## Clarendon receives sales tax payment

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$68.8 million in local tax payments to the 991 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

Overall, the checks represented large increases over city payments made last March, but Bullock warned that the increase resulted from the way the city money was processed and did not necessarily indicate anything about the economy.

March checks represent taxes collected on sales made in January and reported to the Comptroller by February 20.

Donley County had a 1.39 percent increase. This is the first time in months that the county has been out of the minus column.

Clarendon's payment this period was \$6,608.44, compared to the payment for the same period last year was \$4,501.51. This made their 1985 payments to Clarendon \$22,244.79 while 1984 payment was only \$21,533.18 which gave Clarendon a 4.23% increase over 1984.

Hedley and Howardwick did not receive any tax money for this period. This was due to the way the tax money was collected for this period.

## Notice

The City of Clarendon has changed the disconnect date policy for delinquent water bills effective April 1, 1985. Each customer's water bill is received in the post office boxes on the first day of each month for the previous month's usage. The bills are due when received and become delinquent after the 15th of the month received. The cut-off date is the 20th of the month, but normally the City has waited until a customer was two months delinquent to cut off water.

As it will be imperative to collect the money due the City prior to the 15th day of each month in order to pay BFI Trash Collection Service for sanitation pick up, and Greenbelt Water Authority for our water, the City will no longer allow two months delinquency prior to cut-off. Any bill not paid by the 20th of the month received, will be cut off and a \$15.00 fee will be charged for re-connection.

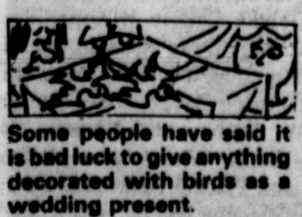

## DUTIES AND POWERS OF SCHOOL BOARDS

Manage and Govern the public schools of the district.

Adopt such rules, regulations and by-laws as the board may deem proper.

Levy and collect taxes and issue bonds.

Select a tax assessor-collector.

Prepare, adopt and file a budget for the succeeding fiscal year and file a report of disbursements and receipts for the preceding fiscal year.

Receive bequests and donations or other monies or funds coming legally into its hands in the name of the district.

Select a depository for district funds.

Order, canvass the returns, declare results, and issue certificates of elections as required by law.

Acquire and hold real and personal property in the name of the district.

Exercise the right of eminent domain to acquire property.

Hold all rights and titles to the school property of the district, whether real or personal.

Authorize the sale of any property, other than minerals, held in trust for free school purposes.

Sell minerals in land belonging to the district.

Employ by contract a superintendent, principal(s), teacher(s), or other executive officer(s), and set salary schedules therefor.

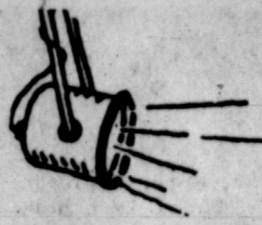

### TEENAGER SELF-IMAGE by REV. TONY COLBURN

We have been studying about having a good self-image in our Youth Department. It is very important that we think of ourselves as being important. Teenagers are usually bad about having a poor self-image. Many teenagers do not like the way they look and they're not too pleased with the way God made them. They either don't like the way their nose is shaped, or their too fat, or too skinny, too tall, or too short, etc... It's easy to get upset about the way you look.

You would be surprised at how many teenagers feel that they are an outcast just because they have a few physical shortcomings. It hurts when you're the last one chosen to be on the baseball team; or when you're rejected by others, or when everyone else is invited to go somewhere and you are the only one left out. Many teenagers have killed themselves for less.

We need to learn to accept ourselves the way God made us. We need to realize that we have been made in the image of God and that

you can't perfect upon that. God made you the way you are for a purpose. You need to realize that however you may look you are important to God. God doesn't put emphasis upon this physical body because it's going to die. God is concerned about the soul because it will live on forever. The Bible says in 1 Sam. 16:7 "...for the Lord seeth not as man seeth; for man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart."

Anybody that is trusting in their physical appearance to get them through this life is walking on very thin ice. Beauty doesn't last forever. A person begins to die as soon as they are born and by age 26 they are dying faster than they are living.

We need to develop the inner man and quit putting so much emphasis on the physical appearance. Remember God loves you the way you are.

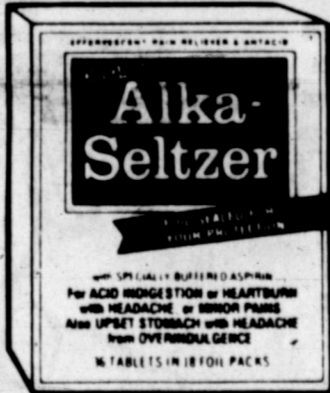

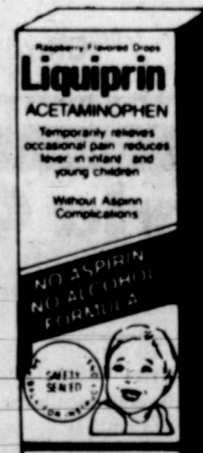

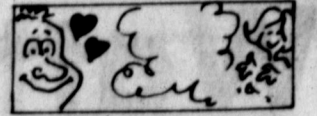

## Letter to the Editor

The evidence continues to mount that a political realignment is indeed underway in Texas with the Texas G.O.P. reaping the benefits.

In the past few weeks several prominent officials have made the switch to the G.O.P. all noting that conservatives are no longer welcome in the Democratic party.

On February 8th, three Dallas County judges moved into the G.O.P. folds. State District Judges Thomas Thorpe and Don Koons and County Judge Mike Schulle, accompanied by Senator Phil Gramm, announced their switch, despite the repeated pleas by Gov. White for them to remain Democrat. With these switches, 61 of 68 judges in Dallas County are Republican. In 1978, there were no Republicans.

On February 15, County Sheriff of Nueces County, James T. Hickey, also jumped to Republican ranks. Hickey said, "I have felt uneasy about the Democratic party's failure to address the needs of mainstream Americans."

Then on March 4th at a press conference held in the state capitol, Williamson County District Attorney Ed Walsh declared that he was joining the Republican party. In his statement to the press Walsh noted that "I no longer want to be part of a Democratic party that supports laws that make it harder to put criminals in prison and easier for them to get out." Walsh served as D.A. since 1976 and recently gained nationwide attention after he convicted mass murderer Henry Lee Lucas.

Joining the current wave is Judge Sam Houston, U.S. District Judge in Denton. Judge Houston ran for the Texas Supreme Court in 1976 as a democrat.

More switches are expected in the coming months. The conservative Democrat, especially those in the Bible belt have a great many conflicts to resolve. Two of the most important are the homosexual and abortion issues.

The recent election of Paul Kirk, a former aid to Massachusetts Senator Ted Kennedy, to the chairmanship of the Democratic party only adds to the problem.
