#### Carroll Lewis Attends Boy Scout Court Of Justice Of Peace School At Lubbock

Local Justice of the Peace Carroll Lewis attended a three-day training session at Lubbock last week with 104 West Texas counties represented by 172 Justices of the Peace.

The session, sponsored by the designed to upgrade the standards of Texas Justices. This was the first and largest of a series planned throughout the state.

Under new state law, justices are required to be licensed attorneys or have served at least eight years as justices or acquire 40 classroom hours of instruction morning, October 2. She was within 12 months of September 1. A second session including another 20 hours of classroom instruction is scheduled in Lubbock Feb. 16.

The classes, intended to meet qualification standards, include Master in duplicate bridge. Her general aspects of criminal law, attorney general opinions affecting justice courts, examining trials, truancy and liquor laws, arrests with and without warrants, game laws, public relations and other topics.

Lewis explained, "The courses are designed to give justices better working knowledge of law within the areas in which they deal almost daily."



#### Spring Bulbs Can Bring Early Color

Spring flowering bulbs can bring early color to the home landscape next year if the proper steps are taken this fall, according to County Agricultural Agent Ronald Gooch.

Crocus, snowdrops and winter aconite are some of the first flowers to bloom in the Spring. These are soon followed by hyacinths, narcissus or daffodils and tulips.

Plant all of the spring flowering bulbs in the fall, says Gooch. Root growth and flower development occur during the winter months so that the final burst of growth can take place in early

For repeat blooming over period of years, plant bulbs in a well-drained soil of average fertility, preferably a sandy loam, located in a sunny area. In the scuth where they are usually treated as annuals, bulbs can be planted almost any place in the yard where the soil is well drain-

The general rule of thumb is to plant bulbs so the top is below the soil surface a distance of about twice the diameter of the bulb. This would be about 4 inches deep for narcissus and tulips and about 2 inches for smaller bulbs. In sandy soil plant at a depth three times the diameter of the bulb, adds Gooch,

Larger bulbs can be spaced as much as six to eight inches apart. Smaller bulbs are more effective if spaced three to four inches apart. The most effective landscape plantings are achieved by grouping bulbs of the same color together in a mass. Use at least 12 to 24 bulbs of the same

and color, remember to make your selections early and, plant your bulbs in October and November, concludes Gooch.

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

#### Compost Pile Should Be Started Now

Fall is here once again and home gardeners will want to begin work on a compost pile, suggests County Agricultural Agent Ronald Gooch.

Compost is a good soil con ditioner as it improves the soil's water holding capacity, supplies organic matter, helps to retain soil moisture and aids in keeping soil temperature at desirable le

A compost bed may be con structed out of scrap or rough lumber or with net wire. The en closure should be large enough to hold the raw material needed to supply next year's compos needs, advises Gooch.

Tree leaves are beginning to fall and are cluttering up the lawn and flower beds and creating a disposal problem. You can improve environmental conditions by using them for com-

The county agent suggests this procedure in building a compost pile. Place leaves, grass clippings and other healthy plant material from flower and vegetable gardens in the compost heap. As you put down a lawyer of material, sprinkle it with a complete fetrilizer before adding another layer. The fertilizer will add plant food to the mixture and will also speed up de composition.

Since moisture is needed to the decomposition process, the heap should be sprinkled with water to keep it moist when rainfall is not sufficient to do the job. By next spring you have the needed material for mulchin

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
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
