

# **Services Held For Longtime Local Journalist**

George Wayne Estlack

Funeral services for George Wayne Estlack, age 77, were held at 10:30 a.m. on Monday, June 13, 1994 in the First United Methodist Church with Rev. Terry Tamplen, Pastor and Rev. Truman Ledbetter, Pastor of the First Babtist Church, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with arrangements under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directions, Inc.

Mr. Estlack died at 7:45 p.m. on Friday, June 10, 1994 in Hall County Hospital in Memphis following a lengthy illness. He was born February 5, 1917 in Eunice, New Mexico and had lived in Clarendon for the past 75 years. He married Ruby Dell Scoggins on November 28, 1936 at Clarendon. He began working at the Donley County Leader newspaper in 1929 and was the editor and publisher for many years before selling the paper in 1974. He then owned and operated Clarendon Office Supply and Printing until his retirement in April 1992. He had served as the Past President and had served several years as Secretary of the Panhandle Press Association and had been a director of the Texas Press Association. He had received many first place awards for his editorials over the years on a statewide level. He was one of the organizers of the Clarendon Outdoor Entertainment Association and was a member of the Clarendon Masonic Lodge #700 and a 50 year member of the Clarendon Lions Club. He had served on the Donley County School Board for many years and was a member of the First United Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Ruby Dell Estlack of Clarendon; one daughter, Jackie Patterson of Canyon; one brother, E.H. Estlack of Austin; one granddaughter, Marcella Wilson of Amarillo; and one great grandson, James David Wilson of Amarillo; and several nieces and nephews.





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

## School Board Meets



Dan Hall opened with a prayer. Minutes of the April 14th regular meeting, April 20th special meeting, and April 21st special meeting were read. Motion by Phil Fletcher, seconded by Wayne Hardin to approve the minutes as amended. A thank you note from Kay Hayes was read. Dan Hall nominated Lynne Williams for secretary. Motion by Wayne Hardin that nomination cease, seconded by Phil Fletcher. Motion carried unanimously 5-0-0.

Open Forum: Thank you expressed to administrators and board members for the fruit baskets sent during Teacher Appreciation Week. Gerald Smith, from C & D Music Company, was present to assist the school with the evaluation of the band program. He presented some estimated costs and improvements needed. Phil Barefield presented information on a foreign exchange student from France, who wants to come to Clarendon and needs a sponsor. Motion by Wayne Hardin, seconded by Dan Hall to approve local coaching stipends as presented: Head Basketball Coaches \$5000.00; First Football Assistant \$5000.00; High School Assistants \$3,500.00; Junior High Coaches \$3,500.00; and participation in Two-A-Days \$700.00. Motion carried unanimously 6-0-0. Information will be gathered con-cerning an ice machine for the field house. Motion by Phil Fletcher, seconded by Joe Lemley to ap-prove the UIL stipends for the 1993-94 school year as presented. Motion carried unanimously 6-0-0. Motion by Elmonette Bivens, seconded by Dan Hall to approve the 1994-95 contracts for services with Region XVII Education Ser-



mously 6-0-0. The Region XVI ESC is able to bid on computers for the region, and Clarendon School can participate in the cooperative. Motion by Lynne Williams, seconded by Elmonette Bivens to pass a resolution to participate in the effort of Region XVI **ESC Micro Computer Purchasing** Cooperative. Motion carried unanimously 6-0-0. Motion by Wayne Hardin, seconded by Dan Hall to revise the 1994-95 school calendar as follows: change October 17th staff development day to September 12th. Motion carried unanimously 6- 0-0. Since the copier in the Administration Office cannot be repaired in a cost effective manner, the school will purchase a copier up to \$3000.00.

Applicants for the Junior High Principal position will be interviewed by a teacher committee and the school board on May 17, 1994. 

# Saving Tips Offered

The long hot days of summer are upon us. When temperatures reach the 90's, you wonder how to stay cool and save energy at the same time. West Texas Utilities company offers these tips to help use energy wisely during this hottest part of the summer.

Check air conditioning filters each month and replace them at least every 30 days. Dirty filters cause the equipment to work harder and use more electricity.

For economy, set the air conditioner thermostat no lower than 78 degrees. Each degree below that adds to the cost.

Use portable and ceiling fans whenever possible to help circulate air and reduce the amount of air conditioning required.

Set thermostats at a higher temperature when away from home. The air conditioner won't cycle as often while you're out.

Perform heavy housework chores in the cooler time of the day. This includes washing dishes, baking and laundry work, chores which create heat and moisture that put an extra strain on the air conditioner. Vent clothes dryers to the outside and use kitchen exhaust fans to get rid of excess heat.

Block out direct sunlight as much as possible. Close curtains, shades and blinds to hold down the temperature inside the house. Consider light-colored roofs, outside wall material, drapes and solar screens that reflect the heat.

Weather-strip doors and windows to prevent expensive air leaks, Make sure all windows and doors are closed when the air con-

ditioning unit is operating.

The attic should be properly ventilated to prevent excess hear build-up which causes a cooling system to work harder.

Insulation is very important and can pay for itself by lowering cooling costs by as much as 20 percent. Use insulation with a high "R" value. WTU energy experts suggest R-30 to R-38 for ceilings, R-16 for outside walls and R-19 for use under raised floors. Also, an 11.0 or higher Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio (SEER) is preferred for air conditioning units and heat

Air conditioning and heat pump equipment should be inspected and serviced each year to operate at maximum efficiency.

If you have a fireplace, be sure the damper is tightly closed.

Keep furniture and draperies away from air vents inside the house. Air should be allowed to flow freely throughout the home.

Shrubbery growing against the outside walls, as well as trees that shade the roof, act as a barrier against the sun and can reduce the amount of energy required to cool a home. However, keep shrubbery trimmed away from the outdoor compressor unit so that there is ample room for good air circula-

These tips can help the homeowner make it through the upcoming "dog days of August" while using energy wisely around the house.

# Summer Bugs Are Back

The bugs are back. And they're in a buzz.

Even if you dread that familiar summer scenario, there is little you can do to prevent a run-in with one of the many vicious, venom carrying insects that invade every pool party, picnic, baseball game and barbecue.

"Repellent will keep; mosquitoes at bay, but the only way to avoid the sting of a harmful flying insect like a wasp or honeybee is to stay a safe distance away," says Dr. Robert Fromm, Jr., Director of Emergency Services at The Methodist Hospital in Houston.

Dr. Fromm says swatting at them with your hand may just stir them up, so its best to just move away as fast as you can. ~ If you should disrupt a nest or beehive, run!" says Dr. Fromm.

Certain flying insects, like the honeybee, can sting just once, but several will strike several times and that means more poison penetrating your skin.

"Nausea, vomiting, shortness of breath, weakness and generalized swelling usually mean a lot of venom has been secreted into the skin, ~ says Dr. Fromni. If you notice those symptoms, it's time to see a doctor."

If you are stung by a honeybee, the bee will leave its stinger stuck in your skin along with a small sack which contains venom. Don't squeeze it! Dr. Fromm advises gently scraping it off the skin so the venom will not penetrate.

All insect stings will likely produce some localized swelling, redness of the skin, pain and an itching sensation. "The best way to treat most stings is to apply ice for the swelling and a lotion or cream to relieve the itching," says Dr. Fromm, "but try to resist the urge to scratch the affected area since that often causes an infection."

And one more thing. Interestingly enough, the smell of some fragrances and trash is a magnet for most stinging insects.

They'll get all over it. Like bees on honey. (I just couldn't resist.)

Snider reminds Texas motorists that many people lose their lives within 25 miles of departure and/or destination. This fatal fact is due in a large part to exces-

sive speeds and not wearing safety belts. Remember to buckle up, be alert and have a great vacation this



even your best paying accounts won't pay until they receive a bill. If you're experiencing cash flow problems, we recommend that you send out bills as soon as you complete the work.

Bill frequently. On jobs where you don't complete the work quickly, make partial billings. Bill on the 15th and the 30th of each month. Billing quickly and more frequently will improve cash flow. Bill clearly and accurately.

Inaccurate or unclear invoices will always delay your collection process. To ensure clarity, keep bills simple and uncomplicated. Describe each billing item separately. Check your math. Double-

check all figures and calculations. Make certain that all bills are based on accurate charges. You may wish to provide documentation of delivery or services rendered.

Bill conveniently. Enclose a self-addressed envelope. Make it easy for the person you've billed to pay your bill. Although simple, this technique may move your invoice

to the top of the "to be paid" pile. Expect prompt payment. Once you've sent an accurate bill, you have a right to expect prompt, timely payment. If you don't receive that payment within a reasonable period, communicate your expectation clearly. Don't delay. Get on the phone and let your customer know that you ex-

pect payment. If you're not going to get paid the sooner you find out the better. You may want to take quick action such as cancelling further work orders or shipments.

Follow-up. No one likes to make collection calls. It is stressful. It is not fun. However, there is no fun in not being able to pay your

bills either. When you must make collection calls, get right to the point. Don't beat around the bush and don't apologize for calling. You shouldn't be on the defensive. You have a right to be paid and you need to express it. Follow your call with a short letter confirming your conversation. You'll be pleased with

# **Minding** Your Own **Business**

**OUALITY TIPS** 

Some business-building concepts are so elegantly simple that we say to ourselves, "Why didn't I think of that?" This is the case with a local company's quality improve-

ment program. Culligan Water Systems of Amarillo, TX, uses a straightforward approach for creating excellence from within. Tom Grimes, the company's owner, shared his five-element plan with us several

was developed by the entire staff. I've read the five elements several times as I've sorted piles of information on future column topics. Each time I reviewed the five points, I was reminded that good programs don't have to be complex.

Recently, quality critics have criticized some of America's larger companies' TQM programs because of their complexity. The critics say that several of these programs are failing because the process is too complicated to un-

derstand and implement. We realize that all business management issues are easier to discuss than to put into practice. However, if the process is too complex or if those charged with responsibility of implementing the program feel that it is too complicated, it is doomed from the start.

This is why keeping it simple and straightforward is beneficial.

If you can express the main elements of your quality efforts simply, you can work out the methods of implementation and measurement.

#### **Chrysler's Simple Turnaround**

Lee Iacocca, the retired chairman of Chrysler Corporation, described his success in turning the troubled company around a few years ago. He said the fundamentals were to, "Create a quality product, deliver it to the marketplace and make sure you let everyone know about it."

Iacocca's formula is neither complex nor difficult to understand. He founded it on sound manufacturing principles: Produce and deliver quality and then promote it.

Many specific operations are required to produce quality. You should examine each aspect of your business operation to ensure that it is contributing to quality in your products or services.

The elements of quality will vary from business to business. Some companies will be more product oriented, others more service focused.

For Tom Grimes and his Culligan team, the quality effort began by identifying five areas to improve. They call their process the Q.T.I.P.S. Program. Here it is as






