## **Proclamation**

BY THE County Judge of Donley County

To all to whom these presents

shall come: I, Billie Christal, County Judge of Donley County do hereby declare the week of September 16-22, 1984 as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY

WEEK in Donley County, for the

following reasons: Whereas, the president has proclaimed the 41st annual National Farm Safety Week (founded in 1944 to fight accidents impairing wartime food and fiber production) and the Governor has proclaimed the same period as Texas Farm and

Ranch Safety Week; and Whereas, during this week, a statewide farm and ranch accident/ illness prevention education campaign is being undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Safety Council, the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and 4-H Clubs, Texas Education Agency through the Texas Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, the Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Donley County Farm Bureau with the theme, "MANAGE FOR BETTER SAFETY AND HEALTH"

Whereas, the National Safety Council estimates indicate that in 1983 farm work accidents resulted in approximately 1,900 deaths and 190,000 disabiling injuries. This unhappy toll is further compounded and on the highway." by many job-related illnesses. The direct economic costs of these problems exceed \$5 billion annually, and there is no way to measure the pain, despair and family disruption that also result.

Therefore, I urge every man and

woman engaged in farming and ranching to make basic safety and health a priority in every activity and task -- on the job, in the home and on the highway. I call upon parents especially to teach their children good safety and health practices and instill in them a positive attitude toward safety and health which will serve them well throughout their lives.

Billie Christal County Judge Sept. 16-22 proclaimed Farm and Ranch Safety Week

County Judge Billie Christal has proclaimed September 16-22, 1984, as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Donley County, at the request of Harold Whtie, Donley County Farm Bureau president. This year marks the 41st annual observance of National Farm Safety Week, cosponsored by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Farm Safety Week was founded in 1944 to fight accidents impairing wartime food and fiber production. The theme, Manage for Better Safety and Health, recognizes that safety and health must be a management goal if losses due to farming accidents and illnesses are to be controlled.

In the proclamation, Judge Christal said, "I urge every man and woman engaged in farming and ranching to make basic safety and health a priority in every activity and task -- on the job, in the home

Donley County Farm President Harold White said, "We wish to emphasize this year's Farm Safety Week theme - Manage for Better Safety and Health" - Successful farmers and ranchers know that how well they use their heads at the desk is just as important as how well they use their hands in the field. There's just no substitute for good management. They also know accidents and work-related illnesses cost time, money and sometimes life and that there's no substitute for making safety and health a top management goal

\*Develop a safety and health plan tailored to your operation and those who live and work on your place.

\*Keep informed about safety and health. Attend local events that include them. Encourage children to take part in 4-H, FFA and other safety projects.

\*Carry out regular safety inspections of equipment and facilities.

\*Buy quality products, then use and care for them as directed in product manuals, on labels and/or as instructed by product suppliers. Train your help, then see that

they work safely. \*Take needed precautions before starting a job. Have the right tools. Check out equipment. See that shielding is on, that correct per-

sonal protective equipment is worn. \*Take care of your health. Be fit and ready for a safe day. Avoid activities that require normal competence if ill or taking strong

medications or alcoholic drinks. •Respect limitations of mind and body. Take action to reduce stress. Get enough rest and take work breaks to reduce fatigue.

\*Keep children off and away from machinery. Give youngsters chores they can safely handle.

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

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

INFECTION-FIGHTERS

Medicines used to help the body fight bacterial infection are called antibiotics or antiinfectives. There is a large number of different bacteria that cause infection and, fortunately, there is a large variety of agents available to fight the infections thus produced.

The infection-fighting value of sulfonamides [the "sulfas"] was discovered in the early 1930's. Labeled "miracle drugs", the sulfonamides revolutionized our thinking about infection. The importance of penicillin as an infection-fighter was discovered shortly thereafter. People became excited about the

Unfortunately, this possibility has not material-

help us cope with life-threatening infections. Streptomycin, for example, brought hope to thousands of individuals suffering with tuberculosis. The broad spectrum antibiotics which began to emerge in the 1950's and 1960's resolved a variety of infections that would not respond to sulfonamides or penicillin. Tetracycline, chioramphenicol, and - more recently the cephalosporins have often been proven to be more miraculous than their predecessors.

#### **FARM-STORED GRAIN UNDER** CCC LOAN

When you get your commodity loan at your local ASCS county office, you sign an agreement with the Commodity Credit Corporation. Your responsibilities are spelled out in the terms and conditions section of the agreement. IT'S ALL THERE IN THE FINE PRINT - so read your agreement carefully. Until your farm-stored loan is satisfied, you are responsible for both the quality and the quantity of the grain under loan. Deterioration, shortage or contamination can cost you money when it's time to settle up. Protect your interests and safeguard your commodity by using good storage management.

While your grain is in storage, you should check the grain carefully at regular intervals (2-3 weeks). Grain temperatures should be checked at each inspection (any evidence of higher than normal temperature is a danger signal). Look for insects (likely spots are

grain surface peaks, at the unloading door and the southwest side of the bin). Use an approved fumigant, if necessary, to kill insects. If your bin is equipped with fans, aerate to cool the grain when outside air is cooler than the grain. DEADLINE NEARS FOR WHEAT INSURANCE

The final application date for Federal Crop Insurance on 1984crop wheat in Donley County is August 31st, according to Gene Hamilton, District Director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corp. Hamilton adds, however, the wheat growers interested in participating in the special individual yield coverage program should apply for the necessary yield certification by December 1st.

Farmers who can qualify for the IYC plan are offered higher yield guarantees at no additional cost. To be eligible, Hamilton explains, producers must have records to show that average wheat yields during the three most recent crop

## Train derails in Clarendon Sunday


According to Mr. Lynch, a supervisor for Burlington Northern Railrods, the derailment started at a switch about 800 yards south of the




## Keep Children Away from Outlets!
