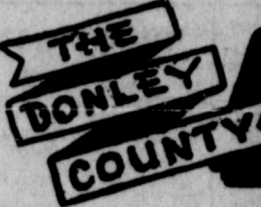

## Rains Up Yearly Moisture Total; Greenbelt Lake Rises 1.6 Feet

Rains the past week have pushed the moisture total up for the year to 8.55 inches and already for the month of June to 2.71 inches. A big part of the heavy showers have hit the Greenbelt Lake watershed. Jimmy Kuhn, manager, stated that the lake had come up 1.6 feet during the rainy spell.

Frank Drummond, Plant Engineer, reported that the Lake now stands at 2639.64 feet above sea level which is 1.41 feet less than the highest level of the lake. The previous high was 2641.05 feet. Actual depth at the deepest place now is 59.64 feet. The lake will be 84 feet deep when full. He said the lake now holds approximately one third of its capacity of water. The next 25 feet will certainly be a big volume of water and will spread out over a huge area.

The lake rose .44 ft Tuesday night and water was still coming in.

Our official weather observer reported a moisture total of 1.13 Sunday, .05 Monday night and 1.03 inches Tuesday.

### Farm Bureau Labor TV Film June 23 - 25

The workers' side of the issue of farm labor unionization will be depicted in a special showing of the film "Road to Delano" on local television soon, according to Jay Gould, president of the Donley County Farm Bureau.

The film will be shown on all three Amarillo television stations. It will be aired on KFDA and KGNC on Friday, June 23, at 9:30 p.m. KVIL will show the program on Sunday, June 25, at 4 p.m. County Farm Bureaus in the viewing area are purchasing the time for the showing.

The film, produced by the American Farm Bureau Federation, is built around interviews with some grape vineyard workers in the Delano, California area who were forced to join the farm workers union led by Cesar Chavez without the privilege of secret ballot elections to determine which union, if any, they wanted to represent them.

The tactic used by the Chavez forces was the secondary boycott which effectively closed markets for grapes. Unable to sell their produce, the growers had no alternative but to sign their workers over the Chavez organization. The secondary boycott is outlawed for industrial unions, Gould pointed out. Farm Bureau is backing legislation to guarantee workers secret ballot elections and to outlaw the secondary boycott, prevent strikes at harvest time, and create an Agriculture Labor Relations Board.

This action led to the Chavez forces launching an all-out campaign recently to discredit Farm Bureau, Gould said. He added that Farm Bureau would not be intimidated and is continuing to support legislation that would benefit the grower and worker alike.

All-time records for both car and truck sales for the final 10 days of May helped Dodge to its second best month in history for combined car and truck

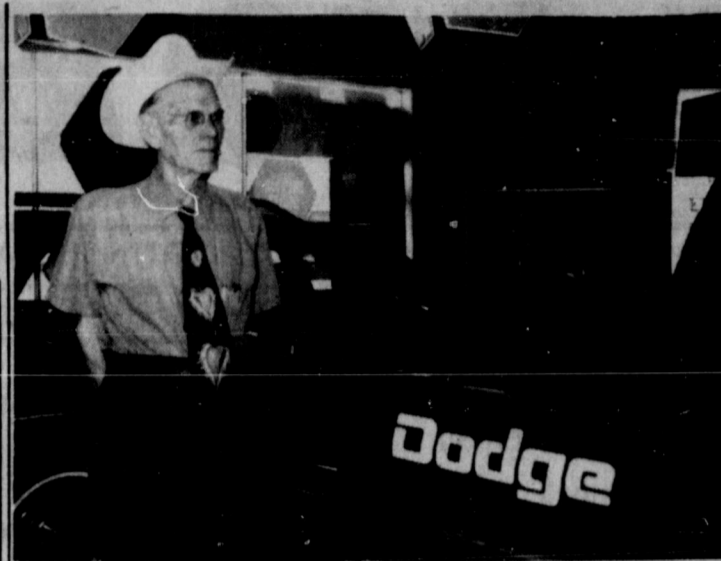
sales. The total of 80,783 cars and trucks sold by dealers was also an all-time high for the month of May.

### More Than \$2 Million To Hold Primaries

More than \$2 million has been spent to cover the costs of the May 6 and June 3 primary elections in Texas, Secretary of State Bob Bullock said today.

"We have distributed, as of June 3, \$1,604,415 to Democratic executive committees and \$396,709 to Republican executive committees to cover costs for holding the primary elections," Bullock said.

"These figures represent 75 percent of the actual expenses which the local party chairmen estimated.

"This figure is some \$300,000 to \$400,000 more than our original estimate, which was made back in April so that the money could be appropriated," he said.

"We made every effort to keep the expenses down by establishing maximums on the number of election clerks that could be paid at each polling place and by disallowing all items not properly payable from the primary fund.

"Three factors contributed to the increased costs though. These were an increased voter turnout, payment of \$2.00 per hour to almost all election workers and an increase in the number of election places for parties which necessitated hiring more election workers."

Bullock also came out strongly for a single polling place to serve both parties.

"We could cut the cost of holding the election by at least a third if we would need as many voting machines or as many people."

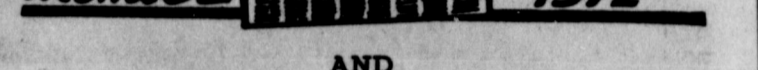

elections through his office was the only reasonable alternative, Bullock said he thinks that future primary elections should be held and financed through the county clerks' offices.

"Federal court decisions clearly have estimated that primary elections are an integral part of the democratic process and, therefore, are considered to be a function of state government.

"But since we can no longer assess conditions for the cost of the election, I believe that unitary primaries conducted through the county clerks' offices would be the most efficient and economic means of holding future primary elections."

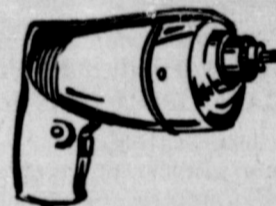

### Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State Capitol

"Leadership is hell." That quote from a political leader came to mind during the 64th annual National Governor's Conference in Houston last week.

It's darned tough to serve as a public official these days. Not just presidents, vice-presidents and candidates for presidents have their lives threatened — but governors and candidates for governor face physical threats these hectic days in America's political history.

This fact was brought to mind by the extremely tight security measures at the host hotel for the National Conference for state chief executives.

Security police, Texas Rangers, and state patrolmen almost outnumbered the governors, aides, newsmen and guests who were allowed to observe the proceedings at the important annual function of state heads of government.

Mrs. George Wallace, wife of the Governor, had six security men surrounding her when she moved around the corridors of the hotel.

When Vice President Spiro Agnew arrived, Secret Service men were all over the place. Even the hotel employees wore photo ident badges — reminiscent of defense plant and Navy installation days of World War II. We heard no complaints — except from one elderly hotel janitor who kept picking up walky-talky conversations between the security police on his hearing aid.

The three-day program of the state's chief executives was an "economic war" of sorts. Principal topics of the conference revealed that financial problems are their top concerns — as they reviewed revenue sharing with the Federal government, financing of elementary and secondary education and funding the "war" against crime and drugs.

Host Governor Preston Smith and his staff and a hospitable Houston made the serious problems easier to study with a well-rounded entertainment program for the Governors, their families and staffs. An outdoor pool-side Texas western party, (appropriately by the world's largest swimming pool, according to the hotel staff), an excellent transportation organization delivering guests to all Houston entertainment and tourist facilities — and a formal ball with Duke Ellington's Orchestra

completed the lighter side of the serious meet.

Other important topics of interest to Texans covered at the Conference were: diversification of industry to rural areas, a resolution requesting the appointment of a farmer as next Secretary of Agriculture of the United States; a NASA economic impact report for the states and the role of the states in national growth patterns.

National political intrigue made the Conference more interesting with visits from Sen. George McGovern and Sen. Hubert Humphrey — and the appearance of Mrs. Wallace.

**SPECIAL SESSION MEETS** — The Legislature convened in special session at midweek under lame duck leadership in both houses and the governor's office.

Gov. Preston Smith, defeated in his bid for re-election, pledged to offer a 1973 budget which would require no new taxes and, indeed, to allow no consideration of taxation.

LT. Gov. Ben Barnes, also defeated for governor, said Smith should show lawmakers how he proposes to trim appropriations. House Speaker Rayford Price was defeated in his home district, as was Rep. Bill Finck of San Antonio, chairman of the budget-writing House appropriations committee.

Legislative Budget Board — which includes Barnes, Price and Finck among its members — calculated that even a "tight" 1973 budget would require \$89.2 million in new revenue.

After a day-long session, the Board concluded its staff would just have to get together with Smith and see what he had on his mind.

The LBB staff drawn budget called for \$228.2 million in spending during the next fiscal year — or \$89.2 million less than the revenue forecast.

Virtually certain to land on the special session agenda is new state officials' code of ethics legislation. Barnes said he will press for such a bill, and a House committee prepared its own version.

**LEGISLATURE ALTERED** — Primary elections assured a drastic shakeup among rank and file members of the legislature as well as the top leadership.

There will be at least 76 new members in the House of Representatives — a majority. The turnover rate is the highest since 1953 when 88 freshmen representatives took office. The November general election may remove a few more of the incumbents, and no more than 74 present House members are assured of returning.

The State turnover rate is almost as high. At least fifteen of 31 senators will be freshmen next year, and Republicans conceivably could gain another place.

Former House Speaker Gus

Mitcher was among the veteran incumbents defeated.

Defeat of Price in the House set off another scramble for speaker. Rep. Frank Calhoun of Abilene challenged him last week, expressed doubt that Daniel had anywhere near a majority and said he will begin his own campaign with about 50 dependable votes from moderates and conservatives.

**PRIMARY CHANGES URGED** — Primary election costs topped estimates by nearly \$400,000, and a better, cheaper system has to be found, according to Secretary of State Bob Bullock.

Bullock advocated future primary elections be held and financed through county clerk's offices, with single polling places serving both major parties.

Such a system, said Bullock, would reduce primary costs by at least a third and increase efficiency. Bullock said he distributed \$1.6 million to Democratic committees and \$386,709 to Republican groups to pay the bulk of local primary costs.

**AG OPINIONS** — A person can serve as a State Parks and Wildlife Commissioner and school district trustee at the same time but can't draw any type of compensation, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded: Texas Water Quality Board may distribute "clean water" bumper stickers.

Texas Tourist Development Agency may draw vouchers favoring the Confederate Air Force, Lower Rio Grande Valley and McAllen Chambers of Commerce for advertising and promotion.

Shell redeposited on bay floors as pads for drilling barges can be removed only on permit.

County employees cannot buy with county funds goods from a store owned by a county commissioner.

Real property foreclosed by tax judgment can be purchased

by the owner at a Sheriff's sale at its adjudged value although this is for an amount less than the full judgment. The judgment may be enforced for the balance against the tax debtor.

A county operating under the optional county road law may continue to employ services of a qualified road administrator rather than a licensed professional engineer.

A university shuttle bus driver may be under 21.

### Campaign For Safe Use Of Pesticides Being Launched

A statewide campaign for safe use of pesticides is being launched by the Texas Department of Agriculture. Leaflets explaining how to use and dispose of poisons will be placed in stores throughout the state.

"We must all bear some of the responsibilities in the fight against environmental abuse," Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White notes in the leaflet. "We must do everything we can as individuals to maintain and improve our environment. Proper use and disposal of pesticides is a must to achieve this objective of a quality environment," White said.

One of the most flagrant abuses of pesticides is their disposal. Getting rid of an unwanted poison by pouring it down a drain can result in great harm to the

environment. Detailed instructions on how to properly dispose of pesticides are explained in the leaflet.

The leaflet is titled "The Safe Use And Disposal of Pesticides And Their Containers."

### Learning To Swim Good Life Insurance

More than half the 7,000 drowning victims in the U. S. each year couldn't swim 20 feet to save their lives.

These drowning victims were only 20 feet from safety and yet couldn't make the distance, according to James U. Cross, executive director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "Three-fourths of the earth's surface is covered by water," said Cross. "It stands to reason that you're going to come in contact with it some time. So it just makes good sense to learn to swim."

Cross said swimming could not only help you live longer, but it could also help you enjoy life more.

"If you can't swim, practically the whole world of outdoor recreation is closed to you," he said. "By learning to swim, you trade your fear of water for a healthy respect for it."



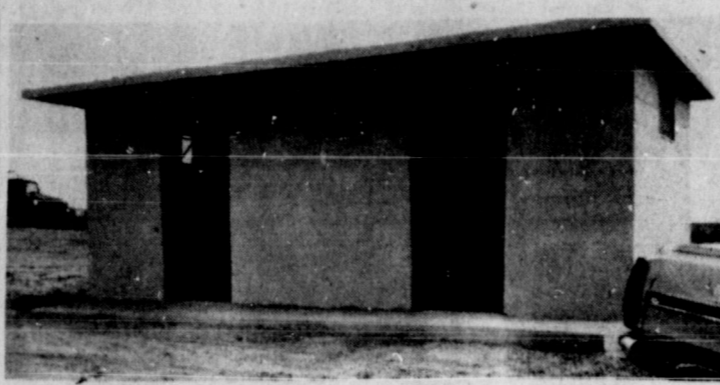

**Product Labeling Of Cosmetics**

"Cosmetic firms are one of the latest industries to come under the fire of a government agency because of consumer pressures," said a Texas Agricultural Extension Service clothing specialist.

Roxanne Schnorr said that retailers, including drug stores and supermarkets are further pressing the issue of unsatisfactory labeling of cosmetics.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has jurisdiction over the cosmetic industry. But cosmetic manufacturers aren't required to label ingredients on their package nor prove the safety of their product.

"The FDA and the Cosmetic, Fragrance and Toiletries Association are working on a voluntary plan," Miss Schnorr said. "The proposed regulation would require cosmetic firms to specifically request secrecy of information detailing reasons why the product should be eligible for exemption from the Freedom of Information Act."

Cosmetic manufacturers have resisted mandatory labeling regulations with the defense of giving away trade secrets and spoiling their labels' appearance.

The Texas A&M University specialist said that the availability of listed cosmetic ingredients could be of valuable help for the consumer in determining how or if one product differs from another in ways other than perfumes and color blends. The price difference could be explained or discounted as unworthy of the products.

"In the medical sense," Miss Schnorr said, "ingredient labeling could also aid in determining the source of allergies and infections. Most products are safe. But recent headlines have cited hexachlorophene and one particular brand of mascara as harmful."

The proposed plan isn't the final word on cosmetics. It may take mandatory ingredient listing, in addition to pre-market testing and certification, to protect consumers adequately.

**Local Action Groups Seen As Key To Traffic Safety**

"Strong action on the local level may be the only long range way to significantly cut traffic deaths and injuries in Texas," according to a state traffic safety leader.

Lloyd F. Palmer, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, issued a plan for personal involvement as he revealed statistics that show more than 70 per cent of all Texas traffic deaths occur where there is no local traffic safety action group in operation.

"There are only eight counties in this state with local safety groups taking an active role in traffic accident prevention. It is notable that the other 246 counties had 2,735 of the state's traffic deaths last year. In addition, these same counties recorded 75,587 injuries as a result of traffic crashes," Palmer said.

The TSA executive said that the problem is especially acute in major metropolitan areas, but also extends to less populous areas of the state.

Palmer said there are several different types of organizations that can be formed to achieve the objectives. Local conditions, history, and experience should be used to determine what type of organization can best serve the needs of the local community.

"I urge anyone interested in tackling this serious challenge to write to the Texas Safety Association today. We are ready to help and will respond with positive action programs to turn the tide of traffic deaths and injuries in Texas," said the safety expert.

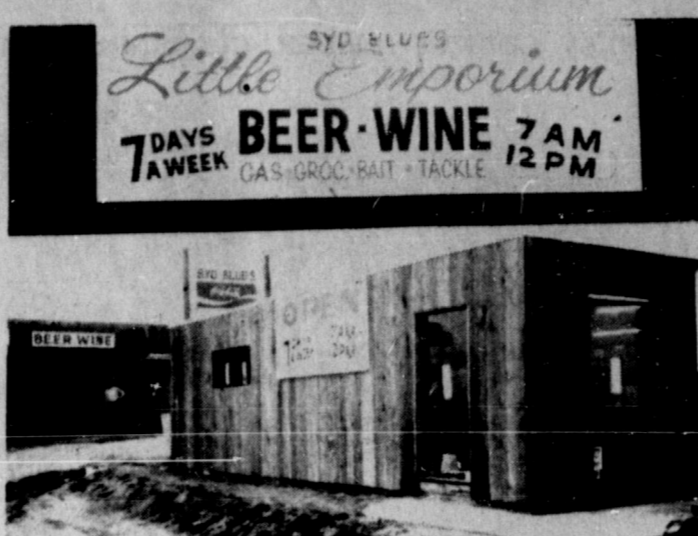

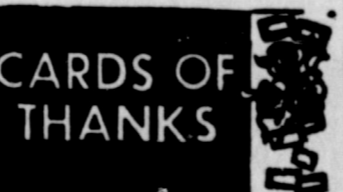

**Human Development Meeting Wed., 21**

Wednesday, June 21, 1972 at 9 a.m. in the High School Auditorium a meeting will be held in regard to the Human Development Program.

The public is invited to attend and hear about the facilities available at the Amarillo State Center for Human Development.

By July the Amarillo Center will open 10 beds for short term round-the-clock care of mentally retarded persons in the Panhandle. This care will be known as the Respite Bed Program. Operational costs are estimated at \$34,000 annually and initiation of the respite bed program will mean opening of the State Center on a round-the-clock basis. This added service provides brief and temporary relief in cases such as death, illness, marital discord, vacations, etc.

Placement of the 10 beds will be in the area now occupied by the adult retardate workshop.

Satellite programs such as the program operated in Clarendon, are functioning in 12 Panhandle cities and offer some of the services initially provided at the State Center.

Area meetings are scheduled to be held June 19 in Hereford, Dimmitt and Tulia; June 20 in Dumas and Dalhart; June 21 at Borger, Pampa, and Clarendon; June 22 in Canadian and Perryton; and June 23 at Wellington and Childress.

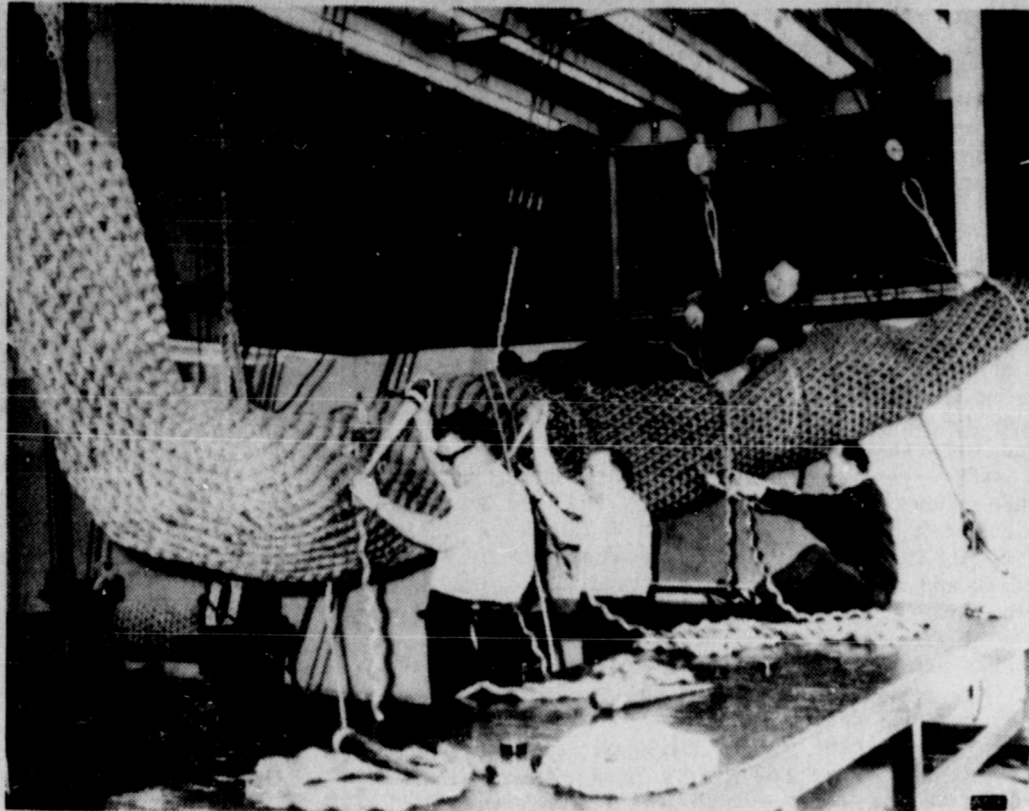
