

Two area fires this week keep Clarendon firemen busy

Clarendon's Volunteer Fire Dept. was kept busy this week answering calls to fight two area fires.

Saturday afternoon the fire unit doused a fire which had started in the upper floor of a local apartment house. Another alarm was set off Monday afternoon in connection with a reported fire at the JA Ranch Headquarters twenty-five miles southwest of the city.

Alarm for the apartment house fire went off at 4:45 p.m. Saturday. Firemen battled the blaze for approximately two hours before extinguishing the fire. The apartment house is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Reagan Bain.

None of the residents of the three apartments in the two-story building were at home when the fire started.

Gilbert Speed, resident of the upstairs apartment, returned home Saturday afternoon to discover smoke coming from his and his wife's apartment. Speed turned in the fire alarm which eventually summoned 16 local volunteer firemen and four firefighting vehicles including both Clarendon firetrucks.

Billowing grey smoke from the fire drifted across Highway 287, attracting a large crowd of spectators.

The fire was extinguished before large amounts of damage was caused to the

outside of the two-story building. The blaze.

interior of the upper apartment, however, was almost a complete loss. Walls and ceiling were charred badly and most of the furniture was burned. Some damage was caused to the two lower apartments because of water flowing through a large hole burned in the floor of Speed's apartment.

The majority of water damage was to the apartment of Mr. and Mrs. H.C. Taylor. Their apartment was directly under the hole burned through the ceiling joist.

Mrs. Bain said cost of the fire damage had not been estimated yet. She also commended the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Dept. for an "excellent job" in containing

The Fire Dept. received the alarm call at 3:50 p.m. Monday reporting a smoldering fire at the JA Ranch Headquarters. One unit of the local Volunteer Fire Dept. was dispatched to the ranch headquarters. The Claude Fire Dept. was also radioed to assist in the call.

The Clarendon unit arrived at the scene first and discovered smoke coming from within a log wall directly behind a fireplace in the house. Apparently heat from the brick fireplace was sufficient to cause the logs to smolder but not to ignite into flames.

The log wall was doused with a fire extinguisher by the Clarendon firemen.

The Claude Fire Dept. arrived immediately after the Clarendon unit. Both the Clarendon and the Claude firemen stayed at the scene for some hours to be sure the smoldering did not begin again. No damage was reported caused by the smoldering fire except some minor smoke damage.

This mini-shop in a not very large room at the back of the house is a lesson in the utilization of space. There is nothing "busy" or cluttered in the area of the shop. The shelves, display table and the measuring table take up

New stamps available here

In an interview with postmaster E.A. Tipton it was reported that Clarendon had received their new 13 cent stamps on schedule and sales for the stamps began on January 1.

"There is not a noticeable difference in the demand for three and 13 cent stamps", Tipton said, "but we do have to keep requesting 3 cent stamps to keep enough of a supply on hand."

The demand for the 13 cent stamps has been extremely heavy, much heavier than the usual demand for the old 10 cent stamps, Tipton stated. He was unable to account for the upsurge in demand for stamps for the average piece of first class mail.

Tag registration beginning soon

Residents of Texas and Clarendon began receiving 1976 car registration papers in their mail today.

This year for the first time Texas drivers and car owners will not replace the old tags but will instead attach a small tab to the existing license plate. This is much like the system which has been in use by the state of California for many years.

Although the proper forms for the new year's tabs have been mailed, sale of the 1976 tabs will not begin until February 1.

er. Usually custom made ladies wearing apparel in some sizes is on display.

When the little business started, Mrs. McDonald determined to stock only the kind of material she would buy from someone else, first quality. This she has done for the almost five years she has had the shop. January 20th will be the fifth anniversary of May Pearl's Fabrics.

In addition to carrying knits, cottons, polyester denims, polyester crepe for blouses and suede cloth, May Pearl sews for her customers. The only drawback to this is the fact that more persons need a seamstress than she can accommodate. However it is rewarding to be so much in demand.

When May Pearl and her husband, Houston McDonald sold their farm to make way for the dam at Greenbelt

Lake they gave up a home of 20 years, and decided to move to town and buy a home in Clarendon. May Pearl had been working for Alynne Bain at the drugstore for several years and the move was practical.

This move seemed providential for now that she was in town a fabric shop did seem like a good idea. After a consultation with her daughter, who likes fabrics too, May Pearl's Fabrics became a reality.

This business is just perfect for Mrs. McDonald, she says "I really enjoy cooking, sewing and taking care of my family. With my shop in the house like this there is no problem. Any time I like I can stop and enjoy a cup of coffee with a

New ways to use linen outlined

Call it a "White Sale" or a "Bright Sale" -- January sales OFFER savings in the bed and bath department.

It's a good practice to replace a pair of sheets and pillowcases for each bed every year, but two on the bed, two in the wash and two on the shelf in good condition should be sufficient.

A minimum of four bath towels, hand towels and washcloths for each family member should also be kept on hand. Both the color scheme of the bedroom or bath and the decorative effect will need to be considered when shopping for these household linens.

All colors and designs are fashionable if they suit the decor. The natural look in neutrals, dulled blues and greens and browns and dusty

colors are increasing in popularity, however. Bright Bicentennial colors and patterns are also being favored.

Towels can also be used as attractive wall hangings. Abstract contemporary designs are especially suited for this. Add washcloth pockets to these towels and hang them by the tub to hold shampoo, brushes and other needs. Two large towels can be stitched together for an after-bath cover-up garment.

Besides the "ordinary" use for sheets, they can be used as drapes, tablecloths, shower curtains (use the old curtain for a liner) and any type of clothing requiring cotton-type fabric--such as hostess gowns and caftans. Fill pockets sewn into sheets with weights to make a wind-proof tablecloth.

Here are some tips to check quality of linen goods. Price isn't always an indication of quality, so be sure to shop different stores

as prices vary.

Sheets and pillowcases: hold up to the light to be sure weave is even and firm. Rub the fabric between your fingers to be sure that it hasn't been overly sized (starch or some other finish to make it smooth.) Rub parts of the sheet over a contrasting surface to see if a white powder rubs off. This indicates too much sizing and the sheet will probably lose this after it is laundered. Hems should be even. Corners of fitted sheets should also be reinforced.

Towels: hold the towel to the light to check for uniform weave. Tiny, regular pinpoints are a good indication of quality. Sizing should not be evident. Towels with sizing will also be of poor quality after laundering. Check evenness of tension by pulling at the various parts of the towel--body, hems and selvages. The label should also be checked for colorfastness.

Early Lelia Lake history retold in article

A news story chronicling the early history of the Lelia Lake community and first printed in 1926 was brought to the "Press" office this week.

Headline of the story reads "Lelia Lake--A Flourishing Little City of Donley Co." The article was published Dec. 16, 1926 in the "Clarendon News."

Earl Shields, head ginner at the Lelia Lake Paymaster Gin, submitted the newspaper clipping to the Press office. Kinch Leathers of Clarendon had originally brought the article by the gin to show the employees and they had placed it upon a bulletin board in the gin office.

Both Shields and Leathers speculated the article had been written by Mrs. H.R. King, a country correspondent for the Lelia Lake community for over 30 years. The article does not include the by-line of the author.

Wilma Batson, daughter of Mrs. King, said her Mother did write a history of Lelia Lake and the article was probably the same one. Mrs. King was the Lelia Lake correspondent for the Clarendon newspaper from the early 1920s until her death in 1957.

The 49 year old newspaper clipping is yellowed with age and parts of the copy have crumbled. All readable parts of the article are reprinted here and omissions in the copy indicate where the clipping was not readable.

Lelia Lake is located on the Ft. Worth and Denver R.R.

seven miles east of Clarendon. Some forty years ago the country where Lelia Lake now stands was a vast rolling plain with no inhabitants but the wild buffalo which used Lelia as their watering trough. In January 1887 Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Myers came to make this their home. They located some four miles east of where Lelia Lake now is. Mrs. Myers still resides on the homestead.

About 1890 the little town was founded and named by Mr. Montgomery, townsite agent for the Ft. Worth and Denver Railroad, named in honor of Miss Lelia Fain, sister-in-law of Judge G.A. Brown who lived there with his family. At that time Judge Brown was county Judge and afterward became District Judge, and his home was on his ranch one half mile west of Lelia. In 1890 Mr. and Mrs. D.L. McClelland moved here and he was manager of the Brown ranch and now Mrs. McClelland resides in Clarendon.

The lake south of R.R. tracks covers the headquarters of the old Brown ranch. The section house was built in the year of 1887.

Jim Kilfall and family, Dr. Pitt, George Latimer and family, J.L. Reid and family, J.O. King and family and Mr. Shoff located in and near Lelia Lake in 1890 and 1891.

Miss Annie Powell taught our first term of school in a small house located about 500 yards due east of the present school building, with about twelve pupils.

J.L. Reid was a pioneer teacher, who with his wife, still resides on their same old

homestead. They gave a part of the present school ground and the school was moved to present location. Mrs. J.A. Thompson also taught in the early days and now lives with her husband, one mile north of town.

The first Sunday School was organized in the home of J.O. King one mile west of Lelia. There the members assembled each Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock, had their lesson, offered prayer and sang songs. After S.S. they visited for a while, as the homes were so far distant from one another they rarely visited.

In the winter of 1902 and 1903, Mrs. W.B. Sims, who now resides with her husband in Clarendon, organized an orchestra composed of Eda Brown Leathers, Eva Sims Draffin, Myrtle Leathers Christal, Mattie Millsop Phillips, Kate

Reid Herwig, Della Reid Campbell, Arthur Sims and Will King. They indeed added much to the amusement of the young people of that day. Two of the noted annual social events of this time were the gathering in the home of J.R. Leathers on Christmas night and one in the home of J.O. King, New Years night.

Many of the advantages the young people of today are allowed to enjoy are largely due to the privations of those pioneers mentioned and the following: Mr. and Mrs. Harry Brown, Mr. and Mrs. Marion Williams, Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Roberts, Mr. and Mrs. McGee, Mr. and Mrs. J.A. Gerner and others.

Rev. A.H. Thornton of Goodnight organized the first Baptist Church on September 6, 1903, with nine charter members. Rev. Laney organized the Methodist Church

about years ago with between fifteen and twenty people.....the aspiring of 1907 and Mr. Phil Jackson was first postmaster. Lela to the north of us and Lelia being so near alike caused confusion with the mail so Lake was added and we have Lelia Lake.

And now since the fire of August 27, last, which destroyed six business houses, we boast of four groceries, a hardware, dry goods, barber shop, tailor shop, drug store, real estate office, meat market, blacksmith, two cafes, three garages, five filling stations, a lumber yard, two cotton gins, an elevator and a rooming house.

There are four churches in the town.

We have an Independent School District with a modern two story brick building, which includes eight class

rooms, a studio, one main auditorium with seating capacity of some five hundred. Four grades, four high school and two fine art teachers compose the faculty. Our science building is a separate building from the main building.

Apparatus and equipment is valued at about five hundred dollars, two hundred fifty dollars of which has been bought in the last two years. Equipment consists of materials for use in biology and general science, with a small bit of physics apparatus. The laboratory is equipped with running water. This is the first year to offer biology since 1924 and we are now trying for affiliation. Last year was first year to offer general science and we secured a credit in it. Interest is increasing, shown by the fact that we have fifty-four students.....

Religious Thoughts

By JAMES O. BRANDON

In 1610, Henry Hudson discovered and perished in the bay which bears his name; and in 1670, Charles II, granted a charter to an English company, with Prince Rupert at its head, securing to them a monopoly of the trade in the productions of the countries watered by the rivers which fall into that vast area of the sea. The wealth, influence, and territory of the Company increased in due time; and for a long period they ruled from the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific, and from within the Arctic circle to the northern boundary of Canada and the United States. This immense region, thirty-five times the size of Great Britain, was inhabited by Indian nations. They were distinguished from each other by such names as Cree, Snake, Swampee, Dog-ribbed, and Harefoot Indians. Besides the trade of the Company, men like Cooper, Elliot, and David Brainerd became interested in the religious life of the Indians.

One of these first missionaries wrote about the Indians: "They roam over dense forest, vast prairies, broad rivers, extended lakes, and mighty mountains of North America, enjoying the freedom, exhibiting the improvidence, and enduring the privations of barbarism. Except in cases where a few have been civilized by Christianity, they are without flocks or herds, without village or farm, or field. A horse to hunt beasts or chase their enemies, and a canoe to voyage on the lakes and rivers, are nearly all the articles of property they care for. A wigwam, formed by hanging skins over poles, is their shelter in the severe winters. They live by hunting and fishing; and when fish, birds, deer, and buffaloes fail, they sustain life on woodberries, and roots. They believe in a Great Spirit, carry a mystery-bag always on the breast, and have some ideal of a future state where the evil are condemned to dwell in perpetual ice, and the good are admitted to a land where the hunting grounds are always excellent."

It was not until 1820, that is 150 years after being claimed as the territory of England, that the first step was taken in the direction of communicating a knowledge of the gospel to the Indians of this vast region. The forts established for the purposes of trade were not rendered subservient to the purposes of religion. They were hundreds of miles from each other; and each contained about a dozen young men, chiefly from Europe, who were generally destitute of religious principles and did not even own a Bible.

Beyond the pale of civilization the natives were treated by these early explorers as slaves; and, far from the restraining influence of Christian society and religious beliefs, they introduced their Indian neighbors to the sins of intoxication and impurity, and inflicted them with disease and misery. "I blush to say," wrote Major Semple, the governor of York Fort, the principal station in the New World in 1815, "that throughout the whole extent of the Hudson's Bay territories, there exists no place of worship even on the smallest scale."

It was the result of this concern that brought John West to the New World, the first teacher of the truth of Christ. He lit a

candle that has not since been extinguished and gave the light of the gospel of Christ to those in spiritual darkness between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. He was sent out from England by the Church Missionary Society in connection with the Hudson's Bay Company, and was to act both as chaplain to the colony and as missionary to the natives.

By the good hand of the Lord upon his labors, the character of the white settlers rapidly improved. The Sabbath was kept holy; public services of religion were well attended; marriage, almost unknown before, became general, and the public school resulted.

And that is the way it was 200 plus years ago in the great region now known as the United States of America. (See the *Christian Treasury*, p. 5-9.)

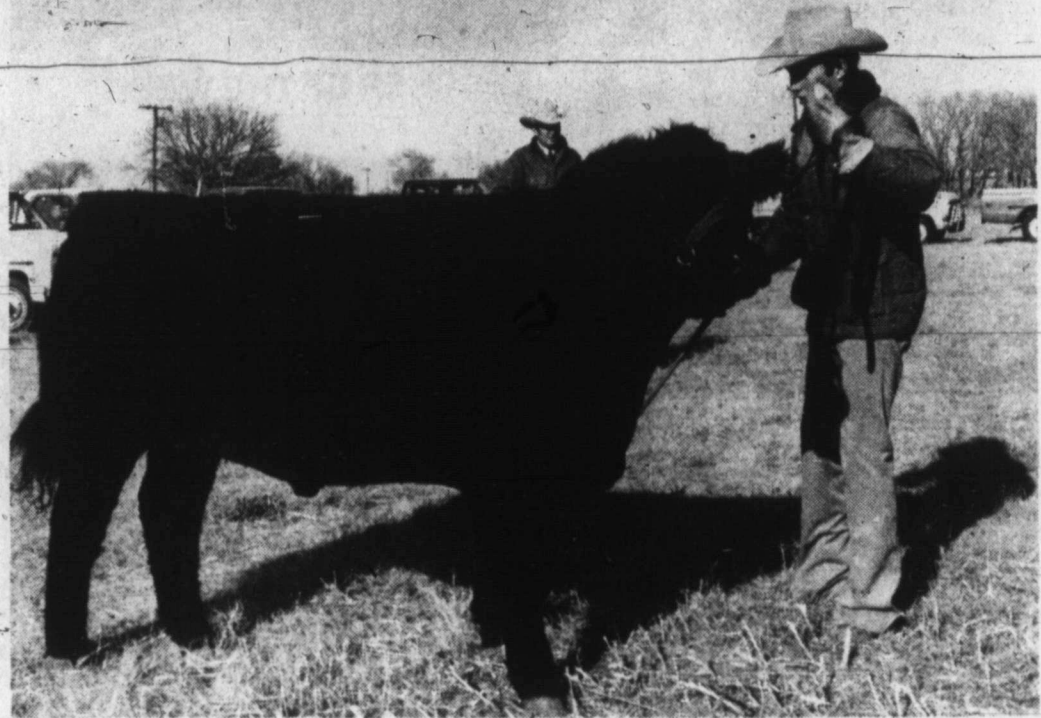

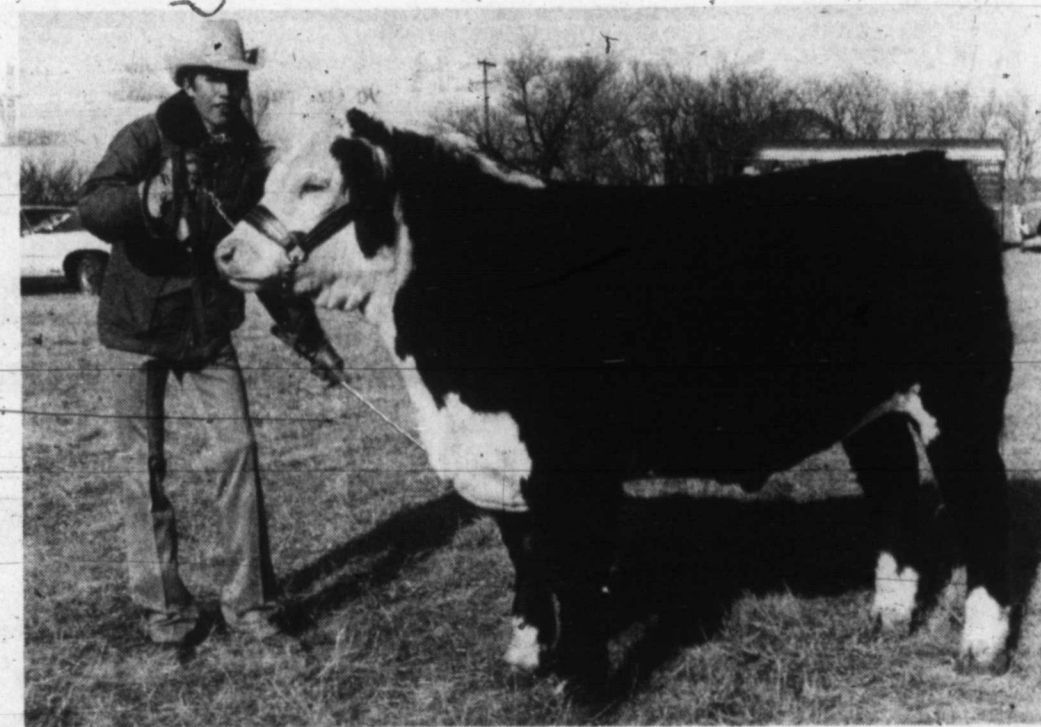
