## Residents Urged To Register To Vote

This is a general election year and up until the present time only approximately 1100 have registered so they will be able to vote.

All ages, 18 and up, will be required to register at the County Tax office if they want to vote in any election. Tax officials will be making up the poll tax list in February which will be used for any election following that date.

One bright aspect of the new law which went into effect this year is that when you register now, you will not have to register in following years if you vote in any election during the current year. Renewal will be automatic unless you move out of the county and then you will need to cancel your registration here and register wherever you move.

It has been pointed out also that you will no longer be able to sign the sheet at the election polls and vote without your registration slip. Keep your registration in a safe, easily found place as you will have to have it to vote.

## Cotton Classing News

Harvest was halted in the Memphis area in mid-week by one inch of snow and freezing temperatures, according to W. E. Cain, in charge of the USDA's Memphis, Tex. Cotton Classing Office.

The Memphis office classed 21,200 samples this week to bring the season total to 74,000. This compares to 96,900 by the same date last year.

Light spotted grades were predominant this week accounting for 57 percent of the total classed. Spotted grades accounted for 28 percent.

Micronaire readings showed 34 percent miked in the 3.5 to 4.9 range. The 3.3 to 3.4 range accounted for 24 percent. The 3.0 to 3.2 range accounted for 32 percent.

Pressley readings showed 89 percent of the samples tested 75,000 psi or higher.

The cotton market continued active with a strong demand. Prices climbed until late this week, then fell 100 to 150 points to close 50 to 75 points under last week averages. Mixed lots, mostly Light Spotted and Spotted grades, 30 and longer staples, 3.0 and higher mikes sold for 32.00 to 32.50 cents per pound. The same grades and staples, 2.9 and lower mikes sold for 31.50 to 32.00 cents per pound.

Governor Preston Smith has announced the appointment of The Honorable Grady Hazlewood of Austin to the Board of Regents, West Texas State University, Canyon, Texas. Appointment is effective immediately and is for a six year term to expire August 31, 1977.

Hazlewood replaces Dr. Theron C. Hawkins of Kerrville whose term has expired. A member of the Texas Senate from 1941-71, Hazlewood received his B. A. degree from West Texas State University and a law degree from the University of Texas. He served as District Attorney, Amarillo before going to the state Senate.

## Cordell Reports On State Meeting And Tax Questions Raised

Recent Federal Court decisions which concern all public schools and their patrons were discussed in Austin at the Mid-winter Conference for Administrators on January 5th, 6th, and 7th, and attended by Supt. Arling Cordell.

The courts have given the State of Texas two years in which to equalize per capita expenditures for the school children. This means that the present method of local ad valorem taxation by each district is held to be unconstitutional. Therefore, the next Legislature will have to devise some method of a statewide system of assessing and collecting taxes on real and personal property, then re-distribute these to each school child equally. Taxes as they are presently collected will continue to be legal for the two year grace period allowed by the Federal Court in San Antonio.

The second semester of the school year is off to a good start. Parents, pupils and teachers seem to be in a good mood to continue the progress made during the first semester.

## Police Science And Flying Courses At Clarendon College

### County Commissioners Court Starts New Year With Busy Day

The Donley County Commissioners Court started their first session of 1972 off with a full agenda Monday with several important decisions being made.

Their actions dealt with increase of salaries, grievance committee, food stamps program, and local option election.

The general text of the minutes of their meeting Monday is as follows:

Commissioner's Court regular session January 10—Motion by Jess Finley, second by John Swinney to set salaries for 1972 at 10 percent increase to be paid out of the general fund and fees in equal monthly payments. Motion carried. Motion by Finley, second by Swinney to set salaries for County Commissioners on same basis to be paid out of road and bridge fund in equal monthly payments. Allow road employees 10 percent increase. Motion carried.

Motion by Finley, second by Swinney to increase Commissioner's auto expense to \$100 a month. Finley and Swinney voted for. Clarence Reynolds and J. Hill Against, Judge W. R. Christal Against.

Motion made by Finley and second by Swinney to adopt Food Stamp Contract. Motion carried.

It is ordered by the Commissioners Court in regular session on this 10th day of January 1972, that a local option election to legalize the sale of all alcohol beverages, including mixed beverages within the city limits of Howardwick, Texas. The election shall be held at the Community House on February 1, 1972 within the town of Howardwick, Texas, in Precinct 1. Vernon Berry be appointed as judge of the election and Glenn L. Doty be appointed alternate judge.

The Court appointed the following on the grievance committee, subject to the individual's acceptance: Charles Donald Fields, Chester Talley, F. A. Floyd, J. B. Lane, Mrs. Hubert Rhoades, Clyde Slavin, P. C. Messer, Clyde James, Nina Dale, Judge W. R. Christal.

The Grievance committee will evaluate any and all complaints etc. regarding salaries of county officials and make decisions in this regard. Judge Christal pointed out that the committee would serve without pay.

### County Commissioners Court Starts New Year With Busy Day

According to figures released this week by the three banking institutions of Donley County, there is a substantial increase in deposits which brings the total to over 15 1/2 million.

The figures as released by the Donley County State Bank, The Farmers State Bank and Trust Co. in Clarendon and the Security State Bank at Hedley show total deposits at the close of business December 30, 1971 at \$15,594,648.59 as compared with a total of \$13,959,143.60 at the end of 1970. This is an increase of \$1,635,504.99 and the main influx of deposits from the current cotton crop is not on deposit yet due to a late harvest. Farmers are receiving the best price for their cotton in many, many years.

When deposits are up, the loan column is up also. The three banks showed a total of \$9,239,816.73 in loans at the close of business December 30, 1971 as compared with a total of \$7,589,029.62 at the same time in 1970. This is an increase of \$1,650,787.11 in loans but less than the gain in deposits.

The statements of the three banks in Donley County reflect a good sound banking system for people of this area and local residents should feel fortunate and proud to have these progressive banks here to help and to serve them.

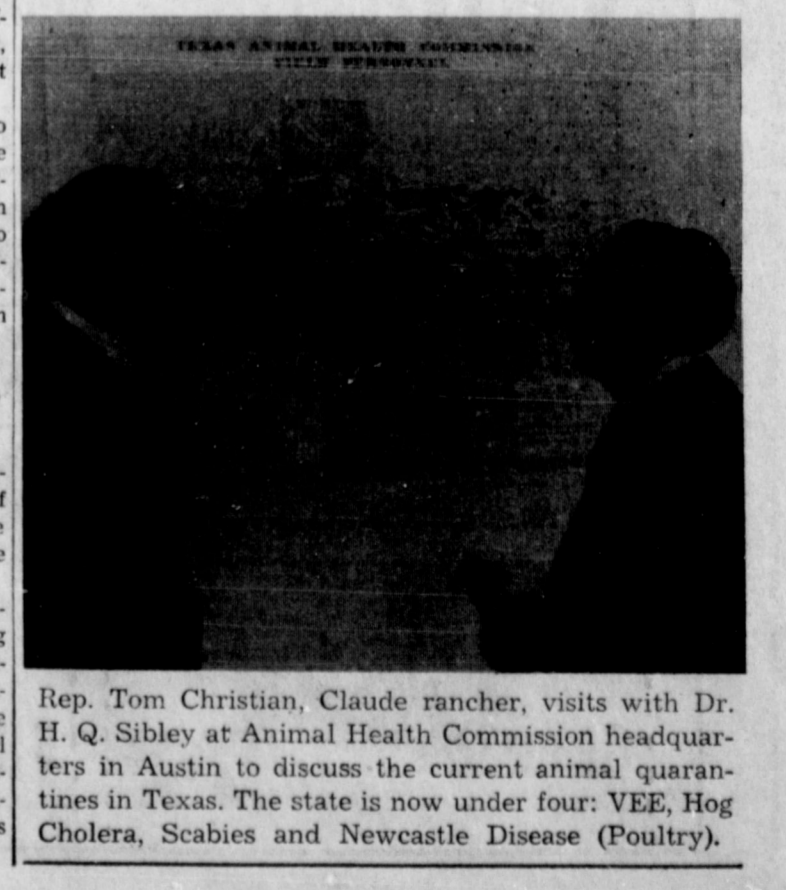
### Mrs. Wellie E. Ables Services Thurs., p.m.

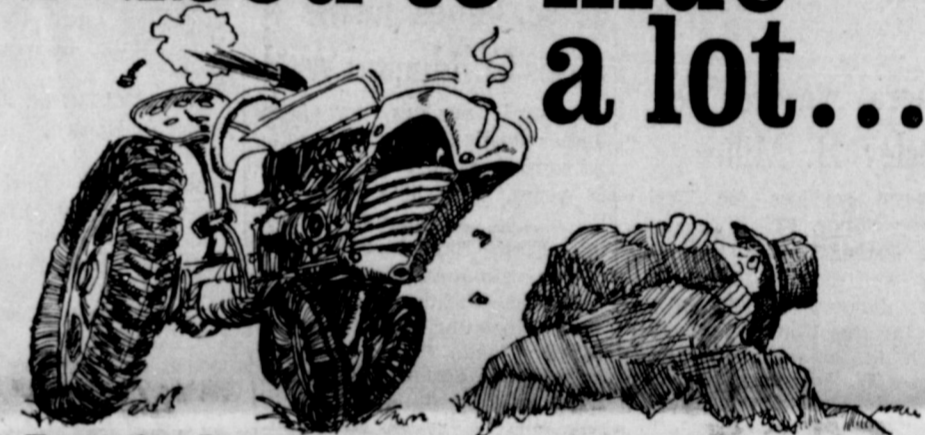

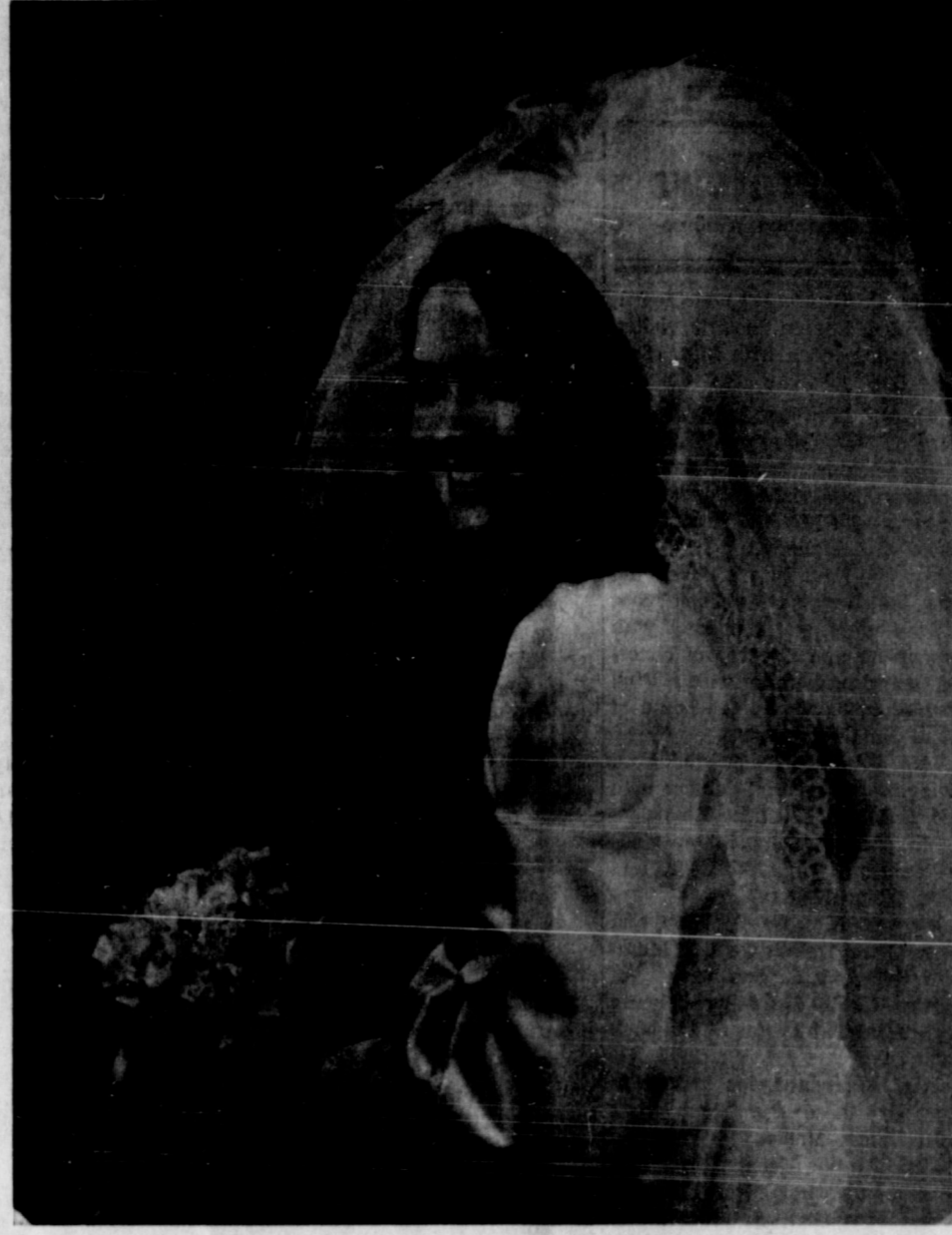

Congressman Bob Price 18th District, Texas

Congressman Bob Price today received word that the Office of Management and Budget has approved an additional \$55 1/2 million for the 1972 Rural Environmental Assistance Program. Congressman Price commented, "I am pleased that the Administration has responded to the needs of farmers and ranchers throughout the country by making available the full amount of funds appropriated for this important program." Price pointed out that he supported the appropriation of the full \$195.5 million for the REAP program when it was considered in the House.

The decision to release the funds was made in response to growing indications from across the country that farmers are willing to match, or exceed, the additional investment in soil and water conservation and pollution prevention and abatement practices. Under REAP the Federal Government shares, generally on a 50-50 basis, the cost of such practices in the effort to solve rural environmental problems for the primary benefit of the total rural community and the public.

Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol By BILL BOYKIN Texas Press Association

Candidates for the legislature are keeping an anxious eye on a federal court which last week heard massive, consolidated challenges to House and Senate redistricting.

The three judges listened to four days of testimony and arguments and took the case under study. A decision is expected in a week or two in order to allow time for appeals to the U. S. Supreme Court before the February 7 fil-

filled in San Antonio, Tyler, Houston and Dallas was on the issue of single member vs. multi-member (countywide) House of Representatives districts for metropolitan areas.

Challengers of the 1971 reapportionment (based on the 1970 census) by a five-member board made these key claims:

Countywide districts tend to prevent election of blacks, Mexican-Americans and Republicans.

Elections in the multi-member districts require expensive campaigns which few candidates, other than those backed by big interests, can afford.

Single member or individual districts for the big counties insure a smaller constituency and thereby made legislators more available, responsive and accountable to the voters.

The state, in defense of the 1971 reapportionment, maintained:

Multi-member districts are not discriminatory and do not dilute minority group representation.

Prior Supreme Court rulings have held that either multi-or single-member districts are acceptable as long as they are fairly drawn.

Single-member districts tend to fragment a county's representation and chances of delegation harmony on key countywide issues.

Federal Circuit Judge Irving L. Goldberg of Dallas, U. S. District Judge William Wayne Jus-

tiice of Tyler and U. S. District Judge John H. Wood Jr. of San Antonio must make the decision whether to invalidate the apportionment and draw new lines or let the board's plan stand.

CAMPAIGN REPORTS URGED - Secretary of State Bob Bullock has urged state and county political organization chairmen to report campaign contributions and expenditures as candidates are directed to.

He said 31 other states require such reports by law, though Texas does not. State Democratic Chairman Roy Orr of DeSoto rebuked Bullock for "overreaching" his authority.

Bullock disclosed he is having legislation drafted to require full disclosure by political parties at the state and local levels. Until that legislation can be enacted, he recommended the political organizations make the reports voluntarily on contributions and expenditures after Jan. 1, 1972.

The secretary suggested filing reports on party funds used for county office campaigns with the county clerk, district or state office reports with the secretary of state here and reports of party money spent in local elections with the city secretary or city clerk.

MASS ASSEMBLY RULES STUDIED - Texas Department of Public Safety set a February 28 hearing on proposed rules and regulations and minimum safety and good order standards for mass gatherings.

The 62nd Legislature directed DPS to promulgate such rules which must be met by promoters in order to get official permission to hold mass gatherings, such as outdoor rock concerts.

Among the proposed rules are those governing adequate parking, lighting, access by emergency vehicles and responsibility of the promoter to preserve order within the assigned area.

COURTS SPEAK - The Texas Supreme Court sustained lower court orders stopping sale of 500 magazines, films, books and cards found by a San Antonio judge to be "obscene." The Fourth Court of Civil Appeals, whose judgment was affirmed, had earlier knocked down that part of the original trial order prohibiting sale of "similar" material.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld the State Board of Examiners of Psychologists and refused to direct certification of a man who holds a doctorate in education and 127 hours of psy-

chology graduate courses. A Victoria County mother won in the Supreme Court a new trial of her suit to regain custody of five children adopted by grandparents.

SCHOOL FINANCE STUDIES ON-Gov. Preston Smith designated a 12-member task force to advise him on possible state action needed following a federal court decision that the Texas system of financing public schools is unconstitutional.

At almost the same time, Smith directed the newly-created Commission on Intergovernmental Relations to head a study of the effects of the case and report suggested solutions to the legislature by January, 1973.

Meanwhile, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes expanded a senate committee on urban education and directed an examination of finance problems in the wake of the federal court action. At least seven groups are

now in the search for solutions. Concern has been expressed for security of school bonds and even for the entire dependability of the property tax as the main source of revenue for all local governmental purposes.

### Tax Suit Here Is Being Finalized

Preparation for a tax suit against the Clarendon Independent School District will be completed within the next few weeks, according to the following information released to the Leader this week by a committee of residents of the Greenbelt Lake area.

A spokesman for the committee, representing a large segment of property owners in the vicinity of the lake, stated that their efforts to achieve a property evaluation policy balance with the remainder of the school district had failed. There was a willingness on the part of most of the owners, said the spokesman, to pay up to half again or twice as much as Donley County citizens were paying, and not complain, but tax notices mailed out included assessments upwards of ten times as much.

Plaintiffs, who have chosen to participate in the suit, have not paid 1971 taxes, and will not do so until the court makes a ruling. Special appraisers from Dallas and Austin, who have been checking valuations on the school district property rolls, and tax notices this past week, have encountered some two hundred apparent inequities. Variations allegedly range from 30 to 100 percent.

Apparent inequities exist in the assessing of merchandise inventories, furniture and fixtures, farm machinery, livestock, grass land and irrigation lands, and city residential property and improvements within the school district.

Preparations for the suit, said the spokesman, were begun only after every possible effort was made to gain some communica-

tion or relief from the school board. A meeting of the school board in early December was indicated, as going to find an equal policy to put into effect, but nothing was ever heard by the committee regarding the outcome of this meeting. "That's the way it has been from the very start," he stated. "We came here expecting to pay taxes, and should pay taxes, but they ought to be at least in reasonable range of what the native people are paying. They hit our retired folks, who have only limited incomes, with severe inequities," he added.

The committee fully realizes, said the spokesman, the expense connected with the reevaluation of a school district, and knows the inconvenience it causes the school funding during the course of a tax suit, but has, as stated, exhausted all other efforts.

The committee further recognizes and appreciates the fine school system in Clarendon, and most particularly the administration within that system. And finally hopes, that after the reevaluation, which certainly will be ordered, is completed, that the school system will benefit by having better facilities, better teacher salaries, and a generally better all-around working program.

#### Change In Signup Dates

We have been notified that sign-up for the 1972 cotton, feed grain, and wheat programs will NOT begin January 17th as previously announced. Instead, it will begin Thursday, February 3rd and will end on Friday, March 10th.

#### Approved Alternate Crops On Set-Aside

The list of approved crops which may be grown on set-aside acreages is unchanged for 1972. The list includes guar and castor beans. A payment reduction will be made for each acre of set-aside devoted to any of the approved alternate crops. An average productivity deduction rate will be used for each county, with rates varying from \$6 to \$10.20 per acre.

#### 1972 Rural Environmental Assistance Program

This program has been announced and approved. The initial allocation for our county is \$33556.00. The County Committee is accepting requests now for the following practices:

- A-2—Establishing permanent vegetative cover.
- 1-B-5—Drill and case stockwater well.

### Christian Named On Committee To Study VEE Epidemic

Dr. H. Q. Sibley, head of the Texas Animal Health Commission, has announced the nomination of Rep. Tom Christian of Claude to a Congressional Commission on Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis.

Christian is one of fifteen Texas ranchers and veterinarians who have been asked to serve with a U. S. House of Representatives committee which will study the recent epidemic. Members of the House committee are expected to come to Texas sometime after the Congress reconvenes.

Request for such a commission came from the office of Undersecretary of Agriculture Ernest Saulman and is being handled in Texas by Dr. Erston Cox. Dr. Cox is head of the Federal Animal Health Commission in Texas.

In discussing Christian's nomination, Sibley stated, "Rep. Christian has been in on this VEE thing from the beginning and he should be on this Commission."

At the time of the epidemic, which put the State under quarantine, Christian was responsible for getting additional aircraft for vaccine distribution and for disseminating information concerning the disease to area veterinarians and county agents.

According to Sibley, the Commission will also take a look at other animal diseases that now have the state under four quarantines.

Concerning the nomination

Christian said, "I am pleased that Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz is showing concern for cooperation between the State and Federal agencies. By working together now, perhaps we can prevent the reoccurrence of the disastrous epidemic we witnessed this past summer. We need to take a look at our potential problems in the field of animal health and try some 'preventative medicine' rather than trying to play 'catch up' once a disease has broken out."
