Elba Shelton Ballew Funeral Services Sat.

Funeral services for Elba Shelton Ballew, 78, a resident of Donley County for more than 70 years, and one who had built a national reputation breeding top-quality Hampshire hogs, were held at 2 p.m. Saturday, February 17, 1973, in the First Baptist Church with Dr. James O. Brandon, pastor, and Rev. Weldon Rives, Minister of the First United Methodist Church, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery under the direction of Murphy Funeral Home.

Mr. Ballew died at 3:40 p.m. Wednesday, February 14th, in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo after a lengthy illness. He was born at Pilot, Texas and came to Donley County in 1903. He married Edith Eddins April 16, 1922 at Fort Worth. He built one of the nation's top Hampshire herds and went out of his way to see that area club boys had good hogs to show. With his motto "you've got to have a product just a little better than the next fellow's and breeding techniques ahead of their time," he turned out 1900 ribbon winning barrows for area 4-H and FFA boys by 1943. He was donor of the first registered Hampshire at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch and himself showed many grand champions at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo.

In 1968 he was the owner of the reserve grand champion at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas. He was honorary vice president of the State Fair, Past President of the Texas Association of Swine Breeders, a member of the National Board of Hampshire Swine Registry, past president of the State Hampshire Association, and had served as advisor to the Swine Center at Texas A&M. He was a director in the Southwest Hampshire Breeders Association and had been active in the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce, the Donley County Fat Stock Show and was an honorary member of the Block and Bridle Club of Texas Tech, Lubbock. He was a deacon in the First Baptist Church and a veteran of World War I.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Edith Ballew of the home; one daughter, Mrs. Elba Jean Erickson of Washington, D. C.; one son, Jack Ballew of Dallas; a sister, Mrs. Carl Gilliam of Lubbock; a brother, Donald G. Ballew of Clarendon and six grandchildren.

Bearers were Jack H. Ballew, Duane H. Erickson, Craig Erickson, Mike Ballew, Mark Ballew and Doyle Hall.

Around twelve different petitions were circulated this past week end in and about Donley County in regard to the election of Hospital Board Members. During this short time, over 500, nearly 500 signed the petitions asking the Commissioners Court of Donley County and the Donley County Hospital District Board to reconsider resolutions regarding proposed amendment to the Donley County Hospital District Bill No. 525 etc. to read as follows:

Section 3. (c) At such time as this amendment shall take effect, seven directors shall be elected by majority vote of the qualified electors of the entire Donley County Hospital District, and the seven directors elected shall divide themselves into three classes; Class one, three persons to serve until the first Saturday

in April, 1974; Class Two, two persons to serve until the first Saturday in April, 1975; and Class Three, two persons to serve until the first Saturday in April, 1976. Successors shall be elected by majority vote of the qualified electors of the entire Donley County Hospital District for three year terms.

These petitions with resolutions calling for such action which will be before the House of Representatives Resolution Committee next Monday, February 26, were presented to County Judge W. R. Christal Wednesday afternoon and also to the Donley County Hospital District asking for their immediate consideration and action so the bill can be amended by the Resolutions Committee Monday and be ready for a local vote within the very near future.

CHS SPEECH DEPT. TO PRESENT DRAMA MAR. 1

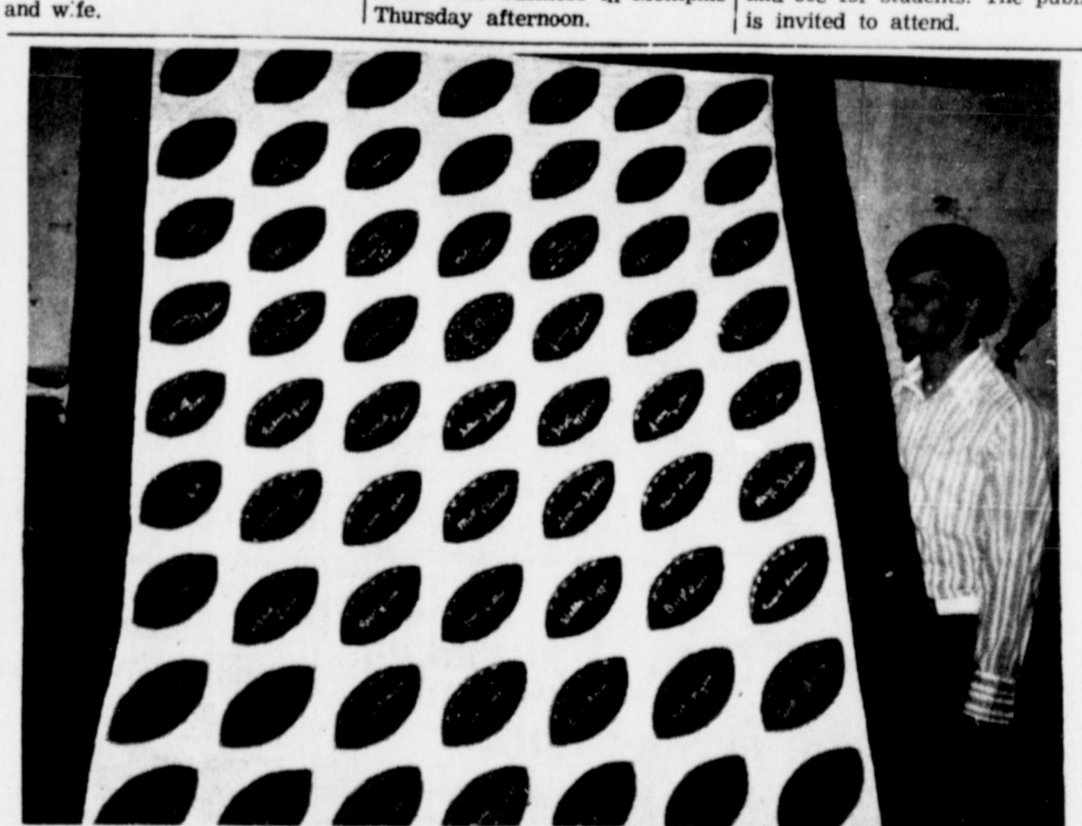

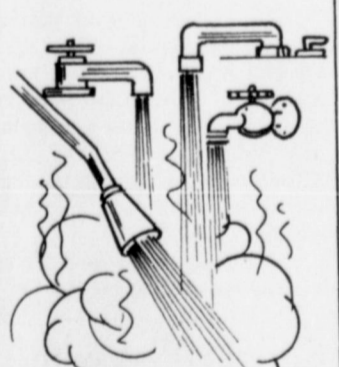

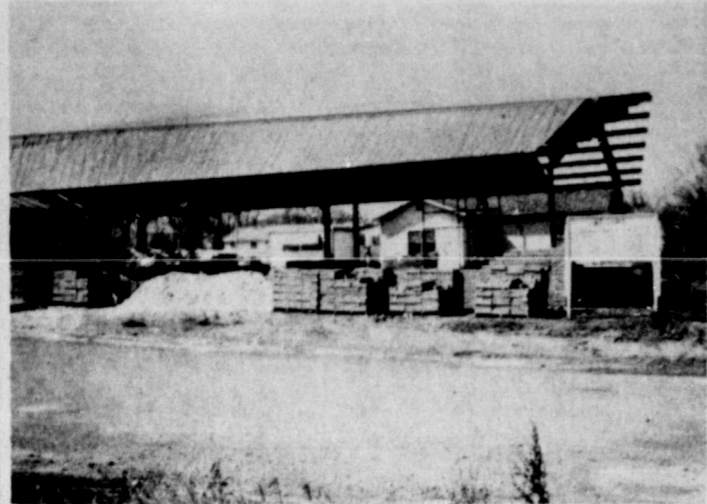

Cotton Classing News Office Of USDA

"Cotton harvest is nearing completion in the Memphis, Texas area," said W. E. Cain in charge of the USDA, AMS, Cotton Classing Office in Memphis, Texas. The Memphis Classing Office will close today, February 16, 1973. "This will be the final market news release for the 1972-73 season," added Cain.

The Memphis, Texas Cotton Office graded 20,450 samples this week to bring the season total to 213,400. This compares to 144,350 for the season a year ago.

The predominant grade classed this week was Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) with 36 percent followed by Strict Low Middling Spotted (43) with 18 percent and Middling Light Spotted (32) with 11 percent.

The predominant staple classed this week was 32 with 54 percent followed by staple 31 with 33 percent and staple 33 with 8 percent.

Micronaire, or fineness and maturity, readings showed 46 percent miked in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9. The 3.3 to 3.4 range accounted for 17 percent and the 3.0 to 3.2 range accounted for 17 percent and the 3.0 to 3.2 range accounted for 27 percent.

Pressley, or strength, tests showed 87 percent tested 75,000 psi or higher. The average for the week was 80,000 psi.

The cotton market in the Memphis, Texas area continued active and the demand strong. Prices were steady until midweek, then gained slightly to close 25 to 50 points over last weeks quotations on all qualities. A good demand continued on lower mike, 3.0 to 3.4, cottons. Some average prices paid were: Strict Low Middling, staple 32, 29.00 cents per pound; and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, staple 32, 28.00 cents per pound. This was for cotton miking 3.5 to 4.9.

The average price-paid for cottonseed was \$52.00 per ton.

Chrysler-Plymouth Increased Sales

Chrysler-Plymouth dealers of the Dallas sales region had a 2.9 per cent increase in passenger car sales for the first ten days of February compared with the same period last year, it was reported by W. R. Vawter, Chrysler-Plymouth regional sales manager.
