## Cotton classification meeting was held at CC

Area gin managers and interested farmers met with Special Assistant to the Secretary of Agriculture Vern F. Highly at Clarendon College to discuss the problems the farmers are having with the classification of their cotton.

According to Mr. Highly there are approximately 5,500 different classes of cotton and that the sooner the farmers start using mechanical classing the better off they would be. He also stated that the farmers should make it their business to learn how their cotton is marketed.

"Get involved. Leave nothing to chance. Appoint a committee to go to the classing office and find out how they work. Ask questions."

Earl Shields, manager of the Paymaster Gin of Lelia Lake, brought records with him to show he sent a sample of cotton to be classed three times and each time he got back a different classification.

Mr. Dink Miller, manager of the Memphis Farmers Co-Op Gin asked the advantages of mechanical classing as opposed to manual classing was told that the sooner the farmers changed to mechanical classing the better they'd be because the classing office tended to under train the classers. According to Mr. Highly the USDA uses part time employees during the classing season and most of them are housewives who want to earn a little extra money. Most of them are trained for approximately 6 weeks while in the past a classer was required to have 7 years of supervised training.

When asked about the micronaire, Mr. Highly said that strength and length uniformity is the single most important thing. "The first thing a mill asks is the strength and length of the fiber. If a buyer tells you that the mic isn't important he's lying to you."

The group agreed that the local buyers were very competitive and that as a rule they paid 2 or 3 cents per pound more than Telcot paid. Most of the gin managers agreed that they sold very little cotton over Telcot.

In closing Mr. Highly said, "I'm going to see that someone looks into this problem. The American farmer feeds more than half the people in the world, and it's time he received proper recognition of this fact. The American public needs to be made aware of the fact that the farmer doesn't want to be dependent to anybody."

## Donley County approved for special haying-grazing

To accommodate farmers whose hay production and pasture development have been severely hampered by adverse weather conditions, USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service recently gave farm program participants special permission to graze their livestock and harvest hay or forage on cropland taken out of production by the 1985 acreage reduction and land diversion programs.

ASCS official Edwin Campbell said the special acreage conservation reserve (ACR) haying and grazing could benefit about 250 farmers in the county.

ACR acres include unpaid acreage reduction acres and diverted acreage for which payment is made. Without special authorization, the grazing period on these acres would have

been closed between May 15th and October 14th.

In addition to grazing livestock on their own ACR cropland, Campbell said program participants are authorized to let another farmer use their ACR acres. "No charge may be made of this privilege, however, other than to recover any reasonable harvesting cost."

The ASCS official said any acreage designated as a wildlife food plot or habitat may not be hayed or grazed, and any haying or grazing of ACR acres shall not remove the cover to the extent that the acreage is unprotected from wind and water erosion.

Farmers interested in ACR haying and grazing must notify the ASCS office of their intentions.

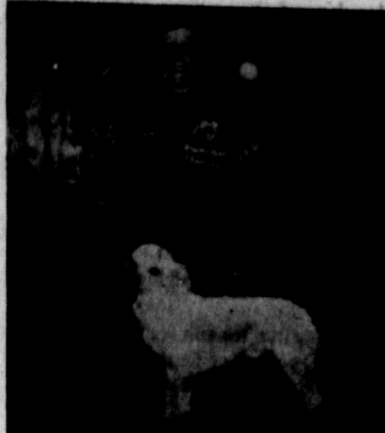

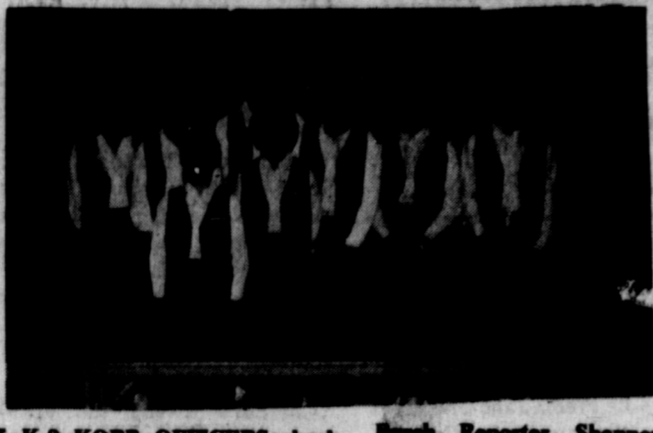

Protect fruit trees from insects

Homeowners hoping to harvest good fruit from their trees this year need to start work now to assure healthy trees and quality yield, advises Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent.

"The first step in producing quality fruit is to insure that the tree is in a healthy, vigorous state," Gooch said.

Various insects attack fruit trees and often the use of insecticides is the only means of control, the county agent said. Cultural practices such as proper pruning, fertilizing and watering also play important roles in preventing insect damage, he noted.

"Insect losses can be reduced with a spray program and by diligently following good cultural practices," Gooch said.

"But this should begin now for peach and apricot trees and in the next few days for apple trees," he stressed.

The most important insects which damage fruit in this area are the codling moth in apples and pears and the peach twig borer in peaches and apricots. Other damaging insects include the peach tree borer, which attacks the base of the trunk; and thrips, which attack foliage.

The first cover spray to prevent insects from damaging fruit should be applied to peach and apricot trees at the pink bud stage, and to apple trees when 90 percent of the petals have dropped. Subsequent applications should be made every 10 days to assure undamaged fruit.

"Five or six applications will be needed for apricot and peach trees, and up to 14 applications for apples and pears. Thorough coverage of the tree is important," Gooch emphasized.

Several insecticides, including diazinon, malathion, and zolone

provide good control of damaging insect pests, he said. Sevin will thin apples and shouldn't be used until 30 days after full bloom. A fungicide can also be applied with the insecticide to help prevent diseases in peaches and apricots.

Always read and follow label instructions for the pesticide you are using, Gooch said.

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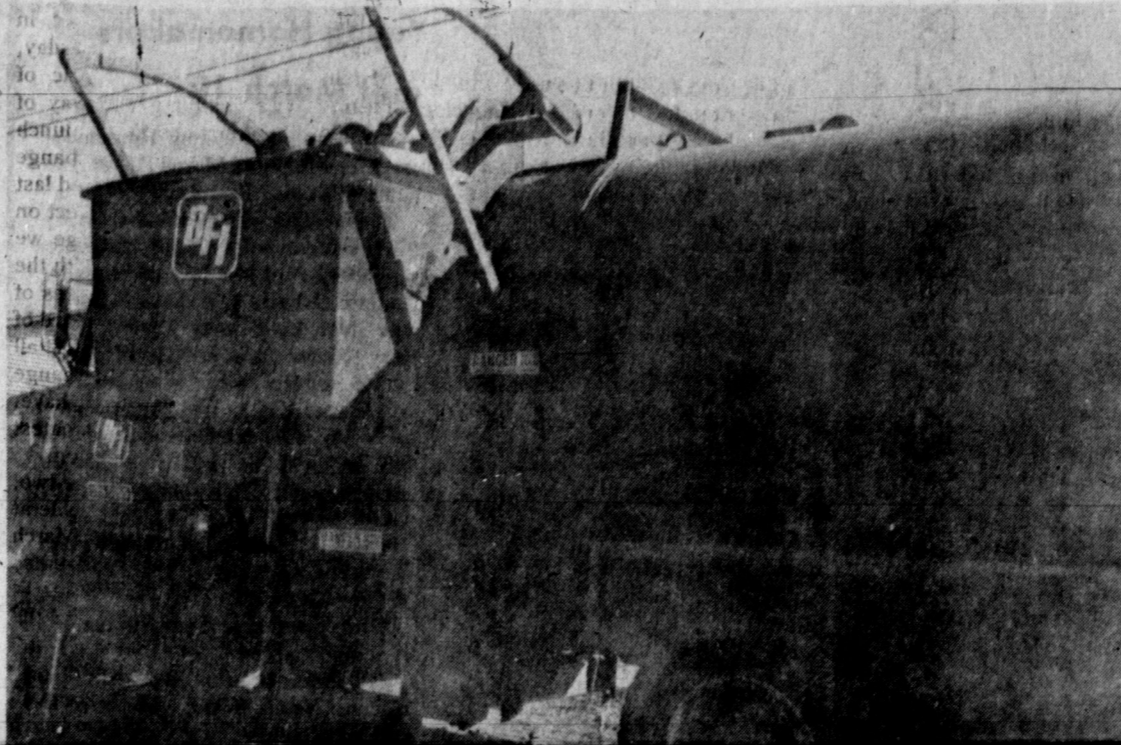
**Dangers concerning children and dumpsters**

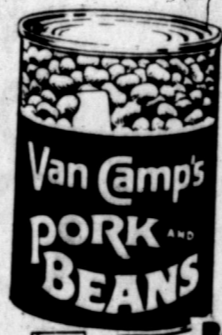

\*Minutes of the February 26, 1985 meeting were read and approved.

\*Charles SoRelle of the Donley Appraisal District asked the Board if they desired to continue having the Appraisal District contract with a law firm for the collection of delinquent taxes, offering discounts for early payment of taxes, providing penalties to defray costs of collection of delinquent taxes, and taxing of automobiles and other vehicles.

\*An ordinance was passed granting authority to contract for collection of delinquent taxes.

### ORDINANCE

An ordinance granting authority to contract for collection of delinquent taxes.

Whereas the City Commission of the City of Clarendon desires to have the services of an attorney to collect delinquent taxes and believing that all Tax Entities participating in the Donley County Appraisal District should be served by the same tax collection attorney for a period of two years, being all of 1985 and 1986.

Now therefore, be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Clarendon, that authority to contract with a tax collection attorney be delegated to Charles SoRelle, Chief Appraiser of the Donley County Appraisal District.

### ORDINANCE

An ordinance providing for a penalty to defray costs of collection of delinquent taxes.

Whereas the City Commission of the City of Clarendon deems it necessary to have a declared policy regarding the expense of collecting delinquent taxes due the City of Clarendon, and

Whereas the City Commission of the City of Clarendon is of the opinion that said expense of collecting said delinquent taxes should be borne by the delinquent properties and their owners who are responsible for causing such expenses.

Now therefore, be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Clarendon:

Section 1: Whenever any accounts for delinquent taxes owed the City of Clarendon are given to its tax attorney for collection, on or after July 1 of the year they become delinquent, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to, and shall collect, an additional penalty of fifteen (15%) percent of the delinquent taxes and penalty (including any interest owed) due on each delinquent property at the time of collection, either before or after suit and or foreclosure sale, as provided by Section 33.07 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

Section 2: In addition to the collection expenses provided for in Section 1 above, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to collect the actual expenses incurred by the Donley County Appraisal District in providing all data and information as to the name, identity, and location of necessary parties and the legal description of property necessary to the filing of any suit for delinquent taxes.

**Letter to editor**

For the past several months the Governor has been calling on all state agencies to "tighten the belt" in light of the state's current fiscal crisis. And while the Governor may talk about cutting the cost of state government, little or no action has taken place.

To make matters worse, the Governor has already approved half of the staff additions.

 The results of over 250,000 poisonings reported by the American Association of Poison Control Centers indicated that nine out of ten accidental and deliberate poisonings occur at home. The most common source of poisonings is household chemicals such as bleach and detergents. Plants rank second and medicines used to relieve pain and fever are third.

Four ways to reduce the danger associated with the poisons in our homes follow:

1. Discard outdated and unneeded household products by flushing them down the toilet. Throw away empty containers so that children will not play with them.
2. Keep poisonous materials in their original containers. Soda bottles containing even a small amount of solvents can be deadly to the unsuspecting child.
3. Do not refer to medicines as being "sandy" or as tasting "good." Children may seek them out when they get hungry.

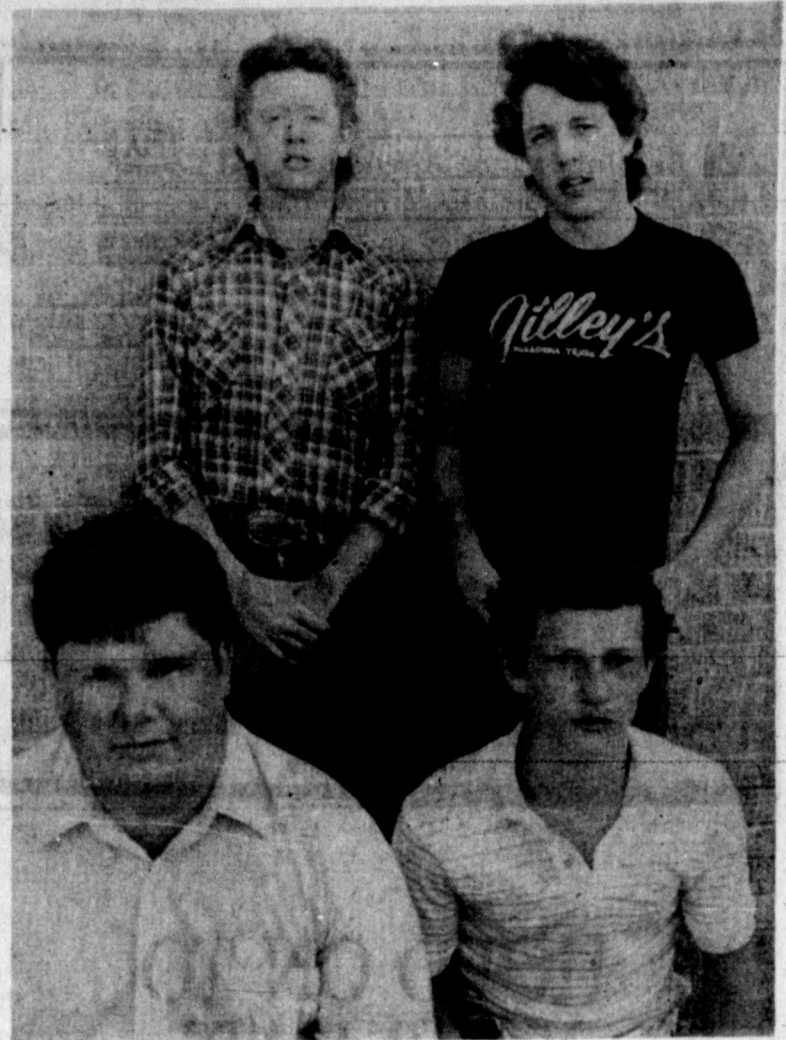

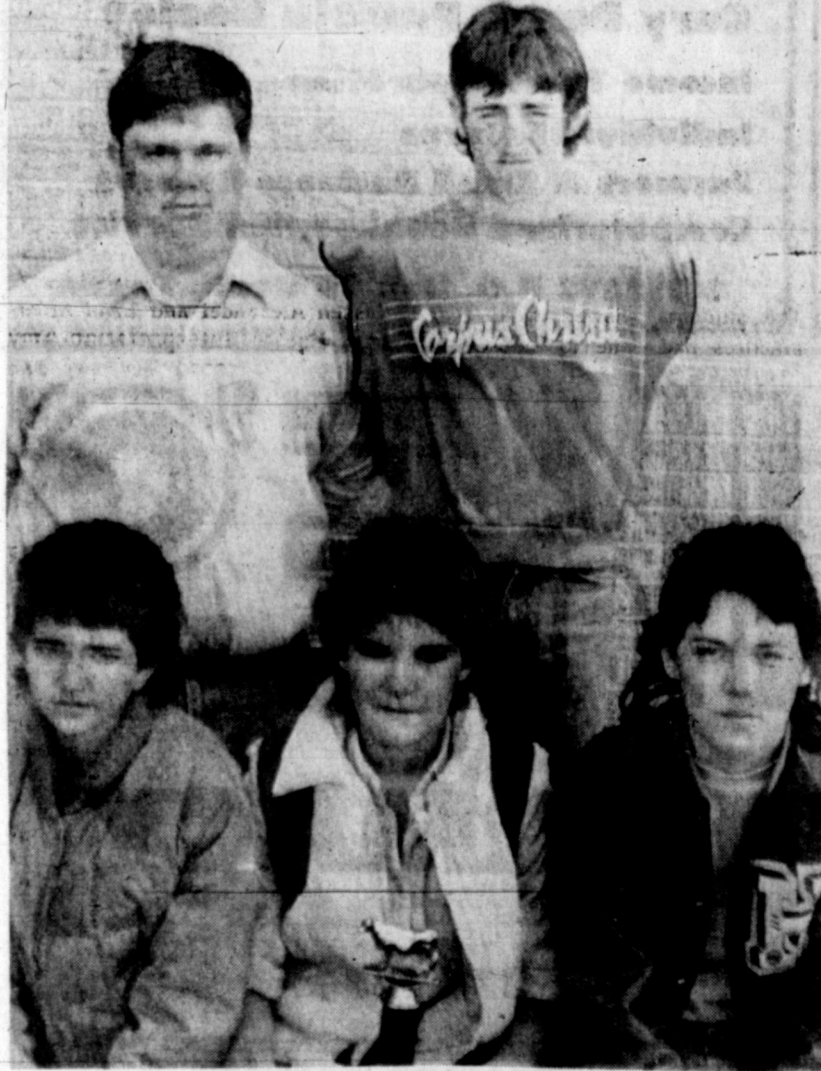

The following business was transacted:

\*Approved the minutes read in open court this date.

\*Amended the 1984-85 budget, for second amendment in the amount of \$11,000.00 to \$12,000.00. This is line 12 page 4.

\*Paid the bills as reflected by the Claims docket and approved by the court.

\*Approved the February reports presented by: County Judge, County Clerk, County Treasurer, Extension Department, the Justice of the Peace Prec. 2 and 3.

\*Appointed Billie Gaines and Leo Smith to serve on the grievance committee for 1985 in the place of people who declined to serve.

\*Tabled appointment of election judge for voting box 1, Prec. 1 in Howardwick.

\*Approved the telephone easement presented by General Telephone, according to County specifications.

\*Went on record opposing Senate Bill 628 and notified necessary authorities in Austin.

\*Entered into a contract with the law firm of Perdue, Brandon and Fielder to collect delinquent taxes,

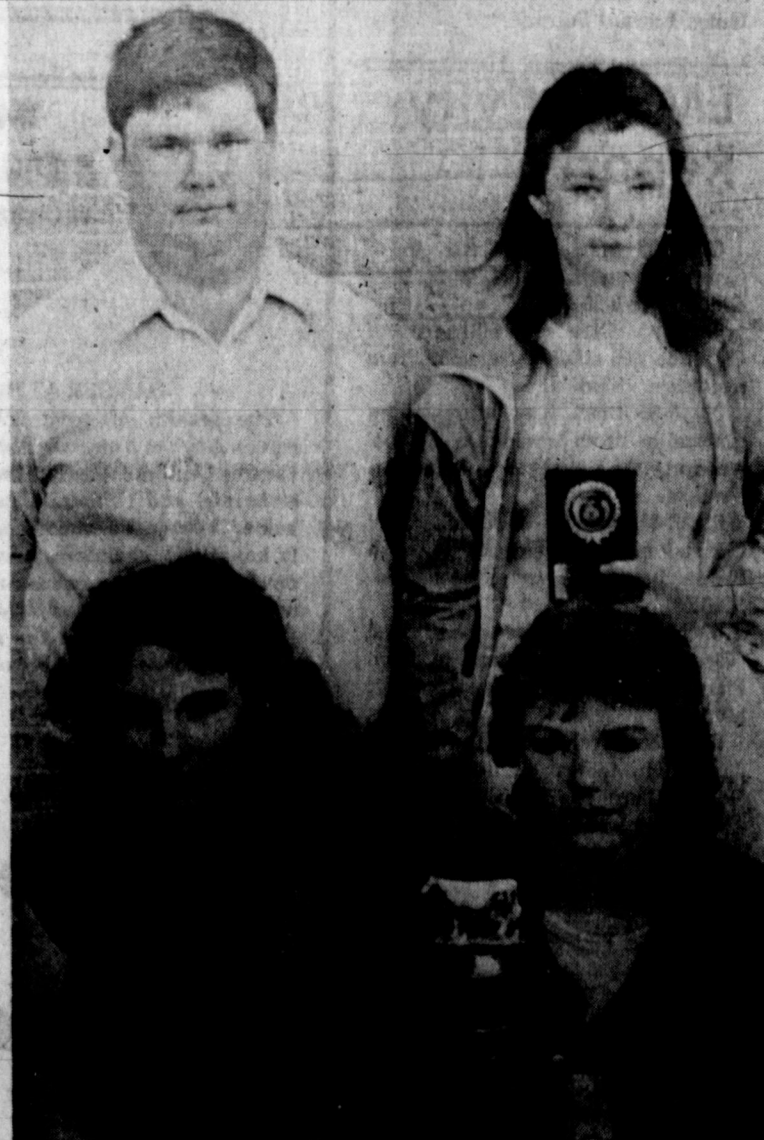
\*Approved having the telephone in the previous County Attorneys office moved to the present County Attorneys office.

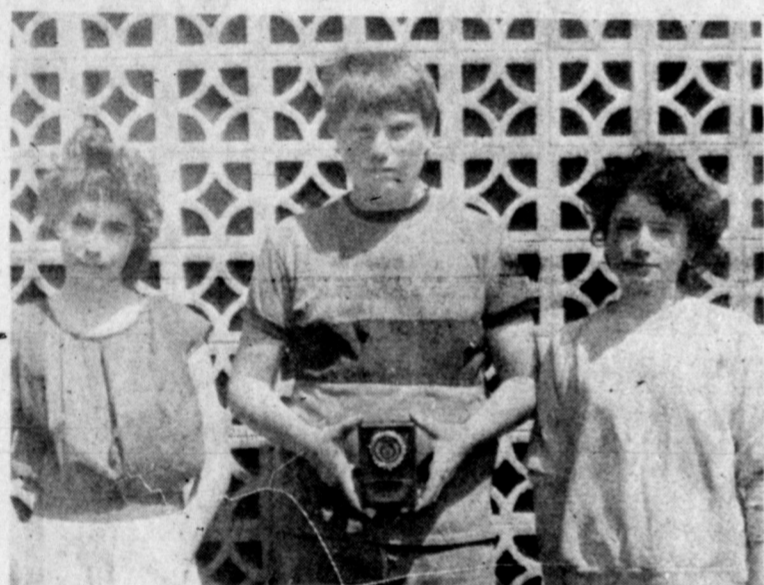
