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

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

Diversion Program President Johnson recently signed into law the 1964 Voluntary Wheat Program. All wheat producers were mailed pamphlets explaining the program. If you wish to take part in the program, you must sign up before May 15, 1964. There are some excptions to this date, however, if you are in compliance with your present allotment, or if you plan to divert any acreage in addition to the mandatory 10% you must sign your application by May 1, 1964. 




