





Nationally, about 12,000 such applications are mailed daily from local offices to the Social Security headquarters. Over 75,000 other verifications are handled each day by teletype for persons who need replacement cards and

Numbers are assigned and cards issued to workers, students, taxpayers, infants, servicemen, retired persons, and just about anyone, in fact, who needs a social security number for one reason or another. Five out of six applications are from the under 20 age group. Since 1963 the applications from children under 15 have skyrocketed. Last year they were 10 percent of the over 3 million new num-
