Clarendon receives sales tax payment

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$68.8 million in local tax payments to the 991 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

Overall, the checks represented large increases over city payments made last March, but Bullock warned that the increase resulted from the way the city money was processed and did not necessarily indicate anything about the economy.

March checks represent taxes collected on sales made in January and reported to the Comptroller by February 20.

Donley County had a 1.39 percent increase. This is the first time in months that the county has been out of the minus column.

Clarendon's payment this period was \$6,608.44, compared to the payment for the same period last year was \$4,501.51. This made their 1985 payments to Clarendon \$22,244.79 while 1984 payment was only \$21,533.18 which gave Clarendon a 4.23% increase over 1984.

Hedley and Howardwick did not receive any tax money for this period. This was due to the way the tax money was collected for this



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
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CHAMBER OF COMMERCE Clean Up Committee worked Saturday on north Sully

MAKE PROPERTY RENTIONS SOON

Almost everyone with property in the Donley Appraisal District has now been mailed rendition forms. Blank forms and other information is also available from your Appraisal District office in the Court House Annex.

Please complete the listing of your taxable personal property and return the forms by the end of April. Your estimate of the market value of the property is requested and will be considered along with reliable published price guides.

All personal property must be rendered each year. You should include cars, pickups, trucks, RV's, travel trailers, motocrcycles, boats, and airplanes. You should also include all merchandise in inventory held for resale. January 1 of each year is the rendition date in Texas; render only that property which you owed on Jan . 1, but make your rendition before May 1. Household goods and personal effects are exempt: generally all other personal property is taxable.

God doesn't put emphasis upon this physical body because it's going to die. God is concerned about the soul because it will live on forever. The Bible says in 1 Sam. 16:7 "...for the Lord seeth not as man seeth; for man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart.'

Anybody that is trusting in their physical appearance to get them through this life is walking on very thin ice. Beauty doesn't last forever. A person begins to die as soon as they are born and by age 26 they are dying faster than they are living.

We need to develop the inner man and quit putting so much emphasis on the physical appearance. Remember God loves you the way you are.

More switches are expected in the coming months. The conservative Democrat, especially those in the Bible belt have a great many conflicts to resolve. Two of the most important are the homosexual and abortion issues.
