At regular Chamber of Commerce meeting Monday

New plan to bring doctors here presented

The administrator of the Donley County Hospital District Medical Center, Jerry Knight, presented what one chamber director described as a "new approach" to obtaining other doctors for the center at Monday's regular Chamber of Commerce meeting.

Knight spoke after regular chamber business had been conducted. He said he was appearing before the cham-

ber to obtain thinking of the board members on "recruitment procedures" for obtaining new doctors here.

Basically, Knight's plan involved a community wide effort to contact and bring potential doctors to Clarendon for "a taste of what its like to practice in a small town."

Emphasizing that this idea was only a general one with no specifics set, Knight suggested a local committee

be formed comprised of representatives from all area civic and social groups which would seek out and, if interest was shown, bring doctors and their families to Clarendon. Other possibilities mentioned were to have members of the committee travel to meet these potential doctors.

"The most effective method of recruiting doctors I've seen," Knight said, "is when its done by community groups rather than special interest groups." He said doctors are more likely to feel the community has a "real need" for their services if they are contacted by area representatives. He also said this contact helps assure doctors if they move, they will have enough patients for a successful practice.

As outlined by Knight, this community committee would not be under supervision of the Donley County District Hospital Board, but, he said, its possible formation has full board support. Funds for the committee could possibly come from contributions of various local groups.

Knight has already discussed this plan with the local Lions Club and said he would like to speak to all Clarendon civic organizations and social groups if interest was shown.

The Chamber Board of Directors voted unanimously to support the community committee and to appoint two members from the Chamber to serve on it when formed.

Other suggestions raised

by members of the Chamber were to use the committee's funds for other possible methods of procuring doctors including advertising in medical journals.

Another Chamber suggestion was to have Dr. Richard Gilkey head the procurement committee. Gilkey said Tuesday he would be willing to help with the committee in any way he could. "This is the way to go about it," he said, "with everyone behind it."

In other Chamber business, committee reports were heard concerning Chamber sponsored Bicentennial projects, the spring fishing rodeo, 4th of July celebration plans and a planned brochure advertising the Clarendon area as a tourist attraction.

Bright Newhouse, chamber director, confirmed the appearance of "Uncle Sam in Action" March 16 at Clarendon College. The one-man performance will feature an entertaining rendition of U.S. and local history and will be free to the public.

Chamber director in charge of the 4th of July Parade, Owen Johnson, also announced his plans to travel to Shamrock March 17 for their annual St. Patrick's Day celebration. Johnson said he would contact organizations entered in the parade for possible participation in the Clarendon 4th of July Parade. He also encouraged any local civic organizations interested in entering floats to contact him.

Large grass fire destroys property of area persons

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Spier's featured as Business of the Week

Bill Spier wouldn't exactly describe his and his wife Darlene's business as "just a variety store," but his stock certainly has a great amount of variety.

Items available at Spier's are also found in toy stores, clothing stores, drug stores, jewelry stores, fabric stores and hardware stores. "A nightmare at inventory time," Spier called it.

The Spiers purchased the store and its stock from the original owners in December, 1974.

Along with the stock on the shelves in 1974, Spier found several toys put back in the storeroom apparently because they were thought to be too old to sell. These old

toys include wind-up toys and penny banks made of tin, a metal seldom used in toy production today. Spier contacted an Amarillo antique dealer who appraised many of them as genuine antiques.

One item, a penny bank made by the toy manufacturing firm J. Chien and Company, was valued at a starting value of \$150. Spier has several of these banks, all still in their original boxes.

Spier said women's and children's clothing is probably their main selling area now. The store's stock in clothing ranges from baby clothes to ladies fashions.

Brand names offered in the store include Mr. Dino,

Jane Colby, Lisa Lynn and Turtle Box in the women's line and Buster Brown and Peaches n' Cream for children's wear.

To accommodate their enlarged clothing area, the Spiers remodeled the front portion of the store to make room for more racks of clothes. But along with the changes the Spier's have made, much of the store is similar to what it was for nearly fifty years when it was Parker - Perkins, owned by Ruth and Thomas Perkins and Grace Parker and her husband.

Along with the merchandise inherited from the previous owners and merchandise added since they opened, Spier said a big job is keeping the stock replenished and up-to-date.

Most of the items sold at Spiers require changing due to fashions trends and fads. The clothing and fabrics must be changed with each of the eight fashion seasons. Added to the standard four seasons are the in between fall, winter, spring and summer transitional seasons.

To predict what will be popular in the coming seasons, the Spiers attend

Apparel marts in larger cities throughout Texas.

Distributors for the mixture of merchandise stocked at Spiers ship from such diversified points across the U.S. as Oklahoma City, California, New York, Tennessee and Arkansas.

Clothes aren't the only items which come in and out of fashion, Spier said. Toys must also be purchased ahead of time and accurate predictions of what will be popular are required. Spier said he is now ordering some of his toy stock for Christmas.

The whims of fad buying also presents an ordering problem, Spier said. "You-

ve got to know when to get in and when to get out." A recent example he offered was mood rings. At Christmas, he said, they were "selling like crazy" Today, their selling potential has all but disappeared. "But you know," he said, "we still sell a few hula-hoops along."

Employees at Spiers include Mrs. Lee Welch, who has worked in the store for over 14 years; Mrs. Vera Johnson, a worker for almost 13 years, Wanda Holman, and Joanne Formway, who sews alterations.

The Spiers have two daughters, Gina, aged 10, and Brigett, 6.

Religious Point of View: Angels discussed

Often the minister is asked about the possibility of life on other worlds. The Christian who believes in Christ and the Heavenly Father has no problem with the possible existence of other life forms in the Universe. In fact, the Christian who reads his Bible, knows for certain that man is not the only creature that God made. God asked Job one day: "Where were you when I created the earth, and the Sons of God shouted for joy?" The answer is that man hadn't even been heard of, God hadn't yet created him.

The Bible tells of at least three other creatures that God created. (1) The cherubim creatures mentioned in Genesis (3:24). They appeared in the Garden of Eden and their purpose was to guard the gate into the garden to keep man out. Their appearance was like fire. It is said that they had "flaming swords." (2) The Seraphim creatures (Isaiah 6). These were seen by the Prophets Isaiah and Ezekiel. They surrounded the throne of God and moved as lightning to do the bidding of the Lord. They often appeared so it seems in the Bible with chariots of fire as indicated in the case of Elijah being taken into heaven in a chariot of fire. (3) There is the angel of the Lord, who appeared to men throughout the ages. He had the appearance of a man and was sometimes mistaken for man. This is why the Bible says: "Be careful, to entertain strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares." In the Book of Revelation, the Apostle John who was visiting in heaven in the spirit mistook one of his own kind, a man, for one of these angelic creatures of God. He got on his knees before him, and the individual lifted him up and said: "I am only a man like yourself, get up off of your knees."

These angelic creatures of God seem to be the highest of all God's creatures. They are highly intelligent. They seem to have a life form different than that of manking. They dwell in the heavens and the "heaven of heavens" is said to be their native home (Matt 24:36). They "excel in strength" (Ps. 104:4). They are like gentlemen-in-waiting to the King and are said to minister unto the Ancient of days (Dan 7:10). They are "holy" (Matt 25:21). The word "holy" means, other, separated, beyond time, matter, and perhaps space. Their countenances are like "lightning" (Matt 28:3). They surround the throne of God (Rev. 5:11). Through the angels He carries on the government of the world.

There are some interesting accounts in the Bible involving these creatures of God. When Elisha, the Prophet of God, was in Dothan surrounded by the Syrian army, his servant cried: "Alas, how shall we do?" The Prophet prayed that the Lord would open his spiritual eyes to see. The Lord opened his eyes and he saw the "mountain full of chariots of fire round about" (II Kings 6:15-17).

Elijah was carried into heaven in a chariot of fire. An eye witness account stated that a fiery chariot separated Elijah from Elisha and that Elijah was carried into the heavens. His body was never found although 50 of the Prophets of God searched for it for days.

The Bible indicates that there are various ranks, thrones, principalities, and powers in the angelic kingdom (Eph. 1:22; Col 1:16). (See the Critical and Expository Cyclopaedia, p. 38).

There are angels of Satan (Matt. 25:41; II Cor. 12:7; Rev. 9:11). There are principalities, powers, and spiritual wickedness in heavenly places (Eph 6:12).

The Apostle Paul spoke of a man passing through three heavens and seeing things "not lawful to speak about." Most Bible scholars feel that he was speaking of himself.

It seems that the angelic creatures of God come and go from the earth as represented in the dream of Jacob who saw a ladder extending into the heaven with its bottom resting upon the earth. He saw the angels of God ascending and descending upon it.

Guatemala Relief fund

Contributions are still being accepted for the Guatemalan Relief Fund which was begun here by local representatives of the Red Cross shortly after the disaster.

As of Feb. 13 the Guatemalan Red Cross reported 17,032 dead and 54,825 injured as a result of the recent earthquakes. The toll is now reported to be considerably higher. In addition, more than one million people are homeless.

The American Red Cross and Guatemalan Red Cross estimate that their needs for cash will be in excess of four million dollars. Individual donations of clothing and food cannot be accepted by the American Red Cross for two reasons: First, the cost of transporting these items is too expensive and, second,

the stature of the Guatemalans is considerably smaller than that of United States citizens and their taste in food differs considerably from ours.

Cash donations will be used to purchase specifically needed medical supplies, beans, rice, sugar, tents, coats and blankets which are priority items of need and will be purchased in Guatemala or adjacent countries and the United States.

Contributions may be left at the Donley County State Bank or at the Farmer's State Bank and earmarked for Guatemalan Relief.

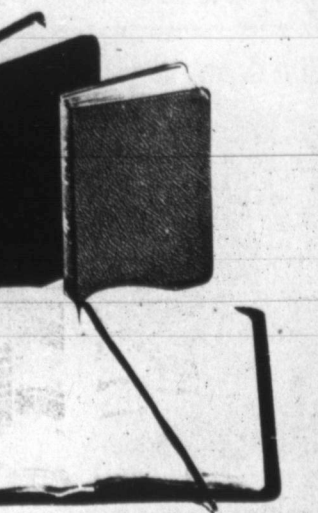

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Girl Scout Week begins Sunday, local scouting history recalled

Little documented information is available concerning scouting organizations for Clarendon girls before 1950.

Most of the facts about these early days of scouting here must be obtained from the recollections of early scout leaders. From these memories, however, a few names and events have been established.

Clarendon's scouting organization for girls was a troop of Campfire Girls active in this area as early as the mid-twenties. This early girl's organization helped build the Clarendon City Park in 1925. Volunteers from the organization transported rocks used to build the park's rock bridge and flower bed borders.

This group of Campfire Girls was active until the early forties, but apparently was discontinued during the war years. This early organization for girls had their own camp. They called it Wo-Hi-Lo, deriving the name from the shortened versions of their motto, Work Help and Love. The Campfire Girls Camp was located on land owned by Walter Goldston directly south of Clarendon's old Country Club, northwest of town.

At first the camp was merely open land, completely undeveloped and the girls would pitch their tents for over-night camp outs in the open. In the later twenties or early thirties the businessmen of Clarendon donated money and labor to build a rock house which served as a mess hall for the camp. This rock house still stands today.

Campfire Girls received instruction in cooking, swimming and Indian crafts. J.P. Rhoades, one of Clarendon's first Eagle Scouts, was a lifeguard at the Campfire Girls' camp pool. He also taught swimming.

The Campfire girls had a system for achievement awards similar to Boy Scouts merit badges. Rather than badges, Campfire Girls would receive a different colored Indian bead for completion of some learning skill. These beads were worn in a necklace. Some of the categories for earning Indian beads were camping, cooking, health, art and music.

Some early Campfire Girl leaders were Mrs. Julia Caraway, Mrs. Reeford Blackwell, Mrs. U.J. Boston and Mrs. Major Hudson. Younger girl leaders who helped with the troop were Miss Mary Frances Caraway, Miss Lorena Steagall, Miss Mildred Martin and Miss Lodi Green.

Other campfire leaders during these early years were Mrs. Carol McClellan, Mrs. Bob Allen, Mrs. Bertie Speed, Mrs. Major Hudson, Mrs. Jennie Smith, Mrs. Helen Boo Lowe, Mrs. Pete Borden, Mrs. Will P. Chamberlain, Mrs. John Horn, Mrs. R.Y. King, and Mrs. Dick Vallance.

The first scout troop organized in Clarendon was formed in 1946 by Mrs. Capp Morris. Another girl scout troop organized by Mrs. Will P. Chamberlain and assisted by Mrs. Pete Borden was active in Clarendon in 1948.

Mrs. Mary Frances McCully became leader of Girl Scout Troop 4 in 1950. There was also a Brownie Troop organized in 1951.

From 1953 - 59, Mrs. J.N. Weaver, public school music teacher, was instrumental in keeping some troops active

and interest alive in scouting. Mrs. Athlyn Estlack was leader of Troop 4 in 1954 - 55. Her assistants were Mrs. Avis Benson and Mrs. Kathleen Yankie. Both it and the Brownie Troop were sponsored by the B & PW Club.

became Troop 182 and the other one 184 after the council was formed. Mrs. Jeanne Gilkey was its first leader, assisted by Mrs. Genevieve Caldwell. Later Mrs. Lucille Swinney was named leader.

There was also a Brownie Troop in 1959. The leaders were Mrs. Joe Pfeiffer and Mrs. Nancy Shelton. That year, for the July 4th parade, they made a "Brownie Flower Garden" which won first place in the floats. They assembled it in Noland's Garage, which is now the offices of Vera Lewis.

Sponsoring organizations for these troops were: Beta Sigma Phi, St. John the Baptist Episcopal Church and the Lions Club. The latter is the present sponsoring organization for all Girl Scouting in the Clarendon neighborhood.

The present Quivira Girl Scout Council was formed in 1959 by members of the Development Committee. Serving on this committee from Donley County were Mrs. Genevieve Caldwell and Mrs. Frances Deyhle.

On March 4, 1960, a banquet was held in the Starlight Ballroom of the Coronado Inn at Pampa to launch the new ten - county council. This marked the beginning of real, coordinated growth and interest in Girl Scouting. Trained, professional help, providing better service to all girls and workers and an expanded camping program. Emmett Simmons was Chairman of the Fund Drive that enabled Clarendon to make its first contribution towards the new council.

The first Neighborhood Chairman was Mrs. Jeanne Gilkey, 1960 - 62. By 1961, two Brownie troops were active and there were two Intermediate troops.

Genevieve Caldwell became Neighborhood Chairman in 1962. It was in the spring of this year, on Girl Scout Sunday, that a Tea was held in Fellowship Hall of the First Methodist Church in commemoration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of Girl Scouting - 1912 - 1962.

By 1970, there were two Brownie troops organized and another Junior troop. Mrs. Newhouse organized two Junior troops (the term Junior being used now instead of Intermediate).

Mrs. Genevieve Caldwell took the job of Neighborhood

Chairman again in 1969. There was only one active Junior troop at this time. Mrs. Lucille Swinney took the troop. This later became the first Cadette troop in Clarendon girl scout history.

By 1970, there were two Brownie troops organized and another Junior troop. Today there are three Brownie troops, (first graders were allowed to become Brownies three years ago), three Junior troops, and one Cadette troop and two girls who are Senior scouts, comprising 96 girls.

In 1970, School Superintendent, Arling Cordell, gave the girl scouts a room in the old college building for a permanent home.

In 1971, the council bought the land and buildings north of town, that were formerly the Clarendon Country Club, and Camp Cibola came into being.

This camp is used by all girls in the council and provides a place for both Day Camp and Established Camp. Money from Girl Scout cookie sales paid for the camp and all cookie sale proceeds go towards maintaining the camp.

Mrs. Genevieve Caldwell still works in the capacity of Neighborhood Chairman. The Clarendon Neighborhood is the only one in the Council to attain the ideal in scouting, which is one Girl Scout out of every three girls. The last two fund drives, headed by Mrs. Barbara Cosper and Mrs. Mary Neal Risley, have been far above average for a town of this size.

Junior Troop - 175 and Brownie Troop - 95 became Blue Ribbon Troops in 1974 - 75, the first Blue Ribbon Troops ever in Clarendon. Leaders of Troop 175 are Mrs. Judy McCully and Mrs. Geala Gunnels. Leaders of Troop 95 are Mrs. Linda Bell and assistants Mrs. Ruth Hancock and Mrs. Connie Robinson.

Four girls in Troop 175 are working on the God and

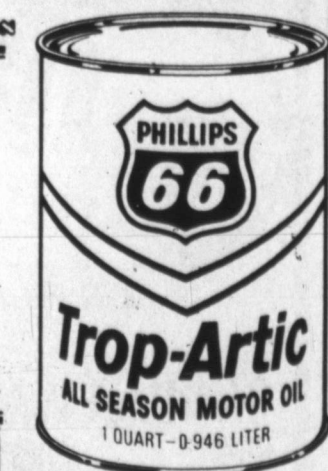
