





# Who will be replacement for O'Connor?

Will Sandra Day O'Connor ever get to retire? Will the president ever get a suitable replacement for her? Will that replacement ever get past the US Senate?

America's first female justice announced her retirement back in June, and President Bush has been having a bit of trouble naming a

replacement for her.

For months the safe money had been on Chief Justice William Rehnquist being the first to depart the court on Bush's watch, but then O'Connor surprised everybody by announcing editor's her retirement before Rehnquist could die. rate cartoons from reality, right?







Somewhere along the way, Harriet came to that same realization and promptly withdrew her nomination

O'Conner by this point was definitely ready to go play shuffleboard in Florida, and so Bush found a serious replacement - Judge Samuel Alito.

This fellow has a pretty solid conservative track record, has experience in government, and has been a federal judge since 1990. Most importantly, he's been through senate confirmation once already. It makes one wonder why Bush didn't just nominate this guy to start with.

But, of course, it doesn't matter that Alito has been through the Senate's sausage-maker once. Now he's got to do it again.

Unfortunately, now the Senate is too busy to be bothered with little things like Supreme Court nominations. The Democrats have put the filibuster in the stable for the time being and started using new tactics to stall Republican action. Minority Leader Harry Reid last week blew the dust off the rule book and came up with a motion that stopped Senate business, sent most people out of the building, locked the doors, and kicked off a virtually unknown closed session about national security. Which made Majority Leader Bill "Gomer" Frist really, really mad. Gosh, he was really, really steamed. In his own words, he "just won't be able to trust Sen. Reid anymore." Well, no \$\*&#, Sherlock. Why did you ever trust him in the first place? But I digress.

these famous words, he could scarcely have predicted the fate of his two certainties. Today, even death offers no relief from taxes. Supporters of the Death Tax do not believe that it affects hard-working, everyday people. Many ordinary folks, however, find it difficult to pass the American dream on to their children. The legacies we will leave to our children depend upon the government taking strong action against these taxes. I believe the Congress must repeal the Death Tax permanently and immediately.

When the Death Tax is calculated, an individual's bank account holdings, investments, land and even insurance policies are considered taxable assets. The IRS may take up to 55 percent of portions of the deceased's estate. Some people might think this tax only affects millionaires, but thousands of Americans lose their inheritances to taxes every year.

Numerous Texas families dedicate their lives to the land they work. A family ranch or farm is much more than the plowed soil or wide grasslands you see from the road. The land is the heart of the family — a heritage passed on from father to son, from mother to daughter. Yet it is precisely these families whose property can be so adversely affected by the Death Tax

In 1966, the average acre of South Texas ranch land cost just \$196, even after adjusting for inflation. Due to appreciation, this same acre is now valued at \$1,779, making the tax burden nine times higher than when the land was purchased. To shoulder this burden and keep its land, a bereaved family may be forced to take out huge loans, incurring debt they may not be able to manage, or sell the land altogether.

One woman in Hill County was surprised to learn that her uncle left her 4,500 acres of land the family had owned since the turn of the century. She was even more surprised when she learned the family would have to pay \$1.7 million in taxes to keep the land. When her father died, he too left his portion of the family land to her, along with a \$565,000 tax bill. Unfortunately, she believes she will have to carry debt against the land for the rest of her life.

The Death Tax also attacks familyowned businesses. Only 30 percent of all family-owned businesses are passed down to a second generation, and only 13 per-


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some small businesses, causing employees to lose long-held jobs. One study found that 77 percent of family businesses that entered bankruptcy had failed after the unexpected death of the founders.

Bruce Thompson began his career working for large grocery chains and later struck out on his own, founding Market Basket Foods. He worked hard and made sacrifices, and his small grocery business gradually grew into a family-owned chain of 37 stores. Today, his son, Skylar Thompson, is president of the company. Bruce fears that when he passes on, the Death Tax will take away most of the business's capital base. This loss will jeopardize jobs throughout southeastern Texas and southwestern Louisiana.

Small businesses are the core of our economy. They are the engine that drives our nation, and they provide a livelihood for millions of our citizens. When family heads pass on, however, there is often little they can do to preserve their achievement.

Tax disregards the sacrifice of those who risked everything to provide for today's generation.

Ranchers and conservation groups alike fear that the Death Tax will destroy priceless wildlife habitats. The need to sell part of their inherited land to pay the tax man forces many landowners to sell their land piecemeal to developers. Agricultural land near urban areas is particularly at risk. Today's wheat field or pasture could become tomorrow's parking lot.

We in Congress have begun to phase out the Death Tax; and it is currently slated to disappear by 2010. In 2011, however, the tax will be back in full force. Individuals who would owe no tax before midnight December 31, 2010 will suddenly owe huge amounts if they pass away just moments later.

I am a strong opponent of the Death Tax, and I believe it should be repealed permanently. I am a co-sponsor of Senate Bill 420, which would make permanent the current phaseout of the Death Tax. I am also a co-sponsor of Senate Bill 988, which would make the repeal effective for people who have died since January 1, 2005.

Americans work hard for what they have and take pride in their achievements.

#### **Avian Flu: Prevention and Treatment**

Numerous news reports have been published during recent months about the spread of the avian (bird) flu in Asia and Europe among chickens, ducks, and other fowl. At a recent meeting of health officials regarding potential human health problems related to the virus, much discussion centered on bird flu virus mutations, the need to develop a new vaccine against various avian flu strains, and ways to increase production of one or more drugs that may fight the virus if it spreads from fowl to humans.

Drugs in the News

Although scientists are working to develop a vaccine that would be effective against avian flu, presently no such vaccine is available. Media stories have centered on a drug called Tamiflu and its role in a possible bird flu pandemic. The drug appears to be effective against certain bird flu strains, while other antiviral drugs have not shown much effect against this virus. Recently, federal officials approached the manufacturer of Tamiflu regarding the possibility of having other drug companies make generic versions of Tamiflu to ease a shortage that would occur if an avian flu pandemic in humans occurred.



## Hunt addresses **4-H meeting** By Ashlyn Tubbs


The Donley County 4-H meeting was held on November 1, at the Family Life Center. President Paul Goetze called the meeting to order at 6:00.


