## Emergency Care Course In Amarillo Set For May 19-21

A practical course on emergency care and transportation of the sick and injured to be held in the Amarillo area is scheduled May 19, 20, and 21, 1970, in the auditorium of the Psychiatric Pavilion of Amarillo Medical Center, 7201 Evans Street in Amarillo, Texas.

Invited to attend the three-day course of lectures and demonstrations are ambulance attendants, policemen, firemen, safety engineers, rescue squads, nurse, public health, civil defense, and other officials or private citizens dealing with the handling of persons who are sick or injured due to accidents.

This course is given free of charge and is expected to attract attendance from a seventy-five mile area around Amarillo. It is given by the Texas State Department of Health and the Potter-Randall County Medical Society.

To furnish this instruction, doctors and nurses from the Amarillo area and members of local police and fire organizations and others will speak and demonstrate on a wide range of subjects, including resuscitation, cardiac massage, splinting of fractures, burns, and other medical emergencies. Aid to snake and spider bite victims, smoke and gas hazards, handling of emotionally disturbed patients, emergency childbirth, and traffic control at the scene will be covered.

**Acres Report—Final Notice**  
Friday, May 15, 1970, is the final date to report your wheat and barley acreages. This is also the final date to report rye and oats which will be left for a cover on diverted acres.

This is important so please don't let this date slip by.

**Diverted Acres**  
Any acreage you plan to use as diverted acres under the 1970 programs must not be harvested in any manner, other than grazing during the approved period. Diverted acres must not be grazed after May 14 or before October 15, 1970.

The planting of sweet or forage sorghums on diverted acres will not be authorized for 1970. Cane or African Millet are not approved cover crops on diverted acres. Please check with us if you have any questions concerning eligible cover crops.

Some of you had wheat planted on diverted acres which was grazed until May 14. Let us remind you that this land must be plowed just as quickly as possible.

## HOME USE OF 2, 4, 5-T HAS BEEN SUSPENDED

The federal government has announced that the registration of liquid formulations of weed killer 2, 4, 5-T for use around the home and on lakes, ponds and ditch banks has been canceled. The government also announced that it intended to cancel registered uses of non-liquid formulations of 2, 4, 5-T around the home and on food crops intended for human consumption (apples, blueberries, barley, corn, oats, rye, sugar cane, rice).

## Hail Hits Lelia Lake Area Monday Night

Hail, the size of baseballs, pounded the Lelia Lake area Monday night and damage was quite heavy in some areas. The hail started southeast of Clarendon and covered an area from east of town to the west of Hedley. Up to 3 inches of rain was reported in some places.

Here in town we received only light hail and .16 inch of moisture. This brings our yearly total to 3.68.

The mercury jumped this week also with 93 being recorded on the 10th and a warm 96 degrees on the 11th.

The hail here Monday night was associated with the frontal system that spawned the disastrous Tornado that hit Lubbock shortly before 10 p.m. Monday night.

## New Fire Department Storm Warning

When it was found that many area citizens were not aware that our area was under a tornado alert at the time of the recent tornado in this area, the Clarendon Fire Department adopted a new plan for alerting the community. The new plan was tried out Monday night of this week when severe weather prevailed.

Beginning immediately the following plan will be used. When the area is under an alert and threatening cloud is in the area two blasts will be sounded on the siren each hour on the hour.

If the cloud becomes more threatening, the blasts will be repeated at shorter time intervals.

If a funnel is sighted the siren will be sounded repeatedly at very short intervals. Two blasts of the siren will continue to be signal of severe weather or tornado danger. The difference will be in the time between soundings indicating the severity of the storm approaching or in the area.

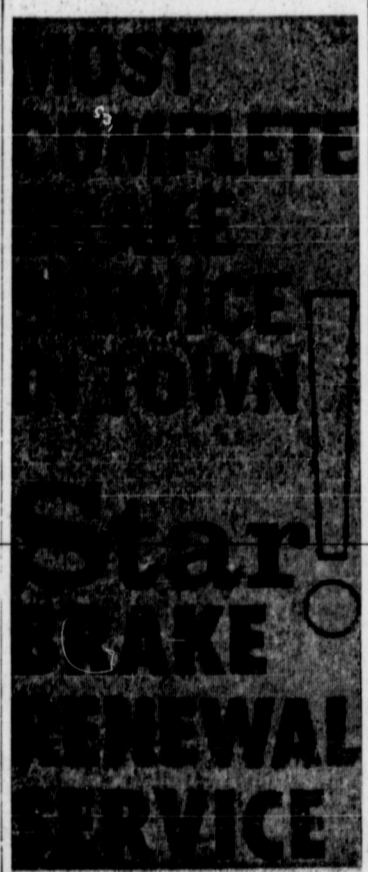

**Highlights and Sidelights**  
From Your State Capitol  
By Vern Stanford

U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough and State Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler were upset victims in the May 2 Democratic primary to Lloyd Bentsen and State Rep. Robert L. (Bob) Armstrong.

Scene of political action now shifts to the general election where Bentsen faces Republican Senate candidate George Bush. Gov. Preston Smith, unopposed in the Democratic primary, is confronted with GOP Paul Eggers Bush and Eggers won nominations easily over Robert Morris and Roger Martin in the Republican primary.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin won third term nomination handily over Judge David H. Brown and faces Edward M. Yurri, GOP, in November. Democrat Ben Ramsey had no difficulty with Connie Lawson and is unopposed in November. Truman Roberts defeated Earl W. Smith for Court of Criminal Appeals. James G. Denton appeared to be the Supreme Court contest winner over Matt Davis and Hawthorne Phillips. Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, unopposed in the Democratic primary, is challenged by Byron Fullerton, GOP, in November.

ber. Four other GOP candidates will wage token campaigns for statewide office against Democrats.

**CAPITOL PRECAUTIONS** — Tighter security measures may be ordered for the historic state capitol — always wide open to visitors — in the wake of a violent anti-war demonstration there last week.

Three 82-year-old etched glass door panels were smashed when a mob of 200 obscenity-shouting youths stormed through the rotunda. A tear gas grenade was tossed into the north corridor as police chased the demonstrators back through the building and on to the University of Texas campus.

Twice within the next two days, the capitol was evacuated due to telephone bomb threats. Riot-equipped Department of Public Safety officers took up stations inside or patrolled the grounds as demonstrations continued on the UT campus.

Gov. Preston Smith said damage and disrespect may force tougher security, though the capitol has been the scene of many undisturbed peaceful demonstrations in the past.

**COURTS SPEAK** — State Supreme Court agreed with lower courts that 6,972 acres of Victoria County oil land belong to private owners, not the state, in a prolonged land vacancy dispute. Had plaintiff in the vacancy action been right, Texas might have recovered up to \$100 million in mineral rights.

Dallas grocery chain stores were rejected by the High Court in their effort to obtain a sales tax break due to trading stamps given their customers. Chain wanted to deduct the cost of stamps before figuring the sales tax owed the state.

Third Court of Civil Appeals affirmed \$40,815 in damages to a brakeman injured in Atcheson, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad braking accident, but cut the award \$38,650 below the trial court verdict.

**EDUCATION POLICY APPROVED** — State Board of Education adopted the policy that contributions of ethnic and racial groups should be taught.

Board also proclaimed that books must be free of offensive language and that life science texts will present evolution as a theory rather than a fact.

Per capita state aid to local districts was increased from \$114.40 to \$117.65 per student for the current school year. Board authorized application for \$1.8 million in federal anti-poverty funds to help train 900 migrant workers for city jobs, approved a \$2 million special vocational program for poor students and empowered the Texas Education Agency to seek a \$50,000 federal grant to continue technical assistance to school districts with degradation and other ethnic problems.

**APPOINTMENTS** — Governor Smith named Preston H. Dial Jr. judge of the vacant 175th district court in San Antonio after

Dial was nominated for the post in the Democratic primary.

Randall B. Wood, native of Edom, is new director of elections in the secretary of state's office, succeeding Mrs. Mary K. Wall who retired.

Governor Smith has named R. L. Thornton Jr. of Dallas to Board of regents of Texas Woman's University and Dr. Paul C. Witt of Abilene to State Board of Examiners in Basic Sciences. Robert A. Hansen of Sioux City, Iowa, will become superintendent of Texas School for Blind on June 1.

Fifteen-member state textbook committee has been picked and held its first meeting May 8 to begin a five-month series of hearings on new textbooks.

President Nixon appointed Byron Fullerton of Austin to national advisory council on education professors.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES** — State Credit Union Commissioner cannot enter a proposed truth in lending liaison agreement with the Federal Trade Commission, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held in a recent opinion.

In other rulings, Martin concluded that State Comptroller can write rules by which Texas Tech University art works can be temporarily exchanged with other universities and museums.

Texas Tort Claims act does not cover school districts except as to motor vehicles, but limitations does not apply to Junior College districts.

Panel code article pertaining to seizure and confiscation of devices prohibited in Espiritu Santo Bay and other waters pending trial, and destruction of the prohibited devices on conviction for possession or use, is constitutional.

**NURSING HOMES ASK RAISE** — Nursing home operators, claiming they face financial crisis, want authority to levy a \$25 a month supplemental charge for welfare patients in addition to the state allocation.

Plan seeks a six per cent increase in state payments for patients requiring skilled care or a total of \$81 a month. State costs in other categories would decline if families pay the supplemental charge.

Meanwhile, State Board of Public Welfare, which took the request under study, heard new federal family assistance legislation backed by the president would cost Texas \$57 million a year more than present programs.

**WELFARE** — State Board of Public Welfare announced that only 12 counties have not decided on a course of action on the Dallas federal court order that 90 Texas counties must begin food-aid programs for the poor.

These 12 include Archer, Bailey, Blanco, Castro, Gregg, Kendall, Llano, Mills, Oldham, Parmer, and San Saba Counties. However, Blanco, Llano, Mills and San Saba County officials reportedly were working actively on the problem.

Another 31 counties had refused to operate food programs, so the State Department of Public Welfare planned to operate commodity programs at federal expense in Aransas, Baylor, Bosque, Bowie, Clay, Collin, Colorado, Coryell, Deaf Smith, Denton, Edwards, Ellis, Fort Bend, Gillespie, Gray, Grayson, Hood, Jack, Johnson, Kaufman, Kerr, Lamar, Randall, Refugio, Roberts, Rockwall, Rusk, Uvalde, Wheeler, Wise and Wood Counties.

**WATER RIGHTS HEARING** — Texas Water Rights Commission will present for consideration its proposed rules, regulations and procedures for administering the state water rights adjudication law in a public hearing in Austin at 10 a.m. June 4.

Also to be considered are proposed rules to govern the operation of Amistad Reservoir near Del Rio.

Commission wants persons planning to comment on its proposals to file written statements before May 30, setting forth their reasons and any other pertinent information.

Copies of the rules may be obtained in advance by writing the W.R.C., Austin 78711.

John C. White, Agriculture Commissioner, has set March 6 for a hearing in Robstown to consider quarantine measures against St. Augustine decline, a virus grass disease which has been found in several Texas areas.

### Social Security News

Q—I understand that recent changes in the Social Security Act raised everyone's benefits by 15 percent. However, I haven't heard anything about the cost. Will the social security funds operate at a deficit this year?

A—No, the income to the program is estimated to exceed benefit and administrative costs for every year over the long range future.

Q—I know that the amount you pay when you are hospitalized under Medicare has been raised from \$44 to \$52. Has the \$50 medical insurance deductible been increased also?

A—No. Only the hospital insurance deductible was increased; the medical insurance deductible remains the same.

Q—I was baptized as an infant but I have never checked to see if a record is available. Should I check before I apply for social security?

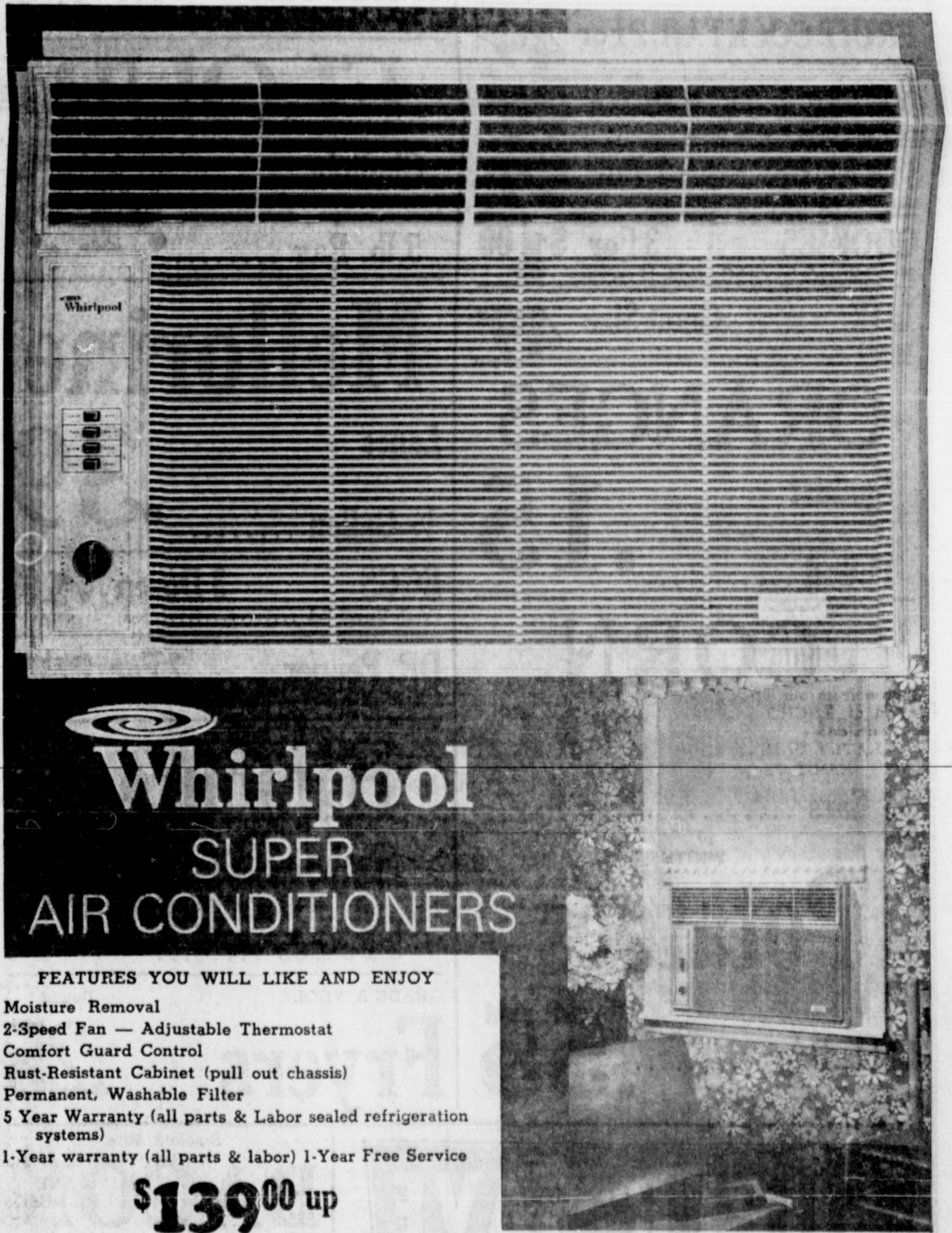
A—Yes, applicants who were baptized before age 5, and who do not have a birth certificate recorded before that age, must try to obtain their baptismal record. Studies show that in most cases these baptismal records are available upon request. 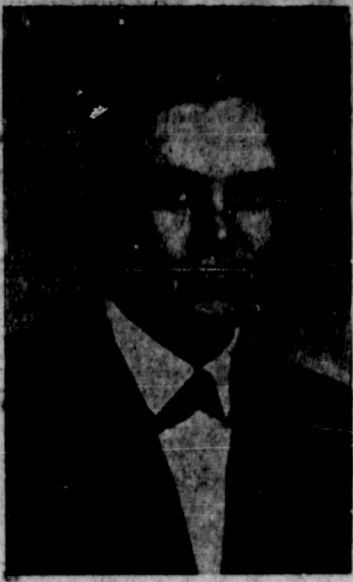

**Taxpayers Ask IRS**  
Q—I didn't think I had a refund coming so I waited until almost April 15 before I worked out my tax return. How long will it take for me to get my refund?  
A—If there are no mistakes on your return to delay processing, you should have your refund in June, about six weeks after you filed. It might take a bit longer, however, due to the large volume of returns filed in April.  
Q—What should I do about a delayed refund?  
A—If you have not heard anything about your refund and it has been 10 weeks since you mailed in your return, then you should call your local IRS office. You should wait 10 weeks before calling as this period of time is generally sufficient for the refund to be issued or a letter sent to the taxpayer explaining why it is delayed. To call before 10 weeks can delay the processing of your return.  
When inquiring about a missing or delayed refund, give your name, current address, Social Security number and the date the return was filed.  
Q—How do I get a Social Security number? I need one for a summer job?  
A—Your local Social Security office has Form SS-5 you can use to apply for a Social Security number. Send the completed form to the Social Security Administration and they will assign you a number.  
Q—What do I do with the Forms I had left over after I sent in my estimated tax declaration?  
A—Keep them for your remaining quarterly estimated tax payments. The worksheet will help you determine the amount of your payments and make any adjustments that are necessary. The pre-addressed vouchers and envelopes should be used to make your payments.  
Q—I'm buying a house this summer. What records should I keep?  
A—Your records should show the purchase price of the house and any improvements you make to it that would affect your cost basis. This information will be necessary to determine whether you have any gain to report when it comes time to sell.  
Each year you should keep a record of the property taxes and interest paid on mortgage loans. These can be deducted on your income tax return if you itemize. More information can be found in Publication 590, Tax Information on Deductions for Homeowners. Send a post card to your IRS district office for a free copy.

**Substitute Chemicals For Hand Labor**  
You can spray your way out of the grass and weeds in cotton cheaper and easier than by using hand hoeing, states a Texas A&M University cotton specialist.  
Fred C. Elliott, Extension cotton specialist, adds that post emergence chemical weed control practices in cotton are positive control measures.  
In small, young cotton — three inches high — if grasses alone are the problem, Elliott suggests the use of naphtha or DSMA plus surfactant formulations. If a combination of both grass and broadleaf weeds are the problem in small, cotton, then a combination of DSMA plus Cotoran plus surfactant is suggested.  
After cotton is larger and is six to eight inches tall, the continued use of Cotoran plus DSMA plus surfactant is recommended. Also notes Elliott, a number of other materials can be used with DSMA plus surfactant. These include Diuron, Herban, or Caparol.  
The cotton specialist emphasizes that any tough grass and weed control situation can be handled without expensive hand hoeing.  
He suggests that a copy of B-1029, "Suggestions for Weeds Control with Chemicals," be obtained from the local county agent. He emphasizes that container labels should be read and carefully followed when chemicals are being used for any purpose, including grass and weed control.
