Fire Destroys Mobile Home

A fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed a mobile home about one and a half miles east of Lelia Lake about midnight Monday night. The home was owned by Dean Peoples of Henrietta, Okla., and was not occupied at the time of the fire.

By the time firemen arrived on the scene, the entire structure was a ball of flames and completely beyond saving. Fighting the fire had to be delayed because of live electrical wires which had fallen on the ground near the home. The most recent occupants of the 14 by 80 foot mobile home had moved about two months ago.



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Nobody's Perfect But. BY JERRY SPARKS

Bernie Green, president of the Donley County Farm Bureau and Lee Shaller, a director of the same organization, went to Dallas last week for the state convention of the Farm Bureau. This convention is getting to be one of the largest in the state as far as attendance goes.

The convention drew, 1,074 voting delegates this year with many wives and other interested persons in attendance for the three-day affair.

Among the many business items on the agenda of the Texas Farm Bureau this year was an item pertaining to land use planning

Probably a lot of people are in the dark about this land use planning although it has been talked about for quite some time in congressional circles.

Farm Bureau, and several other organizations are against the proposed legislation that could possibly dictate to a farmer. rancher or businessman what he can put on his property or what he can use it for.

The TFB adopted a resolution which will be forwarded to the national oraganization urging them to work for defeat of the land use planning bill should it ever come up to a vote in Washington. Should this ever come into law, the land use planning would call for additional funds appropriated to carry out the plan, additional governement payroll would be created for its administration and more controls slapped on the individual, the area he lives in, and affect of the economy in that area.

Land use planning, in a nutshell, would dicate to the owners of property whether it could be used for farming, ranching or industry. To our way of thinking, this would be totally uncalled for and unfair to our system of free enterprise.

In reading through our mail last week, we discovered a news release from the State Board of Insurance that probably should be bannered across the front page of every newspaper in the state.


It seems that someone has finally realized that unnecessary state spending should be contained and waste eliminated where ever possible. The state board has recently been completely reorganized and because of these efforts, a reduction in insurance company maintenance taxes will result.

The board has eliminated the need for a newly proposed multi-million dollar building that only months ago had been considered a necessity. In addition, some 29 full time employee's jobs were eliminated when they either retired or moved on to other jobs and the work load shifted to other members of the staff. This step alone saved taxpayers almost a quarter of a million dollars this year.

If we can pass this word along to other state and federal government agencies, perhaps many of the other fat cat posts created to return political favors can be eliminated and, in turn, result in future tax savings.

SPARE PARTS FOR YOUR BODY



You can get new parts for your car, or your washer and dryer, if they break down, but what can you do if your own body is damaged — or if some of its parts don't work right!

We know of metal plates for the skull and metal devices for repairing broken bones or installing artificial hip joints. But these, because they are metallic, are hard. They can't be used for repair-ing or replacing soft body Medical researchers have

found that special rubbery silicones can be used for building artificial, internal body parts which can be per manently placed inside the body without being rejected. This discovery has enabled

surgeons to make repairs to the human body that up to now have been impossible Silastic Silicone rubber is

used extensively by plastic surgeons for making devices for rebuilding patients' facial features. Receding chins are built up

by placing a small piece of silicone rubber in a pocket under the skin and over the chin bone. The same material can be shaped to form missing ears and to build out sunken foreheads, cheek bones and noses
