

Pony Express Ride To Benefit Heart Campaign

December 13th has been set as the date for a Pony Express as a fund raising event for the American Heart Association according to Jack Moreman. The ride will begin in Hedley at one o'clock and end at the Clarendon Rodeo Arena here, where refreshments will be served and trophies presented. Each rider participating will be given a patch to wear and keep, which was designed by Cherine Henry, a member of the Clarendon Junior College Nursing Class.

There will be several teams competing, each team consisting of five riders, with one rider serving as Team

Captain. The competition is not one of speed but will depend on the amount of money the team has managed to raise in pledges. This will be an opportunity for local people to help sponsor a team by donating to a worthy cause.

Riders wishing to enter can obtain entry forms and pledge cards from anyone in Emmett O. Simmons Insurance Agency. Riders will furnish their own mounts and be responsible for getting these mounts to their appointed location to ride. Each team will have a Captain responsible for getting their team organized and naming the team. The Heart Association will direct the relays with Medical Personnel stationed along the route. The Nursing Class at Clarendon Junior College will also conduct a Blood Pressure Clinic on the same day.

Coca-Cola Observes 50th Anniversary

Chartered on November 11, 1925, the Coca-Cola Bottling Company celebrated its 50th anniversary this year.

The franchise for the company covers Clarendon and Memphis. It was purchased by Frank Phelan, Sr. from John O. Colquitt, Sr. and Tom Nabors who had started it in Memphis.

At the time he received the charter, Frank Phelan had the bottling company in Memphis. In 1928 a plant was built in Clarendon and operated with the Memphis plant until 1930. In 1936 the Memphis plant was closed and the Clarendon plant was opened again and has operated here since that time.

The plant here was built by adding to the wall of the Farmers Exchange building which housed a garage owned by Carl W. Bennett (Trapper). The twenty-five foot building housed the machinery and other facilities; the route truck was driven in to the building, empty bottles were unloaded and full cases reloaded on the truck. Later, two 25 x 100 foot lots were used to expand the space to 9700 square feet needed for more efficient operation.

A colorful business, the early soft drink establishments had few flavors; there were no established flavors except root beer, sarsaparilla, strawberry, and cream soda. Early flavors of grape and orange were not successful.

Chemical laboratories had formulas which they guarded jealously for themselves. The syrup man was a key figure, for upon him depended the

finished flavor. There was the everpresent threat of commercial espionage in the theft of flavor formulas.

Dr. Bogue, a Frenchman, who lived in Sherman, used his formulae, made labels, signed them, and claimed his was the only genuine Coca-Cola. Prompt action was taken, and he was made to cease and desist.

Little wonder that precious formulas were kept under lock and key with only one or two persons knowing them. Even the syrup man did not know the formula, but he did know the amount of syrup to add to the quantity being made up for bottling.

Even today, every safeguard is taken to protect the Coca-Cola formula--only two persons know it! Syrup is made from the formula and this is used to flavor the world's most popular soft drink.

Preparation of the bottles for filling has changed drastically from the days of bottling the famous Coca-Cola. At that time bottles were washed by hand in a large wooden tub with water and some bird shot put into the bottles for a cleaning agent; the shot and water swished about until the bottle looked clean.

This procedure would not only be frowned upon today, but lack of sanitary standards would have a bottle company shut down in short order.

Bottle caps have changed too, and much for the better. Virgil Dearing, brother-in-law of Frank Phelan, Sr., owned the first crown-top bottling company in Texas, at Bonham. Previously the

Beating The Greenbug

Donley County sorghum grower Bobby Cole discovered the benefits of genetics on his farm here this fall. And it looks like he's figured out a better way to beat the bite of the sorghum greenbug, a serious crop pest for area farmers.

Cole, in his search for improved sorghum hybrids, decided to plant a test plot on his farm this year. He was curious about hybrids with bred-in resistance to the greenbug that were recently released by DeKalb Ag-Research, Inc. The genetic control in the new resistant varieties, company officials report, allow greenbugs to remain on plants and feed

without doing any severe damage.

One of the hybrids in Cole's test was DeKalb C-42+, a widely adapted hybrid for this area. The results? Cole explains that the DeKalb hybrid with resistance outyielded its counterpart non-resistant type by 102 pounds per acre.

Dr. Bruce Maunder, DeKalb's sorghum research director, Lubbock, says a yield like Cole's is further proof of a biological control system that really works.

"Hybrids with resistance are simply less affected by the toxin greenbugs inject into the leaves as they feed on sorghum plants," Mau-

der says. "In addition, their genetic make-up seems to slow down greenbug growth and reproduction."

"Farmers will be able to save on spraying for greenbugs, plus get a yield advantage without greenbugs chewing away on sorghum plants."

Maunder says the new form of genetic resistance allows natural parasites to do a better job of keeping greenbug populations in check.

"That's because we're not trying to eliminate the critter. We still want him around as food for the beneficial insects," he explains. "Plus there's less a

chance for future mutations since bugs are compatible with resistant hybrids and have less pressure for change."

Grain sorghum farmers in Donley County won't have to sacrifice yields in order to get the added bonus of greenbug resistance either, Maunder points out. "In DeKalb field tests, even without greenbugs, the resistant hybrids outyielded the susceptible ones in every test."

Cattle Lice Treatment Time Here

Lice are starting to infest some cattle in the county and now is the time to start a control program that will prevent lousy animals when winter rolls around.

Proper treatment of lice infested animals now will kill all lice and will keep them free of the tiny insect pest this winter unless they contact other untreated animals.

Don't wait until your cattle are rubbing down fences before you treat for lice. Begin control measures before the winter turns bad and their hair gets long.

Approved sprays, dips and pour-ons are usually the best treatment but properly placed and maintained self-treatment devices such as dust bags, back-rubbers and oilers generally afford effective control at a low cost and with a minimum of labor.

In a spraying, dipping or pour-on program, an animal should receive two applications 10-18 days apart for the best control of lice. The second application will kill any lice hatching from eggs laid before the first treatment.

A number of materials are currently registered for controlling cattle lice. Before using any material, read the label thoroughly and follow all restrictions and precautions, especially if some of the treated cattle may go on to slaughter.

Additional information on livestock parasite control is available from the County Extension office, Gooch said.

Yule Trees Dangerous

A dry, brittle Christmas tree can go up in flames in a matter of seconds. With a few precautions and a little common sense, it's possible to keep a tree fresh and avoid fire hazards.

"First of all," says Ronald Gooch, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, "pick a tree that's fresh. The needles should be green and flexible and shouldn't fall off at the touch."

"Before setting the tree up, make a fresh cut diagonally across the trunk base to facilitate the tree's water uptake. Then put the tree in a sturdy water filled stand and locate it away from fireplaces, stoves, radiators or other sources of heat," he cautions.

Replace the evaporated water daily in the tree stand. Before decorating the tree, check the lights and other electrical decorations for burned out bulbs and frayed,

cracked or worn insulation. Replace any damaged items and don't overload electrical circuits.

Gooch advises using non-flammable ornaments on the tree and throughout the house. Never use lighted candles on a tree and don't hand metal foil tinsel directly over wires or tree lights.

Remember to disconnect tree lights before leaving the house or going to bed.

Dispose of the tree as soon as possible after the holidays, adds Gooch.

Coca-Cola Marks 50th Anniversary Clarendon Shoppers

(CONT. FROM PAGE 1) top-top bottles were used, and this is the origin of the term "pop" for soft drinks.

Frank Phelan, Sr. was as colorful a figure as the business he purchased for Clarendon and Memphis in 1925. He was forced, by circumstances, to help provide for his mother and other children of his family at a young age, and was never able to indulge in the small frivolous lapses so dear to the hearts of everyone. He had a particular fondness for selectable chocolate cremes made by a Greek candy maker in Temple. He would buy large sacks of this candy or his own children, when they were small, and empty the contents on the floor, where they were playing, to see their delight at the treat. Strangely enough, when the family had moved to Memphis, Phelan discovered that the Greek candy maker had moved to Amarillo, and he was able to continue the purchase of his favorite candy.

Construction of any kind fascinated Frank Phelan; he had a fine time once when he state highway was laying some pavement just out of Memphis. Every day he drove out to the site, parked his car, and watched the workers to his heart's content. He commented on the alacrity of the men to the workers came to the car, where he was sitting, and (in an off-hand way) asked his official position. When Phelan explained he was an observer only, the man replied, "Man, we have nearly worked ourselves to death on this job, because we thought you were an inspector." Thereafter, work progressed at a much more comfortable rate, and the men were unimpressed with the daily visits of Frank Phelan.

Another life-long fascination for Phelan was water. If, for any reason, anyone needed any watering done he had only to ask and Phelan would gladly agree. He could use more water than almost

anyone on the grass and shrubs and trees and walks and drives—and nearly all of it was hand applied!

An enthusiastic player of games he and his friends always had a domino or moon game going. These games were so regular and intense that, at one time, there was a minor brush with the authorities in Memphis, when the long arm of the law decided that the men were gambling as they played moon. This was not true however; he had the same zest for games or anything else he was interested in. The incident did, however, have an effect on the "city dadda" in Memphis and they thereafter found a private place in which to enjoy their domino and moon games.

Another hobby of Phelans was his absorption in baseball and baseball players. Frank Phelan could always be counted on to give a job to a good baseball player—with particular attention to the pitchers. Consequently, a large number of baseball players were regularly hired and fired at the Coca-Cola Bottling Company. Sometimes the players did not work, or work out, at either the baseball job or the bottling plant.

Phelan's outside interests did not conflict with his business expertise and the Coca-Cola plant continued to thrive. When Frank Phelan, Jr. returned from World War II, he was made vice-president of Sales for the company; when his father died April 16th 1957 he became president of the Coca-Cola Bottling Company here.

Frank Phelan is admirably suited for the responsibility of the position. He first became a paid employee of the Coca-Cola Bottling Company when he was five years of age. Although his duties did not entail any of the running of the plant at that age, he did learn, by the age old process of observation, many of the things he was to do actively later. His formal training consists of a B.S.A.

in Accounting from the University of Texas and an L.A. degree from Harvard University in 1943. This degree is unique for it was only given by the university for that one year. After receiving his L.A. degree, Frank Jr. served in the Army Quartermaster Corps and returned home in 1946 and went into the business here in Clarendon.

Changes came about in the Coca-Cola Bottling Company also, and in 1955, larger sized bottles were made in 10 ounce, 12 ounce and 26 ounce sizes. The 10 ounce bottle did not have the same familiar contour that literally millions of Americans had seen for so many years. The panhandle Coca-Cola Bottlers decided against using it and went instead for the larger but well-known 12 ounce bottle.

National recognition has been made to the Coca-Cola Bottling Company here on numerous occasions. The first of these was awarded to Frank Phelan, Sr. in 1937 for the 50 bottle per capita achievement. For the year 1947, at the first International Coca-Cola Convention, held in Atlantic City, the company was given the silver bottle for 100 bottles per capita. Frank, Jr. and his wife Wanda attended this convention. Other awards include 1946 for 150 bottles per capita, one for 200 bottles per capita, and 1973 for 250 bottles per capita.

In 1975 in Dallas a plaque for 50 distinguished years in business was awarded to the company.

Operation of the plant does not consist of sitting behind a desk by any means. President Frank Phelan, Jr. says he is chemist, handy man, electrician, plumber and "jack of all trades" for the business.

In 1948 Frank Phelan, Jr. married Wanda Avant Johnson of Childress. Wanda was born at Greenville and Frank was born at Commerce, but they discovered that the attending physicians at their births were brothers. Not

many married couples have this in common.

Frank and Wanda have two sons. Frank III is 25 years old and works in Houston for Prudential Insurance Company. Charles is 23 years old and is attending Milwaukee School of Engineering.

Frank Phelan is active in civic works for his community as a member of the Donley County Living History Commission and is Vice-President of the Adobe Walls Council of the Boy Scouts of America in addition to membership in the Lions Club.

Wanda is a recognized musical talent, has a beautifully trained voice, belongs to many clubs and organizations and is vitally interested in her community. There is the kind of family that builds foundations for America.

Other family members share the responsibility of the company with Frank Phelan, Jr. Carl Allmond, brother-in-law of Frank is vice president of the company, and Mildred Phelan Allmond, sister, is secretary-treasurer of the Coca-Cola Bottling Company.

Richard Maxey has been a loyal employee of the company for 29 years—since 1947, and other employees are Harold Dewayne George, employed for two and a half years; Danny Strack and Alvin Ivory are part-time employees who are attending Clarendon College.

These persons are members of a company that belongs to the Texas Soft Drink Association and to the National Soft Drink Association, an organization that is notable for membership that has the ability to get along. All in all the company and its employees have worked to make the Coca-Cola Bottling Company outstanding among the others, any where in the country.
