WHERE DO WE STAND NOW?

(An Editorial)

Bright Newhouse, President of the Donley County Hospital Board, reported to your editor this week that a meeting was held in Amarillo last Friday by parties concerned with the various hospital—doctor suits and he believed that considerable progress had been made. When talks are completed, the proposition will be presented to the hospital board . . . probably at their next meeting which has not been announced as of this date.

The following quote was made in another publication last week. "However you must do it, you must get a doctor, whether it be Dr. Smith or anybody else," West said (CPA from Wichita Falls) "Whatever you must do to satisfy a doctor, I would advise you to do it."

We were informed by out-of-town lawyers this week that regardless of the court suits, Dr. Smith could have been serving his patients as a staff member at the hospital at any time the hospital was open since the building was completed, if his qualifications met the demands of the Hospital District in regard to staff members. If and when he could qualify, he could and can serve the people who desire his services.

We were informed Tuesday night by Senator Max Sherman that every effort to pass legislation in regard to the election of Hospital Directors was being made by he and Rep. Phil Cates.

He stated that County Judge W. R. Christal, County Commissioners Gene White and John W. Swinney were there in Austin Monday for the hearing before the Senate Committee to be sure there was no deviation from the resolution passed by the County Commissioner's Court recently. The bill, as proposed and passed by the committee Monday reads that the three directors whose terms expire the first Saturday in April or their positions will be filled by election if the bill clears both houses in time; the three will be elected at this time and the present four members recently appointed would continue to serve an additional term. If the bill can be passed in time and the election held, this would relieve the court from having to make appointments. A number of citizens were in hopes that the board would divide in two classes, 3 and 4 before the election and the three that drew out would run for office. In this manner, it would be giving the voters of the county a better choice.

Accident Takes Life Of Carl Morris, Jr.

Carl Morris, Jr. of Memphis, Texas and owner of Morris Sand and Gravel and Redi-Mix Cement Co. of Memphis and Clarendon was killed in an accident at his cement business in Memphis Saturday morning, January 27, 1973.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon, January 29, at the First United Methodist Church in Memphis with burial in Fairview Cemetery.

The accident occurred as Morris was removing a chain between a truck and a front end loader when the reverse lever on the loader broke, crushing Morris between the two vehicles. A native of Goodlett, Morris moved to Hedley with his parents in 1948 and graduated from Hedley High School. He married Dorothy Jo Copeland in 1958 in Memphis. Memphis had been the family home for the past 13 years. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church of Memphis.

Surviving are his wife; two sons, Sonny J. and Tommy J. and a daughter, Jerri L., all of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl W. Morris, Sr. of Clarendon; a sister, Mrs. Jimmie Brock of Amarillo; and two brothers, Dale R. Morris of Beaumont and David G. Morris of Shallowater.

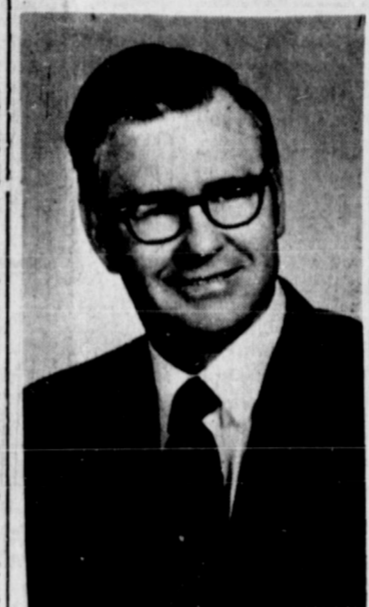
Barry Tyler Is Local Manager Of Morris Sand & Gravel

First Baptist Church Welcomes New Pastor

The members of the First Baptist Church are happy to welcome into their fellowship, a new minister, Reverend James O. Brandon.

Rev. Brandon held his first services as pastor of the local church Sunday, January 28, 1973 and is moving his family to Clarendon this week. Since completing his Mission in Brazil the Brandons have made their home in Amarillo while Rev. Brandon has filled pulpits in churches over the area.

Reverend Brandon was ordained to the Gospel Ministry in October 1956 and has pastored four Baptist Churches including Bolton, St. Baptist Church in Amarillo. He is a graduate of Brownfield High School, Brownfield, Texas, Hardin-Simmons University with a major in Bible and a minor in English; Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, with a Master of Divinity; and Luther Rice Theological Seminary, Jacksonville, Florida with a Doctor of Theology.

He was appointed to the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in July 1968 and served one term in Brazil. He served the Baptist State Convention of the Federal District of Brazil as Executive Secretary; and served the Baptist State Convention of the Federal District of Brazil as director of the Department of Evangelism and Religious Education. He was also involved in institute training for pastors and laymen in Brazil and served the Brazilian Baptist Convention as a member of the National Evangelism committee. Reverend Brandon has served and contributed to all areas of Baptist work in the local, associational, state, and national levels.

Reverend Brandon's wife, Barbara, is a graduate of West Texas State University, Canyon, Texas, with a B. S. Degree in Elementary Education. They have four daughters: Elesha, age 13; Janna, age 11; Nessa, age 4; and Sarita, age 2.

CC Enrollment Continues To Climb

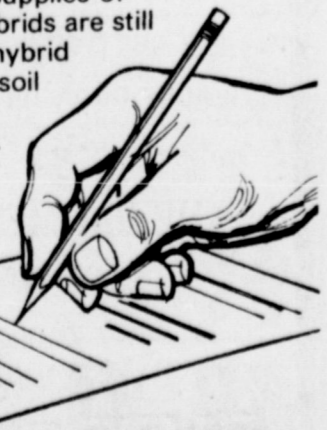

Don Stone Addresses Group Here Recently

Don Stone, minister of the Clarendon Church of Christ, presented the following remarks to a group recently. His subject was "The Ingredients of Greatness." These remarks are worth reading and thinking over.

THE INGREDIENTS OF GREATNESS

Let's talk about our kids and grandkids — and what we are giving them.

We are giving them longer life. Their life expectancy is up 50% over 50 years ago.

We are giving them shorter workdays by a third with an output of twice as much.

We are giving them a healthier world with serious epidemics virtually eliminated.

We went through the hunger and cold of history's deepest depression and determined they will have better things: better homes and schools, better nourishment and medicine. And because of these things, our young people are the tallest, healthiest, brightest and best-looking generation ever to inhabit this good land.

Because we were materialistic, they will work fewer hours, learn more, have more leisure, travel to more distant places and have more opportunity to pursue their life's ambition.

But with all of this have we given them guts, gumption and grit to face their frontier? A frontier of racial tensions, international conflicts, crime and poverty. They will be pioneers on all these frontiers. As such they will need that same pioneering spirit that made our nation great.

The same guts, gumption and grit that men had when our nation was young. When adventure called men west, where they would find a place of land and look up and say, "Thank you, Lord, I can take'er from here!"

Through drought and sickness and hardships that rugged pioneer character was hammered out on the anvil of necessity. They developed a doggedness and an independence of spirit that made America a giant.

But there are evidences of decay. That noble spirit is dying. The government, as the historian Parrington described, has staged a great "free barbecue" and everybody is standing in line for a handout.

Politicians seeking political advantage and the public looking for a handout have pushed our public debt from one billion to over four-hundred billion in a single life-time. We've borrowed ourselves so much money we're broke.

The handout philosophy has replaced the spirit that said, "... I'll take 'er from here." Too many Americans have lost their rugged individualism and have become a mass of political putty.

Too many of us are getting soft and flabby, mentally and physically. We are frankly spoiled. And if we are spoiled, what will our offspring be? Doted and indulged, milksopped and mollycotted.

How are they going to get the guts, gumption and grit to tackle the forbidding frontier of ecology and people-problems. The last frontier is the conquest of self and the exploration of inner space.

The story is told of an old farmer who left his small acreage to two sons who have left the farm seeking their fortunes. His simple will read: "My sons, I leave you a fortune; dig for it." They set their plow deep and they worked the land like it had never been worked before — hoping to strike a buried treasure. But alas, no treasure was found, so they settled down to putting in a crop. At harvest time the yield was the best in the country and then they understood what their old dad had meant, "I leave you a fortune; go dig for it."

A collector of moths found the cocoon of an Emperor Moth. He kept it inside for the winter and in the spring he discovered a tiny opening at the end of the cocoon. Thinking to assist the struggling moth, he picked the hole a little larger. But the result was the moth did not develop its wings. The struggle gave it the muscle to fly. Even so, when we overprotect and indulge our youngsters, are we not arresting the development of their moral muscle needed to deal with the problems of their lives?

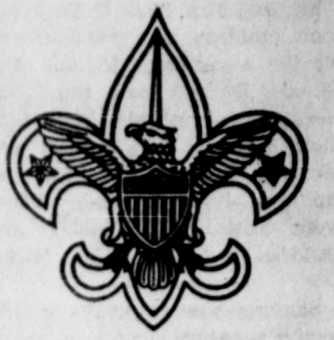

Fort Worth Stock Show Jan. 26-Feb. 4

A swelling record of 13,008 head of livestock will be on exhibit during the 77th annual Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, Jan. 26 through Feb. 4, reports W. R. Watt, Jr., Stock Show general manager.

The Stock Show office staff has processed entries of 4,569 in cattle classes; 1,460 swine, 1,741 sheep, 1,738 horses with an estimated 3,500 entries for rabbits, poultry and pigeons being processed.

In noting that junior entries are up over 400 head above the previous year, Watt said, "The increase indicates gaining interest among our young people in the livestock and agricultural fields. This is a good thing, as our youngsters are our future."

Another boost in show entries was in the Polled Hereford division, the Stock Show being host this year to the Golden Anniversary of the American Polled Hereford Association.

The show will also host the National Meat of the American Bantam Association, with an estimated 2,500 entries in the poultry division.

The Stock Show opens Friday for a ten-day run through Feb. 4 on Amon Carter Square. All show facilities are open to visitors, and the show has ample parking space.

New breeds showing this year include Simmental and Limousin in the Junior Steer Show, and Peruvian Pasos in the Horse Show. An exhibition is planned for an exotic Italian cattle breed, Chianina. Also set is a sale, the First National Gelbvieh Cattle Sale.

Sales planned include commercial Hereford females, performance tested Angus bulls, Polled Hereford, Limousin and Simmental cattle, Charolais bulls, and Quarter Horses. An estimated \$1 million is expected as the gross of the Stock Show breed sales.

The sale of champion steers will be held at 9 a.m. Tuesday, Jan. 30. Other sales will be held for champion barrows and lambs.

Cotton Classing News From Office Of USDA

Cotton harvest resumed early this week but was halted again on Thursday by light rain over the entire area, said W. E. Cain, in Charge of the USDA, AMS, Cotton Classing Office in Memphis, Texas.

The Memphis, Texas Cotton Classing Office graded 10,900 samples this week to bring the season total to 147,200. This compares to 119,800 on the same date a year ago.

The predominant grade classed this week was Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42), with 30 percent followed by Strict Low Middling (41) with 26 percent and Middling Light Spotted (32) with 20 percent.

The predominant staple classed this week was 32 with 78 percent followed by staple 31 with 11 percent and staple 33 with 10 percent.

Mcronaire, or fineness and maturity, readings showed 51 percent miked in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9. The 3.3 to 3.4 range accounted for 20 percent and the 3.0 to 3.2 range accounted for 24 percent.

Pressley, or strength, tests showed 70 percent tested 75,000 psi or higher. The average for the week was 78,000 psi.

The cotton market continued active and prices were steady to slightly higher than last week. The market was slow early in the week due to reduced supplies but gained momentum as ginning increased. Short interest buying helped to keep the demand strong and prices fully steady for Memphis area cotton. Mixed lots, mostly 31, 41 and 32 grades, staple 32, 3.5 to 4.9 miked, sold this week for 29.20 to 30.00 cents per pound.

The average price paid farmers for cottonseed at the gin was \$52.00 per ton.

THP Reports Nine Rural Accidents In Donley Co. For Dec.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of December, 1972 according to Sergeant J. R. Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and four persons injured.

The rural traffic summary for this county during the twelve months of 1972 shows a total of 62 accidents resulting in eight persons killed and 44 persons injured.
