

Drennan Cited As Clarendon's Citizen Of Year

R.E. Drennan, venerable educator and civic personality, was honored Tuesday night, October 28, at the Lions Club Ladies Night by the presentation of the Citizen of the Year Award.

After finishing high school in the first decade of the 1900's, Mr. Drennan took a teacher's examination, passed it and began his teaching career at 18 years of age. He taught school in Tulia, on the south plains, where he finished high school, for six years.

When his sweetheart finished high school they were married and went to Elmore City, Oklahoma where he taught from 1914 to 1920.

Elmer and Minnie Drennan moved back to Texas and he joined the school system at Lelia Lake in Donley County. Drennan replaced one of several teachers who had been run off by the students. He decided to stay and subdued the rebellious element by whatever methods he felt were most appropriate at the time. Soon the school became an institution of learning again and he remained there for several years before going to Jericho.

Because of an embargo he could not be shipped across the state line to Idabel, Oklahoma where the Collins now live. Proposed State Constitution Vote Set Here Tuesday

A move to get out the vote in what has been termed one of the most important elections for Texas in recent history will be concluded next Tuesday when voters go to the polls to make an electoral decision on the proposed Texas Constitution.

While state elected officials have chosen sides and staged an emotional-packed campaign for or against the proposed new state document, voter reaction has been on the negative side and predictions for a light or medium vote.

Voters, most of whom have remained silent about their feelings, will have the opportunity to vote for or against each of the eight separate articles of the proposed Constitution.

changing trends by the executives of the organization Foxworth-Galbraith has kept abreast of the times and weathered the trying eras our country has endured since 1901 when the first yard opened for business.

Unusual initiative was shown by W.L. Foxworth, one of the founders, when he was a quarterback with the University of Mississippi. Foxworth weighed 125 pounds the next smallest player weighed 205 pounds and the players on the opposing team were large too. He devised a way to

equalize the evident disadvantage. One day he sat down and sewed a suitcase handle on the seat of the big center's football uniform. In close formation in the next game quarterback Foxworth called signals and the center thrust the ball into his hands. With the football in his left hand Foxworth grasped the suitcase handle with his right hand and hung on while the 230-pound center dashed through the line to victory. Foxworth graduated from Mississippi in 1890 and his football days came before modern-day rules and regulations. However resourcefulness is still the name of the game for Foxworth-Galbraith.

H.W. Galbraith, another of the founders was the son of an Episcopal rector who left his home in Carrickmacross, Ireland for the opportunities of America and Texas and thereby presented his son, H.W. Galbraith with the chance to become another business giant.

Annual Arthritis Meeting Set For November 8

The Annual Meeting of the West Texas Chapter of the Arthritis Foundation, the Fifth Annual Physicians' Arthritis Symposium, and a Symposium for Allied Health Professionals in West Texas will all be held Saturday, Nov. 8, 1975 in the beautiful convention facilities of Amarillo's Best Western Villa Inn.

The Annual Meeting of the Arthritis Foundation will start at 9 a.m. with registration. Following will be workshops on volunteer organization along with reports from the Chapter's Planning Committee. The noon luncheon will be followed by a panel of doctors, physical therapists and patients who will discuss and answer questions on arthritis from the members. The annual business session will include election of board members.

Concurrent with the Annual Meeting, doctors from Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma will be attending the Fifth Annual Arthritis Symposium on Arthritis in Office Practice, Both Juvenile and Adult Problems. 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Hiked Legislative Powers Seen In New Constitution

AUSTIN — The chairman of Citizens to Preserve the Texas Constitution says the campaign to defeat constitutional revision in the November 4 election is gaining ground rapidly with the help of Governor Dolph Briscoe.

State Senator Peyton McKnight of Tyler said the Governor's decision to oppose all eight propositions on the ballot "came after his own careful analysis which convinced him the present Constitution is far better than the revised version written by the Legislature."

Citing reports of voter apathy, McKnight called upon Texans to familiarize themselves with the issues and vote next Tuesday.

"I believe that most people who study the proposed new constitution will vote against it," he said. "But if a voter hasn't had time to examine every controversial provision, then I think he or she should play it safe and keep our present Constitution by voting no."

In expressing his opposition to the new charter, Governor Briscoe pointed out that Texas has a low per capita tax burden and is the only industrial state without an income tax. He said that annual sessions of the Legislature, as proposed in Proposition One on the ballot, "would make it more difficult to hold the line on new taxes and would lead us down the road to a state income tax."

"We do not need a full-time legislature," declared Healy. "I think that would cost the taxpayers just about as much, on a proportionate basis, as our full-time Congress. And that really is what Proposition 1 on the ballot would mean."

"Proposition 2 would abolish our Court of Criminal Appeals and force the Supreme Court to hear appeals in both civil and criminal cases. That can only result in slowing down the judicial process."

"You can go down the list, and if you study each proposition carefully, you will discover that this entire rewrite of the Constitution is designed to reduce the people's control over their State Government."

"I always have had great faith in the legislature, but I don't have as much faith in any group of 181 people as I would have to have in order to vote for the new constitution," declared Healy.

incur greater public debt without voter approval (which McKnight called "the little New York" provision). The Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association and numerous other organizations are opposing the new constitution. The Texas Association of School Boards is against the finance article (Proposition Five), which State Comptroller Bob Bullock describes as "a spook which will haunt us many years." The Texas Association of School Administrators opposes both the finance article and the education article (Proposition Four).

McKnight declared: "The document we will vote on November 4 was written by the Legislature and it increases the Legislature's own power at the expense of the people's presently solid constitutional guarantees. It overturns voter decisions including those in recent years rejecting annual sessions and letting the Legislature set its own pay. It invites costly, lengthy lawsuits in a new overhauled court system to determine what the new laws mean. It changes our basic governmental concept to rule by the Legislature, and can lead only to more government, more spending and higher taxes."

"I don't think the people want to give future Legislatures a blank check, which is what these eight propositions do."

to call itself into Session and set the salaries of its own members and at the same time give it almost unlimited authority to regulate health care, environmental projects, land reclamation, navigation, recycling of wastes, energy resources, gambling, and state employee and teacher retirement funds.

"The present Constitution has been construed and interpreted by the Supreme Court of Texas and we know what it means. If the new one should be adopted it would cost a tremendous amount of money and we would be a half-century before we would know how the Supreme Court would construe and interpret the new document."

"This is why I agree with Governor Briscoe that all eight propositions on the November 4th ballot should be defeated," said Mr. Healy.

"If we really do need to do some of the things this new Constitution would authorize, such as relaxing the present prohibition against lotteries, let's do them one at a time — not in one fell swoop."

"I don't think the people of Texas are ready to turn over to the Legislature the power

to vote for the proposed Constitution. And even if I did trust the present Legislature with all of the massive powers this Constitution would give to it, I would have to balk when I realized that the complexity of the legislature can be changed by the voters every two years."

"We have the best State Government in the Nation now, in my opinion. I do not think we could improve it by changing the Constitution to remove the ceiling on Welfare spending, to remove the ceiling on taxes required to finance the debts of Local Government, to remove the ceiling on the State's contributions to state employee and teacher retirement funds — and, most of all, to remove the right of the people to set the ceiling on the salaries of Legislators."

The farmer who mismanages his finances may be forced out of business, cautions Ronald Gooch, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

It is much easier to go broke today than it was some years ago because the keys to success are shifting from land and labor to capital and management.

Farmers today rely much more heavily on purchased inputs and heavy machinery investments, points out Gooch.

And, financial statements play a vital role today. These should include net worth, profit and loss, and cash flow statements.

Gooch explains that most farm financial problems arise because too little cash is generated after expenses to cover both living costs and current debt commitments.

A general financial picture requires the farm's current net worth analysis and profit and loss statement.

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CC Student Sees Indian Culture As Christianty

Stephen Wilson, a member of the Cherokee Indian Nation and the Katoo Clan has chosen the study and rehabilitation of persons of his own ethnic background as a career.

Like the majority of Americans today, Steve is not of pure blood but inherits his Indian blood from both his mother and father. He is entitled to vote for the Cherokee tribal chief in the state of Oklahoma in Indian Territory and to free hospitalization in the state of Oklahoma.

At an early age Steve became interested in his historic ancestry and his father told him much of the background of their Indian culture and helps keep the heritage alive. Steve explained with pride that Katoo means 'long keeper of the old ways' in the Cherokee language.

When he was six years old Steve visited an Apache reservation where his uncle was a Baptist Missionary, became vitally interested in his own lineage, accepted Christ and joined the church. The experience was the most momentous of his life. Paradoxically the setting among the Apaches, considered by early settlers in this country to be one of the most aggressive tribes, was the place where Steve found tranquility of mind at such a tender age.

An illustrious ancestor was Sequoia, (the teacher) who wrote the Cherokee alphabet. Sequoia was called the Indian Moses and he used his influence to keep the peace on the terrible march from Georgia when 98 percent of the Cherokee Nation was moved to Indian Territory in eastern Oklahoma in 1831.

Wilson has lived, talked and studied on the Wennebago, Navaho, Apache, Sioux, Rosebud, Santee, and Omaha reservations in the summers. While there he took part in some ceremonies. The result is an

"My conclusion is," stated Steve, "that Indian culture is Christianity, the tenets of Indians are so much like those we learn from the Bible—treat your enemy as a brother, practice respect of everything, other people, the land, flora and fauna."

This philosophy has been summed up by a friend who is a full blood Cherokee Indian in a beautiful way. "When the sun goes down each day, remember the things you have learned and experienced."

The ancient craft of horn jewelry is one of Wilson's principal interests. This art is an exacting and for Steve a rewarding one. One of the oldest arts forms of primitive man, horn and bone jewelry predates the silver and turquoise variety by many many years. Wilson makes his jewelry from thin slices of raw horn which is soaked in water over night before the center is painstakingly hollowed out by hand with a sharp knife. Some of the slices are only smoothed enough to remove rough edges before being combined with colored beads, also hollowed out by hand, and strung on leather thongs to become unique necklaces. Other horn beads are given more buffing and when the weathered stain is removed the beads look like ivory. This procedure requires a lot of time, 45 minutes to an hour for each one, but the results are worth it.

Of particular interest is Wilson's own medicine necklace, fashioned from points of the European Red Stag and containing 58 rings at present. The rich ivory colored rings are in graduated sizes and strung on a slender leather thong and took something like 58 hours of work. The Indian medicine necklace has great significance since the Indian believes it contains the strength of the animal from

which its components are made. For that reason it is understandable that bear claws, eagle talons and elk horns are used so much.

Steve has a medicine pouch too, made of powdered bone, eagle feather, bear claw, and rattlesnake bone. A medicine pouch varies from one individual to another.

Horns used in the jewelry making come from a local source. Steve Wilson is the nephew of John Lee Bell of Pampa, owner of the Horn B game preserve a few miles from Clarendon. All of the horns from Fallow Deer, Sika, European Red Stag and others come from the shed, broken or dehorned horns of animals on the refuge. There is a fairly rare variety of black horn that is used also.

The necklaces have proved to be extremely popular with the college and high school students and other persons lucky enough to have seen them. Steve has displayed his craft at the Indian Store at Tahlequah, Oklahoma and at Whitman's Store in Vian, Oklahoma. One sale was made to some young persons from Muncie, Germany who had been looking for something out of the ordinary to take back to Germany.

Several offers have been made for the medicine necklace, one for \$75 which Wilson declined. He plans to add more beads to it as time permits. A museum has a similar one made by a Sioux of domestic elk horn measuring 16 feet and taking 14 years to complete.

Detroit, Michigan was Steve Wilson's birthplace. His father was stationed at Selfridge Air Force Base where he was a pharmacist. For the past 18 years his parents Mr. and Mrs. Richard A. Wilson have made their home in Pampa. Steve is a sophomore student at Clarendon Junior College.

Upon completion of his Sophomore year at Clarendon Junior College he plans

Stray Dogs Kill Ag Farm Pigs

In two separate incidents within the same week, dogs killed four head of swine at the Clarendon High School Agriculture Department farm on the north side of town.

On the first night one of the animals was killed and two nights later the three remaining pigs were also mutilated and killed by the dogs.

There was no insurance carried on the animals and the loss was borne by the Ag. Students themselves. These were to have been show animals and the initial cost was \$75 per animal. Milton Mann, agriculture teacher, estimated the boys would have broken if they had been able to feed the project animals out and sell them for 140 to 150 dollars a head. Had one of them become a champion the loss would

have been much greater. All of the animals had been purchased in Iowa one Poland China, one Chester White and two Berkshires and any one of them had the potential for breed champion.

The FFA chapter owned one of the pigs and the others belonged to Steve Rives, Keith Floyd and Bob Berry. This is not the first time the agriculture department has suffered such a loss, three years ago the same thing happened to animals at the farm.

Recently 20 or 30 dogs had been destroyed in the vicinity and it was hoped the danger from them was gone. It is not known whether the dogs were running as a pack or not since no one was around to view the slaughter, but it is definite that several were involved.

FHA Making Emergency Loans To Farmers In Panhandle Areas

The Farmers Home Administration is now making emergency loans in Armstrong and Gray Counties in

Texas. This action is possible because these counties were declared a natural disaster area by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Mr. J. Lynn Futch, state director of FMHA, said adverse weather conditions this year have caused extensive damage to local crops and farm production.

Farmers or ranchers in the designated counties who have suffered losses may be eligible for Farmers Home Administration emergency loans to cover actual physical or production losses. Other loans under the emergency program can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments to the operation.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until December 22, 1975, for physical losses and July 23, 1976, for production losses.

Loan funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts, or to replace damaged or destroyed buildings, including homes.

Emergency loans are repayable as soon as possible consistent with the repayment ability of borrowers, Mr. Futch said. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depend-

ing upon the purpose of the loan. Loans covering actual losses are repayable in their entirety at an interest rate of five per cent. Other loans will be made a current interest rates for long-term or short-term credit.

To be eligible for a loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from this disaster and have no other means of recovery or sources of credit.

Loans are made through offices of the Farmers Home Administration serving designated counties. Mr. Robert A. Keown is the County Supervisor for Gray and Armstrong Counties and his office hours are as follows. Pampa office hours are from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 Noon on the second and fourth Thursday of each month at the Courthouse Annex. Claude office hours are from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 Noon on the first and third Wednesday of each month at the Courthouse. McLean office hours are from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 Noon on the fourth Wednesday of each month at the City Hall. In addition, office hours in Clarendon are from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. each Friday afternoon at the Agricultural Building.

Rock And Roll Group To Be Here In Special Concert

Eighty-eight bulls, representing Herefords, Angus, Santa Gertrudis, Charolais and cross-breeds have begun the feed test.

There are 26 Herefords, 23 Angus, three Charolais, one Santa Gertrudis and 35 cross-bred bulls which began the test Oct. 9, according to Nolan Poteet, director of the annual performance test.

The bulls are tested for their ability to gain weight on feed. They will be sold at the annual field day and performance tested bull sale at Pantex to be held at the center east of Amarillo March 11, 1976.

Records are kept and provided for prospective buyers on all animals which tell their daily gain, weight at the beginning and end of the test, and other information

pertinent to their ability to convert feed into meat.

"All bulls are in good shape and have had no problems other than minor stress," Poteet said. "Weather has been good and they are on feed good. I feel that the quality of the bulls is much better than any year that I have been associated with the test."

The bulls are consigned to the center by "cooperators" for the test and are auctioned at the sale.

company at these places. Springing up like mushrooms after a shower company yards appeared all over the panhandle and in the oil fields during the oil boom and the rapidly growing area in the Texas panhandle. When the boom was over the need for so many yards was gone and the company closed or moved the facilities to other lucrative locations. On occasion the same yard was opened again if business warranted. This practice is the result of the farsightedness of the management personnel.

Clarendon has had a Foxworth-Galbraith yard in Clarendon since the early 1900's and the original store stood on the location where Clarendon Meat Company is at present. Wm. Cameron & Co. sold their yard here and Foxworth-Galbraith bought the property and moved to that location, the present site of Foxworth-Galbraith.

One of 50 outlets the Clarendon store is best described as a "Building Materials Center" and is one of "the people helpers" in this community as it has been for a long time.

Lloyd McCord has been an employee of the company for 17 years acting as assistant manager much of the time prior to December 1, 1967 when he accepted the managership for Foxworth-Galbraith when the manager

was transferred to the Spearman yard. The Clarendon store has enjoyed steady growth in the past eight years and the prospects for many more years of customer service are certain.

McCord is married to the former Frances Hearn and they have three children, Mary Louise Price of Santee, California, Sue Hardy, of Floydada and Lloyd Lynn of Clarendon and five grandchildren.

conducting the state-wide elections.

The major points of the new Constitution to be considered have been stated as follows:

ANNUAL SESSIONS

Legislative sessions on odd numbered years would be 140 days and on even number days would be 90 days. Those for insist Texas is large enough that it needs yearly planning, especially in financial and budget matters. Those against say the added expense of yearly session would be too high and local government don't need the added rules from the state.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

The new Constitution allows voters to add, eliminate or combine local elected offices, mainly on the county level. Those for say one taxing agency could be created, or certain local officers done

away with. One of the strongest voices against this article is the association of county judges and commissioners.

ADDITIONAL COSTS

Implementing the new constitution is expected to cost several million should it pass. Opponents also insist the daily operation under the new constitution will be much higher. Persons for it insist the state government will be more efficient and thus save money and provide better services.

TAX CHANGE—the new constitution would allow the Legislature to set a standard for taxing farm and ranch land whereby the land would be valued on its productivity, not to exceed its actual market value. Also to be exempt under the retail sales tax would be feed, seed, fertilizer and farm machinery as is in the present constitution.

"SELF DESTRUCT" for state agencies—Under the

new Constitution all state agencies would last only 10 years and have to appear before the Legislature for renewal each 10 years. Those for say many state agencies are not accountable to anyone and thus become too independent because offices are for life and they need to be responsible every 10 years to make them more responsive to the people. Persons against insist this puts too much power in the hands of a few legislators.

LEGISLATORS' SALARIES—Would be set by a Salary Commission and approved by the Legislators. Could be lowered but not raised by the Legislature.

off every teacher who came. They needed R.E. Drennan. The solution was simple. All that was necessary was for Drennan to prove he was rougher and tougher than the boys. It took some fighting, bruising and other unorthodox methods to accomplish this but in the end there was no question as to who the boss was, it was Elmer Drennan.

Not only was he the boss but he possessed an amazing ability for running. He has been reputedly matched against a race horse, locomotive and a professional speedster. According to all accounts the outcome did nothing to diminish his reputation.

Still not converted to teaching as a career Drennan entered Oklahoma University as a pre-med student. He received his B.S. degree but found he was not fitted for a medical career. He returned to Clarendon and resumed his teaching and spent the summers working toward his Masters.

The following years were spent in dedicated service in the educational profession as a teacher, Dean of Clarendon Junior College and friend of high school and college students.

Mr. Drennan has earned and received all of the certificates available to public schools, and studied regularly to keep abreast of changing policies within the educational system. He was a dedicated educator and a Phi Theta Kappa.


