Prospects Good For Garment Factory Here

Prospects look good for the locating of a Garment Factory here within the near future if sufficient labor is available within the area.

Plans were discussed at a meeting of the Donley County Industrial Commission the latter part of last week. A Labor Survey Form is being carried in this issue of the paper and all women of the area are asked to fill out the form and return it. Further, Mrs. Beverly Holland, reported at the Leader Office Monday morning of this week that when forms were received here she would be making a house to house and door to door canvass in an effort to assess the labor potential here.

The firm interested in locating in Clarendon will need at least 25 women to start operation, with the hope of having as many as 60 by the end of the year. The average pay will be \$2.25 per hour with the top wage \$4 per hour.

The firm will need no assistance from the citizens of the area. Their only need is that an ample labor force be maintained. The sewing will be on the type of assembly work with each individual doing a specific job. A special shift will be planned for College Students if enough students want to do this type work. There is no age limit.

Questions on the Survey form will indicate your name, age, phone, address, if you are interested in sewing, if you are experienced in sewing, if you are willing to be trained to sew.

You may fill out the Labor Survey Form in the paper and mail to the address listed at the bottom of the form or you may contact Mrs. Beverly Holland and she will assist you in filling in the form.

Let us all get behind this movement and do our part in helping bring industry to our locale.

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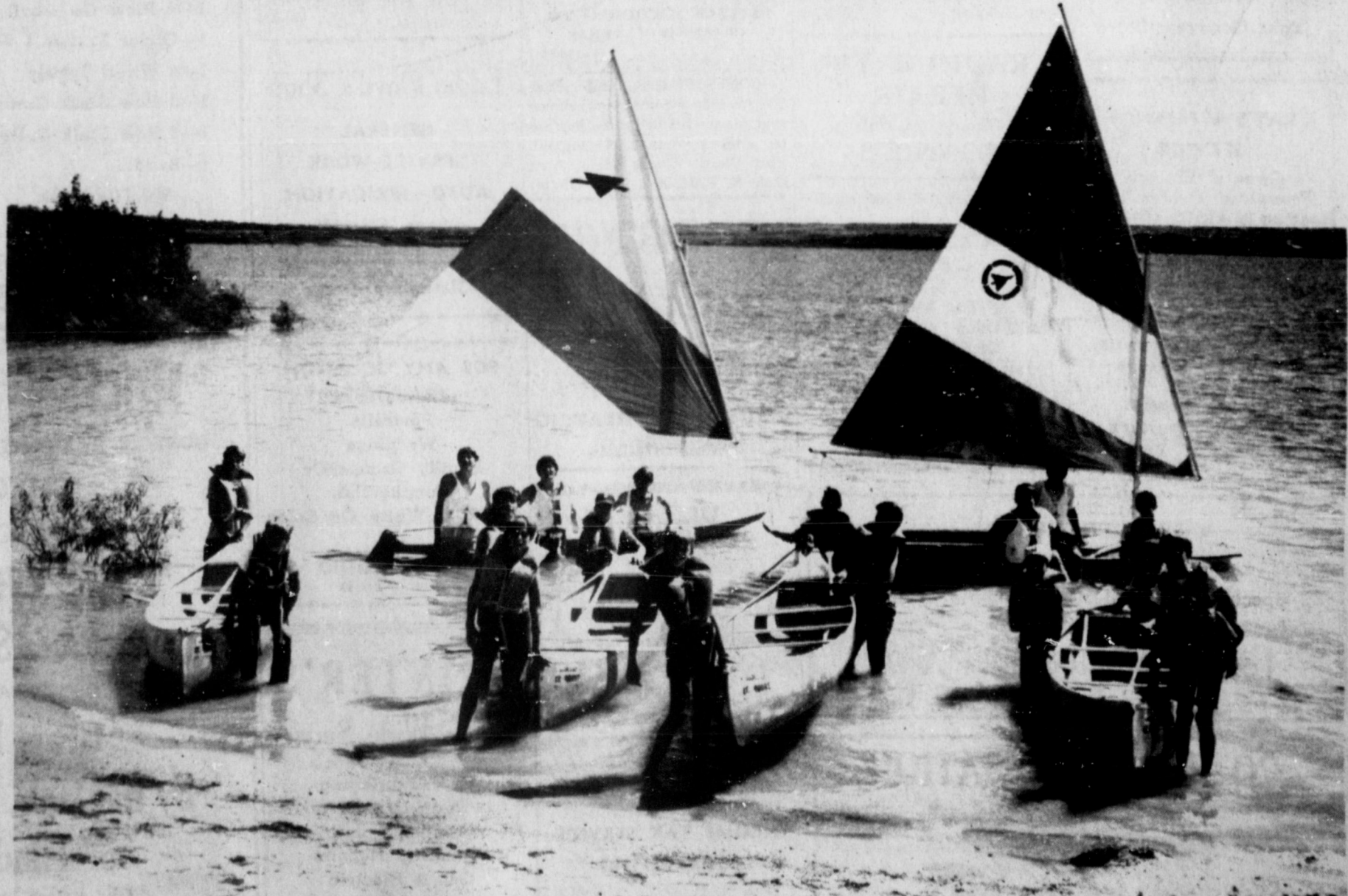

Mrs. Weller, do you always let Jerry C. climb in and out your windows?

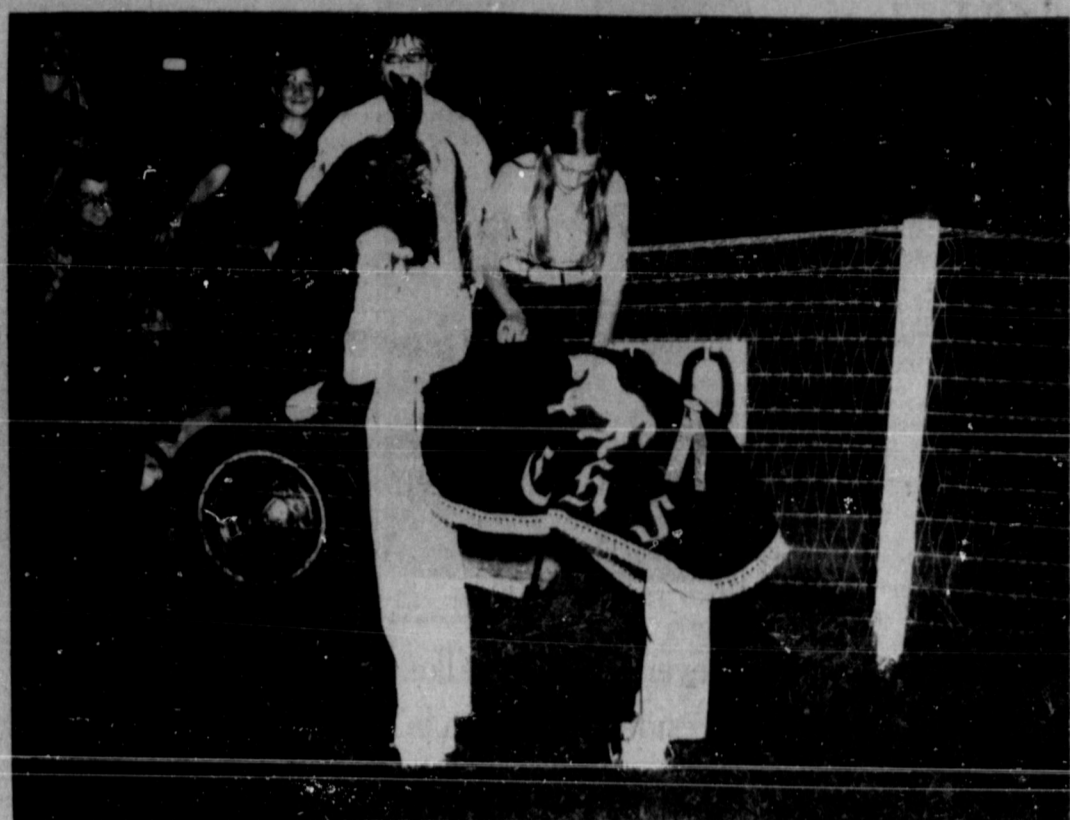

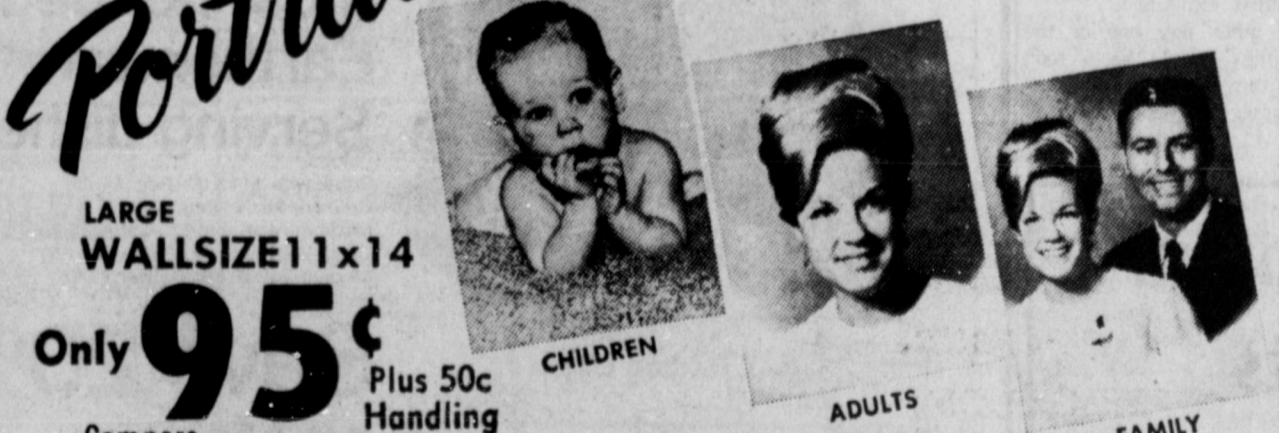

For Family Nutrition Select Food Wisely

Fewer families eat adequate diet today than in the past, recent U. S. Department of Agriculture surveys indicate.

Even in the upper and middle income levels, the number of families eating adequate diets is decreasing, according to Karen Kreipke, Texas Agricultural Extension Service foods and nutrition specialist.

Select food on the basis of nutrition, the specialist said. Scientists devised a guide called the Basic Four food groups — when foods are chosen from these four basic food groups, it's possible to get all the nutrients necessary for good health.

Included in the basic four food groups are the meat group, the fruit and vegetable group, the milk group, and the bread and cereal group.

Because different age and sex groups have different nutrient needs, the number of servings from each of these groups can vary for different people, the Texas A&M University specialist pointed out.

Noting the wide range of choices in each group, Miss Kreipke said the meat group features beef, pork, lamb, veal, poultry or fish.

"In fact, eggs, peanut butter, or dried beans can substitute for some of the meat required each day," she added.

Fruits and vegetables also offer a wide choice of foods. "An adult needs four servings of fruits or vegetables each day — one of the four servings should be a food high in Vitamin C such as oranges or grapefruit," the specialist explained.

"Every other day one of the four servings should be a food high in Vitamin A — such as spinach or apricots. Foods high in Vitamin A are usually dark

green or deep yellow in color." The remaining two servings from the fruit and vegetable group are the individual's choice.

From the bread and cereal group are the individual's choice, an adult needs four servings of breads and cereals daily, Miss Kreipke noted.

"These can come from enriched white bread, variety breads, rice, macaroni and other pasta, or tortillas."

From the milk group each day an adult needs only two servings, but children, teens and pregnant women need more servings, the specialist explained.

"Milk is one of the foods in this group along with cheeses and ice creams. Many people enjoy eating their milk in puddings, custards or sauces," she suggested.

DENTAL HEALTH CHECKUP

"Look, Mom... no cavities!" That's the sound most parents hope to hear when dental health checkup time rolls around every year. Of course, most of us are not that fortunate, and we have one or two cavities that require dental treatment.

But what if the story is "Hey, Mom, I've got five cavities" and the child's indignant parents cannot afford dental health care? That is a problem State health officials have been concerned about for some time. As a result, a project has begun in East Texas to deal with that problem and other dental health problems, including the need to educate children of all socio-economic groups on proper dental health care techniques.

That project is known as the Dental Health Education Trailer, a specially-built and equipped mobile clinic is currently operating in the City of Marshall in East Texas, primarily in conjunction with the public school system, but also Project Head Start Programs and other such programs. It is being used as an educational tool and not as a treatment facility.

The program is having great impact on the dental health of Marshall school children in grades kindergarten through

sixth grade. Although the real measure of the program will not be in until it has been in effect for two or three years, State health officials expect to see a significant reduction in the tooth decay rate of the school children on a yearly basis. Oral hygiene practices were greatly improved in just a few weeks after the program was instituted.

So far the program has reached some 2,000 children in five different Marshall schools, and over 100 teachers have been trained in proper dental health education. These teachers see that the dental health education begun in the mobile dental health clinic continues on a daily basis in the school system. Students, who are taught proper tooth-brushing and flossing techniques and tooth care, practice these methods every day in the classroom.

Marshall was the first city to add fluoride to its water — in the interest of better teeth. Now it has the distinction of being the first in the State with the Dental Health Education Trailer program.

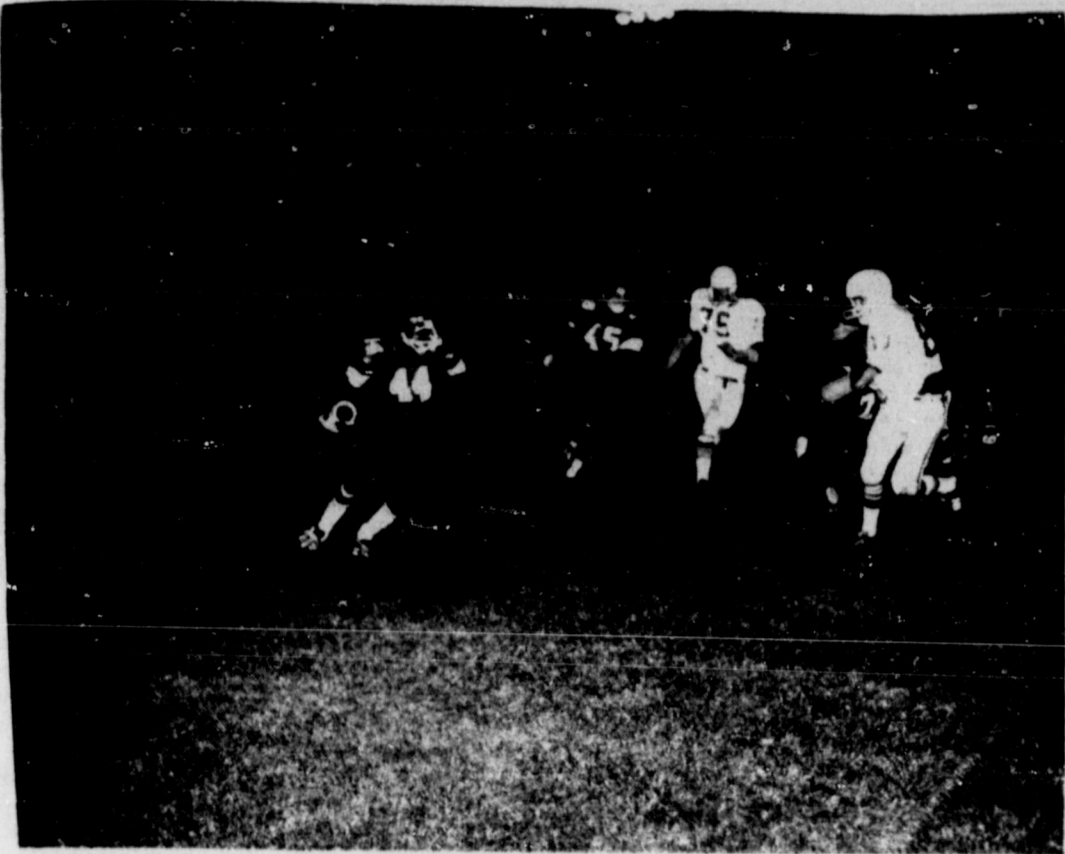

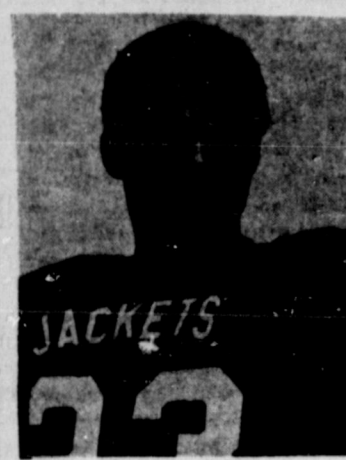

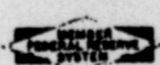

Getting A Social Security Card Now

Getting a social security card is no longer as easy or as fast as it once was. A new worker, school child, or other person applying for the first time could once go to a social security office and probably walk out with his new social security card. "But no more," says Social Security District Manager, Travis C. Briggs.

"If a person needs a replacement card and knows his social security number, we can give fast service. But if anyone has forgotten his number, or is applying for the first time, he should make his application at the Amarillo Social Security Office several weeks before he has to have his card."

This advice is particularly important," Briggs went on, "for students who will soon be asked for social security numbers by their high school teachers, and for persons needing social security cards to get driver licenses or to show new employers."

The increased processing time for assignment of new numbers and delivery of cards is tied to new policies and controls. Most of the social security cards will now be mailed out from the Social Security Administration, Baltimore, Maryland headquarters. There a data processing system will record identifying information for computer screening and searching against future applications. This will help the Social Security Administration maintain accurate identification of the growing number of social security accounts.

Over 200 million different numbers have been assigned since 1936 and over 150 million persons now living have social security numbers. At least 9 million have two or more different numbers, which have been detected and combined. Social Security calls these "multiples" and there is growing concern about the thousands of multiples which have not yet been identified.

"It is now necessary," Briggs said, "to check almost every application against the central files before releasing a new card." Nationally, about 12,000 such applications are mailed daily from local offices to the Social Security headquarters. Over 75,000 other verifications are handled each day by teletype for persons who need replacement cards and can recall their number.

Numbers are assigned and cards issued to workers, students, taxpayers, infants, servicemen, retired persons, and just about anyone, in fact, who needs a social security number for one reason or another. Five out of six applications are from the under 20 age group. Since 1965 the applications from children under 15 have skyrocketed. Last year they were 40 percent of the over 3 million new numbers assigned.

The Amarillo Social Security Office is at 317 East Third. The telephone number is 376-5151. Many questions and some social security matters can be handled by telephone.

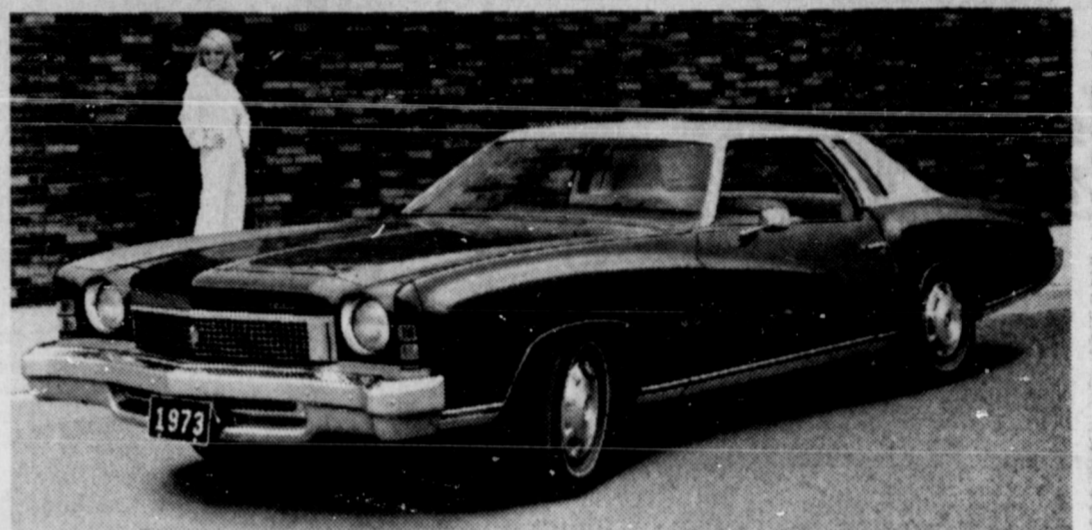
The plant has a capacity of eight beefs or 12 hogs per hour and offers complete meat processing services including butchering, wrapping and freezing.

Two Rural Accidents Reported in Donley County For August

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of August, according to Sergeant Rex Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic accident sum-

mary for this county during the first eight months of 1972 shows a total of 36 accidents, resulting in eight persons killed and 32 persons injured.

Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety shows a total in August, 1972 of 593 accidents resulting in 28 persons killed and 359 persons injured as compared to the same month in 1971 with 581 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 400 persons injured. This was 12 more accidents, three more fatalities and 41 less injured in 1972, at the same period of time.

The 28 deaths for the month of August 1972 occurred in the following counties: Castro, four; Palo Pinto, three; Lubbock, Carson, Deaf Smith, and Gray, two each; Clay, Cochran, Hale, Haskell, Lamb, Lyn, Montague, Parker, Stonewall, Wichita, Wise, Yoakum, and Briscoe, one each.

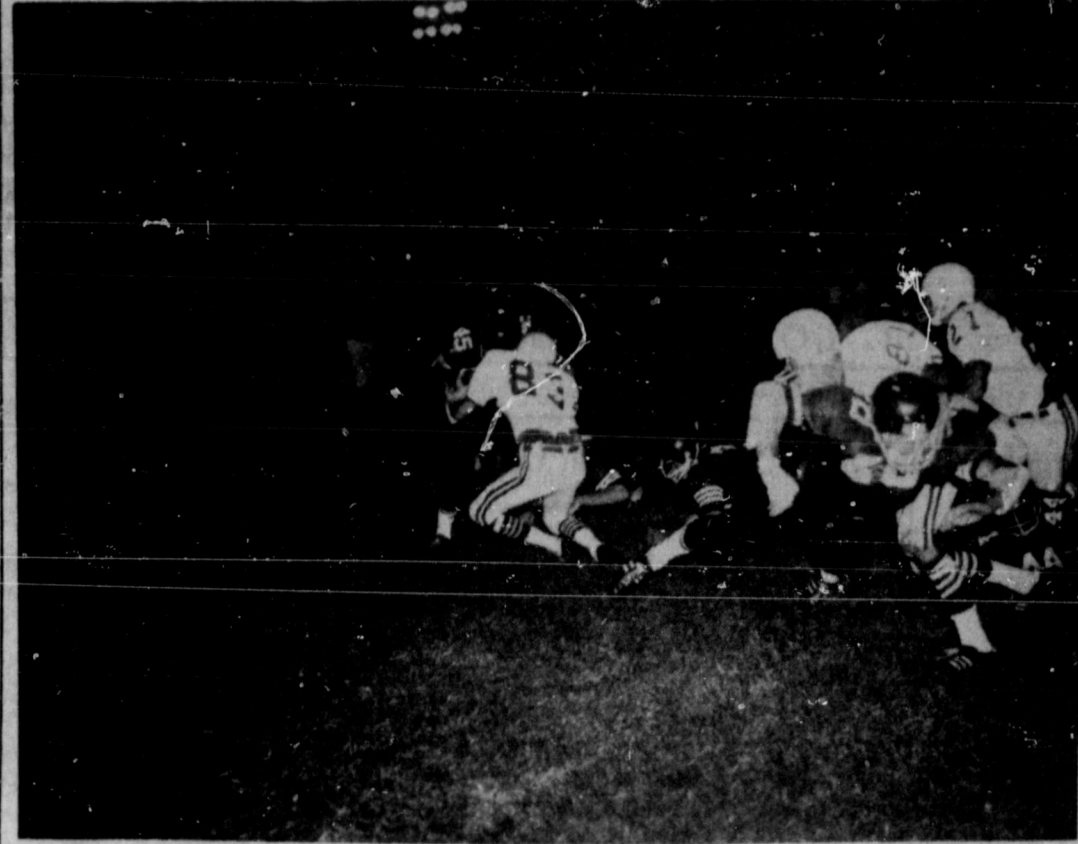

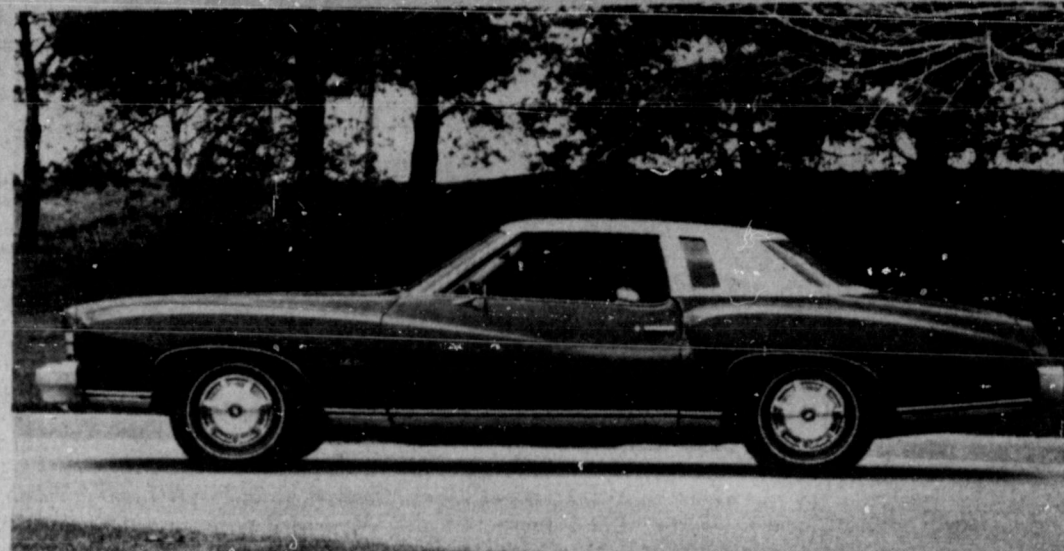

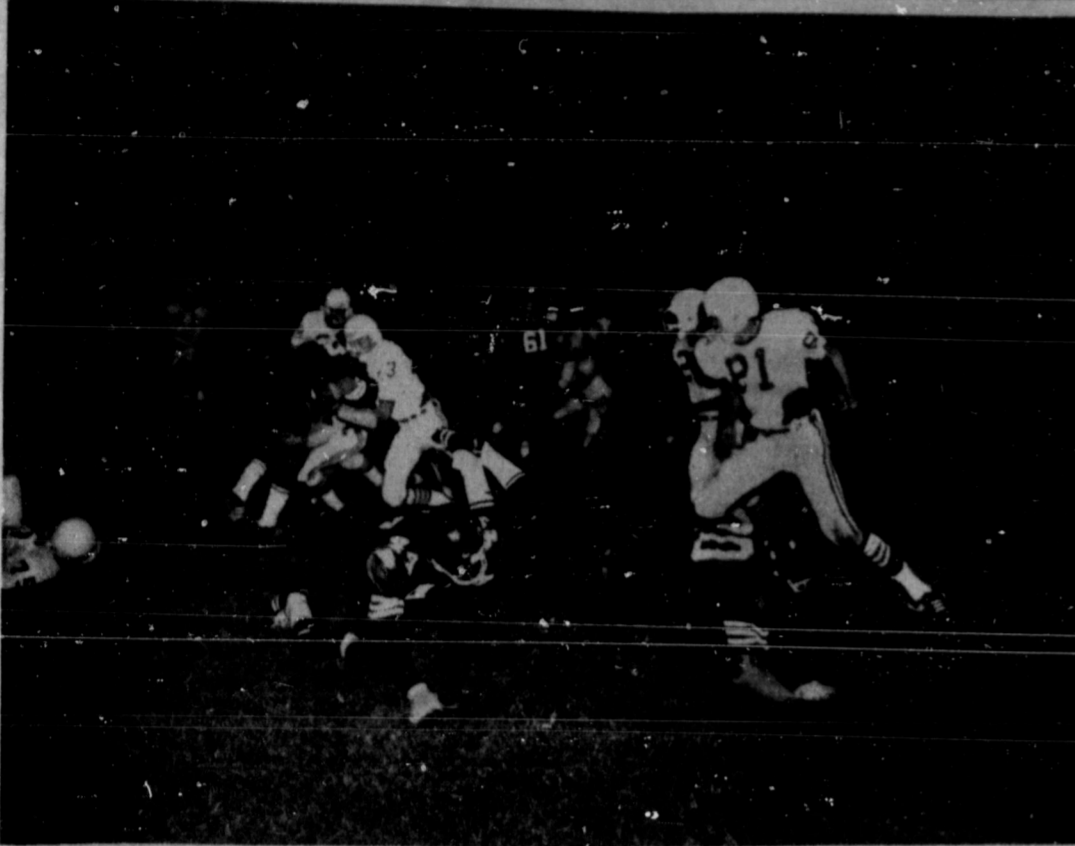

Q—I am the daughter of a Korean Conflict veteran who was totally and permanently disabled by a service connected injury. I am eligible for VA's Dependents' Educational Assistance but wonder if I can go to school less than half time?

A—Yes. However, payment will be limited to tuition cost, not to exceed \$175 if you train less than half time.

Q—I need funds to finance my son's college education. May I borrow on my GI insurance for that purpose?

A—Yes, provided you have a

permanent plan GI insurance policy over one year old. If you do, you can borrow up to 94 percent of its cash value. Current interest rate on such loans is five percent.

Q—I understand anyone may buy a VA repossessed home. Where can I get a list of real estate brokers who handle such properties?

A—The loan guaranty officer in the VA regional office in the area where you want to buy will provide such a list if you write or phone your request.

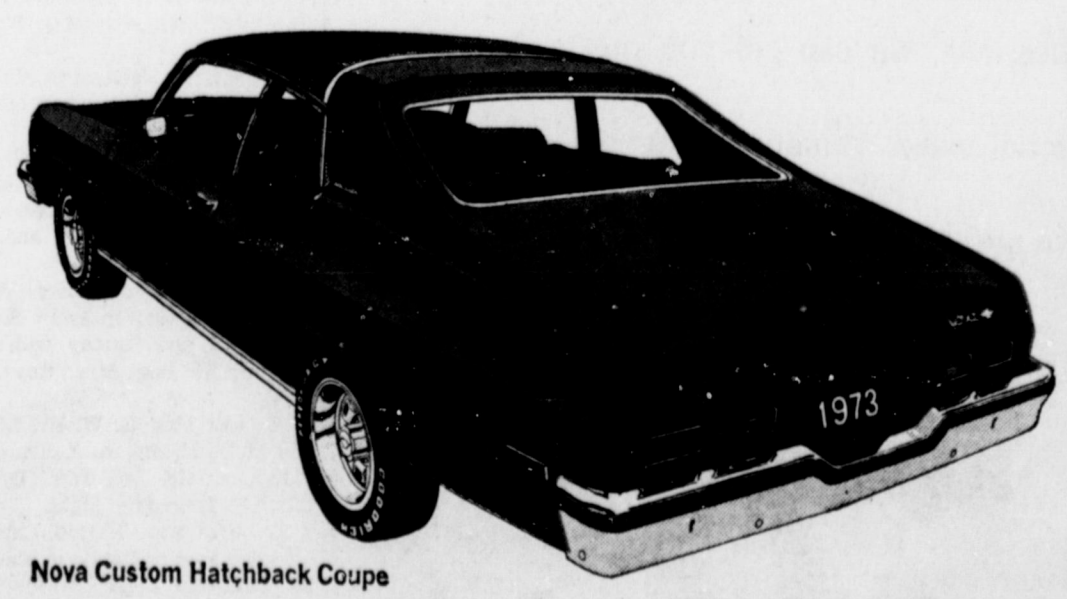
