Monroe is a newcomer to Donley County, but he's no newcomer to the business of selling fruits and vegetables. In fact, Ed and his wife, Sandra, have more than a quarter century experience in retailing and wholesaling of produce.

They spent ten years in Marys-ville, California where Ed managed an orchard. More recently they spent several years wholesaling fruits and vegetables in Granite, Oklahoma. They bought produce from the markets at Dallas, San Antonio, and Oklahoma City. They also bought directly from the growers in South Texas.

"We picked, sorted, packed, and wholesaled the peaches to the dealers in the Marysville area. We've been wanting to buy an orchard for a long time, and when this chance came up, we jumped at it. The economic conditions are right now for anyone in the produce business to be successful. The American housewife has realized that her food money goes further if she buys her fruits and vegetables fresh and prepares them herself."


Politicians are the people we see every two or four years campaigning against the problems they have created in between these ap-

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
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
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

Project Tejas: Texas Agriculture

Relief Direct to Africa







VITAL VISION

The ability to see is one of our most vita needs. Each year during the first week is March the American Optometric Association sponsors "Save Your Vision Week." Particular emphasis is given to prevention oblindness that occurs with glaucoma, an eydisease that has probably caused more than 50,000 cases of blindness.

Most persons with glaucoma respond well to nedicines that are taken by mouth and/or laced directly in the eye via drops. Glaucoma nedicines either reduce the formation of fluids within the eye or enhance fluid outflow. In either instance, there is less fluid and resoure becomes more normal.
