## BRONCHOS BATTLE FOR DISTRICT TITLE

The Clarendon Bronchos will journey to Wellington Friday night to play the deciding game of the season, with the District Championship squarely on the line.

The Bronchos stand 6-0 in district play, 7-1-1 for the season, while the Skyrockets also stand 6-0 in district, 8-0-1 for the season.

Back on hand from last years squad are 20 lettermen, 10 offensive starters and 10 defensive starters for the Wellington Skyrockets. Part of the reason for Wellington's encouraging season

this year is the fact that three starting backs were on the second team All-District last fall.

Leading the group is Shane Tarver (6-0, 160, junior) quarterback, Edward Thomas (5-10, 145, senior) wingback and Jessie Davis (5-11, 175, junior) halfback who rushed for over 400 yards last fall and was in on over 502 of the tackles from his linebacking position.

Sammy Gonzales (5-8, 155, senior) halfback is the fourth member of the starting backfield returning.

In the forward wall, Coach Williams welcomes back such veterans as end Tony Martinez (5-7, 145, junior) tackles Allen Sanders (6-0, 170, junior) and David Null (5-11, 200, senior), guard Don Allred (5-0, 170, junior) and center Randall Maxwell (5-9, 155, senior.) The Rockets will launch from a Wing-T attack and try

to shut out the Bronchos with a Split-6 defense.

Wellington's successful season of 8-0-1 comes from defeating Hollis 28-0, Paducah 39-0, Memphis 23-6, Wheeler 29-6, Claude 14-9, Silvertown 50-0, Shamrock 34-6, McLean 49-0 and tying Childress 13-13.

"Wellington probably has the top quarterback in the District," says Wilson. "Its gonna be a tough one. I feel like whoever gets the breaks will be District Champs," stated Coach Wilson.

Glenn Reeves ran the business for a number of years as the owner, John Jones, stayed busy with the construction contracting business.

A change was made in the office location when the corner of the building which housed the lumber yard was converted into space for Sibly's Restaurant and the space previously used by Todd and McAnear for their 66 service station was converted into the present lumber yard office and the service station moved out east of town.

Wayne McElroy took over the management in 1968 and managed the yard until April of 1973 when it became necessary to give up the position because of his health.

J. and W. Lumber was closed from April until August when W.M. (Buddy) Ford, general contractor, purchased the business from John Jones.

On October 2, 1973 Jimmy McElroy son of Wayne McElroy assumed the management of the business. Jimmy had valuable experience for the position having worked for a number of years for Foxworth - Galbraith Lumber Company.

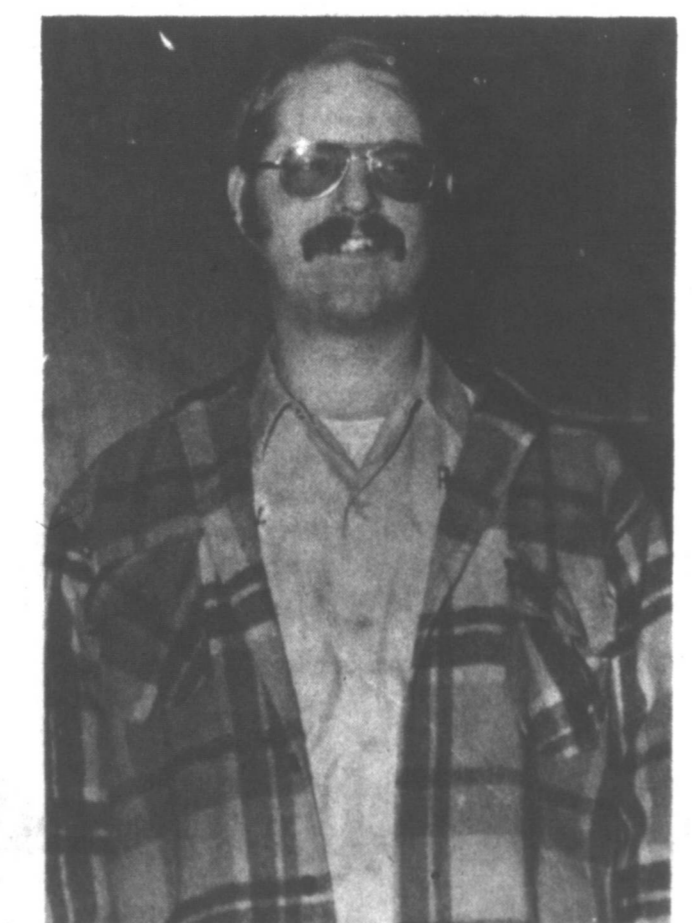

# HOSPITAL CLINIC LEASED

The clinic facilities at the Donley County Hospital have been leased to Dr. Richard L. Gilkey, it was announced this week, following the November meeting of the hospital board Tuesday night.

Speaking for the board, Gerald Knight, hospital administrator, said that an "open end lease" for one year has been signed with Dr. Gilkey and that tentative plans are for him to occupy the new clinic quarters around December 1.

Dr. Gilkey, who is currently Clarendon's only practicing physician, has been operating his clinic in the old Adair Hospital building for the past years.

Knight did not indicate the amount of the lease but said that it was a "minimal amount." He pointed out that the lease would allow for its use by another physician should such a situation develop.

Hospital officials pointed out that the lease was for a private clinic and that by no means was it to be construed that the facilities would be open 24 hours a day or that any hospital care would be involved.

Facilities involved in the lease are the doctor's office, reception area, three examining rooms, one additional office and drug preparation area.

The hospital board is also allowing Dr. Gilkey to use the hospital laboratory and X-ray facilities, the clinic waiting area and emergency room and storage area.

In other action the board discussed the possibility of applying for Federal Home Administration financing which would be available around July 1 of next year and applying for an Economic Development Administration (EDA) grant.

Knight said that the EDA grant did not "look very promising" but that the board is exploring every possible source of financial assistance.

In the meantime, it was learned this week that John Jones, a former building contractor who operates farming interests here, resigned from the board at the October meeting.

Knight indicated that the board will appoint a new member as soon as possible. A number of appointees are being considered. Other members of the hospital board include E.W. Barbee, president; Bub Hermesmyer, vice-president; Billy Ray Johnston, secretary; Clarence C. Ayers, Lacy Noble, and Ansel Adamson.

## "Holiday Turkeys"

It is good to get settled in Clarendon and already I have met many fine and gracious people. As an extension agent, it is my responsibility to help people in the community with areas relating to home economics. Do not hesitate to call or come by the extension office any time you need help. I am here to serve you.

Since it is almost time for preparing those Thanksgiving turkeys, we will look at turkeys that can save homemakers time.

Self-basting turkeys offer the busy holiday cook the advantages of convenience, texture, and flavor. Self-basting turkeys are usually U.S. Grade A birds injected with a limited amount (three per cent) of basting solution. As the bird roasts, the solution is released throughout the meat, improving the texture and flavor.

Basting solutions range from straight butter to mixtures of oil and water. Oils used are the same ones normally found in margarine—such as cottonseed, soy, coconut, or corn oil. The USDA approves these solutions under regulations for federally-inspected turkeys. It also protects consumers from fraud by requiring the label to state a basting solution has been added.

Unbasted turkeys are also available. These birds don't have any basting solution to add weight, so they will "weigh in" lighter than a basted turkey of comparable size. Unbasted turkeys will be just as good as self-basting ones, but more care in cooking is required.

Turkeys are a wise market choice all year, but consumers should take time to examine the turkey—choosing one with firm flesh, free of blemishes. Also, read the label carefully and make the purchase a matter of choice, not chance. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's shield is a sign the bird is wholesome, that the poultry came from a healthy animal and was inspected throughout the packing operation.

# Religious Thoughts

**GOD IS ETERNAL**

God is eternal. One of the questions most often asked or preachers is: Where did God come from? Because the human experience is involved in beginnings and endings, many make the mistake of thinking that the Eternal had to begin somewhere. Because we are born and die, it is hard for us to perceive of One who never was born, has always lived, and who will never die. Because the idea of a Being without beginning or ending is beyond human understanding, some stumble at it.

The ancient philosophers such as Socrates, Plato, and Aristotle perceived that eternity is there and tried to relate the human experience to it. All of the religions of the world are an attempt to relate the human experience to what is perceived of eternity. The logic and reasoning of the ancients opened up many avenues of reflection, but real insight into eternity came from the Hebrew people and the revelation of the Eternal God through this chosen people. The ultimate insight and final word came through Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who came to reveal God to us. Men spoke with wonder and awe concerning Him. When He arose from the dead, at long last, final proof of eternity and the eternal God who inhibited it, was in evidence. Men could see that there is more to living than just dying and that there is life beyond the grave.

The Bible declares that God is eternal. Being eternal, God is infinite, without end or limitation, without beginning or end. The Biblical writers said: "From everlasting to everlasting, thou art God" (Ps. 90:2); "A thousand years in thy sight are but as yesterday when it is past" (Ps. 90:4); "One day is with the Lord as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day" (II Peter 3:8.) The eternity of God is punctuated by the ascended, transformed, Savior of Men, Jesus Christ who said to the Apostle John: "I am he that liveth, and was dead, and behold, I am alive for evermore..." (Rev. 1:18.)

The Christian hope and assurance is stated by the Apostle Paul: "We believe that we shall also live with him" (Rom. 6:8.) The Christian believes that God is eternal and that men created in the image of God are eternal. We believe, as the Apostle stated, that the "dwelling place of God is with men, and He will dwell with them, and they shall be his people, and God himself shall be with them, and be their God" (Rev. 21:3.)

The question remains: How can a mortal man experience the Eternal. God realized that we are finite and would have a hard time relating to Him. For this reason, He put our relationship with Him on a faith basis. "Without faith it is impossible to please him; for he that cometh to God must believe that he is and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him" (Heb. 11:6.) Your eternal destiny depends upon your reaching out to Christ in faith! God doesn't ask you to understand. He asks you to believe!

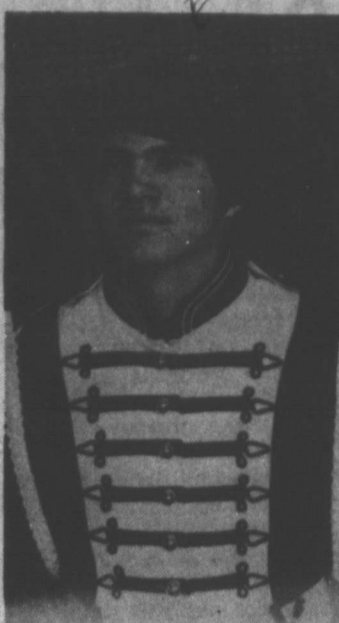
## Christians Plan Thanksgiving Dinner

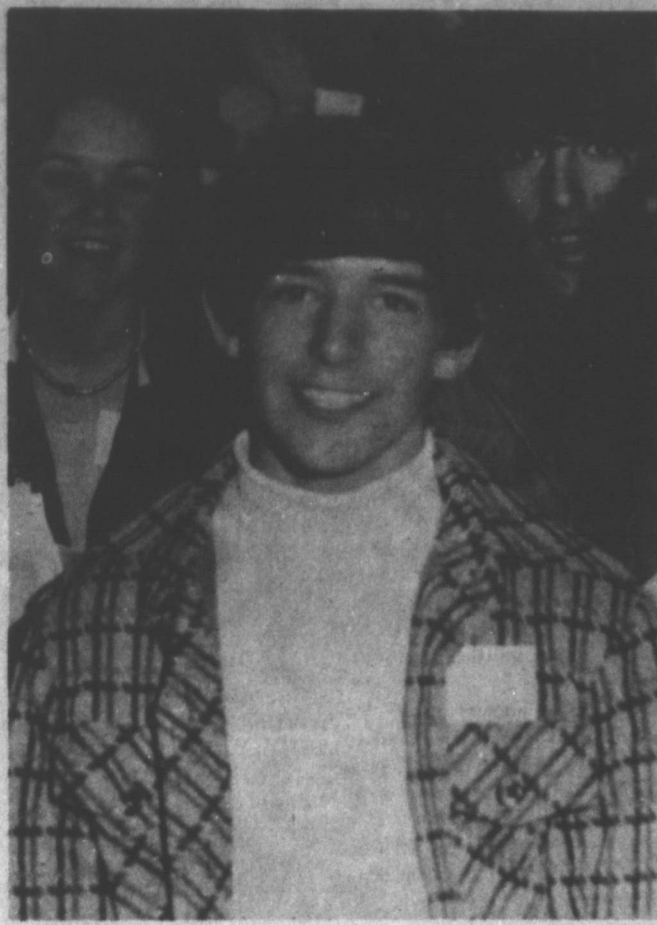
