increase in the number of miles driven coupled with_a three percent decrease in the mileage death rate indicates that we are still making
progress in traffic safety," Adams progress in trafic safety," Adams
said. "Compared to the record death toll
of 4,701 in 1981, we've had a saving of over 2,000 lives in the last three years, he pointed out. "However,
the growth of our state in the coming years will lead to continued increases in the number of miles being driven, licensed drivers and vehicles on our
