Soil and Water Conservation **District Tree Sales Started**

200 million trees and shrubs were planted on 30,000 farms in windbreaks. The planting zone extended from the Canadian border of North Dakota to include the Texas Panhandle.

One of the most significant modifications that plains foresters have made in the traditional 15 to 20 row plantings made 42 years ago is the narrower width of windbreaks being recommended today. A three row windbreak 50 ft. tall can reduce wind velocity on the leeside by as much as 50 to 75 percent for a distance of 500 to 700 ft. This reduction in windspeed across a field prevents erosion of surface soil and subsequent damage to young crops due to blowing sand.

A four row windbreak, when planted 100 ft. from the home, can reduce home fuel needs by as much as 15 percent or more. Around the homestead a windbreak can be used not only for protection, but to beautify the home. A typical four row windbreak could consist of

End of Year Crop and Livestock Reports

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in late November for final 1984 crop acreage, yield and production totals during December for end-ofyear livestock and poultry inventory information.

The confidential interviews, conducted by mail or in person by field enumerators, provide information used by producers to make their production and marketing plans for the coming year.

"These surveys take on a new importance this year," State Statistician Dennis Findley added, "since the prolonged dry weather in many areas of the state cut crop and forage yields and forced heavy culling of livestock herds. Producers are depending on this information for an accurage picture of the 1984 agricultural situation. We all need a sound base to make the right decisions for 1985."

To reduce survey costs, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as county esti-

Timmy, age 4, had 25 stitches in his head. The other victims escaped with lacerations and bruises.

This was the 218 accident in Donley County this year and 5 more accidents have been reported since Thursday. Donley County has had three traffic fatalities this year, one of them was alcohol related.

Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson stated, "This is an unacceptable traffic figure. My deputies and I are going to crack down on traffic violators. Anyone caught breaking the traffic laws will be stopped and tickets will be issued. Speeding in the school zones will be number one on the list."

White Deer Ends **Bronco Season 13-10**

The Clarendon Broncos lost their chances to go into the state playoffs with a 13-10 loss to White Deer. A strong north wind and numerous penalties hampered both teams. The Broncos received 10 penalties for 120 yards. It seemed each time the Broncos were on the move they would receive a back breaking penalty.

The Broncos started with the strong wind to their back and after an excellent punt by Rod Keown that went out of bounds on the Bucks 5 yard line, the Bucks were forced to punt and the Broncos took over on the Bucks 30 yard line. Stanley Gardner made 20 yards to the 10 yard line and after the drive ended with fourth and 5 from the 5 yard line, Trent Sharp kicked a 22 yard field goal to make the score Broncos 3 and the Bucks 0. The rest of the first half was a defensive battle with the Bronco defense coming up with enough big plays to keep the Bucks out of the end zone each time.

White Deer chose to take the wind in the third quarter and after two drives were stopped deep in Bronco territory, finally scored on a 12 yard pass and missed the extra point to make the score Bucks 6 Broncos 3.

The Broncos still had high hopes as they got the wind trailing only 6 to 3 but a Bronco turnover gave the ball to the Bucks on the Bronco 30 yard line. A flat pass was taken and ran the distance to make the score 12 to

Late in the fourth quarter the Broncos took over on their own 20 yard line and Rodney Smith took a pass from Sharp to the Bronco 45. The next play produced a play only Smith could make as he took a short pass from Sharp and made a great run to the Bucks 5 yard line. After a Sharp to Brent Hayworth pass fell incomplete. Smith swept left end for the score. Sharp added the point to bring the score to 13 to 10. The Broncos failed on the on-side kick and the Bucks ran out the clock to end the Bronco season

Rodney Smith, the offensive player of the game, ended the game with 60 yards on 17 carries and 3 pass receptions for 85 yards. Stanley Gardner had 50 yards on 12 carries. Trent Sharp completed 8 passes in 24 attempts for 114 yards. Robert Youngblood had 4 receptions for 30

Green Thumb Training Provides Crime Prevention Tips

What does a burglar look for when he's looking for an easy target? Homes that present the least risk of tunity for easy entry, according to the information presented at a recent Green Thumb training seminar.

More than 60 Green Thumb workers from 7 counties learned to look at their homes through a burglar's eyes when they met at Hedley, Texas on November 8, 1984. Homes that appear unoccupied and unprotected; homes without adequate locks and lighting; open or unlocked doors and windows; and home sites which provide easy concealment from neighbors and passing motorists wear "Welcome Burglar' signs.

Jimmy Thompson, Donley County Sheriff, presented crime prevention tips to those attending the seminar. Also on the program was Don Smith, C.P.A., who spoke to the participants on income tax information especially for senior citizens.

State Green Thumb Director Diane Parrish talked with the group of enrollees and sponsors about administrative matters and presented a film from the Central Texas Chapter of the Red Cross that dealt with fire safety

Down 3.58%

Comptroller of Public Accounts, Bob Bullock, sent Texas cities checks for city sales and use tax for the period ending Oct. 26, 1984.

Donley County is up .75% from the same period last year. Howardwick is up 53.44% over last year, Hedley is up 2.72% while Clarendon is down 3.58% over last year. Clarendon received \$9,736.33 this period, receiving \$11,964.50 for the same period last year. They have received \$77,522.98 so far this year compared to \$80,481.26 for the same period in

Hedley received \$937.87 this period and has received a total of \$5,386.49 to date.

Howardwick received the smallest check of the three cities. It received \$560.71 this period for a total of \$6,558.01.

Armstrong County is up 3.13% over the same period last year. Collingsworth has an increase of 4.67%. Carson is up only 1.9%, while Hall County has the largest increase of 10.76% over the same period last year.



DELINQUENT TAX COLLECTIONS CONTINUE

Approximately 95% of local taxes are paid timely by February 1 following each tax year. Those few property owners who do allow their tax assessments to become delinquent are assessed mandatory penalties and interest; notices are always issued warning of the tax delinquency and of any collection action. Most of these few do pay within the following five months; after July 1 following delinquency an additional collection penalty is incurred to defray costs of collections. Then, personal property may be seized and real property otherwise taken to be sold to satisy the tax lien.

This final action is taken only after other collection efforts have failed for a reasonable time!

Unless all pay their tax, it is not a fair system for the willing and prompt taxpayers who are the great majority.

All of the local property tax do!lars stay here in Donley County to pay for local governmental services from which we all recieve benefit. These local governing bodies are all composed of local people whom we elect.





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


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Hedley Feedlot Expands Holding Capacity 33%

The Hedley Feedlot is one of the major businesses in the Hedley area and is expanding their operation. They recently completed a new set of pens with a holding capacity of 3,500 head of cattle and new sick barn with working area and a shop. This increases the total holding capacity

by almost 33 percent. According to feedlot manager, Sammy Slover, there are approximately 10,000 head of cattle on feed in the facility which

is located three miles east of Hedley. The new pens, built by Branson Brothers Construction of Farwell, will hold from 100-300 head of cattle

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There are about 15 employees at the feedlot, most of them local residents

"Randy Shaw and Mike Darnell have been here longer than I have, and I don't think I could find any better help anywhere. There isn't anything about the entire operation that those two don't know between them," feedlot manager, Sammy Slover said.

"Most of the cattle we feed are bought locally. We ship a few in from the east but not many. The mortality rate among the eastern cattle is too high. Most of them have every kind of disease you can think of. We get 70 percent of our cattle from the panhandle of Texas and Oklahoma.

"The mill is running at capacity now. We can mix one hundred twenty-five tons of feed daily. We're hoping to increase the mixing capacity to 200 tons in the spring. Of course, that depends on the economy. By spring we might not be able to buy the cattle we need to run at our present capacity. There might not be any money to buy cattle with, nor any cattle to buy.'

Most of the feed used is grown near Hedley. Weeks-Bagwell Grain Co. of Claude furnishes most of the grain. The feedlot also purchases feed from Wheeler-Evans of Groom and Cargil, Inc. of Amarillo.

The Hedley Feedlot also has 70 acres of wheat and runs calves on it. The wheat is irrigated with run-off water from the watering troughs in the pens. Mr. Slover said he plans to increase the wheat acreage to 175 acres next year.

The feedlot was first opened in 1972 by Tommy Price of Canyon. It was sold a time or two before it was bought in 1977 by Mr. J.W. Rippy of

Mr. Rippy owns approximately 25 percent of the cattle in the facility and the other 75 percent are owned by private customers who feed the cattle on a custom feed basis.

"Most of the cattle come in weighing about 700 pounds and it takes about 90 days to finish them at 1,100 pounds. We sell our fat cattle to Swift Packing Plant in Dumas, Val-Agri and I.B.P. in Amarillo and Micelson Beef and Harris Packing in Oklahoma City.

There's no specific breed in the feedlot. We get a lot of Holstiens but there's almost every other kind of cattle here also." Sammy Slover explained.

'It costs about \$200.00 to finish a steer for 90 days. The blacks and black baldys gain faster than any other breed. The exotics don't gain much in meat. They just get bigger bones. The smaller breeds out yield the exotics also. Some of them yield as much as 1 percent more.

The steers will also out yield the heifers by about 11/4 percent. We have more heifers than steers. We buy some cows. We sell them as fat cattle rather than canners and cut-

When asked to explain about the different grades of cattle, Mr. Slover said, "The canners and cutters are usually old cows and are thin. Real thin. Boners and utilities are a little fleshier and have more meat. Breakers are the fattest of the cows. The steers and heifers we feed are mostly sold as choice beef. This is what we see as steaks and roasts in the meat markets. The canners and cutters are used to make lunch meat and canned meat. The boners are usually ground up into hamburger. The others are better meat with more marbling and are more tender."

When asked if visitors were welcome, he laughed and said, "Sure, if anybody comes by and wams to take a look around, I'll give them a guided tour myself."
