seeded crops.

CRP acreage can be reported at this time also. CRP participants need to certify their bases by July 15, if the base acres are above zero and they have any excess cropland acres not in CRP. Total CRP farms

must be reported by September 15, 1994.

Before reporting, farmers can request that ASCS measure their program acreage. The measurements are furnished at cost, and guaranteed for the crop year. Measurement service is not only valuable to the program participants, but to any farmer who desires an accurate acreage for any reason.

Farm program participants are required to correctly certify their entire farm after planting to be eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and history credit. The reports contain crops and acreage planted, the uses to be made of these crops, acreage removed from crop production to the acreage conservation reserve (ACR) and conservation use acres for payment.

ASCS urges producers who have not certified their spring-seeded crops, to do so before the July 15, deadline, please call 874-3561 for a certification appointment.

## Museum Opens West Wing

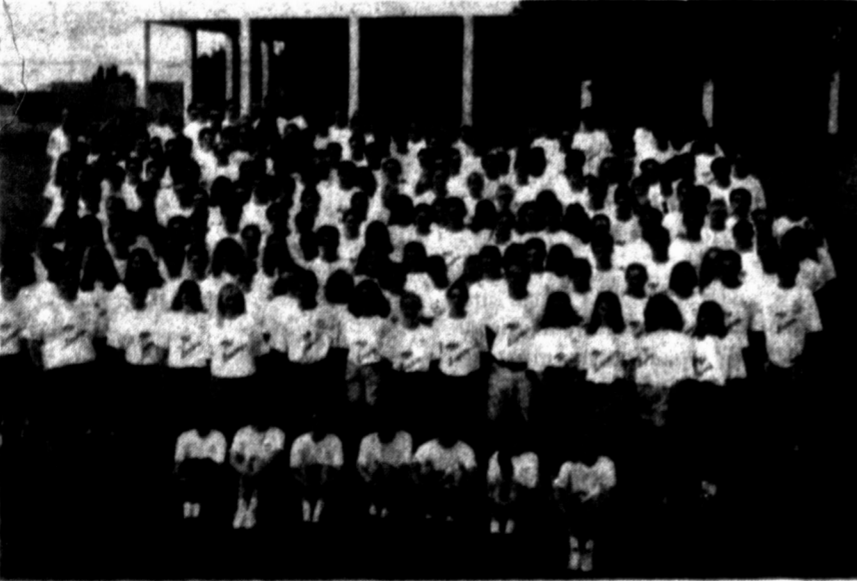

Burton Memorial Library is continually receiving new

materials to interest our community.

One of the newest additions to the World War II collection in the History section is "Voices: Letters From World War II" by Ken Shamberg. Contributors have shared letters of their experiences during this time of risk and tragic events. The book was donated to the library by Bill G. Thornberry in memory of PFC Ray G. Bulls who grew up in the Donley County area, and who was killed in action on October 21, 1944. He is buried in France.

Many of our community citizens will be pleased to know that the highly advertised "Hooked on Phonics" is ready for circulation from the library. Consisting of instructions, cassettes, and flash cards, it has been divided into six units for availability to several individuals at the same time. It appears to be very beneficial for anyone who would like to take advantage of it. Cards and cassettes compose a Skillbuilder Series which would be an excellent "follow-up" after the Phonics program.

Located near "Hooked on Phonics" is a beautiful series of six books which are called "The Core Knowledge Series" edited by E.D. Hirsch, Jr., author of Cultural History. Each book includes fundamentals of good basic yearly education from grades 1-6. The books are titled "What Your First Grader Needs To Know", "What Your Second Grader Needs To Know", and the other four follow the next four grades consecutively. They offer specific knowledge in language arts, history, science, mathematics, fine arts, and technology appropriate for each grade level. The books are quite impressive and a good supplement to classroom education.

The children's Summer Reading Club is in progress. Special programs will be presented during the month of July. It's never too late for your children to begin participating. Why not check it out?

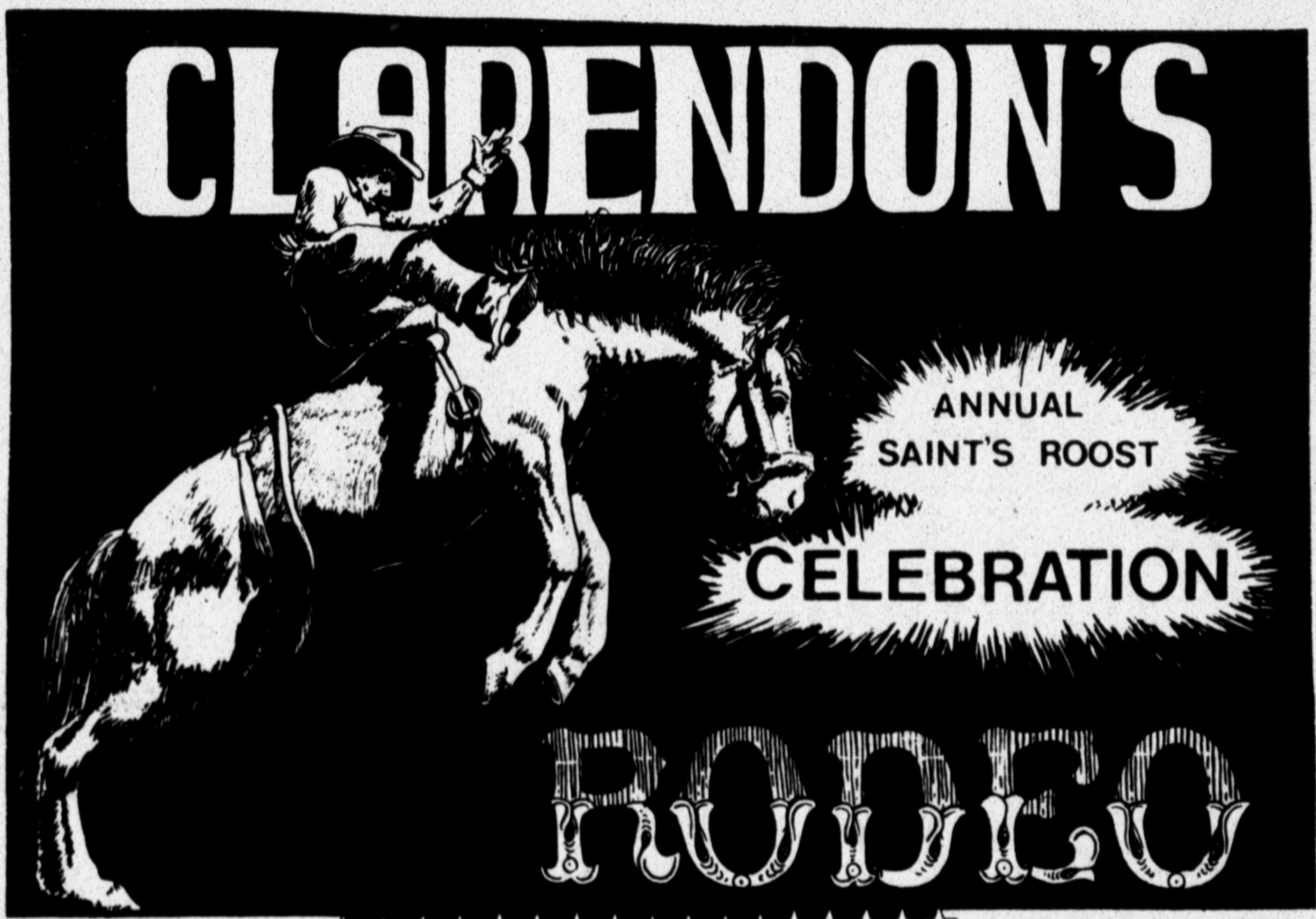
**The Lions Tale**

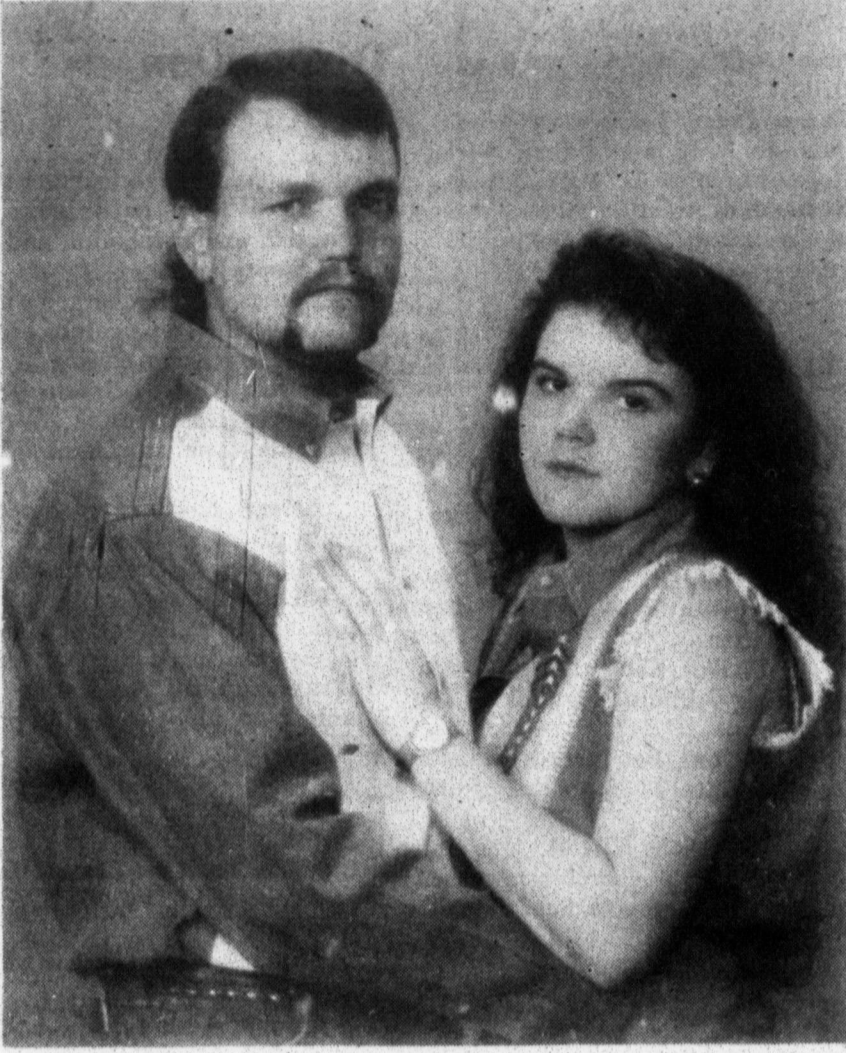

**Reminder Given**

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon would like to remind the citizens of Clarendon that we do have ordinances concerning the cleaning of property.

An ordinance to protect the public health and promote the public welfare of the City of Clarendon, Texas, by providing for the filling up and drainage of lots that shall have unwholesome place or places where stagnant water may accumulate thereon, the cleaning of any building or premises of filth,

carriage or other impure and unwholesome matter: requiring owners or occupants of lots in the City of Clarendon to keep said lots free from weeds, rubbish, brush and other unsightly or unsanitary matter: providing for notice to be given to owners of premises in case of failure of owner to make lots and or premises sanitary and sightly: providing for the fixing of a lien against such lots for such improvements: and providing for a penalty not to exceed \$200 (two hundred dollars) and each and every day such violation is continued shall constitute a separate offense: providing a savings clause: and making this ordinance cumulative with all other ordinances."

Another ordinance we would like to call attention to is concerning junked vehicles.

"WHEREAS, it is deemed by the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas, that a junked vehicle that is located in a place where it is visible from a public place or public right-of-way is detrimental to the safety and welfare of the general public, tends to reduce the value of property, and invites vandalism, creates fire hazards, constitutes an unattractive nuisance creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors, and is detrimental to the economic welfare of the state by producing urban blight adverse to the maintenance and continuing development of the municipalities in the state, and is a public nuisance. . . "Junked vehicle" means a motor vehicle as defined in Article 6701d-11, Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, as amended:


- A. that is inoperative; and
- B. that does not have lawfully affixed to it either an unexpired license plate or a valid Motor Vehicle Safety Inspection Certificate, that is wrecked, dismantled,

partially dismantled, or discarded, or that remains inoperable for a continuous period of more than 45 days."

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# Church To Be Built In Three Days

Jehovah's Witnesses are people widely known. You may have met them as neighbors and fellow employees or in any of the daily affairs of life. You may have seen them on the street, offering their magazines to passer-by. Or you may have spoken briefly with them at your door.

The name itself, Jehovah's Witnesses is a descriptive name, indicating that they bear witness concerning Jehovah, his Godship and his purpose. Jehovah is a personal name and refers to the almighty God and Creator of the universe. This is shown at Psalm 83:18, according to the King James Version of the Bible: "That men may know that thou, whose name alone is JEHOVAH, art the most high over all the earth."

Jehovah's Witnesses have

been established as a religious organization for over a hundred years. They have been in the Texas Panhandle for almost that long as well. During this time, they have grown world wide to over 4.7 million active publishers of the good news in more than 230 lands. There are over 70,000 congregations of Jehovah's Witnesses, and on the average, this number is increasing by over 3,000 per year.

To keep up with this type of expansion, meeting places are needed. Soon, in Clarendon Texas, one such meeting place, called a Kingdom Hall will be constructed in just three days. The date has been set for construction to begin Friday morning, June 24, 1994.

The building is not prefabricated. It will be built from the ground up right on the sight. How is this possible?

When the work begins, it moves swiftly. In an hour the outside walls are up. Roof trusses follow. Sheeting for the walls are nailed into place. The electricians begin running wires. Air-conditioning and heating

ducts are installed. Cabinets are put into position. Regardless of the weather, the work goes on. Who does the work?

It is done with voluntary, unpaid labor. There is no competition or rivalry among the tradesmen. Frequently by Sunday morning, the Kingdom Hall is completed, nicely decorated inside, partially landscaped on the outside. At the end of the project, many of the workers remain to enjoy the first regular congregation meeting, a study of The Watchtower.

Although the entire operation moves at amazing speed, this is not the primary consideration. Of greater importance is the providing of quality construction of the modest Kingdom Hall designed to meet local needs. Careful planning is done so as to accomplish this while keeping expenses to a minimum. Measures are taken to see that safety is given high priority - the safety of workers, neighbors, passer-by, and future occupants of the Kingdom Hall.

The site of the building is lo-

cated just west of Clarendon College on the south side of Highway 287. All are warmly invited to come and see this construction take place. No funds or membership will be solicited. All questions will be answered.

### Time To Treat For Cattle Grubs

Cattle grubs are internal parasites and their damage is largely unseen, yet they cause greater economic losses to the U.S. beef cattle industry than any other insect pest.

While grubs are usually found on the backs of infested animals during the winter months, that's not the time for control measures since the pests have already done their damage. Feed efficiency and animal vigor are reduced in infested animals.

Grubs are the larvae or worm stage of heel flies, and adult heel flies are active over most of the state from March through May.

The time to control grubs is from now through August when grubs are small and before infested animals suffer stress, weight loss and decreased feed efficiency. Considerable hide damage will occur if infested animals are slaughtered. Hide value has increased rapidly during the past year.

Heel flies cannot sting, have no functional mouth parts and cause no pain to cattle. Yet, they frighten animals, making them difficult to manage.

Heel flies lay their eggs on a seven percent of life insurance animal's hairs in the lower leg region, glued in position. Tiny larvae hatch in a few days, crawl down into the base of the hair and burrow into the animal's skin.

Then they begin a migratory course through the animal's body, congregating in the throat after a few months, and after eight to nine months, appear in the mature grub state on the animal's back.

If a producer has a history of grubs in his cattle herd, it's best to treat each animal over three months of age with one application of an approved systemic insecticide or injectable treatment during the May through August period.

Systemic insecticides are absorbed directly through the animal's skin, circulate throughout the body, and kill grubs while they are small. Injectable treatments are circulated in the animal's body fluids to kill the invading pests.

These insecticides come in various forms—dips, sprays, pour-ons, injections and spot-on treatments. A listing of approved insecticides and methods for controlling cattle grubs is available at the county Extension Office. Ask for Extension publication B-1306, which contains information on livestock pests.

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
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## School Board Minutes



## Minding Your Own Business

### GEESE WORK

(First of two parts)  
As a young man I watched huge flocks of geese migrate north and south over the Missouri farm where I grew up. Over the years I learned to love the honking sounds and watching the big V formations fly overhead.

Although I loved the geese, I remember feeling sad in the fall as the flocks traveled southward because I knew winter would soon

arrive. Winter meant cold, bitter weather and more work to ensure the safety and health of our livestock.

The northbound flights of spring were early indicators that warm weather was on its way. It meant no more ice to chop or hay to feed. Spring brought new green growth, warm sunny days and pleasant activities around the farm.

I didn't know about the wonderful lessons being taught in the sky as I performed my routine chores. I just enjoyed the sights and sounds.

### Geese Lessons

Bill and Marty Geist, owners of Gingiss Formalwear Center in Amarillo, TX, shared an essay with me last month. It is titled "Lessons Learned from Geese."

As I read the essay I remembered those early farm days I described above. I was also reminded that we as small business owners and managers need to be alert for business building lessons regardless of the source. I extracted several thoughts from the "Geese" essay. I think you'll agree as you read them that we can even learn from the birds.

According to the essay, as each goose flaps its wings, it creates

an uplift for others behind it. There is 71 percent more flying range in a V formation than flying alone.

The lesson we can glean from this information is that people who share a common sense of direction and purpose are more successful. They can work longer and accomplish more because they feed off the energy of others.

Another interesting fact is that when the lead goose tires, it rotates back into the formation and another bird takes over. This allows a fresh goose to keep up the pace while the leader takes a breather.

The message here is that shared leadership and independence gives others a chance to lead as well as follow. While being the lead goose may improve the view, the work is harder. Everyone needs a break from the routine and a fresh perspective may improve your attitude.

I also learned from the essay the reason geese honk as they fly. (It's not because they are passing another goose.) The geese in formation honk to encourage the leaders to keep up the speed.

The lesson here is to make certain our honks are encouraging. We all need a friendly honk from time-to-time. In business, it may be a word of praise or a pat on the back for a job well done. Encouragement is a good team builder.

The final point in the essay dealt with being supportive. When an ill or injured goose can't keep up with the flock, other geese will drop out of the formation and stay with it until it revives or dies. Then they catch up with the flock or join a new one.

The point here is that your colleagues may need help from time-to-time. We should stand by them in bad times as well as good.

### Teamwork

You've probably guessed by now that the secret of the geese's success is teamwork. It's not really different from any business or organization. For profit, non-profit or sports related, all groups can benefit from teamwork.

## Natural Gas Safety Tips

School's out once again, and it's that time of year for parents and kids to learn their summer safety do's and don'ts.

Typically, summertime prompts parents to remind their kids to look both ways before crossing the street, to wear sunscreen while playing in the sun and to drink plenty of liquids.

But Lone Star Gas Company reminds parents that school-age children need to be told about the importance of natural gas safety in their homes as well.

During the summer months, kids are often left at home while their parents are at work. "That's why we believe children should know what to do if they smell gas inside the house," says Howard Matson, director of communications at Lone Star Gas Company.

A recent study conducted by Lone Star Gas found that 89 percent of the respondents were aware that natural gas has a distinct odor. Yet less than half knew the precautions to take when an odor was detected. "We try to teach a few simple tips that can make a big difference in saving lives," Matson says.

According to Lone Star Gas: When gas is first noticed, don't strike a match or do anything that may cause a spark, and don't turn anything on or off that uses electricity. Since telephones use small amounts of electricity, don't use your own phone if you smell gas. Don't go back to your house until you've been told it's safe to return.

In addition, flammable materials and fire hazards pose greater threats during the summer because of higher outside temperatures. Lone Star Gas recommends the following general safety tips to decrease the potential of fires: Never store paint or use gasoline or any flammable liquid, such as paint, paint thinner, or cleaning fluids, in the same room with any gas appliance. Never store rags, paper or other combustibles near any appliance with a pilot light or open flame. Use a gas appliance only for its intended purpose. An oven, for example, should not be used to dry wet rags.

## Social Security News

### A Social Security Message For Brides-To-Be

It's the time of year when many brides-to-be are busy with a list of "things to do" before their wedding. The Social Security Administration (SSA) would like them to add one important, but easily managed item, to that list.

"If you're going to change your name when you marry, remember to tell Social Security," says Jim Talbot, manager of the Amarillo Social Security office.

For women who are working, reporting a name change assures that they will receive proper credit for their earnings and, one day, all the Social Security benefits they are due. For women who don't work outside the home, reporting the change will ensure that their Social Security record shows the correct name when the times comes to apply for benefits.

Another important reason to report your change of name is that Internal Revenue Service and SSA records should show the same name and Social Security number. If they don't, your tax refund could be postponed.

"Of course, if a woman continues to use her maiden name after marriage, as many women do today," said Talbot, "they don't need to report the marriage. They just have to be sure to use their maiden name consistently throughout their working years. And if someone should change her mind later, let Social Security know at that time."

To report a name change, call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, any business day between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m., or call or visit your local Social Security office. You'll need to complete an application for a Social Security Card, and provide either your marriage certificate to verify your old and new names or two documents—one with your maiden name and one with your married name. All documents must be originals or certified copies. The application form lists acceptable documents.

Talbot reminds everyone that the service is free. "Don't be misled by any business that offers—for a fee—to complete the paperwork for you. The process is simple and you don't need to pay anyone for a revised Social Security card."

### SSI Changes May Affect Some Military Personnel

Recent changes in the rules governing the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program can affect a number of men and women serving in the armed forces, according to Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo.

SSI disability benefits are paid to individuals who have low income and few assets if they also meet the disability program criteria. Children are also eligible if the impairment is as severe as one that would disable an adult.

Until recently, the law has provided continuing SSI benefit payments to the blind or disabled children who accompany their parents on military duty to Puerto Rico or to U.S. territories or possessions.

Congress has provided new legislation which changes the way Social Security treats the income of military families when the service member is away from home on duty assignment. To prevent any adverse effect on eligibility for, and the amount of, SSI payments, a spouse or parent who is away from home solely because of active military duty generally will be considered to be living in the same household as the individual(s) who are receiving SSI payments.

Talbot explained that "the purpose is to prevent SSI payments from being reduced as a result of the spouse or parent being absent from the household, which sometimes occurred under the previous rules."

In a related action, Talbot noted that Congress also excluded hostile fire pay from income computations for determining SSI eligibility and payment amount.
