

Rains During Past Week Push Yearly Total Past 13 Inches

Rain, falling most any time throughout the day or night the past week, has pushed the yearly total here in town to 13.39 inches which is less than 4 inches from the yearly average of 17 inches. The monthly total so far is 3.41 inches.

Similar measurements have been made at various points in the county with some exceeding this amount and some a bit less.

The exception to this case starts about the Donley-Armstrong county line west of Ash-tola to a point west of Good-night where they report an average of only 4 inches for the year including the one inch received during the past rainy spell. The approximate 8 mile strip north to south from Ben Lovell's Station is still critically dry as .40 inch was the heaviest amount reported from an individual shower. This is one of the reasons why Greenbelt Lake has not risen any great amount as this area is the principal watershed for the lake. Frank Drummond reported a rise of only 10 inches in the lake which has mostly come from Kelly creek and the Carroll creek area.

Weathermen are forecasting a short break in the wet spell and the hot sunshine will be most welcome to a number of row crop farmers.

Leon Doherty Rites At Hedley Monday

Funeral services were held at the First United Methodist Church in Hedley Monday afternoon, August 16, 1971, for Leon Doherty, Rev. Billy Wilson, pastor, officiated. He was assisted by Rev. C. C. Lamb, retired minister from Vernon, and Rev. Ted Dotts, District Superintendent of Pampa. Interment was in Rowe Cemetery in Hedley.

Mr. Doherty, a blind farmer, was selected "Comeback Farmer of the Year" for the state in April of this year. He died near noon Sunday in Hall County Hospital at Memphis.

A native of Hedley, Mr. Doherty developed diabetes when a child. He attended Hedley High School and Clarendon College for a year and a half before losing his eyesight. He married the former Florence Maureen Hill November 29, 1952 at Hedley.

Despite his handicap, Mr. Doherty, with the aid of his seeing eye dog, "Rennie", continued farming operations. He also served as choir director of the First Methodist Church of which he was an honorary member. He was also a member of the Hedley Lions Club.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, LaNeita; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Winfred "Red" Doherty, all of the farm home; two brothers, Ronald of Dallas and Jack of Denton.

New Science Program At Clarendon College

The Division of Science is establishing new programs this fall that will make it advantageous for the student to meet his science requirements at Clarendon College. New programs are being added to give student's majoring in science a sound two-year program. These programs will also help the science non-major meet his science requirements.

Two new courses will be offered in the Department of Biology. These courses are Human Anatomy and Physiology and Plant Taxonomy. Along with existing courses, these new courses will enable the student to complete a two year biology program at Clarendon College. These courses will lead to a major or minor in biology and support the agricultural and pre-professional programs.

General Biology and General Physics will be taught by an integrated approach this fall. Instead of the traditional three one hour lectures and one three hour lab per week, there will be three two hour sessions. This will allow time for the student to develop techniques or verify principles in the laboratory at the time they are studied. A biology field station, which is being established at Greenbelt Lake, will be used for laboratory work. The student will collect and study many of the specimens at the field station.

A study has been made by the Division of Science to predict those students who will have difficulty with biology and chemistry courses. This information will be used to counsel the students early in the semester rather than waiting till mid-term or later when the student is usually beyond help.

These new programs will attract more area students to Clarendon College. They will prepare the students for transfer into junior level work at senior colleges. Because emphasis is placed on helping the non-science major meet his science requirements, we think that these programs will be advantageous to students attending Clarendon College.

SCHOOL SETS TAX RATE AND APPROVES 71-72 BUDGET

At a stated meeting of the Clarendon Board of Education Thursday, August 12th, the budget for 1971-72 was approved and the tax rate was set at \$1.50 per hundred dollars assessed valuation for maintenance and at 40 cents per \$100 for the interest and sinking fund, based upon 3 3/4% of the fair market value.

Students Begin Registration Today For 1971-72 Term Of School

Public School Lunch Program Revised

Clarendon Independent School District has long recognized the need for helping meet the nutritional needs of its students. Our school serves a well-balanced nutritious lunch each school day. The charge to students who can pay is 40 cents in the elementary school and 45 cents in the Jr. High and High Schools. However, since some families find it difficult to pay this full price, the school will provide these lunches free of charge or at a reduced price to those children determined by Jeff Walker, High School Principal, and Stina Cain, Elementary Principal to be unable to pay the full price for their lunches.

Families who feel that their children may be eligible for free or reduced price lunches are urged to apply. Copies of the application forms will be sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies may be obtained at each principals office. The completed application, signed by an adult member of the family should be sent to their child's principal. Such applications will be reviewed promptly and the family will be notified in writing as to the decision made. All information provided on the application will be held in the strictest confidence. Decisions for approval will be based on the following income scales:

Example: If there are 4 people in your family and 2 of them are in school and yearly family income is \$4000, the cost for meals will be 20 cents for each child. If there is a third child and the same income bracket, the meal will be free.

In addition to the above announcement, due to the inflation of prices for food and for labor, the school board found it necessary to fix the prices of school lunches at 40 cents each for grades 1-5 and 45 cents each for grades 6-12; 70 cents each for employees of the school and \$1 each for all other adults.

Water was restored to service around 7:30 p.m. for the exception of the north side of town which was off all night.


We regret that patrons were without water service but these things just happen and all we can do is make repairs as quickly as possible, stated Walter B. Knorpp, City Administrator.



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

1972 Wheat Allotments

The national domestic wheat allotment for 1972 will be 19.7 million acres. This means that your farm allotment should be very nearly the same as you had in 1971. We expect to be able to mail your allotment notices within the next few weeks.

Remember, however, that your wheat allotment will not be a limit on the acreage you may plant. As in 1971, the acreage required for set-aside is the only limitation on crop acreages. The required set-aside for wheat will be an acreage equal to 83% of the 1972 allotment.

1972 Set-Aside Acreage Requirements

The productivity of designated acreage shall be at least equal to the average of the other cropland on the farm normally used

for crops. In the case of blended dryland-irrigated yields, the designated acreage must reflect the proper proportion of each.

The set-aside acreage should be in one field where possible and parts of fields of reasonable size and shapes should be designated only to complete set-aside requirements.

Acreage used as set-aside will not be eligible for prevented or failed acreage credit. This is a change from 1971.

Emergency Programs

The Livestock Feed and Hay Transportation Assistance programs have been extended in this county until March 31, 1972. Seasonal grazing and haying or CAP and set-aside acres now expires on December 31, 1971.

If improved conditions occur making the continued use of any of these programs not necessary, the State Committee may terminate the programs at any earlier date.

Osteopaths Win Fight In California Court

"After having been denied licensure in California for nine years, the osteopathic profession last week won a legal victory, as well as a moral one, in this profession's continuing campaign to preserve the public's right of free choice of licensed physician," it was declared today by Dr. Richard M. Hall (D.O.) of Groom, president of the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association.

The right of new D.O.'s to be licensed in California and the right to reciprocate licensure from other states was denied by a 1962 action, at which time the AMA and the CMA offered membership in their societies to D.O.'s and the "opportunity" to accept an M.D. degree at a cost of \$65.

"Those D.O.'s who refused to go along with this attempt at amalgamating with — and being absorbed by — the allopathic (M.D.) profession have been fighting the decision through the courts, with a ruling finally being handed down by the presiding judge who agreed that the people of California were indeed being denied their right of free choice of physician," Dr. Hall commented.

"Our foremost concern is the health of the people and in increasing the delivery of health care. This concern is not served best by the AMA's plan to absorb all D.O.'s into its membership because organizational monopoly certainly is not in the public interest.

"D.O.'s are prohibited from joining the AMA or any of its political divisions, such as the TMA. Our TOMA membership increased ten per cent last year," Dr. Hall concluded.

In the California court, Attorney Alexander Tobin contended the medical board and the osteopathic board refused hundreds of requests for applications from D.O.'s, because the law prevented examination by both boards, but M.D.'s were not so treated. This he argued constituted an unjustifiable and unlawful discrimination against osteopathic graduates (D.O.) who are as qualified as medical doctors (M.D.) in education training and internship.

The medical board argued that the education of osteopathic medical school graduates was inferior. The osteopaths countered that they must complete the same academic courses required of allopaths (M.D.'s) and in addition must qualify in other healing arts techniques to become D.O.'s.

Judge Finnegan in his August 4, 1971 decision ruled that the many admissions of the State of California, including the admission that "the practice of osteopathy has evolved into a complete school of medicine and surgery... integrating all accepted methods of treatment of disease and injury", demonstrate that there are no longer any material factual contentions to be tried, and further, that the State admits that it is unable to meet the burden of proof imposed upon it.

In commenting on Wednesday's ruling, Tobin said, "Judge Finnegan's decision is a classic example of the historic concept of checks and balances in the administration of government, and proof that the concept is still alive and well."

Interest in cool season grasses for winter grazing is increasing in Donley County. There are many good warm season grasses but few cool season which are adapted to this area. Several cool season grasses which exist are tall fescue, western wheatgrass, and smooth brome. Of these three, fescue is the most used in Donley County.

Fescue is a very palatable grass under fertilization and produces approximately 6500 lbs. per acre of forage during the cool season. The normal stocking rate on irrigated and subirrigated land is around 1-1.5 animal mouths per acre during the cool season, under good management. The grass is not recommended dryland and should be rested in June, July, and August. Optimum seeding dates are in August and September. However, the grass can be seeded until March with good results.

Several farmers in Donley County have small patches of fescue. These farmers are Henry Hastey, F. L. Hill, and Leroy Leathers. Fescue is also being tried for revegetation of the Red River. This fescue is located on the plant material plots on the R. O. Ranch.

For additional information fescue and other cool season grasses, contact the local Soil Conservation Service. They will be happy to give needed assistance and discuss programs which make cost-share available.

TRUCKERS: HIGHWAY USE TAX DUE AUG. 31

When Congress passed the Interstate Highway plan they set up a system to help pay for the nationwide network of highways. They imposed a highway use tax on large trucks, truck-tractors, and buses. The good folks at Internal Revenue Service have issued a friendly reminder to truck owners that August 31 is the deadline for filing their Form 2290 and paying the highway use tax for the fiscal year which began July 1, 1971. If you are not sure as to whether your truck is big enough to put you in a taxable category, IRS will be glad to send you Publication 349, Federal Use Tax on Trucks, Truck-tractors and Buses. Donley Accidents Take Five Lives

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of July, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in five persons killed and 14 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1971 shows a total of 35 accidents resulting in six persons killed, and 28 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July, 1971, shows a total of 564 accidents resulting in 38 persons killed and 324 persons injured. This was 40 more accidents, 28 more fatalities, and 38 more injured than during June.

The 38 traffic deaths for the month of July, 1971, occurred in the following counties: Wise, 8; Donley, 5; Wheeler, 4; Lamb and Wichita, 3 each; Oldham, Clay, Lubbock, 2 each; Deaf Smith, Hall, Farmer, Potter, Archer, Dickens, King, Palo Pinto, and Young, 1 each.

The 38 traffic fatalities in July have been the most that have been recorded during any month of 1971.

Aoudad Sheep Have November Season

The hunting season for aoudad or Barbary sheep in the Texas Panhandle will open this year Nov. 13 and close Nov. 19, both days inclusive, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The aoudads, weighing from 110 to 250 pounds, were first released in the rough, craggy Palo Duro Canyon area in 1957 when the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department brought 44 of the African exotics from the McKnight Ranch in New Mexico. The animals prospered, extended their range, and today number 600 or more rams and ewes.

The largest aoudad officially weighed since the season first opened in 1963 was harvested in 1964, one of 13 bagged that year. It edged the scales over the 270 pounds field dressed. Several weighing more than 200 pounds have since been brought out by hunters.

Permits issued to landowners have varied from a low of 42 to a high of 117 with more than 30 sheep taken each year the past three years. Wary and difficult to stalk, the aoudad makes a fine head trophy. One set of horns taken in 1968 measured 32 inches from base to tip.
