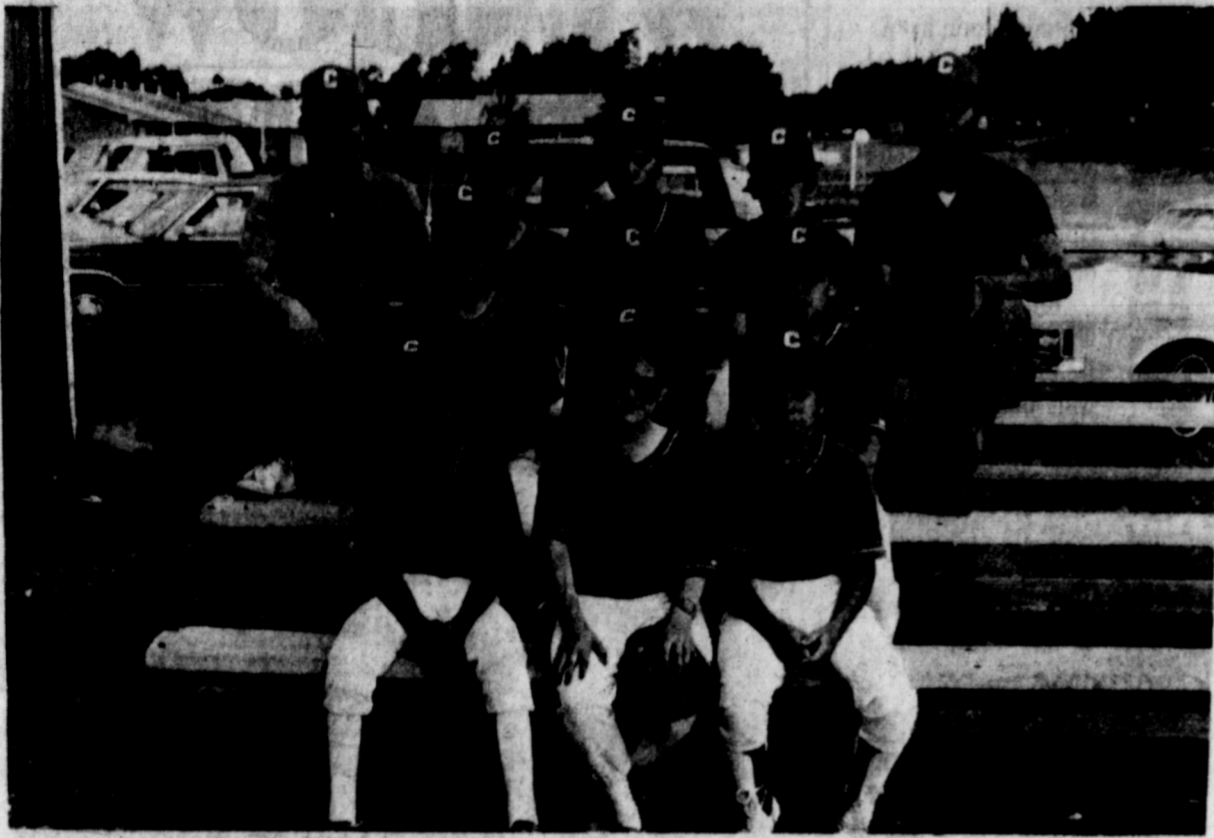

Property owners whose appraised

value on any property has risen more than \$1,000.00 have been mailed a notice of this year's value compared to last year's value in the form of an appraisal notice.

Charles SoRelle, Chief Appraiser stated that almost all value increases cover newly acquired property (mostly automobiles). Market values of land and houses have generally stayed the same or lowered during the last year.

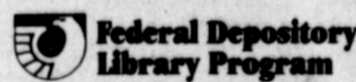

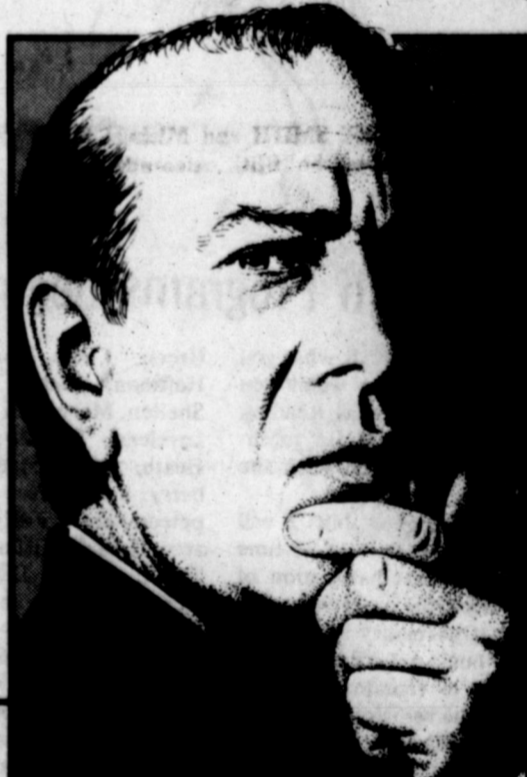

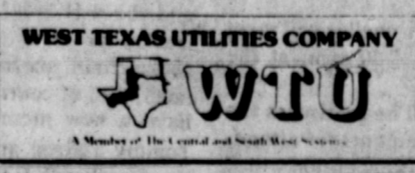

# Top O' Texas Rodeo July 11-13

Plans are complete for the 39th Annual Top O' Texas Rodeo to be held in Pampa, July 11-13 with performances at 8:00 p.m.

Bonnie Beaudin of Elk City, Oklahoma is returning to Pampa to produce this year's rodeo. Clem McSpadden, former senator from Oklahoma, will be at the microphone once again this year to describe the action in the arena.

The "Country Critters," a western band from across San Antonio, will cue the rodeo events. The "critters" will give a 15 minute concert at 7:30 p.m. before each performance and will also give concerts in various shopping areas of Pampa.

The Pikes Peak Rangerettes, a precision all girl drill team, from Colorado Springs, Colorado will be an added attraction to this year's show. The group will be featured prior to, as well as during, each performance.

This year on Thursday, July 11th starting at 5:30 p.m. there will be a free barbeque for ticket holders.

Joel Weaver and Saturday Night Heros will play for the rodeo dance on Friday night, July 12 and Vern Gosdin will play for the featured artist on Saturday night, July 13. The dances will be held in the Clyde Carruth Pavilion and will begin at 9:00 p.m. each night.

Ted Kimsey and Roach Hedaman will be the bullfighters and funny-men at this year's show. Vickie Tyler has combined showmanship, beautiful wardrobes and the rare art of trick riding and roman riding to give rodeo spectators the thrill and excitement they expect when she enters the arena.

Entries for the PRCA and GRA members will open July 5 at 11:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. and close July 8 at 11:00 a.m. (Mountain time). To enter, call the Central Entry Office at 1-800-525-7157. Gray County entries will be taken at the Rodeo Office in the Chamber of Commerce from 9:00 a.m. July 1 until July 3, 5:00 p.m.

The rodeo parade will be held Saturday, July 13 at 10:30 a.m. featuring entries from all areas of the Panhandle.

An Amateur Jackpot Double Muggin event will be offered, with an entry fee of \$35.00 plus a \$5.00 stock charge. Entry fees will be split 80%, 30%, 20%, and 10%.

The Kid Pony Show, with events for children through age fifteen, will be held Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday evenings, July 8, 9, and 10 at 7:00 p.m. Entries will open July 1 at 9:00 a.m. at the Rodeo Office Headquarters in the Chamber of Commerce office. Children in that age range are invited to participate.

General admission tickets for the rodeo performances may be purchased from various Pampa merchants or the Rodeo Office. Reserved seats may be secured by calling 806/669-3241 or by writing Box 1942, Pampa, Texas 79065. They will go on sale in the Rodeo Office at 9:00 a.m., Monday, July 8th.

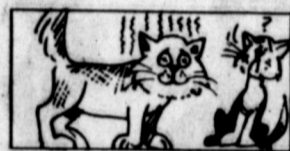
## Deidi Strickland is state officer at Girls State

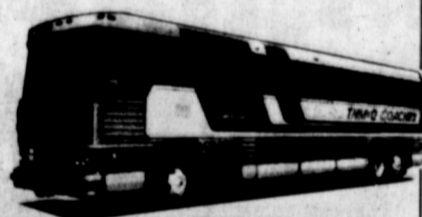

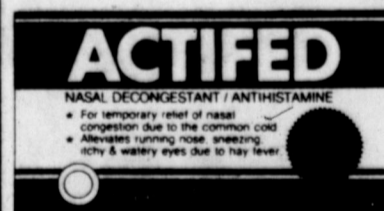

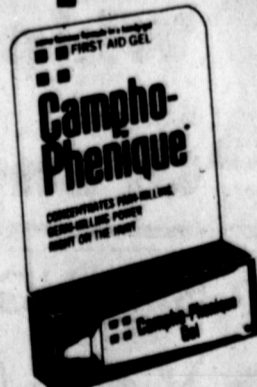

## Non-quota peanuts appear risky

Because of a record peanut crop last year that pushed stocks to huge levels, U.S. farmers likely will keep 1985 plantings within their allocated quotas.

Peanuts are the only crop grown under government quotas, which are designed mainly to control production and maintain price, points out Johnny Feagan, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System. Quota peanuts are supported by a government loan rate, which is \$559 a ton for 1985 basis grade peanuts, up \$9 from last year.

Farmers may plant additional acres of peanuts, but these are supported by a government loan rate of only \$148 per ton to discourage production. That rate was \$185 per ton last year. Additional peanuts designated for edible use in the export market only are supported by a loan rate of \$425 per ton, the same as in 1984, notes Feagan.

Peanut shellers, crushers and processors are showing a little interest in contracting for additional peanuts this year, the economist points out, so farmers need to look closely at the risk of planting non-quota peanuts. Feagan expects this situation to result in an overall decrease in U.S. peanut acreage.

Texas farmers will likely plant from 220,000 to 240,000 acres of peanuts this year, about 90 percent of their allocated quota. Other peanut-producing states also will average about 90 percent of their quota.

With rising production costs and declining loan rates for additional peanuts, farmers need to have a contract in hand before growing peanuts outside of their allocated quotas, says the economist.

Feagan believes that domestic use of peanuts will be up slightly in 1985 compared to last year due mainly to

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## Wagon Train names honorary wagonmasters

There are several well-known people in the state who have become very important to the Texas Wagon Train Association (TWTA) in the past few months.

Heading the list of important folks is Walt Garrison, the former Dallas Cowboy rusher and professional rodeo star.

Garrison, who is a native of Lewisville, TX, is currently a member of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association and still occasionally competes in steer wrestling or bull-dogging and calf roping.

He is currently the chief spokesman for SKOAL and a fulltime employee of U.S. Tobacco. Copenhagen Skoal/Skoal Bandits is also an official sponsor of the Wagon Train.

Garrison said he was excited about being named Honorary Wagon Master because the Wagon Train will give people a chance to see history as it was during the early days of Texas.

"I'm honored to be part of the Sesquicentennial Wagon Train Tour," he said. "It's a brand new ball game for me. This is a once in a lifetime event that's going to be filled with challenges."

Joining Garrison as the Dallas Region's Assistant Honorary Wagon Master will be his former coach Tom Landry. Landry, who started coaching the Dallas Cowboys in 1960, grew up in Mission, TX and attended the University of Texas. Landry played five years for the New York Giants starting in 1950 and then served as defensive coach through 1959. He will start his 26th year as head coach of the Dallas Cowboys this coming football season.

The Cowboys Center at the Valley Ranch, the new Dallas Cowboys training facility, recently signed on as an official Wagon Train sponsor.

Landry's counterpart for the Fort Worth region is night club owner Billy Bob Barnett. Barnett, 37, is the owner of Billy Bob's Texas, the world largest night club, located in the historic Fort Worth Stockyards. Billy Bob's will figure prominently in the celebration at the end of the Wagon Train's tour which will end on July 3, 1986.

Motion carried to pay \$250 for one year to Panhandle Transit, with the understanding that the City of Clarendon will pay \$500.00 and the City of Hedley will pay \$250.00.

\*Approved request presented by the General Telephone Company for underground line, according to County specifications.

Motion carried to furnish the Al Morrah Shrine Club freedom of courthouse lawn for barbeque on July 4th and to place 4 latrines on the courthouse lawn to be used by the public.

\*Motion carried to apply for Federal assistance for a bridge on county road 200 and 201. This bridge will be on Skillet Creek on west side of FM 2695.

Motion carried to accept a contract with Chamberlain Motor Co. for 4 four door V-8 engine sedans to be used by the local Sheriffs department. Chamberlain Motor Co. is to furnish and service the vehicles for everything except insurance, glass breakage, collision damage and tires. This contract is in the amount of \$13,750 on all four vehicles for one year. The combined mileage allowed will be 130,000 miles for the four vehicles combined. If the mileage exceeds 130,000 miles there will be a surcharge of 10c per mile for all miles over and above the 130,000 miles.

Unfortunately, a similar notice can be found on many Christians today: "Service not included."

Paul writes in I Corinthians 6:19, 20: "What? Know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's."

When Christ redeemed (bought) us, He purchased our whole person. It is easy to give God credit for snatching our soul from hell and giving us an eternal home in heaven, but it is not so easy to yield Him ownership of our lives as well. 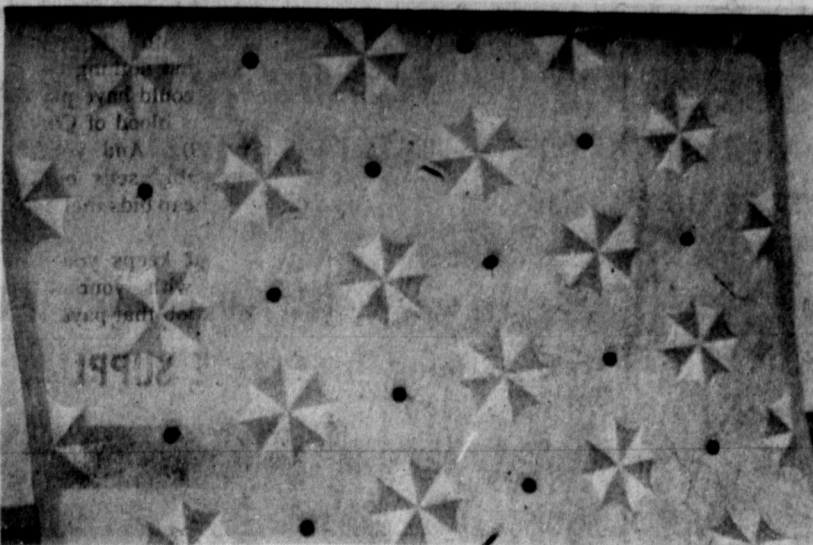
### DATING

Next week we shall see what the true Christian should be focusing upon for his lifestyle.



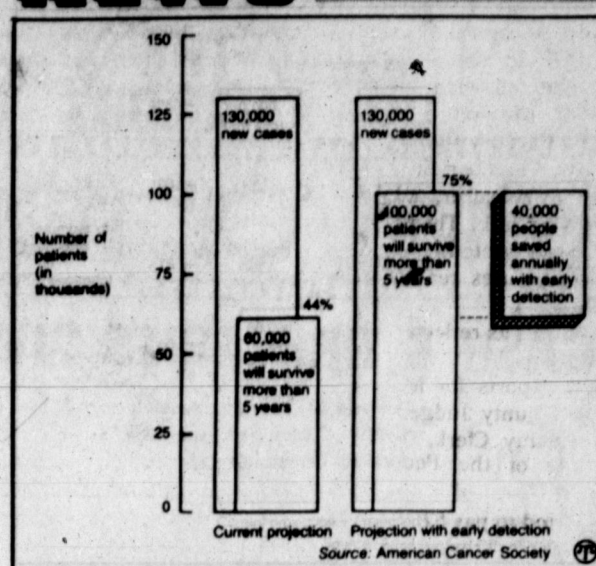
## Lakers Homemakers to give away quilt July 4th

## Economic conditions cause stress on farm and ranch families

The bitter economic realities of low prices, high debt loads and increased bankruptcies translate into stress for farmers, ranchers and their families.

"Even a strong family can be temporarily disorganized under stress," says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service family life specialist Dorothy Taylor. "When pressures become greater

than the strength of the family, or stress uses up all the family's resources, devastating effects like alcohol and drug abuse accidents or suicides result."

The specialist says that early signs or symptoms of too much stress are dreading to go to work, feeling tired all the time without cause, a change in sleeping habits and problems with digestion.

Becoming extremely critical, developing negative attitudes about everything and everybody, withdrawing from people, becoming self-centered, being unusually worried about your health and losing faith in other people and yourself are also signs of stress, she says.

"Farmers and ranchers who are going through stressful times and realize they are struggling unsuccessfully with their difficulties may fear they cannot regain control over

their situation and become depressed, confused or fear a nervous breakdown," Taylor observes.

Stress in farm or ranch families is not unusual, considering their close working relationship and the overlap of their personal, family and work lives, she notes.

But those families with open communication, shared decision-making and long-range planning seem to handle it better than those with little communication, authoritarian decision-making and day-to-day planning.

Developing communication, decision-making and planning skills may help families better cope with stressful situations Taylor says. But if farmers or ranchers notice the signs of severe stress in themselves or other family members, they should seek professional help.

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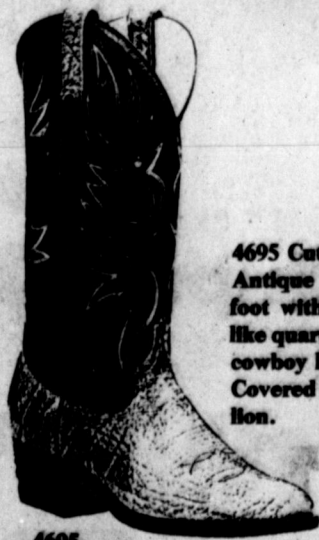

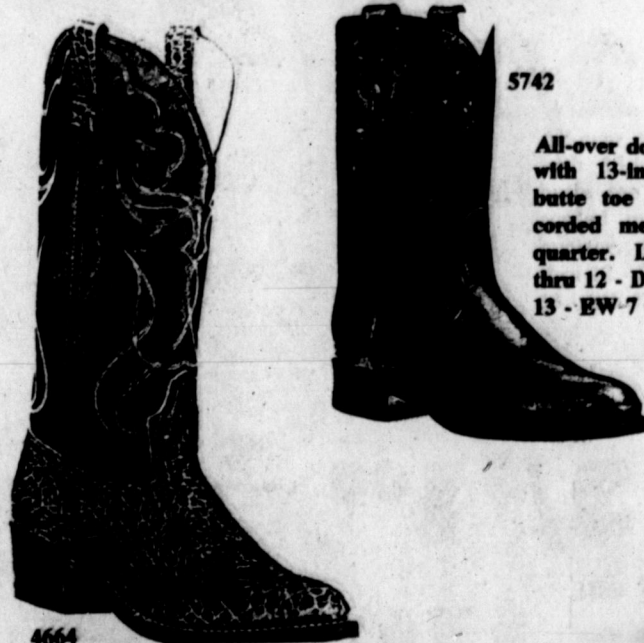

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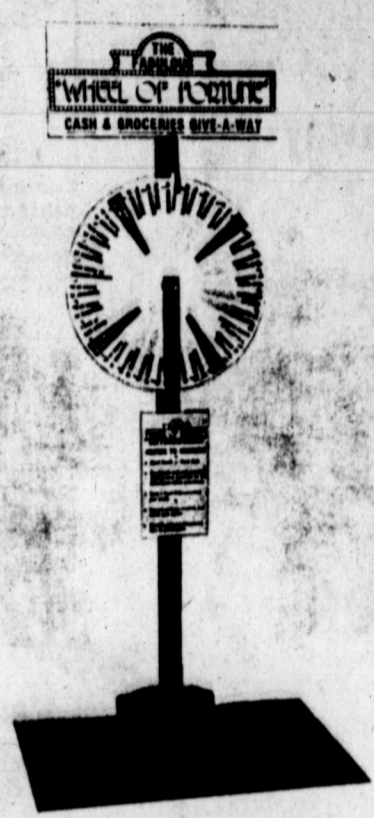
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
