Cong. Price States Contract Let For Two Flood Dams in County

The U. S. Soil Conservation Service is awarding a contract to build two new flood prevention dams on Bitter Creek in southeast Donley County, Congressman Bob Price announced today.

The contract to Wilson Construction Corporation of El Reno, Oklahoma, calls for construction of one dam on the western tributary of Bitter Creek and the other on the eastern tributary. Cost of both dams will total some \$477,000. Price said.

Construction is to begin within two weeks with completion scheduled before Christmas of 1974. The two dams will be the second and third ones to be completed of the 24 dams planned under the Lakeview Watershed Project.

Services will be held Friday and Saturday nights at 7 p.m., Saturday morning at 10 a.m. and Sunday morning at the 11 o'clock worship hour.

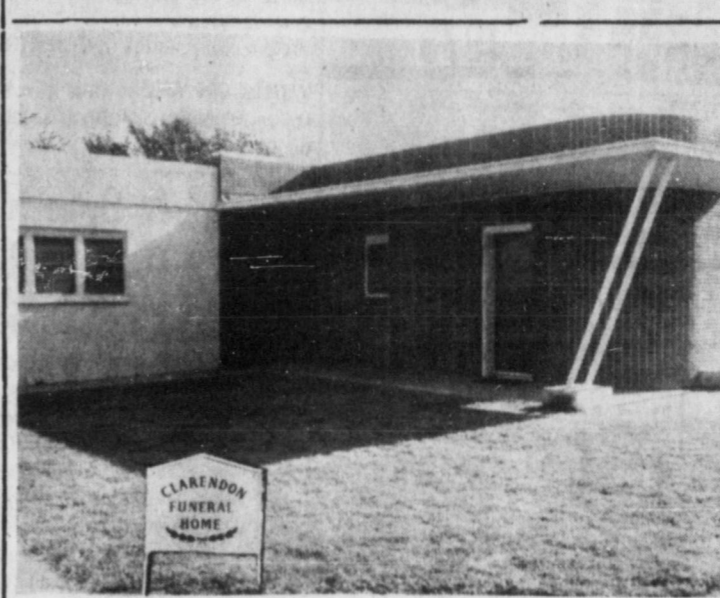

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God Comes First

Acts 5:29 — "Then Peter and the other apostles answered and said, 'We ought to obey God rather than men.'"

Sunday evening I watched the movie "Demetrius and the Gladiators" on T.V. — for about the fourth time. I realized that the old saying is true that no matter how many times you have seen a picture, or read a book, you can always learn something new. Sunday my attention was caught on a line stated by the owner of the gladiator school where Demetrius was being trained. At this point Demetrius was a Christian and had failed in an attempt to escape. Someone asked if he were "chicken", meaning he was afraid to fight and possibly be killed or to kill. The owner of the school said something to the effect that one

trying to escape the school showed he was no "chicken" for this was virtually impossible to do. Then he added: "You don't have to be a chicken to be chicken." What I think he meant was that many of the gladiator trainees don't attempt to escape because they are afraid to die which in most cases was the punishment for such an attempt, and that usually by crucifixion.

That phrase "You don't have to be a chicken to be chicken" is intriguing. Growing up on a farm in Fisher County, we had an old Plymouth Rock rooster that would attack my younger sister everytime they came close to each other. He just loved to get her cornered in the cow lot where she could not escape. Really, he never did attack her but sure made her believe he was going to attack at any moment. Therefore, you know, the opposite of that statement can also be true. A chicken is not necessarily always "chicken." Sometime the tougher battles of life are won not by might and height; but

by careful planning and following through to the very end.

That's the way it is with the Christian Faith. We do live in a day and an age when to be a Christian we may be considered to be "chicken" by some. However, some of the greatest victories of life have been won by the "chickens" of the world while the hawks of life became victims of their own brutality; so it was between Demetrius the "chicken" and Caesar, the hawk in the movie. Caesar died at the hands of his own personal body guard but Demetrius lived to see freedom come for the Christian Faith in the Kingdom of Rome. You see, that's the way it is, many may die for the cause, but God always wins—in the end, thus God must come first in our lives that we may share in the victory and the glory that is God's.

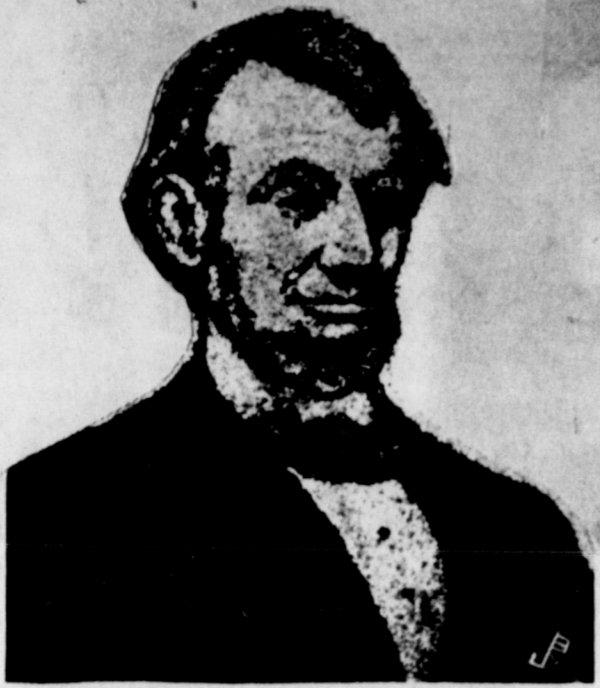
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Portrait of Abraham Lincoln, by James B. Mason of North Carolina, made of hundreds of Thousands of wood fragments.

First Showing Rare Art Form Oct. 27-28

Thirty seven wood mosaic portraits by James B. Mason will be on exhibition at the Farmers State Bank Saturday and Sunday, October 27-28 from 1:30 to 5:00 p.m.

At a showing of one of his portraits, the artist explained "To my knowledge and to the knowledge of such art authorities as the Smithsonian Institute, they are the only ones of their kind in the world. White New Highway District Engineer In Childress Dist.

State Highway Engineer B. L. DeBerry has announced the retirement of Virgil J. McGee as district engineer of the Texas Highway Department in Childress and named Lewis H. White as his successor.

McGee has been in charge of Highway Department operations in 13 Northwest Texas counties since 1964. He has served his entire highway career in the northwest area of the state.

McGee began with the Highway Department in 1935 as a roadman in the Moore County residency. He became district engineer in Amarillo before becoming district engineer at Childress two years later. His retirement is effective November 30.

White, 53, is a native of Alliance, Nebraska. He attended public schools in Oklahoma City and graduated from the University of Oklahoma. After graduation, he was employed by the American Bridge Company and the Oklahoma Highway Department. He joined the Texas Highway Department in 1948 in the Amarillo district. White was transferred to the Bridge Division in the Austin office in 1956 and became assistant district engineer in Childress in 1969.

White and his wife, Betty, have four daughters. They belong to the Presbyterian Church.

The Childress district includes Dickens, King, Knox, Foard, Hardeman, Cottle, Motley, Childress, Hall, Briscoe, Collingsworth, Donley and Wheeler counties.

IRS Answers To Taxpayers Questions

Q-Is it true that when it comes to claiming the child of divorced parents, the parent who has custody usually is entitled to the dependency exemption?

A-If the parents furnish more than half the child's support for the year, the general rule is that the parent who has custody of the child for greater part of the year is entitled to the dependency exemption.

However, there are two exceptions to this rule. The parent not having custody may be entitled to the exemption: if (1) that parent contributed at least \$600 toward the child's support during the year, and the decree of divorce or separate maintenance, or a written agreement between the parties, specifies that the parent not having custody is entitled to the exemption; or (2) that parent provided \$1,200 or more of support for the child for the year and the parent having custody does not clearly establish having contributed more support than the parent not having custody.

Q-My employer pays the premiums on my group-term life insurance policy. Coverage is \$25,000. Do I have to include the cost of the premiums as income on my tax return?

A-No. The cost of group-term life insurance coverage of \$50,000 or less provided to an employee under a policy carried by his employer does not have to be reported as income.

Q-I purchased contact lenses from an optometrist. Can I deduct the cost of the lenses as a medical expense?

A-Yes. Payments for such glasses are deductible as a medical expense if you itemize your deductions. Remember that medical expenses are deductible only to the extent they exceed three percent of your adjusted gross income.

Q-While cleaning out my desk, I came across the contract, bills and other documents relating to the remodeling job I had done on my kitchen several years ago. Can I throw these papers away or are they still important for tax reasons?

A-In the event you ever sell your home, the basis of the property (generally what it cost the taxpayer), increased by the cost of the improvements to the house, will have to be computed in order to figure out your gain or loss. Thus, such records should be kept indefinitely.
