

Social Security News

Q-I understand that recen changes in the Social Security Act raised everyone's benefits by 15 percent. However, I haven't heard anything about the cost. Will the social security funds operate at a dificit this year?

A-No, the income to the program is estimated to exceed benefit and administrative costs for every year over the long range future.

Q-I know that the amount you pay when you are hospitalized under Medicare has been raised from \$44 to \$52. Has the \$50 medical insurance deductible been increased also?

A-No. Only the hospital insurance deductible was increased; the medical insurance deductible remains the same.

Q-I was baptized as an infant but I have never checked to see if a record is available. Should I check before I apply for social

A-Yes, applicants who were baptized before age 5, and who do not have a birth certificate recorded before that age, must try to obtain their baptismal record. Studies show that in most cases these baptismal records are available upon request. You will get your first social security check much faster if you have evidence of age with you when you file your application.


