Large Crowd Attends Mall Groundbreaking At Howardwick Sun.

More contestants are participating; there is greater attendance and better prize money is being offered.

At one time, 200 people were counted in their seats; there were a number on the street in front of the theatre and in the lobby and others walking up and down the aisles so it could safely be said that there were in excess of 300 present.

During the warm up periods and tuning process, the crowd was entertained by Morris Stevens and Mrs. C. P. Jones with their guitars and singing. On some numbers they were joined by Zip Durrett of Lakeview and Mrs. Frankie King of Shamrock. The MC, Tom Waters, obliged, while the final votes were being counted and called on those in the audience to join him in singing familiar songs. His guitar helped bring out harmony. Business in Clarendon has apparently been on a steady increase during the past year as indicated by the amount of money returned to the City of Clarendon for the 1 cent sales tax charged on the sale of merchandise.

Money received the 1st quarter this year showed an increase of 23 1/2% over the 1st quarter last year. At that time the return was \$4,943.59 and the figure received this year was \$6,478.78.

Walter B. Knorpp, City Administrator, reported there had been an increase each quarter since the inception of the tax. At present all tax money is being used to pay for the new fire truck.

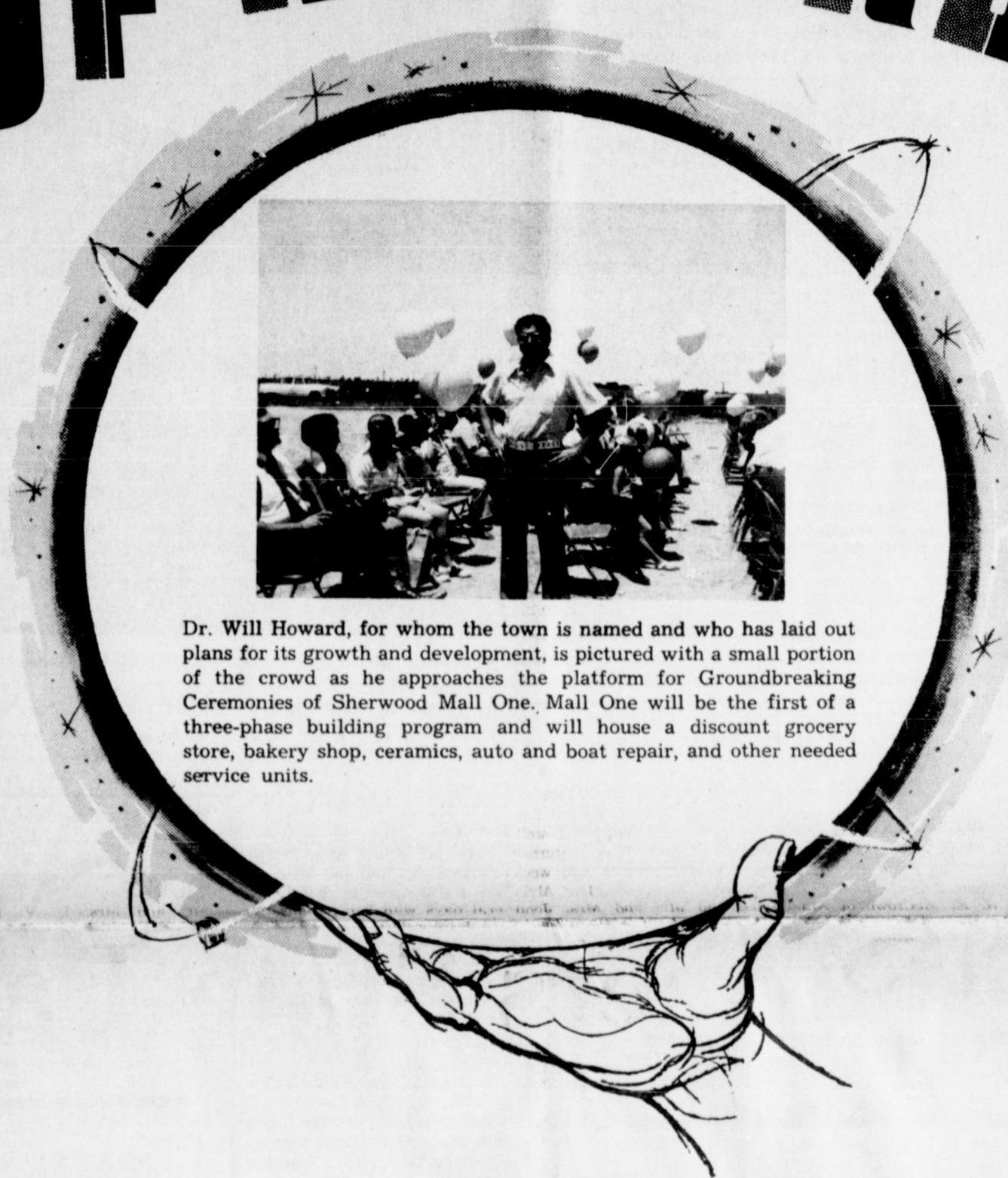

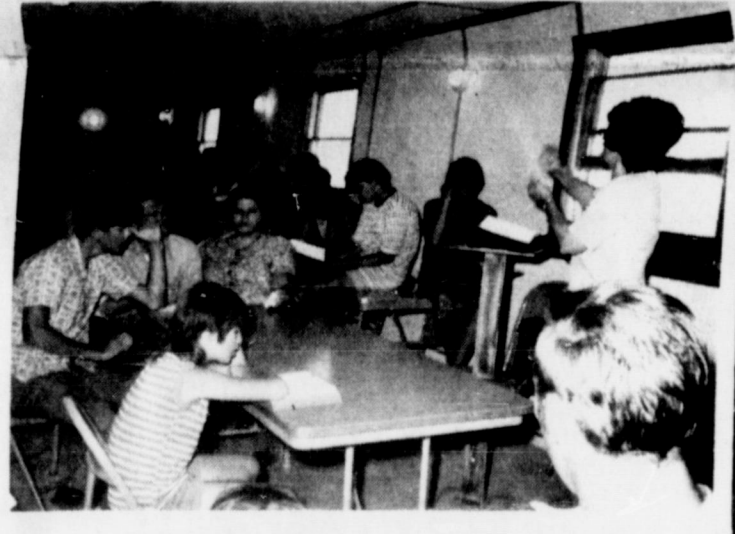
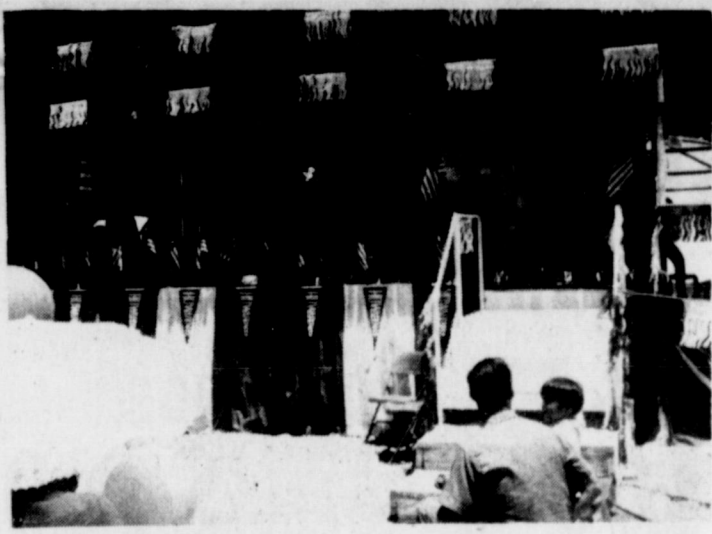

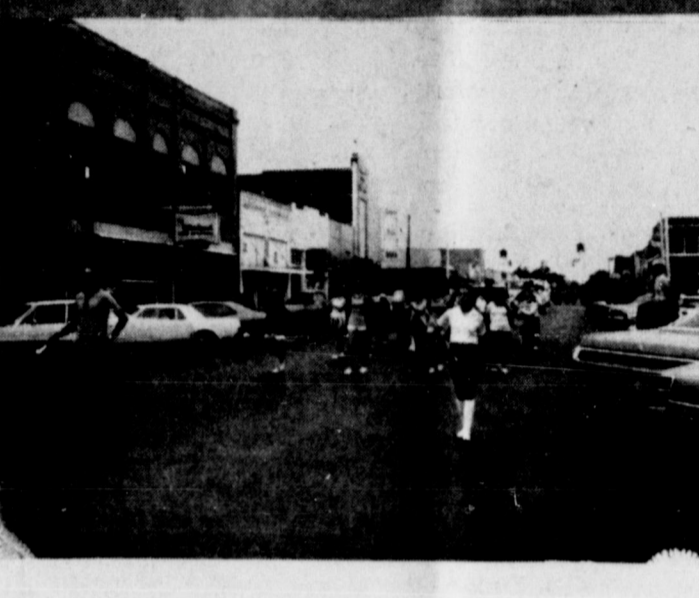

Sherwood Mall One was the first of a three-phase Mall to be developed as the town grows. Mall One will house a discount grocery store which will be the major store, a drug store, bakery, beauty shop, ceramics shop, automobile and boat repair shop, a finance institution, and offices for The Wick (newspaper). As other Malls are added, a major business will be placed in each. The development is a joint venture of Howardwick residents and will be owned by the residents. The Mall will run parallel to the highway and the Airport runway, and is expected to eventually include most every type of business or specialty shop.

Bro. Frankie Just, pastor of the newly organized Howardwick Baptist Church, spoke of the remarkable progress that has been made in developing the area from the time Greenbelt Dam was constructed, the opening of Sherwood Shores, the tornado that devastated so much property and cost a number of lives, the creation of the town of Howardwick in the rebuilding of Sherwood Shores, and the steps which led to Groundbreaking ceremonies for Sherwood Mall One.

The first shovel of dirt was turned by Lions Club Sweetheart Debbie Cherry, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lynn Cherry of Amarillo and Howardwick. Lions, in traditional gold vests with purple trim, the colors symbolic of Lionism, helped with parking and participated in the ceremony, the Lions Club being the first service club in the community.

And as the ceremony was concluded and the first shovel of dirt was turned, the hundreds of multi-colored balloons were released and spiraled up, and up indicating the promise the future holds in this next step in the growth of Howardwick.
