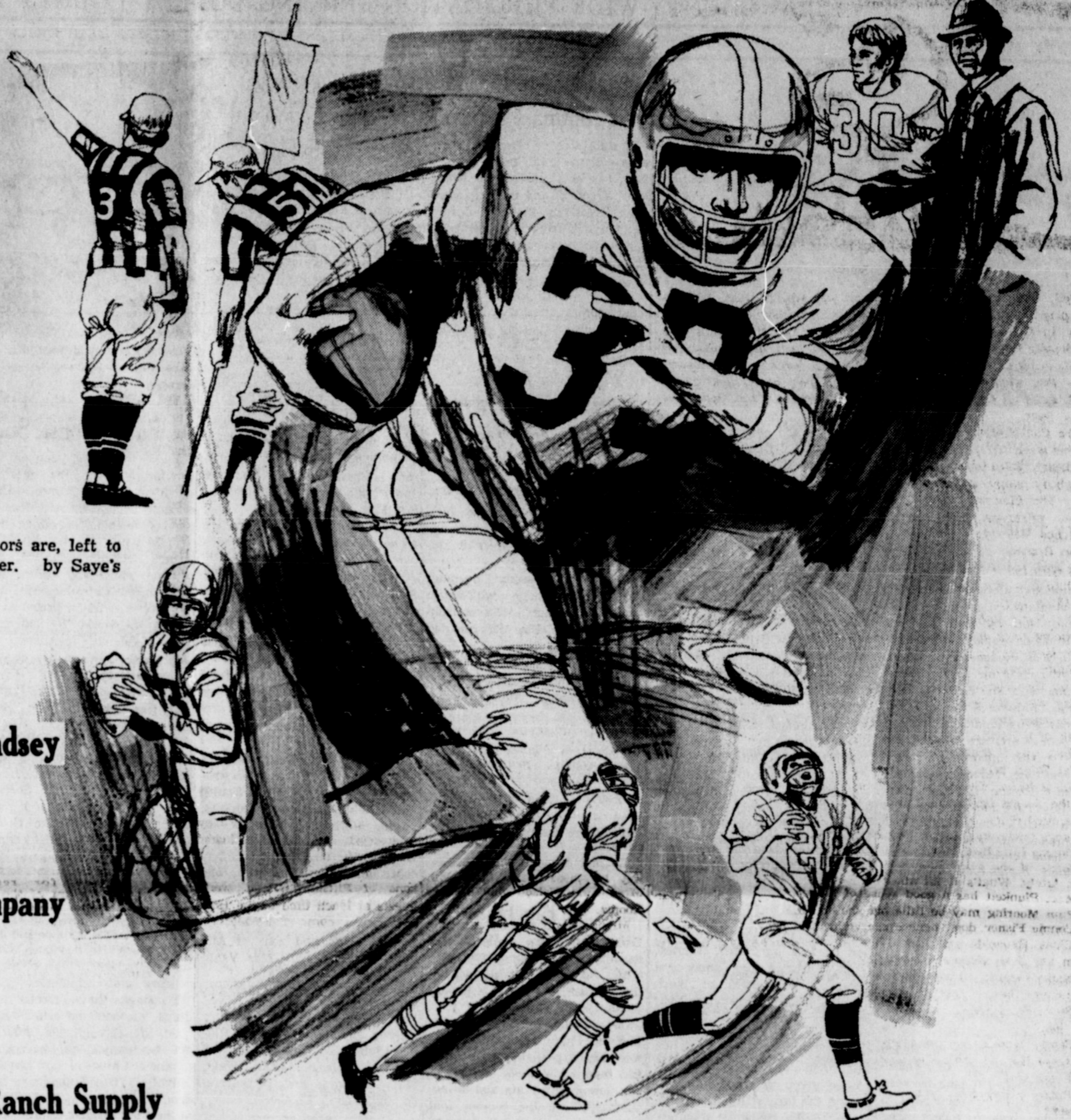

EPCO Classes At CHS To Aid Students In Vocation Adjustment

A new study plan is beginning this year at Clarendon High School. Known as the Vocational Adjustment class, the study is part of the Plan A educational program of the Eastern Panhandle Co-op. The program is known as EPCO.

EPCO is a cooperative of 18 schools: Allison, Briscoe, Can- adian, Clarendon, Estelline, Hedley, Higgins, Kelton, Lakeview, Lelia Lake, McLean, Miami, Mo-beetie, Quail, Samnorwood, Shamrock, Wellington, and Wheeler. The central office is located at 517 South Wall in Shamrock. James Staverhagen is the Supervisor and Arling Cordell is the Assistant Supervisor.

Locally Mr. James Duke, vocational adjustment coordinator is working with Mrs. Arthur Shields, Mrs. Floyd Guinn, Mrs. Jerry Hawkins, and Mrs. Owen McGarity. These teachers are employed by the school but are working with EPCO.

Just what is EPCO's purpose? It is a program designed to bridge the gap between school and the world of work for high school youth who have learning problems and difficulty in completing the regular academic program. Young people age 16 and up are eligible.

The Vocational Adjustment class is held on the campus of Clarendon High School with services extended to eligible members of this class while they are still enrolled in high school.

The course of study gives first attention to the development of vocational adjustment with emphasis on evaluation, planning and suitable on-the-job training. Job training stations may be secured depending on the maturity of the student. Such items as how to apply for, secure, and hold a job, development of acceptable adult behavior patterns, learning of specific job assignments and how to become a productive employee are areas stressed. Thus local businesses in the community may become the classroom as the student goes to an on-the-job training station where he is trained in practical skills.

James Duke, vocational adjustment coordinator, assists the student as well as the vocational rehabilitation counselor, Royal James of the Amarillo district office, working with the school staff.

When a student in the vocation-

al adjustment class, after a specified period of time, has proved himself capable of holding a job in line with his abilities, demonstrated favorable personal and social adjustment, and developed acceptable adult behavior patterns, he becomes eligible for school graduation and a diploma.
