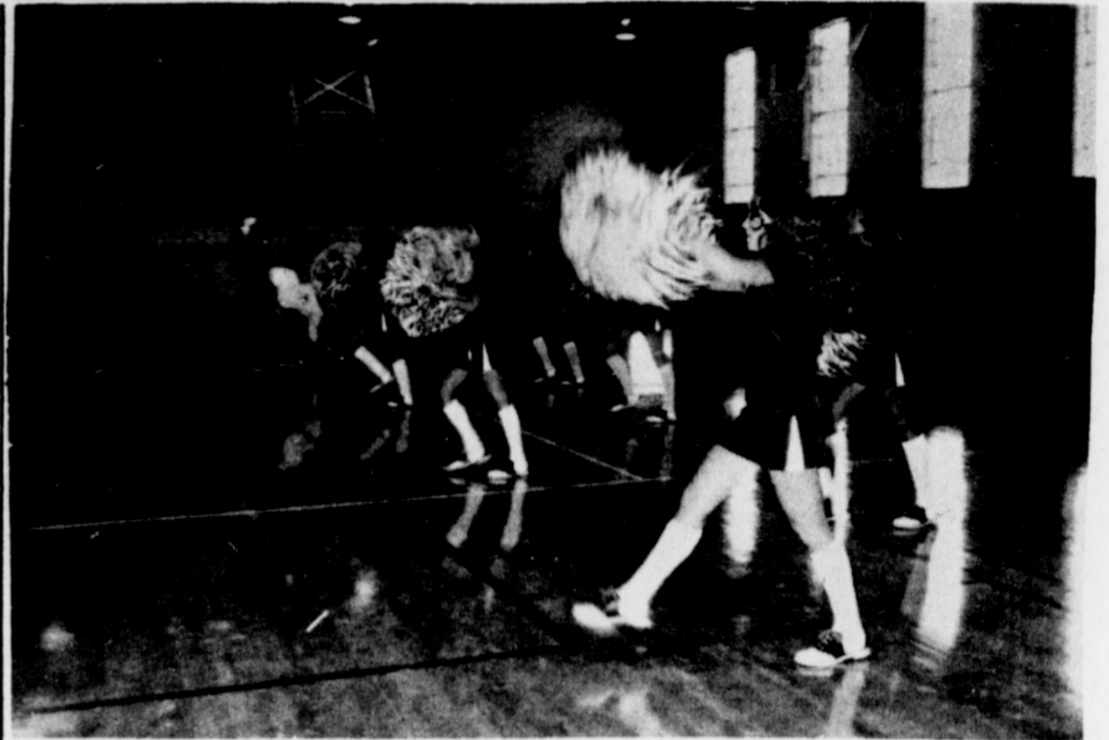

Shopping In Old Clarendon

What was it like to go shopping in the old days in Clarendon around the turn of the century. I'm told that you didn't have too much choice as to where you would buy your groceries. Neither did you have too much choice as to what you would buy. You bought your crackers from the old cracker barrel. You could choose between red and white beans. Dried goods were in plenty.

Items not seen in today's grocery markets were cured meats. There were cured hams hanging from the rafters of the old store. There was cured, dry salt bacon. There were cured or dried links which folk made themselves and cold. The intestines of slaughtered animals were preserved, cleaned, and used to stuff ground meats. There were twisted and tied. There were dried or smoked. Sounds delicious doesn't it? I'm told that they were scrumptious. Dried fish were a delicacy.

These dried meats were used just like you use any frozen ham today. You could bake your ham or fry it. These meats were used to season beans. Skin was cooked to render the lard from it. This grease was used in cooking. The skin was called cracklins were good to eat and good to make corn bread. Such bread was called "cracklin bread."

You could buy three pounds of coffee for twenty-five cents. You had to grind it yourself. You bought cured, baked coffee beans. Every home had its own coffee grinder. Neither did you have an electric coffee pot. You had what some called a "bullie."

This was a big coffee pot that was usually set on an open flame.

People bought a little differently in those days. "We didn't have any of these fine foods," said one person, "but we did eat well." Most everybody bought once a month, or twice a year. The country people would come to town in their wagons about twice a year to buy staple goods. They bought flour, coffee, sugar, beans, salt, cloth, and kerosene for their oil lamps at home. A person could buy fifty pounds of flour for about \$1.00. Sugar was bought in one hundred pound sacks at \$7.00 per hundred pound sack. Flour and sugar sacks were kept to make dresses. Some folk around Clarendon still remember wearing those flour sack dresses.

"People seemed to be more thankful in those days," commented one senior citizen. "We were more content with what we had than people seem to be today," she added. "We lived from day to day."

"Faith in God's provision to care for us helped us to be more satisfied with the things we had," commented another. "We believed in God's care." The words of Jesus were referred to by another, "Wherefore, if God so clothe the grass of the field, which today is, and tomorrow is cast into the oven, shall he not much more clothe you, O ye of little faith? Therefore take no thought saying, what shall we eat? or what shall we drink? or wherewithal shall we be clothed . . . for your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things, but seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things shall be added unto you." (Matt. 6:30-34).

Today's generation seems to have forgotten this art of dependence upon God. We want to live several months in advance. We can learn from this lesson of day to day contentment and being satisfied with such things as we have. (Thanks to Mrs. W. W. Taylor, O. C. Watson, and Mrs. H. W. Stout for sharing with me their concept of life around the turn of the century.)

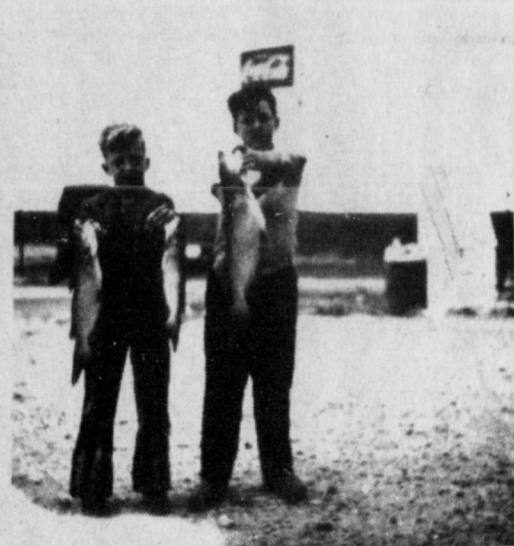

NEWS FROM Congressman Bob Price 13th District, Texas

CONTROLLING FEDERAL SPENDING

An effective battle against inflation must include a reduction in government spending. This year's federal budget totals \$305 billion. The President wants to reduce it by at least \$5.5 billion. I have long worked to cut spending and I am supporting these efforts.

But budget cutting is not a simple matter of a 2-to-3% across - the - board reduction. This is because "uncontrollables" now total some 75% of the budget.

The biggest portion of "uncontrollables" are programs that put money directly into the hand of individuals, totalling \$135.5 billion or some 44% of the entire budget. These payments touch one in every four Americans. They include such programs as social security, medicare, unemployment benefits, veterans benefits, military and civilian federal retirement programs, welfare and food stamp payments, and even disaster aid for farmers.

The Congress has already pro-

mised to pay these benefits to eligible individuals. No one knows precisely how many individuals will qualify, but once promised it is very hard for Congress to limit that spending.

Another \$52.3 billion is to meet federal contracts already agreed upon for construction of such things as buildings, dams and weapons systems. Contracts can be cancelled or stretched out, but usually not without paying built in penalties, and stretch-outs may mean higher costs later.

Another major "uncontrollable" is interest on the public debt: \$31.5 billion. As deficits pile up, the debt is to pay off some of the debt itself. Some other "uncontrollables" include: general revenue sharing already guaranteed to state and local governments, \$8 billion, and Postal Service deficits, \$1.6 billion.

So the \$5 billion to 10 billion in cuts must come in the one-fourth of the budget which is still controllable. Exempting the already bare - bones defense budget leaves - only about \$26 billion from which to make the cuts.

Budget Director Roy Ash says next year's budget is likely to be some \$23 billion more than this year's just figuring in normal growth and not planning on any new government programs. Congress in the past has found the pressures to embark on new

programs and to expand old ones nearly irresistible. Over the years, Congress has become more liberal with the public purse. Now we are paying the price.

The question is whether popular support can be generated nationwide for a government having more modest notions of what it can and should do for its citizens. Somehow, Congress must learn to manage the items now considered to be "uncontrollable."

FARM NOTE: The ASCS this week, at my request, clarified their regulations on volunteer wheat which has sprouted in some areas. I was advised that producers may graze, or even harvest, the volunteer wheat without penalty in their ASCS allotments for cotton, wheat or feedgrains, if crop residues are left as conservation cover through the normal growing season. This gives farmers another option as they make their crop plans and could mean additional income.
