Monroe Peach Ranch to open May 1

Ed Monroe is a newcomer to Donley County, but he's no newcomer to the business of selling fruits and vegetables. In fact, Ed and his wife, Sandra, have more than a quarter century experience in retailing and wholesaling of produce.

They spent ten years in Marysville, California where Ed managed an orchard. More recently they spent several years wholesaling fruits and vegetables in Granite, Oklahoma. They bought produce from the markets at Dallas, San Antonio, and Oklahoma City. They also bought directly from the growers in South Texas.

"We picked, sorted, packed, and wholesaled the peaches to the dealers in the Marysville area. We've been wanting to buy an orchard for a long time, and when this chance came up, we jumped at it. The economic conditions are right now for anyone in the produce business to be successful. The American housewife has realized that her food money goes further if she buys her fruits and vegetables fresh and prepares them herself."

The Monroes recently bought the orchard west of Hedley originally established by W.P. Doherty and more recently owned by George Oakes.

"We plan to plant peas, corn, okra, watermelons, canteloupes, squash, tomatoes, and other vegetables and we have apricots, apples, pears, plums, cherries, nectarines, and more than 20 varieties of peaches that will be ripening from June to October. I hope to get some berries started. We hope to be open about the first of May and look forward to doing business with the

people of Hedley and the surrounding area."

Ed and Sandra have 5 children. Their daughter, Regina, works in Oklahoma right now but plans to be here when the peach ranch opens.

Their sons, Troy, Tony, Jeremy and Matt live at home. Troy is out of school. Tony is a junior in Hedley High School, and Jeremy will start first grade in September. Matt "helps" in the orchard.

The Monroes are affiliated with the Assembly of God Church in Clarendon.

Sharp sets record in Amarillo

Trent Sharp set the 800 meter dash record at 1:53.86 in the Amarillo Relays Saturday. The old record was 1:56. The 1:53.86 Sharp ran is also the second fastest 800 ran in the state this year according to the Houston Chronicle.

The Broncos finished the meet tied for fifth with 42 points. The 1600 relay improved to a time of 3:26.1 and ran third. The team consisted of Robert Youngblood, Rodney Smith, Leland Howell, and Trent Sharp. Both Smith and Sharp ran their legs in under 50 seconds.

Robert Youngblood ran 4th in the high hurdles with a time of 15.81. Russell Alexander was 5th in the discus with 134 feet. Rodney Smith was 5th in the 400 meter dash and 6th in the long jump with a jump of 19'11". Trent Sharp was 6th in the 400 meter dash with a time of 52.8. Clay Sharp was 5th in the 3200 meter run with a time of 11:12.22. Marcus Smith was 6th in the 100 meter dash with a time of 11.54. We thank God for congregations that are exceptions to the rule, but too many Christians are like the prodigal son who not only lived in a far country, but who also lived in the hog pen of sin. Of many Christians Jesus has to say "I have somewhat against thee, because thou hast left thy first love" (Revelation 2:4), or "thou hast a name that thou livest, and art dead. Or as He said to the Church at Laodicia, "I know thy works, that thou art neither cold nor hot: I would that thou wert hot. So then because thou art lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will spue thee out of my mouth. Because thou sayest, I am rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing: and knowest not that thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind and naked: I counsel thee to buy of me gold tried in the fire, that thou mayest be rich: and white raiment, that thou mayest be clothed, and that the shame of thy nakedness do not appear: and anoint thine eyes with eyesalve, that thou mayest see" (Revelation 3:15-18).

The Bible clearly teaches that the Lord Jesus Christ will come to the earth again to rule as King of Kings and Lord of Lords. His coming will be personal, literal, visible, and bodily. 



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VITAL VISION

The ability to see is one of our most vital needs. Each year during the first week in March the American Optometric Association sponsors "Save Your Vision Week." Particular emphasis is given to prevention of blindness that occurs with glaucoma, an eye disease that has probably caused more than 50,000 cases of blindness.

About 200,000 new cases of glaucoma are diagnosed each year. Most individuals are over age 40. Usually, there are no symptoms until the disease has already caused considerable damage. Due to fluid buildup within the eye, the delicate nerves that carry vision are

damaged. Treatment is aimed at reducing excess pressure. If not adequately treated, glaucoma can lead to complete or partial loss of vision.

Most persons with glaucoma respond well to medicines that are taken by mouth and/or placed directly in the eye via drops. Glaucoma medicines either reduce the formation of fluids within the eye or enhance fluid outflow. In either instance, there is less fluid and pressure becomes more normal. Continuing nerve damage is avoided and so is progressive loss of sight.







Texas Most Wanted

GRAND PRAIRIE, Texas -- Trouble had been stalking Ban Thi Tran for the past couple of years.

According to Grand Prairie police, the young Oriental woman had been the target of harassment for almost two years since her divorce.

That harassment turned into murder on August 4, 1984.

Police reports indicate the woman was at her residence in Grand Prairie along with her two children and an acquaintance on the evening of August 4. When her friend was leaving the apartment around midnight, he noticed his automobile had been damaged. A tire was flat and the windshield had been smashed.

Ban Thi Tran told her friend that she would go with him to a service station to get the tire fixed. She went back to her house to lock the front door.

Suddenly, out of nowhere, a man appeared and began stabbing the woman with a butcher knife and a meat cleaver. She was repeatedly stabbed and died at the scene.

The vicious attack was witnessed by Ban Thi Tran's two children, who fled to a neighbor's apartment to seek help.

Other residents of the apartment complex also observed the assault and called the police. Ban Thi Tran's assailant escaped.

However, witnesses identified her



attacker as her ex-husband, Gam Van Vo.

The two had been divorced for about two years and there had been a history of acrimony between them during that time.

Detectives, armed with an arrest warrant, have been searching for Gam Van Vo since the murder.

He is an Oriental male, 25, 5-5, 130 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes. His last know address, detectives say, was in the 2500 block of Choice Street in Dallas. However, he has left that residence and is believed to be travelling back and forth between Texas and Arkansas.

This week Gam Van Vo has made the Texas Most Wanted list. A \$1,000 reward is being offered for information leading to his capture.

Anyone with information about Gam Van Vo's whereabouts is asked to call Texas Crime Stoppers toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program. Callers do not have to reveal their identities.
