

A-It is.

Q-Is there some way I can apply to be relieved from this

A-There is, provided you take action before your induction into the armed services.

Q-How?

A-You can file with your draft board a form called "Application by Alien for Relief from Training and Service in the Armed Forces."

Q-Is this a right, or can the application be denied?

A-It is a right, provided you have not been admitted for permanent residence. An alien admitted for permanent residence is not eligible to file this application.

Q-I'm thinking of applying for citizenship. Would signing the application have any effect on this?

A-It would. If you are relieved from liability for training and service on these grounds, you will become permanently ineligible to become a citizen of the United States, ineligible to receive an immigrant visa, and will be excluded from entry into the U.S. for permanent residence, which includes Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Virgin Islands.


