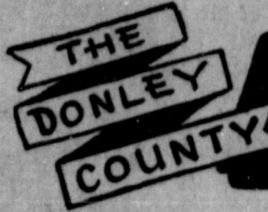
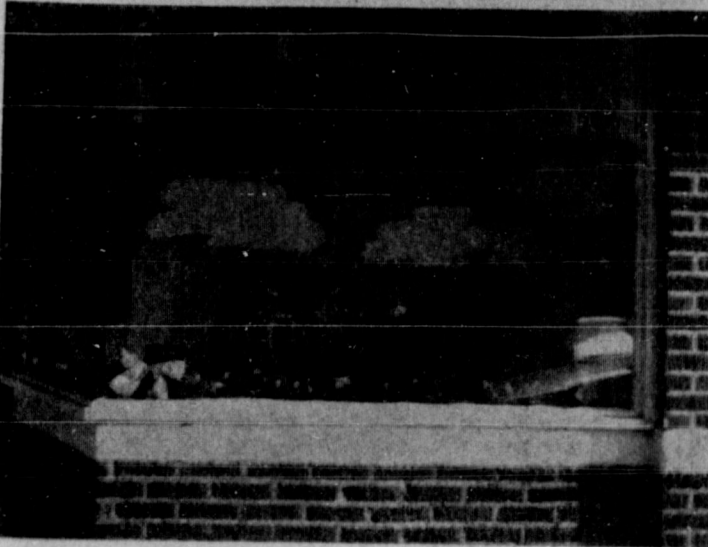

Bulldogs Rank Fifth In WJC Conference

The Clarendon College Bulldogs are ranked fifth this week in the Western Junior College Conference with Amarillo College holding the top spot followed by South Plains, Frank Phillips, and Howard County.

The Bulldogs hosted Trinidad, Colorado here November 23 and came out on top with a 87-72 score. November 24 Lamar, Colorado played in the Clarendon Gymnasium. The Bulldogs racked up 85 points to Lamar's 55.

In the tournament at Pratt, Kansas, Clarendon defeated Johnson County 76-74. The Bulldogs lost out in their final game to the host team, Pratt, by a score of 72-81.

In conference play, the Bulldogs have several players classed among the top scorers. Tony Moya has a total of 102 points to his record; Bobby Martin a total of 85 points, and Jean Villarreal a total of 79 points.

Friday night of this week the Bulldogs host Garden City and Saturday night host Liberal. They play two road games December 7-8, one at Trinidad and the other at Lamar.

Farm News from County ASCS Com.

Cotton Production Records
We have been advised that producers will be required to bring in 1970 production records only. Perhaps some adjustments because of abnormal weather conditions can be made by the County Committee.

Farm Bill
The farm bill which had been passed by the House has passed the Senate and will now go to the President for his signature.

Livestock Report
If you receive one of the questionnaires from the Livestock Reporting Service to be mailed out later this month, you are urged to fill it out carefully and return it to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin.

Grain Sorghum Loan
Basic loan rate for Grain Sorghum is \$1.63 cwt. If your farm was signed up in the 1970 Feed Grain Program, the grain sorghum is eligible to be placed in the loan.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON FARM PROGRAMS FOR THE 70'S
A national conference on farm programs for the 70's has been called in Washington, D. C., November 30 through December 3, by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service—Farm Program Agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Attending from Texas will be the members of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee: Clarence A. Danklefs, Chairman; Charles L. Calhoun, Frank H. Hinkson, John B. Rudd and Jose M. Villarreal, Members. Also attending will be D. W. McElwath, Executive Director of the State ASCS Office, W. M. Hott, Tim Moore, Harold J. Baker, Robert R. Lorenz, Kermit J. Decker and Donald B. Watson, Program Specialists. State office staff members of ASCS, will also attend.

High ranking government officials will address the conference on a variety of current topics, with interest expected to center on new farm legislation which now has been signed into law by the President.

Broad, long-range agricultural questions also will be discussed by Secretary of Agriculture Clif-

ford M. Hardin, Under Secretary, J. Phil Campbell, Assistant Secretary, Clarence D. Palmby, ASCS Administrator, Kenneth E. Frick and other USDA Officials.

On the opening day of the National Farm Program Conference, Oklahoma Congressman Page Belcher of the House Agriculture Committee will be the luncheon speaker. A featured speaker that afternoon will be Attorney General John Mitchell.

"Most of the conference will be devoted to information on the new farm legislation," ASC Committee Chairman Danklefs said. "The legislation is a significant change in American farm policy and programs. It is designed to give farmers more opportunity to manage production for market demand and increase farm income. It provides farmers more freedom in management of their farms than any previous farm legislation."

He stated it was his understanding that producers could look forward to learning details of the new farm programs in the near future. "The National Conference on Farm Programs for the 70's is the first step in acquainting farmers with the new directions of the farm program," Danklefs said.

Mildred M. Ritter, Donley County Executive Director and the Donley County ASCS Committee; Lacy M. Noble, Chairman; Elmer Dishman, and A. B. Spalding will attend a meeting on December 9, in Amarillo on the new Farm Programs.

COTTON MARKETING

Cotton harvesting seems to have reached its peak in the area according to the USDA Cotton Classing office in Memphis, Texas. Ideal weather for harvesting has prevailed for several days.

The past week 12,700 samples were classed to bring the season total to 23,900. Light spotted grades showed a marked gain accounting for 72 percent. Predominant grades classed the past week were Middling Light Spotted and Light Spotted. Mike readings remained in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9.

Marketing was active with prices ranging from 15/16 at 19.65 to 15/16 at 19.30 in the desired range. Average price for seed at gin points was \$57 per ton.

Q-My husband passed away recently. We were living together at the time of his death. Can I authorize the Social Security Administration to pay the lump sum death payment directly to the funeral home?

A-No, the lump sum death payment, or burial payment, must go to the widow or widower if he or she was living with the deceased at the time of death.

Q-I have been married twice and have two children by my first marriage. My first husband recently became disabled and is now drawing social security disability benefits. Are my two children eligible for social security benefits based on their father's work?

A-Yes, they are eligible for the same amount of social security as any other children he may have. You will need to file an application with your social security representative and present their birth certificates.

Q-My husband passed away ten days ago. We were both receiving social security benefits under his number. Is a burial payment going to be made, and who will receive it?

A-Yes, a burial payment will be made, provided your husband's social security benefit was based on his being insured. The burial payment will go to you, if you and your husband were living together at the time of death. If you were separated due to marital difficulties, the payment will go to the funeral home, or if the funeral home has been paid, to the person or persons who paid the funeral expenses.

Q-I will be 65 years of age in two months and have already applied for Medicare. My wife is only 58 years old. Will I be able to include her in my coverage under Medicare?

A-A person must be age 65 in order to become eligible for health insurance protection under Medicare. Your wife will be able to qualify for Medicare, on your social security record, when she attains age 65.

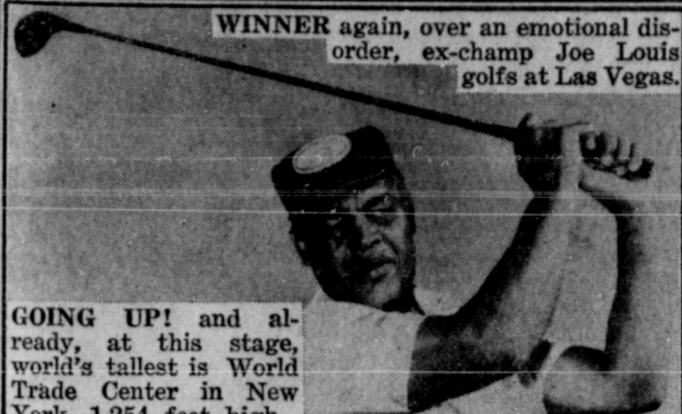

IRS Answers To Taxpayers Questions

Can I deduct the contribution I made to one of the candidates running for office here?

A—No, contributions to political candidates and campaigns are not deductible.

Q—As part of my job I work at home a lot and have a little office for myself. How do I handle my deduction for this?

A—To qualify for a deduction, you must show you are required to provide your own space and facilities as a condition of your employment and you use it regularly for business purposes.

You must also show the portion of your home used for this purpose and the time it is so used.

For example, if the office space accounts for 10% of the space in your home, you may take 10% of such items as rent, depreciation, heat, light, insurance, real estate taxes and mortgage interest. If you use the office portion only half the time for business purposes, then you may deduct only 5% of the expenses as a business deduction.

Q—If I give presents to some of my customers can I deduct the cost as a business expense?

A—Yes, business gifts are a deductible expense as long as they do not exceed \$25, to any one customer during the year. If gifts total more than \$25, only \$25 may be deducted. A gift to a customer's wife or child must generally be included with any gift to the customer himself in figuring the \$25 limit.

Note that gifts which cost \$4 or less are not subject to this limit if your name is clearly and permanently printed on the item and is one of a number of identical items distributed by you. This would cover calendars, pens and similar items.
