by thoroughly spraying the trees with one of the following insecticides: sevin, malathion, dieldrin, lead arsenate or toxaphere. Several spray applications may be necessary to control later generations of the beetle. Be sure to follow the label directions of the insecticide used,

Students Withholding Tax Exemption

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 is helping thousands of Texas students save time and trouble on filing an income tax return this year. This summer students who will not owe any income tax for the year can fill out the new Withholding Exemption Certificate, Form W-4E. This authorizes their employer to stop withholding tax and they won't have to file an income tax return next | January 1, to get their money

The same rule applies to some retired persons and part-time workers. For 1970, a single person who makes less than \$1,725 owes no tax. This is based on the \$1,-000 low income allowance and GRADUATES AT KEMPER a personal exemption of \$625. A taxpayer over 65 can earn wages up to \$2,350 without incurring a tax liability. If you qualify, talk to your payroll office, but you will not ordinarily qualify if you are married, due to the community property law in Texas.
