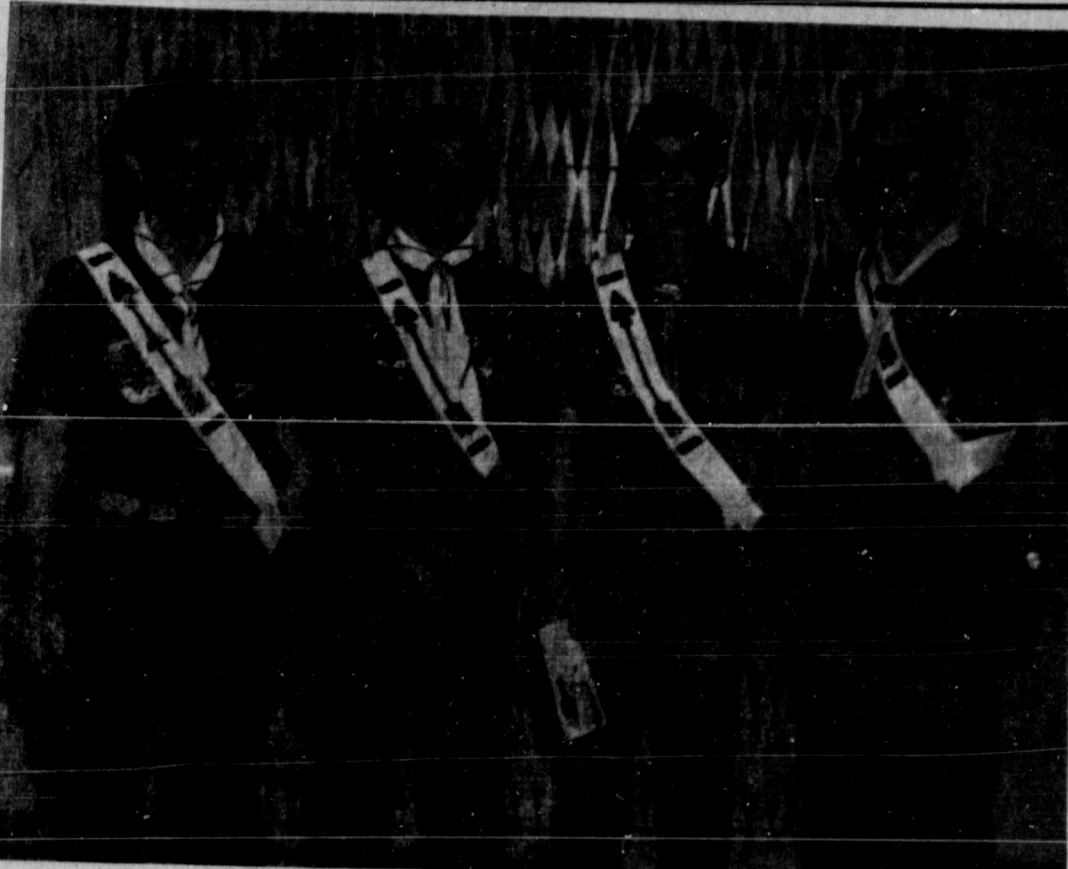

## Stop Diphtheria Shots To Be Available Here

A Stop Diphtheria Clinic will be available to persons in Donley County Friday afternoon, December 18, 1970, from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m., in the old college gymnasium in Clarendon.

The program is under the direction of the Donley County Health Officer, and is held in cooperation with the Texas State Department of Health. No charge will be made for the immunizations.

### WHO SHOULD HAVE DIPHThERIA VACCINE:

1. Everyone two months of age and older who has not had a series of three diphtheria shots as a child, or a series of two diphtheria shots as an adult.

2. DIPHThERIA BOOSTERS ARE NEEDED: By everyone a year after the basic is completed. By pre-schoolers when they enter school. In epidemics by everyone who has not had a booster in the last two years (This year there have been epidemic outbreaks in Texas).

Persons who are ill or have a high fever should not be vaccinated at this time.

School age children are being furnished with permission slips to be signed by their parents and returned to the school. Pre-school children and all adults will be signed up at the clinic. The free vaccine will also protect pre-school children against tetanus and whoopingcough, and others against tetanus. Remember this Clinic Is For Adults as well as for Children.

Funeral services for Bartholomew Wood (Tollie) Lindley, 69, owner and operator of the Broncho Drive Inn Restaurant in Clarendon, will be held at 2:00 p.m. Thursday, December 17, 1970 in the First Baptist Church with Robert C. Jones, retired Church of Christ minister, and Bright Newhouse, minister of the Hedley Church of Christ, officiating. Masonic graveside services and interment will be in Citizens Cemetery, under the direction of Murphy Funeral Home.

Mr. Lindley died at 6 p.m. Monday, December 14th, in Hall County Hospital after a lengthy illness. He was born July 18, 1901 in the Indian Territory of Oklahoma. He lived in Amarillo for 13 years having operated several cafes and was owner and operator of a cafe at 4th and Fillmore Streets for several years before moving to Clarendon in 1963. ### CHS Teams In Tula Tournament

Coach Carl Irlbeck's High School Basketball teams were entered in the Tula Tournament the past week end with games beginning Thursday, December 10 and continuing through Saturday, December 12.

Clarendon's first game for the boys was with Muleshoe. Clarendon took the game 60-55. In the first quarter the score stood at 11-18 but by halftime the Bronchos had overcome the deficit and led 37-31 and by the end of the third period 46-41. Kenny Bacon was high with 31 points and Ronnie Hill dropped in 16 counters. High for Muleshoe was Jerry Putman with 24.

In their second game Clarendon lost to Dimmitt 61-83. The Bronchos got behind in the first quarter 11-17 and trailed throughout the game 25-32 and 40-60. Ronnie Hill sunk 20 points, Kenny Bacon 14, and Elray King 9. High for Dimmitt was Bradford with 23 points.

The Bronchos were able to win their third and final game against Slaton by a score of 73-53. The Bronchos jumped to a lead of 19-8 in the first quarter and at halftime 38-22. The third period ended 56-34. Bacon was again high with 26 points. He was followed by Wayne Carter with 21 and Ronnie Hill with 18. Lynn Kitten was tops for Slaton with 16 counters.

Clarendon girls drew Tula for their first game for a loss of 30-78. The score by quarters was 7-17, 16-46, and 21-61. Joyce Louis dropped in 19 for Clarendon. Tanya Toles of Tula hit 31.

In the second game the CHS girls defeated Muleshoe 45-44. This was an exceptionally fine game. At one time Clarendon was down 24 points. By quarters it was Clarendon 5—Muleshoe 24, 15-38 and 30-40. Lee Ann McCracken came through with 34 points. High for Muleshoe was Jan Winn with 19.

In the CHS Girls' final game they played Slaton and lost by a score of 37-65. By quarters the score was 6-13, 17-35, and 28-52. Lee Ann McCracken counted for 21 points and Sue Brake of Slaton was high with 23.

Tuesday night of this week the CHS teams entertained the Shamrock teams at Broncho Gym.

Clarendon boys defeated Shamrock 61-49 with the score at the end of each period standing at 20-16, 32-26, and 48-34. Bacon was tops with 26; Carter hit 14, and R. Hill 12. High for Shamrock was Lynn Ramsey with 16.

Clarendon girls made a good comeback winning by a tight score 50-48. The tally by quarters was 17-18, 25-30, 26-38 to the final whistle. Free shots proved helpful to the local girls. Lee Ann McCracken dropped in 23. Joan Smith 14 and Joyce Louis 13. High for Shamrock was Aaron with 20.

The Clarendon Tournament will be held here Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week. Clarendon girls will play their first game Thursday night at 7 p.m. and the boys at 8:30 p.m. Turkey will be their first opponent. On our side of the bracket will be Shamrock and Sanford-Fritch and it is likely that the local teams will be playing at 7 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. in their games.

Tuesday the Clarendon teams will travel to Spearman.

Everybody is invited out to these fine games this week. Clarendon girls stand 4-5 in season play, their best record since 1966. Clarendon boys are 5-3.

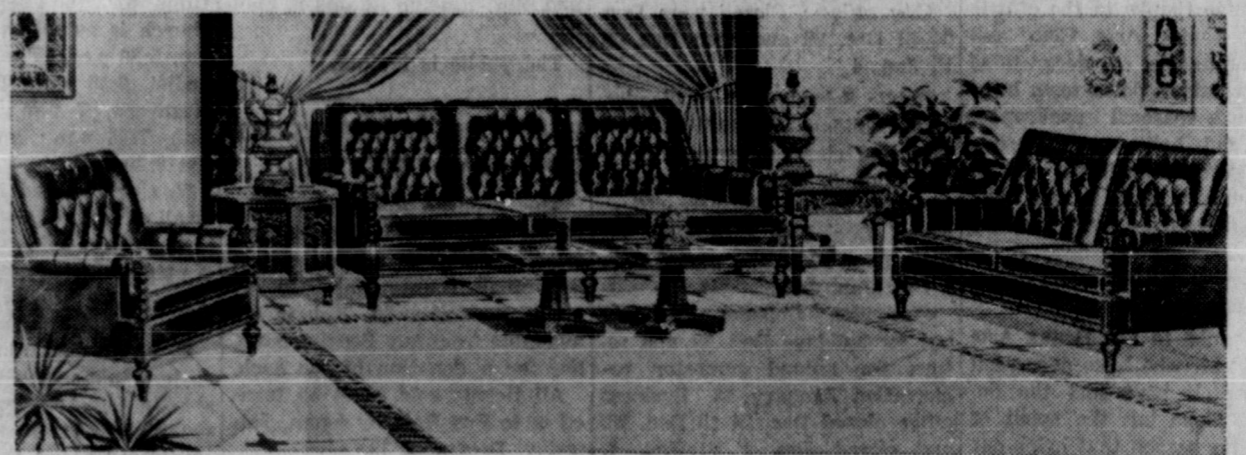
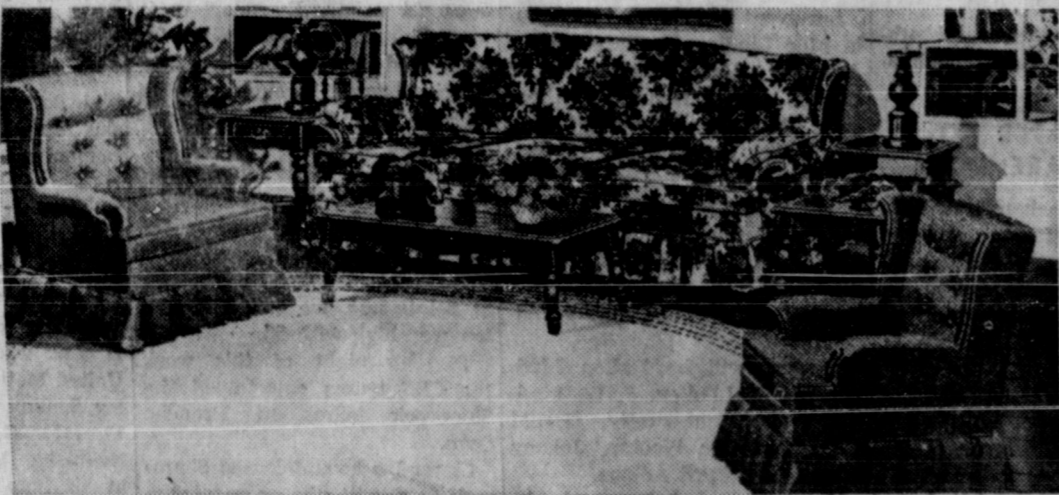

One by one, the dear old-fashioned "country doctors" who made house calls at all hours of the day or night come wind or high water are rapidly fading from the American scene as was evidenced by the recent passing of Dr. D. H. Cox of Hedley, Texas.

Time was when the "minister of the healing arts" traveled horseback, his medicines safely stored in his saddle bags or slung over his shoulder. Mr. Cox was a fast-trotting bay to hasten cross country by buggy to a patient's bedside. This indeed was "a family doctor" who cared for his patients from the cradle to the grave. He borned the babies, counseled the young folks and oftentimes their elders, sat with the dying, comforted the bereaved and wouldn't have traded places with the King of Siam. Dedicated he was to the caring for and the curing of the ills of the ailing.

More often than not, he made do with what was at hand, declined his patients to the best of his knowledge and maintained an ever abiding reverence for all life. Babies were delivered at home. When the expectant mother's time of travail drew near, the frantic husband galloped after 'Doc', and Doc in turn hurried there to be nearby when needed. Always the expectant father, at the doctor's suggestion, was made to boil water and tear rags. Not that these aids would be needed but it gave the nervous man of the house something to do while awaiting the Stork's arrival.

While Dr. Cox didn't go horseback or by buggy, he had the same unflinching dedication to his profession and concern for patients as the old-fashioned country doctor. Born in Topeka, Kansas sixty-seven years ago, Dwight Cox grew up in Nebraska. He was educated as an osteopath physician and surgeon in Kansas and came to Hedley to practice medicine in 1938. There he resided until six months ago when he began a medical partnership with Dr. E. W. Cain in Amarillo.

Dr. Cox was the father of two children, now grown, of whom he was justly proud; a son, Don and a daughter Susan, both accomplished musicians. He was a Mason, a member of the Scottish Rite, a member of The First United Methodist Church of Hedley, and the Hedley Lions Club.

For thirty-one years, Dr. D. H. Cox practiced medicine in the Hedley area. At one time, he was associated with Doctors Goodall and Odum in Memphis. Dr. O. R. Goodall was one of his closest friends. Another time, he practiced with Dr. Lowell in Adair Hospital in Clarendon. The last several years, he has been associated with Dr. Witt of Groom and more recently has been a member of the medical staff of The Groom Hospital.

While few doctors today make house calls at all and, certainly, they travel by car and not in "a one-hoss shay", the same special consideration and tender loving care is expected of them as was meted out by the county doctor of an earlier day and time.

It is with sincere regret that we herein note the passing of a truly dedicated physician, Dr. Dwight Homer Cox, who gave unstintingly of self and service to the Hedley community for almost half a century. He will long be fondly remembered by many who loved and respected him as a gentleman, a scholar, and a worthy exponent of the healing art of medicine.

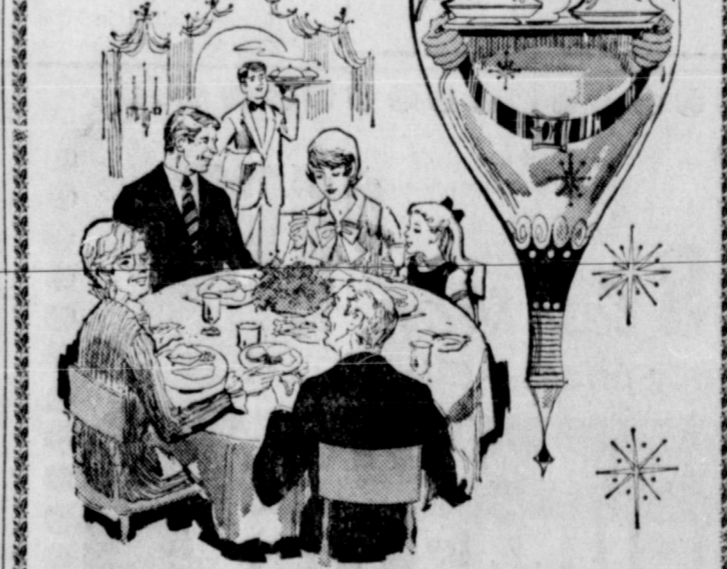

## DPS Predicts Loss Of 87 Lives In Texas Over Holidays

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, warned today that traffic crashes in Texas over the Christmas and New Year holiday periods may claim as many as 87 lives.

He said 52 deaths are expected in the 78 hours of Christmas from 6 p.m. Thursday, December 24 to midnight Sunday, December 27. He also estimated 35 traffic deaths during the New Year Holiday from 6 p.m. Thursday, December 31 to midnight Sunday, January 3.

Speir said the Department of Public Safety will place all available patrolmen on the highways during both holiday periods to enforce the law and aid motorists. He added that many local law enforcement agencies will be joining in this all-out effort to reduce the number of holiday accidents.

The DPS director said a special "Operation Motorcade" would be in effect over both holiday periods, during which periodic tabulations of traffic fatalities will be made and given the widest possible dissemination in order to focus public attention on the added dangers involved in holiday travel.

"We urge each individual driver to join in these efforts and help us prove the estimate of 87 fatalities too high. Many holiday accidents can and will be prevented if Texans will adopt 'Drive Friendly' as their personal slogan while behind the wheel," Speir added.

## COTTON CLASSING

The USDA Cotton Classing Office at Memphis, working about 5 classing days behind schedule, reported 20,900 samples classed the past week to bring the season total to 59,800.

The predominate grade continues to be Light Spotted in the 15/16 class. Mike readings showed 81 percent in the 3.5 to 4.9 range.

The market for Greenbelt cotton gained a few more points this past week being active and strong. Predominant grades brought from 20.10 to 19.75. Cottonseed at gin points was \$9 per ton.

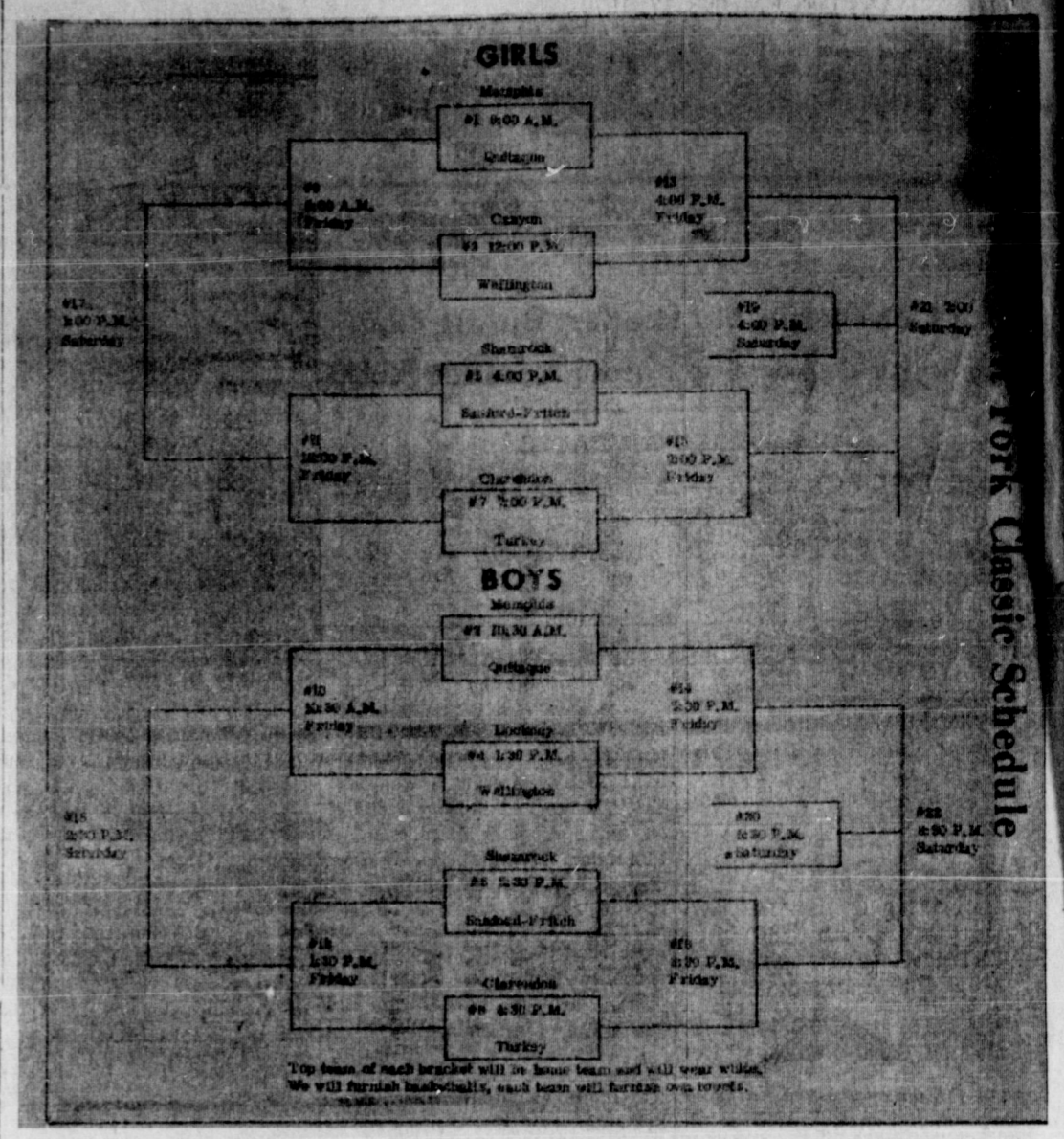
