## Clarendon Jaycees Take Highest Honors At State Convention

President Hubert Kidd and Past President Chauncey Hommel attended the Texas Jaycee Convention this past week end and brought home almost all the first place awards that were presented to clubs in Division I, which consists of cities under 5,000 in population.

For the 1963-64 Jaycee year, Chauncey Hommel was presented with the Most Outstanding President Award in Division I. Delbert Robertson received the Pacesetter Award and the club received the Edward B. Picton Memorial Award for their efforts in the Cancer Crusade. Special awards were presented to members of the local club: Roadrunner Award (those receiving a minimum of 200 points for visitations to other Jaycee Clubs and attendance at National, State, Area, Regional and local functions), those receiving this award include Chauncey Hommel, Delbert Robertson, W. Bradshaw, Roland Hill, Hubert Kidd, Lee Johnson, Bright Newhouse, Ervin Willard, and Robbert Mills; Tall Texan Award (those bringing in a minimum of three new members during Jaycee Career), those receiving this award include Delbert Robertson, W. R. Bradshaw, Hubert Kidd, Billy Mac Hicks, Billy White, Chauncey Hommel, John Payne, and Richard Tunnell.

The local Jaycees certainly had a fine year last year and by receiving these awards they brought recognition for Clarendon throughout the State as they were only surpassed by one other club in the number of State Awards that they received and that was by the Houston Jaycees in Division V which received nine awards.

The comments of the local club were that they had a real fine year and will be doing their best to top this record next year under the leadership of their new President, Hubert Kidd, who is employed by the General Telephone Company here and who made it possible for him to attend the State Convention and devote his time to serve as local President.

Past President Hommel and the entire membership will be looking forward to the National Jaycee Convention in Dallas on June 22nd for they will be entering the same categories and are very hopeful of bringing home some National Awards. The awards that the Jaycees won will be on display at the Farmers State Bank if anyone cares to go by to see them.

Saturday will be the big day for voters when they go to the polls to cast their vote for favorite candidates in the first Democratic Primary and Sunday will be the big day for some of the candidates, for that will be the day when election returns are known and the victors can rejoice.

There are numerous heated races from national politics on down to the local level and one of the largest turnout of voters in recent years is expected. This is strongly indicated by the 86 absentee ballots that had been cast by the deadline Tuesday.

Tunnell Pharmacy will hold the usual Election Party Saturday night with the Donley County results being posted on blackboards in front of the store as returns come in.

A sample ballot is being published in this issue of the Leader through the courtesy of Bill Cornell, candidate for Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector. The ballot shows all candidates in the various races but only candidates on the local level concerning your particular precinct in addition to the district, state and national candidates will appear on the ballot you will use Saturday so there will be no confusion. For example — Ballots for Precinct No. 1 will show only one candidate for County Commissioner where the Ballots for Precinct No. 3 will show four candidates.

There are four in the race for Governor with John Connally and Don Yarborough as the two main contenders; Preston Smith of Lubbock is expected to win quite easily over his opponent. It's an all-out battle between Gordon McLendon and Ralph Yarborough for U.S. Senator. There are five candidates in the race for U.S. Representative-at-Large and Attorney

General Waggoner Carr is unopposed. John C. White is opposed by Millard Shivers for Commissioner of Agriculture and Jerry Sadler is opposed by Fred H. Williams for Commissioner of the General Land Office. Both White and Sadler are expected to come out on top. Jim C. Langdon is expected to out-run Jesse Owens in the Railroad Commissioner race and Jack Pope is the more popular candidate for the Supreme Court job.

Getting closer to home, Herbert C. Martin is expected to be favored in Donley County in the Court of Civil Appeals, 7th District. His opponent, Ernest O. Northcutt, present holder of the office, went against the majority of local voters in the recent school issues when the case went before his court in Amarillo.

Congressman Walter Rogers is unopposed and W. S. (Bill) Heatly, State Representative is expected to receive very little opposition from his opponent, James E. Thomas. In the District Judge race it appears to be a hot race between Allen Harp and Charles Reynolds up until the final votes are counted. John R. Gillham is unopposed for District Attorney.

Here in Donley County, politics has really perked up the past week with several contested races which should draw out every eligible voter.

There are four candidates in the Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector race and a run-off is expected for the second Democratic Primary. Incumbent Truett Behrens is opposed by Lonnie (Bill) Cornell, Vergil T. McPherson and L. E. (Dock) Yankee.

Heavy campaigning has been quite evident in the race for County Attorney with Bill Lowe being opposed by Clyde Slavin. Clarence Reynolds is unopposed for Commissioner of Precinct No. 1 but Frank Murray in Precinct No. 3 drew three opponents who are Woodrow W. Farris, Junior Hill and A. G. Alexander. Mary S. Cooke, present County Democratic Chairman is opposed by Clifford Johnson of Hedley.

Other county candidates unopposed are Ruth M. Richerson, County School Supt.; R. C. Hill, Constable, Precinct No. 2; M. O. Weatherly, Justice of Peace, Precinct 3; and the four Democratic Precinct Chairmen, Hubert Rhoades, Mrs. Dick Shelton, Henry Moore and C. P. Hamilton.

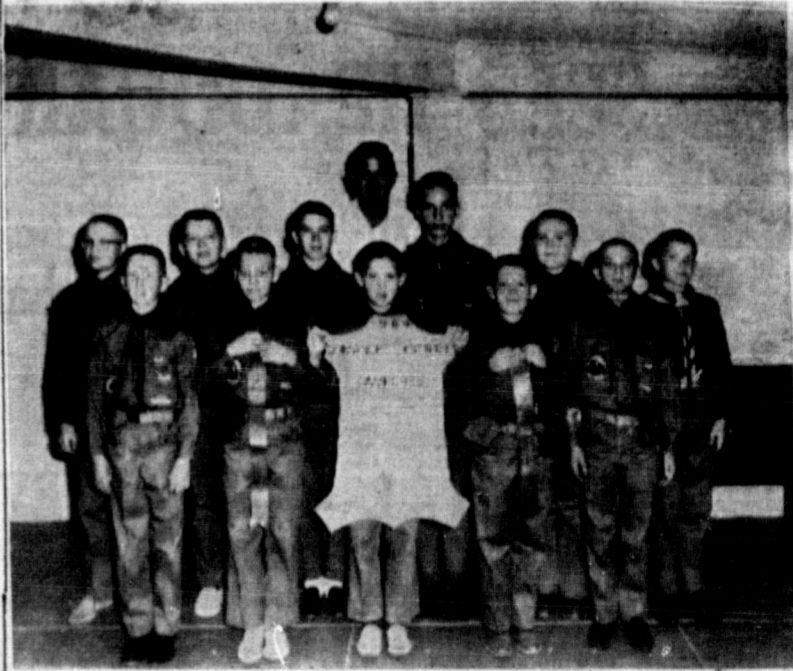
## LOCAL GIRL IN AREA SPELLING BEE

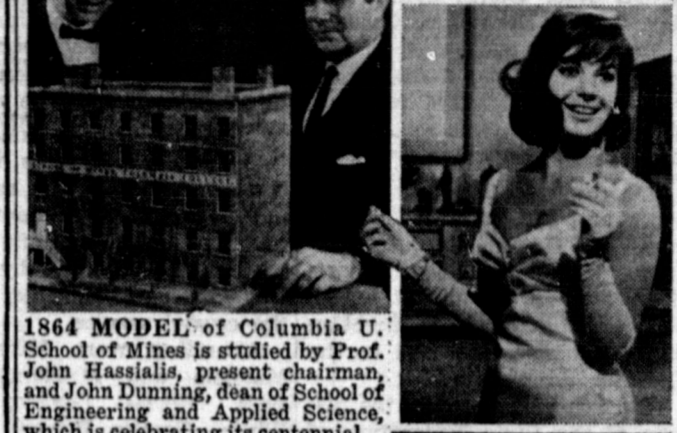

# FARM NEWS

from County ASCS Committee

## The 1964 Wheat Diversion Program

President Johnson recently signed into law the 1964 Voluntary Wheat Program. All wheat producers were mailed pamphlets explaining the program. If you wish to take part in the program, you must sign up before May 15, 1964. There are some exceptions to this date, however, if you are in compliance with your present allotment, or if you plan to divert any acreage in addition to the mandatory 10% you must sign your application by May 1, 1964. Those who sign up and participate in the program will be eligible for payments, certificates and price support loans. Wheat marketing certificates will be issued for an amount of wheat equal to 90% of the normal production of your wheat allotment. This will be similar to the price support payment on feed grains. It would be best for all wheat producers to come into the office before May 1 and let us talk with you about the program.

## The New Program For Upland Cotton

Cotton growers now have available a new choice program to help maintain their income while reducing cotton supplies overhanging the market. The new program supplements the cotton program now in effect. The farm allotments already established for the 1964 crop are still in force. As a cotton producer, you may choose three ways to go — (1) you may plant within your effective allotment, which is the allotment after release and reapportionment, (2) you may choose to plant within your domestic allotment, which in most cases will be approxi-

mately 67% of your effective allotment, or (3) you may plant your 1964 farm allotment plus up to 5% of the allotment as export cotton acreage provided you file an application for such acreage by June 1 and furnish bond within 15 days after filing. The Community Committeemen met last week and are completing work on setting the yields for individual farms. You will be mailed a notice of your domestic allotment, normal yield, and rate per acre of the price support payment which will apply to the acres planted for harvest within the domestic allotment. Also you will receive in the near future additional information on the program.

## Diverted Acres

If you are participating in the 1964 Feed Grain Program remember you may not graze your diverted acres from May 1 through November 1, 1964.

## Wheat Program Changes

**Eligibility for price-support loans and marketing certificates:** You will be eligible for a price-support loan, based on the National average of \$1.30 per bushel, if the wheat acreage on your farm is within the farm allotment even though you do not participate in the wheat program. You will be eligible for marketing certificates if you sign up to take part in the wheat program and (a) produce within your farm wheat allotment, (b) keep within your allotments for any other crops on the farm, (c) meet the program's conservation provisions on the participating farm, and (d) produce within the wheat allotment on any other farm in which you have an interest.

No change will be made in the wheat disposition dates and no change will be made in the grazing dates on designated diverted acres.

## Coast Guard Honors Cloyce Karnes Here

In ceremonies held at the regular Tuesday luncheon of the Lions Club, Cloyce W. Karnes, a former active Coast Guardsman, now a member of the Coast Guard Reserve, was presented the Coast Guard Commendation Medal by Lt. (jg) Edward J. Storey of New Orleans, La. The presentation was scheduled to be held in Mayor C. J. Lohoefer's office but was moved to the Lions Club.

Karnes was recommended for the medal while on active duty with the Coast Guard on Nov. 8, 1963, serving as coxswain of the vessel CG-36434. His citation, signed by Adm. E. J. Roland, Coast Guard commandant, reads:

"For meritorious performance of duty on the evening of 8 Nov. 1963, while serving as coxswain of the CG-36434, engaged in removing two crew members from the sinking fishing vessel 'Princess,' disast' d on Sabine Pass West Jetty.

"The CG-36434 departed Sabine, Texas, passing through the jetty, to answer a distress call from another fishing vessel. However, when information was received that seas had carried the 'Princess' over the west jetty, tearing out the bottom of the vessel, the CG-36434 was diverted to proceed and assist. Upon arrival at the scene, Karnes found two crew members clinging to the stern of the boat, which was only partially above water.

"Despite extremely hazardous conditions, poor visibility and 15-foot seas, Karnes skillfully maneuvered the CG-36434 between the 'Princess' and the West Jetty and removed the two crew members just as the boat sank. The survivors were subsequently brought safely to shore. "Karnes displayed outstanding

courage and initiative throughout this rescue mission. His perseverance and unwavering devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Coast Guard."

## Adjustments Are Due In Postal Services

Limited adjustments in some postal services, ordered in Washington, D.C., on May 10 by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski to save \$12.7 million, will begin to take effect in Clarendon and other cities Monday, May 4, according to Postmaster Mike McCully. This tremendous saving will be realized primarily through conservation of man hours which naturally brings about some limitation in service. The main question in the minds of the patrons of this office is how this limitation will effect me.

According to McCully, window service will be the first to feel the effect of limitation. Patrons should keep in mind that NO MONEY ORDERS WILL BE SOLD ON SATURDAY MORNING. All services offered at the window will be consolidated, and most of the time, there will only be one clerk to perform all of these services. With the exception of the money order service, virtually all other services will be offered, but at a little slower pace. Patrons are encouraged to transact as much of their postal business as possible during the week days.

For years, all citizens have been crying for economy, and like everything else, words alone won't bring about any economy. Someone has to initiate a little action, and this economy step, Postmaster McCully explained, is in line with President Johnson's programs under which the recent federal income tax cut was provided. These service adjustments and changes have been determined as necessary to substantially reduce the costs in the postal field service. People who now receive their mail at the general delivery window, may improve their service by renting a post office box. Gen-

eral delivery service is primarily for the use of transients only, and all permanent residents are supposed to have a box. We have plenty of boxes for rent starting at a nominal rental fee of 90 cents for a period of three months, and you will always receive your mail regardless of what day of the week it is.

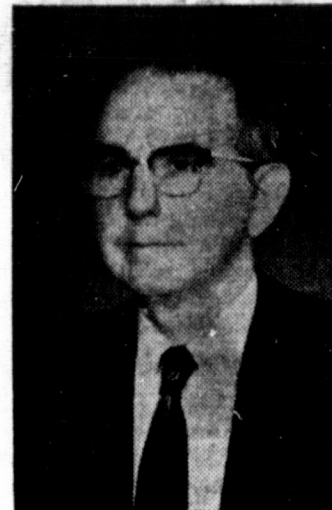

**Waco Judges Help Appeals Court Here**

The Texas Supreme Court apparently feeling that the docket of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo is overloaded, has directed the 10th Court of Civil Appeals in Waco to lend a helping hand.

Two members of the Waco court are in Amarillo today hearing oral arguments in the cases allotted them. The two judges are Chief Justice Frank G. McDonald and Associate Justice Frank M. Wilson.

The Texas Supreme Court in equalizing the dockets of the civil appeals courts in the state has assigned 13 of the appeals filed in Amarillo to the Waco court.

Under statute the cases must be heard in the court in which they are filed. For this reason the Waco judges are hearing arguments in Amarillo.

Elmo Payne, clerk of the Amarillo court, says the Amarillo judges heard oral arguments in nine cases on April 6-7 and currently are working on their decisions in those cases.

The Seventh Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo encompasses the largest Supreme Judicial District in the State of Texas — with 46 counties, Payne explained.

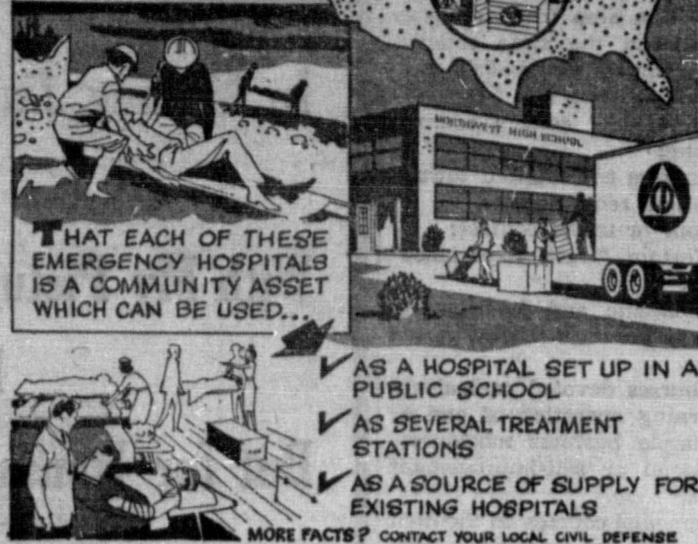

More than 1,300 Panhandle area residents gave me their views on the issues I presented by returning newsletter copies they had marked or by sending me marked clippings from the several area newspapers whose editors were kind enough to reprint the newsletter questions. The fact that so many persons answered the questionnaire reinforced my conviction that Americans are giving close attention to the problems confronting the country and the Congress. There has been no time in our history when the United States was free of problems of a complex and difficult nature, and finding solutions to them — in a free, democratic Republic — requires that the citizens who are the Government be well informed.

School enrollment is continuing to increase steadily, according to the latest report from the Census Bureau. About 50.4 million persons were enrolled in regular schools and colleges in October, 1963, compared with 42.9 million in October, 1958. This is an increase of about 17.4 percent during the five-year period.

**SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS**

**Sand Sagebrush Control**

Brush and weed control is the best means of range improvement per dollar invested we know for sandy sage range. For a range to be suitable for sage control, it should have a good showing of blue grama and should not be the high dune type of range. With proper management you can expect to increase your grass production 50% or more for 10 to 20 years.

About 75% of the sand sagebrush can be killed by spraying in May or early June, but only if the plants are growing actively and after they have reached full leaf. One pound of 2-4-D either in 3-5 gallons of diesel or with a water-oil emulsion should be used. This should be kept well agitated to prevent separation of the material. This application will cost about \$3.00 per acre.

You may also control your sand sagebrush and weeds by mechanical means, using a brush beater or a mowing machine equipped with heavy duty parts. This is a very slow and costly operation. It must be done during the month of June for two consecutive years. Under either treatment the range will be deferred for the entire first growing season following treatment, unless the range condition is good or better following brush control and climax grasses are in a high state of vigor and production; and when pastures are large enough that the treated areas can be given reasonable protection from overuse by control of livestock.

The Donley County Soil Conservation District can furnish all information and cost-share information to any interested participants interested in Brush Control application.

AUSTIN — Texans will have ample opportunity to give their views on how the state should be divided into 33 congressional districts of equal population. A seven-member study group of Texas Legislative Council (research arm of the Legislature) plans to begin extensive hearings over the state soon after the

May 2 primaries. Congressmen and party officers already have been invited to make suggestions as to how districts should be drawn with approximately 416,000 population each. U.S. Supreme Court has supported a Houston federal court ruling that the districts must be

formed to provide "equal representation for equal numbers of people" as nearly as possible. The Houston court on April 1 agreed that the Legislature should have a chance to do the job in regular session of 1965. Sen. George Moffett of Chillocothe, senior member of the Legislature in point of service, heads the study committee which will conduct the hearings. Other members are Sen. Abraham Kazen, Jr., of Laredo, and Reps. Paul Floyd of Houston, Tommy Shannon of Fort Worth, Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge, Richard C. Slack of Pecos, and G. F. Mutscher of Brenham. Gov. John Connally praised Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr for his representation of the state during the redistricting case. He said work of Carr and his as-

sistants made it possible for the state to "hold our 1964 congressional elections without the requirement of a special session or at-large (statewide congressional) races." COURT REFORMS — U.S. Supreme Court Justice Tom Clark came to Austin for the Texas Conference on Judicial Selection, Tenure and Administration, sponsored by the State Bar of Texas. Two hundred and fifty lawyers, judges and laymen talked about how to improve the Texas judicial system. Court organization and administration, and judicial selection, tenure, retirement, discipline and removal were discussed. Lawyers and judges from a dozen other states where court reforms have been enacted participated. AGING — Governor Connally revealed that 1,400 of the 3,500 senile patients in state mental hospitals have been moved to private nursing homes in the last year. He told his Committee on Aging that this is one method being used to better the lot of older, ill persons. Many have been sent to mental hospitals because there was no place else for them to go. But under the new Federal-state program of paying nursing home costs of the ailing aged, those not really mentally ill can be taken out of the state hospitals. He urged the committee, headed by Sen. Walter Richter of Gonzales, to find further ways of bettering the lot of older Texans. HIGHER EDUCATION — Texas Commission on Higher Education allocated \$3,980,000 in

appropriations to meet student enrollment increases in the 20 state-supported senior colleges for the coming school year. At the same time, the Commission took a step toward higher standards in the state colleges when it moved to abolish state financial support for "questionable" or "frill" college courses, including: 1. Courses not counted toward graduation requirements; 2. Tour or travel courses; 3. Certain "work experience" courses; 4. Dramatic and forensic activities not in regularly organized classes; 5. Courses devoted exclusively to learning operation of one or two simple business machines; 6. Social or self-improvement courses; 7. Remedial courses on the high school level not carrying college credit; 8. Orientation courses aimed at counseling or guidance of freshmen students. Commission approved recommendations to strengthen graduate and research programs in the North Texas area and authorized new third and fourth-year courses for Angelo State College, San Angelo. COURTS SPEAK — Fifty-third District Judge Herman Jones granted the first injunction sought by the state to enforce the new small loan act. Action was against E. L. Parker, operator of an Austin liquor store, whom Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell alleged was lending money at rates in excess of 10 percent without

obtaining the required state license. State Supreme Court knocked out a state law granting a land-

owner, whose property is surrounded by another's, right of way across the neighbor's land. (Cont. on Page 5)

Its decision, overturning lower courts, denied Baylor County rancher Wilmer Clegghorn authority to a road through the W. T. Waggoner ranch.

An El Paso army sergeant convinced the Supreme Court it should hear arguments on April 22 in his suit for Texas voting rights. Many servicemen have complained about state regula-

tions which permit them to vote only in the county where they resided on entering service.

Texas Court of Criminal Appeals rejected the third appeal of Billie Sol Estes from an eight-year prison sentence for swindling. However, the court made technical corrections in its earlier opinion which enables Estes to file another motion for rehearing.

Court of Criminal Appeals ordered a new trial for a Bandera County man convicted of sheep

theft. He was sentenced to life imprisonment for the theft of one sheep after the jury learned he had two prior convictions for passing bad checks.

Court ruled that state's attorneys had failed to prove the man's guilt, since the sheep-theft charge was filed by one rancher but testimony centered around "suspicious activities" of the convicted man in the pasture of another rancher who had not filed charges.

**APPOINTMENTS** — John P. Thompson and R. L. Thornton, Jr., both of Dallas, were named by Governor Connally to Texas Turnpike Authority.

Thornton succeeds his late father for a term expiring February 15, 1967. Thompson succeeds the late Bert Fields for a term expiring February 15, 1969.

Charles H. King, Jr., also of Dallas, was sworn in on April 15 as Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

**WATER** — Oil operators in the New and Old Batson and Sour Lake Fields of Hardin County were given a warning by Texas Railroad Commission to dispose of their salt water "in satisfac-

tion manner." However, the commission decided not to issue an order banning the use of open disposal pits.

Lower Neches Valley Authority asked for the hearings on the ground that oilfield salt water was polluting streams from which Beaumont and its industries get water.

**VETERANS LAND SALE SET** — Twenty-two forfeited veterans land tracts in seven counties will be offered for sale on May 12, Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has announced.

Bids on the tracts in Guadalupe, Hidalgo, Maverick, Uvalde, Wilson, Zavala, and Culberson Counties must be received at Sadler's office by 10 a.m. on date of sale.

**OIL ALLOWABLE SET** — Texas Railroad Commission set May oil production allowable at 2,800,000 barrels daily for prorated wells, based on production at 28.5 percent of potential. That's a decrease from the 29 percent formula of the last three months and 2,900,000 barrels daily for April.

Figure still is the highest for May in the last five years.

**OPINIONS** — The attorney general held in opinions:

That the new Ector County detention facilities for juveniles and adult women do not properly separate the boys from the girls and juveniles from grownups;

That county court misdemeanors or defendants do not have an absolute right to see the prospective juror list before trial;

And that prison inmates are eligible for parole consideration after serving two years (one-fourth) of a two-to-eight year sentence.

**SHORT SNORTS** — General revenue fund deficit as of April 13 has risen to \$38,800,000, State Treasurer Jesse James calculated, with balance in all state funds at \$17,100,000.

Attorney General Carr testified in opposition to federal control of radiation source users in Texas and five other states. Governor Connally announced 105 separate schools and 3,400 trainees authorized in the state-federal Manpower Development and Training program already have graduated 1,000 trained workers from the retraining program.

State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners accredited four new schools: Municipal Hospital at Winters; Wintemute Memorial Hospital, Klondike; Terrell School of Vocational Nursing, Terrell; and Ennis Municipal Hospital, Ennis.

A total of \$725,445 in judgments has been entered against operators of alleged slant oil wells in East Texas, according to Attorney General Carr. Texas Highway Department announced that 1965 license plates will have three letters and three digits (Example: AAA-123) for about eight million possible combinations. Discovery of a case of scabies in a feed lot at Hart (Castro County) led to a new requirement that the 500,000 cattle shipped to California annually must be certified as free of the disease, according to noti-

fication received by Texas Animal Health Commission.

**ONTARIO, CALIF., REPORT:** "On the New York Stock Exchange tobacco issues have gone down somewhat. But in many areas cigarette sales have gone up. Apparently some chain smokers were afraid that their favorite commodity might be taken off the market."

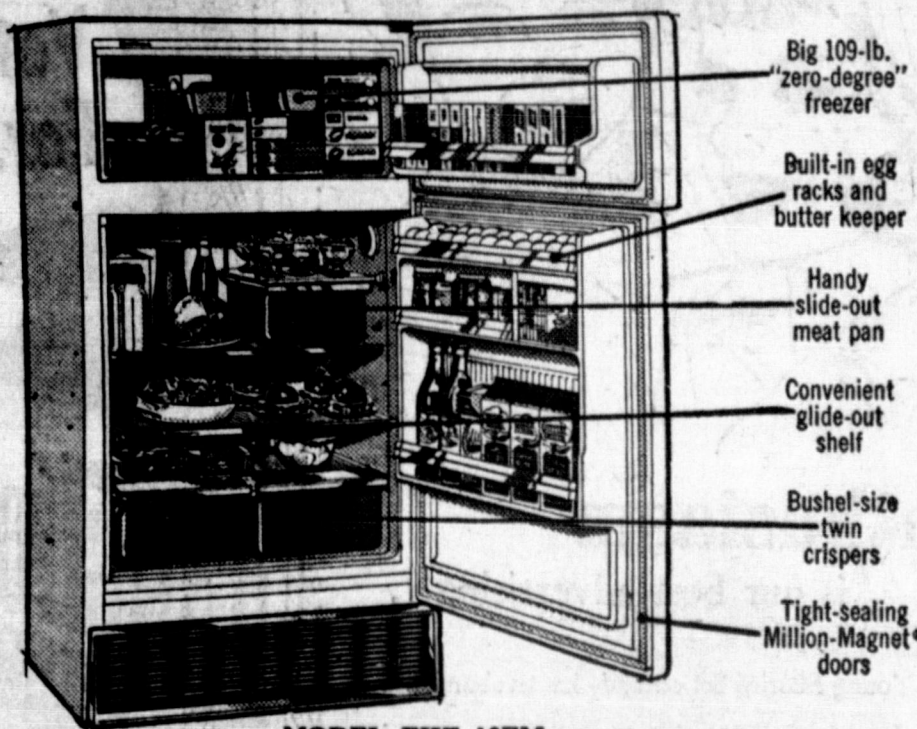
