





#### A Ladder Of Virtue

11 Peter 1:5-7 - "And be

EN WEEK SERIES TO HELP US LOOK AT OURSELVES, OUR NATION AND OUR WORLD. THIS INTROSPECTION IS MOST IMPORTANT IN LIGHT OF CUR-RENT SOCIAL AND POLITICAL TURMOIL IN OUR NATION.

During this series we will be concentrating upon Peter's words in 11 Peter 1:5-7. These verses are sometimes referred to as a seven rung "Ladder Of Virtue." However, the order is not important for each virtue is equally essential to a full Christian life and to be without one is to dis-

o our Christian faith. This week we shall consider the rung of moral and spiritual virtue. Moral virtue has to do with the physical life and our abuse of our bodies, minds and general well being. The old statement that "Its my life (body) and I can do with it as I please' is still a convencing argument for many people. However, one thing we've learned is that "your freedom ends where my nose begins." That is to say, we do have some responsibility toward one another; we are our brother's keeper - it is an inescapable fact of life God built into the order of the creation and to take privileges with our bodies which is abusive not only to our self but to other persons also is to put a serious crack in this rung of the ladder. We need to hear Paul's words again to the church at Corinth (1 Corinthians 6:19): "What? Know ye not that your body is

the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own?" What an evil thing it is when one presents his body to Christ and there is the physical evidence of abusive care such as venereal desease, needle marks, cirrhosis of the liver, or any other evidence of the desecration of the temple of the Holy Spirit, e.g., your body.

As there is a moral virtue, so is there a spiritual virtue. Just moral virtue so do we also the spiritual virtue. That is to say, we let self-desire direct our loyus and gave his Son as a ransom for our souls. Let me inject here that a violation of the moral virtue as indicated previously is also a volation of the spiritual virtue -think on that, if you will. At the point of spiritual virtue the 20th Century Christian would do well to receive the ancient command of the Hebrews the mind and in the heart and to diligently teach them to their children, so that all times and in every place we know what it is that God commands us to do and to be as His disciples in the world. Then it will be true of us too as Paul prayed for the Hebrews (Hebrews 13:20, 21): "God . . . make you perfect in

every good work to do his will." When we as a nation and as a Community of the Christian Faith reinstate moral and spiritual virtue we will then have taken a big step in reclaiming our world for God from the hands of the devil and his angels.
