## Land Board accepting bids on tracts in 37 counties

Information on 55 tracts of state land included in a September high bid sale of forfeited veterans tracts is now available, Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro announced.

Located in 37 different Texas counties across the state, the tracts range in size from 10 acres in Montgomery and San Jacinto County to a 61 acre tract in Panola County.

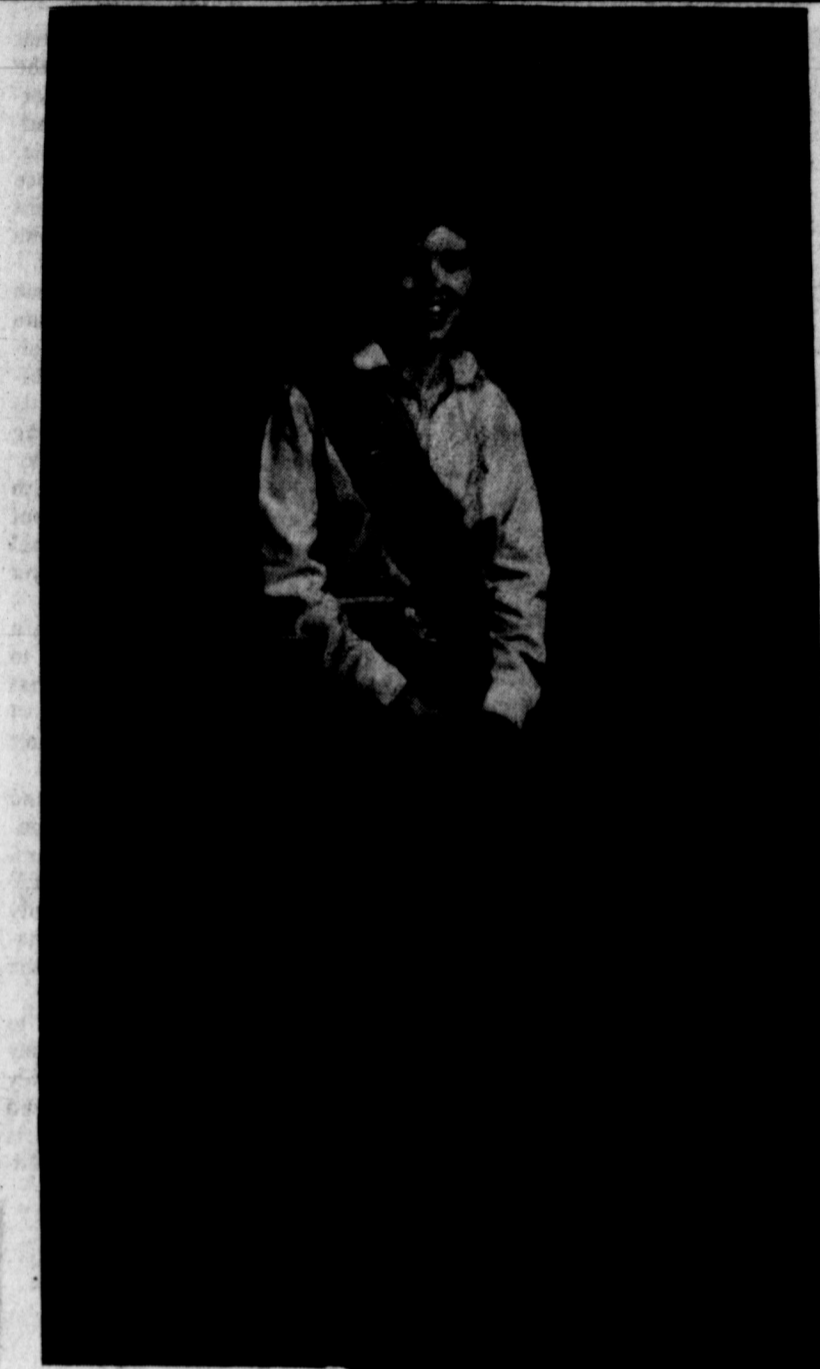
A public reading of bids submitted to the Veterans Land Board will be held on September 25, 1985 at 9 a.m. in Room 118 of the Stephen F. Austin Bldg. at 1700 N. Congress in Austin.

Mauro, who serves as Chairman of the Veterans Land Board, said, "I want to urge all Texans that have been looking for good land to take advantage of this unusual high-bid sale. Everybody has an equal shot at winning under this arrangement."

The tracts are divided into two lots with 40 acre tracts in Section I restricted to bidding by Texas Veterans. Another 15 tracts in Section II are open to bids from both veterans and the general public.

"There's an enormous interest in this sale," Mauro said, "so I urge you to get out as soon as possible, take a look at the tracts that interest you, and get your bids in."

The sale will be by sealed bid only with a minimum bid set by the Veterans Land Board. All bids must be received by the board before September 25 at 9 a.m. at which time

## Clarendon's sales tax down from 1984

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$112.3 million in local sales tax payments to 1,005 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

August checks represent taxes collected on sales made in June and the second quarter and reported to the Comptroller by July 20.

Clarendon's net payment for the year is \$10,425.18. Comparable payment for the same period last year was \$10,702.62. Total payments for Clarendon this year are \$55,685.13. This is down from \$56,916.00 for the same period in 1984. This is a 2.16 percent reduction in sales tax so far this year.

Hedley has received \$3,818.99 this year, down from \$3,939.57 from last year, a 3.06 percent decrease for the year. Howardwick is down 3.98

percent, receiving \$7,071.23 this year and 7,376.25 for the same period last year.

These figures reflect our shop at home efforts. The more we shop in Clarendon, Hedley and Howardwick, the more sales tax returns and helps keep other taxes down.

Claude's sale tax report indicates that they received 3.32 percent more this period than they did the same period last year.

Wellington's reports are up 2.58 percent over last period. Memphis also reported 3.53 percent increase in sales tax.

Bullock's office reported that the City of Howardwick received \$411.66 from their 12 percent mixed drink tax.

## Care Unit offers variety of help

"You were the only one who would help me."

It's a familiar statement heard by Kay Kropff, program manager for the Palo Duro Hospital CareUnit.

"It is time that people know they can reach out and realize that other people will help them," Kropff said. "When they reach out we will be there."

"The first step is the hardest for people to take. But once they reach out, we do not leave them hanging because we really do care."

The Palo Duro Hospital CareUnit is one of many units under the supervision of the CompCare Corporation. CompCare is headquartered in Florida and California. The corporation has existed since 1971 serving the nation with different health care programs set up in units stationed around the country.

The Palo Duro CareUnit is known for a program that uses a team approach in the treatment of alcoholism and other drug dependencies. But the CareUnit is there for more than just alcohol/drug abusers that need help, Kropff said.

The unit is there for problems with eating disorders, stress, adolescent stress, adolescent drug/alcohol abusers, sexual dysfunctions and physical rehabilitation.

"If we cannot help people with a certain problem we refer them to another unit that specializes in that particular problem," Kropff said. I get the patient in the very best unit that they will benefit from.

"I set it up for them. I arrange and pay for transportation," she said. "If they stay for the whole program, we pay for the transportation back."

The CareUnit is a community service where the initial consultations and evaluations are free and the after-care sessions are free.

"I treat people the way I want to be treated," Kropff said. "If they have a problem of any kind, they need to take that first initial step and call. One thing I want to stress is that we protect their confidentiality."

"We ask people to leave their name and number so that we can follow up on helping them, but they don't have to. Their biggest fear is that everybody will know, but we keep everything confidential."

The CareUnit offers a four to six week drug/alcohol program. The patient is medically detoxed, Kropff said. After the patient is out of detox, which is called special care, he is drug free. The unit team observes and evaluates at all times.

"People with alcohol problems need to realize that it is a disease that is progressive until death unless some changes are made," Kropff said. "We are here to help people make those changes. They need to realize that they are not going to get better until they are ready to make changes."

Tied in with the drug/alcohol program is a service called the Employee Assistance Program. We teach employers what to look for and how to help their employee.

"While the employee is in treatment, the employer is assisted with meetings with the staff and with the patient," Kropff said.

"For a lot of people all they have left is their job and it's a relief for them to know their job is secure," she said.

"We find employers are supportive of their employees getting help," Kropff said.

Kropff goes out into the public and gives talks on what the CareUnit in Canyon has to offer people. She also talks to students in the public schools.

"I enjoy going into the classrooms to give students drug and alcohol information. I teach them how to handle peer pressure," she said. "I would rather kids get information

from professionals than off the street where they are told drugs and alcohol are cool."

The CareUnit works hard as a dedicated professional team, she said.

"I am proud of what we do here," Kropff said. "The hospital is supportive and the staff uses a team concept."

"We want people to know we will be there for them when they reach out for help," she said. "We are here 24 hours a day, seven days a week and our number is 655-7723. A lot of people just want to talk and we are here for that too."

"It is very intensive personal work for the patient, but it is rewarding to see them in their recovery process," Kropff said. "I love what we do for people, we have the pleasure of watching them enjoy life again with a different perspective."

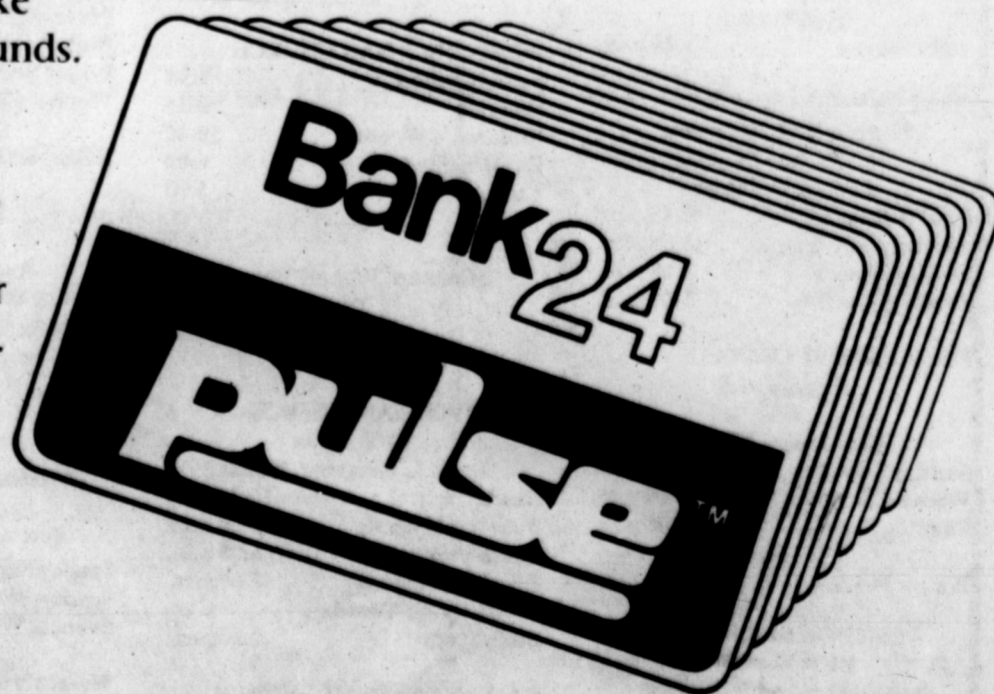
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# County Minutes

### "WHY PRIVATE EDUCATION"

I just received a copy of the Contractor Report on Public and Private Schools, compiled by researchers for the National Center for Education. In this report they listed some reasons that would increase the role of Private Schools.

Those premises underlying policies that would increase the role of Private Schools are:

1. "Private schools produce better cognitive outcomes than do public schools."
2. "Private schools provide better character and personality development than do public schools."
3. "Private schools provide a safer, more disciplined, and more ordered environment than do public schools."
4. "Private schools are more successful in creating an interest in learning than are public schools."
5. "Private schools encourage interest in higher education and lead more of their students to attend college than do public schools with comparable students."
6. "Private schools are smaller and thus bring about greater degrees of participation in sports and other activities than do public schools."
7. "Private schools have smaller class size, and thus allow teachers and students to have greater contact."
8. "Private schools are more efficient than public schools, accomplishing their task at a lower cost."

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# Hospital Board met August 13

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Donley County Hospital District was held Tuesday, August 13th at 7:30 p.m. in the Medical Center dining room.

Board members present were C.C. Ayers, Mrs. J.F. Howell, Jr., E.W. Barbee, R.D. Castner, Quinn Aten, Charles E. Rogers, Administrator Billy Ray Johnston and 17 interested citizens. Board member absent was L. Whitehead.

Board president C.C. Ayers opened the meeting and welcomed the visitors. The visitors were reminded all board meetings are open to the public with the exception of those meetings with a closed session under section (2G) of the Texas open meetings law. The president stated that the books of the District are public record, open for inspection at any time and that any information needed by the public will be available.

Several of the people stated they supported the hospital board's decision regarding the request made by Dr. Hudson. Another stated that he was very displeased with paying hospital tax and not having a hospital and asked if there was any way that the hospital district could be dissolved, and he would not have to pay the tax anymore. Dr. R.L. Gilkey told the group that he had on his own contacted organizations that might purchase Medical Center, but that he had no interested parties come forward. That would be the only way the board could be disbanded until the indebtedness was paid in 1999. Dr. Gilkey answered several questions asked pertaining to billing of Medicare patients. He also stated that he personally felt that Donley County could not only support the two doctors it now has, but a third doctor as well.

Several other citizens expressed their concern about Dr. Hudson leaving and asked the board to do what they could to help. The board was also presented with a petition with 355 names asking the board to do what they could to help Dr. Hudson remain in Clarendon.

Most of the visitors left the meeting and the few remaining continued to discuss the situation with the board until the board continued with the meeting.

The board then read and approved the minutes of the last meeting. They discussed the proposed budget

present and set August 22 at 4 p.m. for a public hearing on the proposed budget.

Administrator Billy Ray Johnston gave the board a report on the facilities conducted by Texas Department of Health, the Life Safety Code Inspector and other business pertaining to the general operation of Medical Center. The facilities passed with an excellent rating. The bills were presented and paid as reflected by the claims docket.

\*Mike Butts presented a petition to the Board asking that the alley in Block 146 be closed. The fact that sewer lines would have to be moved was discussed. This would be possible if the property owner would be willing to pay the City for moving the lines. It was decided to table this item until further study could be done.

\*A resolution authorizing improvement projects for Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority was introduced for the consideration of the Board. Motion was made to pass the resolution as follows:

**RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS FOR GREENBELT MUNICIPAL & INDUSTRIAL WATER AUTHORITY**  
The State of Texas  
County of Donley  
City of Clarendon

Whereas, the City has entered into a water purchase contract dated as of July 10, 1975 with Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority (the "Authority"), which Authority has issued its revenue bonds to finance various improvements to the Authority; and

Whereas, it is necessary for the Authority to seek additional bond financing to make necessary improvements to the Authority's system, and the City deems it appropriate for the Authority to seek to finance such proposed improvements by the issuance of its revenue bonds.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Clarendon:

1. That the Authority is hereby authorized to begin an improvement project for the relocation of the water transmission line across Prairie Dog Town Fork of the Red River, construction of a communication control cable across the Pease River, and clean and paint the interior of the ground water storage tank at Quannah, Texas.

2. That the City further authorizes the Authority to make application to the Texas Water Development Board to seek financial assistance from said Board in an amount not to exceed \$650,000 to finance such improvement projects which financial assistance will be represented by the sale of the Authority's revenue bonds to the Texas Water Development Board.

3. That the Authority is directed to do any and all things to accomplish the issuance and sale of the Authority's revenue bonds to the Texas Water Development Board and the construction of the improvement projects.

The resolution passed by the vote all ayes and no nays.

A budget proposal was presented to the Board. Approval as tabled pending further study.

\*A tax rate was proposed for the 1985 tax year of 8% higher than the 1984 effective tax rate. A time for the Public Hearing on the tax rate was set for August 27, 1985, at 7:00 p.m. at City Hall. A notice publicizing the public hearing will appear in the Clarendon Press prior to the meeting date.
