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Bulldogs Open Home Season Friday Night Against Wayland College

The first home game of the 1965-66 Clarendon College basketball season will be played at the Bulldog Gym Friday as the Bulldogs host Wayland College. Tip-off is scheduled for 7:30 p.m.
The Bulldogs opened the basketball season Tuesday night at Wayland. The next home game is scheduled for Nov. 23 against Cisco College.
The Bulldogs lost to Wayland, 78-71, in a close contest Tuesday at Plainview. Dennis Stratton scored 23 for Clarendon.
New coach Lawrence Overcast has a young, inexperienced squad this season, but they will have plenty of game experience before Region V play starts on January 3.
Overcast has three sophomores on his team this year, although only two of them saw action either as player or starter last season under coach Billy White.
Alvin Alexander, 5-8, is the only returning full-time starter from the 1964 Bulldog cage team that ended the season with a 1-20 record. Gary Varnell, 6-4 of Wichita Falls Hirschi, started a few games last season for Clarendon and Tommy Thomson was the team manager. Thomson checked in his managers duties for the hardwood action.
What Clarendon lacks in experience, they could make up with almost skyscraper size. The Bulldogs have three players that touch 6-6—Leon Choate, Panhandle; Ray Guerrero, Miami, and Ricky Potts, Panhandle. Only Alexander of Hedley and James Norris, 5-11 of Tucumcari, N. M., are under six feet tall.
Alexander and Varnell are team captains this season.
The Bulldogs will operate off of a split post this season with some fast break. "We plan to play a conservative-type of basketball, but we will be able to fast break when the need opens," Overcast said.
Overcast is counting on David Wendrick, 6, Samnorwood; Dennis Shugart, 6-3, Clayton, N. M.; Dennis Stratton, 6-2, Amarillo Caprock and Roger Weems, 6-2 Wellington, to provide the necessary depth to produce a winner.
The Bulldogs have scheduled 12 home games this season, and season tickets are still available at a 50 per cent savings: \$6 for adults and \$3.50 for students. The tickets may be purchased at the college or at several businesses in Clarendon. They will not be on sale after December 16.
Single game tickets will sell for \$1 and 50 cents.

C of C Auction Set For November 27

The first of what is hoped to be a successful series of auctions sponsored by the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce is scheduled for 1:30 p.m., Saturday, November 27.
The auction will be held for, and by, members of the chamber. A \$5 retail value has been set by the retail activities committee of the chamber and all items must be sold. A professional auctioneer has been secured for the event.
All items will be sold on a cash basis only and the Chamber will receive five percent of the sale for a service charge.
"You will probably be able to pick up several Christmas gifts at good prices at the auction," a member of the committee stated Wednesday.
If the first auction is successful, they will be scheduled for each Saturday until Christmas. The last one will probably be scheduled for Christmas Eve.
"If the overall reports on the auction are successful," a committee spokesman said, "we will attempt to schedule an auction a month during 1966."

"A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court," a three-act comedy by Mark Twain, is being presented by the Clarendon College Drama Department. The presentation will feature the following cast of characters: John Cearly; Kenneth Price; Lonnie Roark; Maudena Self; Dolfia Valance; T. Rose Stepp; Todd Dyess; Patty Juno; and Buster Branum.
The story deals with the adventures of a Yankee from Connecticut who finds himself thrown back into the Middle Ages. He believes at first that he is in an insane asylum. But he is soon convinced that he actually is faced with a death sentence from King Arthur, and his ingenuity comes immediately to the fore. By predicting an eclipse of the sun, he saves his own skin, and becomes the idol of the kingdom. His power becomes so great that Merlin, the court magician, plots against him with several others. However, the Yankee builds up a complete twentieth century industrial empire in short order, and keeps the knights of the court completely baffled by his magic. What happens when he is lured away from the kingdom to investigate other domains will keep you in laughter and suspense from start to finish.

Two weeks from today, Donley County voters will go to the polls to cast their ballot in the Election to expand the present college district to embrace Donley County as a whole. This is not an annexation election and will not affect any school district other than the Clarendon Junior College District.

It will involve the school districts of Groom, Hedley, Quail, Alanreed, Lelia Lake and Bairfield which portion lies within the boundary of Donley County. The present college district is comprised of approximately 293 square miles. If the election carries, the district would be enlarged to approximately 900 square miles.

Those eligible to vote in this election are not only property owners but any person who has been a resident of the county the prescribed length of time, has paid his poll tax, has an exemption or is in the over age group.

If this election carries, it will be followed by a tax rate election and only those who have the above qualifications and who have rendered personal or real property for taxation, will be eligible to vote.

The purpose of the election is to enlarge the college district to help improve the college and also spread out the tax burden to include those areas and residents who have not supported the college-wise in the past but have availed themselves of its facilities, and at the same time reduce the tax burden on taxpayers in the present college district.

The Leader will make every effort to give its readers as many facts and figures and projected facts and figures in regard to the proposed tax rate, valuation etc. in the next issue.

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

All farm and ranch operators who are 65 or over, and all farm and ranch workers who are also that old, are reminded by Hal Geldon, Amarillo Social Security district manager, that the 1965 changes in the law make it imperative for them to file their social security claims immediately. This applies even though they are still active on the farm and ranch.

The hospitalization insurance, which is automatic, and the medical insurance, which is optional at three dollars per month beginning next July, require that social security claims be filed before those provisions can apply. Persons already 65 need to take such action now. Those who do not file in the current enrollment period will have only one other chance to enroll, and that will be at a higher cost in the October-December 1967 enrollment period.

Geldon urges all persons affected by the above information to talk with a representative of the Amarillo social security office when he visits in Clarendon on November 17 and Dec 1, Wednesdays. The representative will be in the Courthouse from 8:30 to 11:30.

Even though a person's earnings may be too high to permit immediate payment of monthly retirement benefits, Geldon wants to feel sure that no eligible persons have lost out on the health insurance program because of lack of information.

many of these older couples.

The study was conducted with urban and farm couples living in four geographic areas of Texas. They were asked questions about retirement income, living expenditures, assets and liabilities. Results compiled pointed up many unmet needs.

"Seventy percent of the families studied had incomes under \$3,000. Forty-two percent were living in extreme poverty with an annual income of \$1,500 or less,"

reports Mrs. Patsy Reynolds Yates, Extension Service family specialists at Texas A&M.

She said the failure to plan adequately for retirement expenses was a frequent reason for problems among retired couples.

Farm families placed much importance on owning land, but the average value of property owned was \$377 higher for urban families.

Many couples owned a small amount of burial insurance, but

few had considered or used other forms of insurance to help meet the expenses of retirement, Mrs. Yates said.

The study of the plight of retired couples was conducted by Mrs. Tom Joyce Cunningham, Extension district home demonstration agent at Denton.

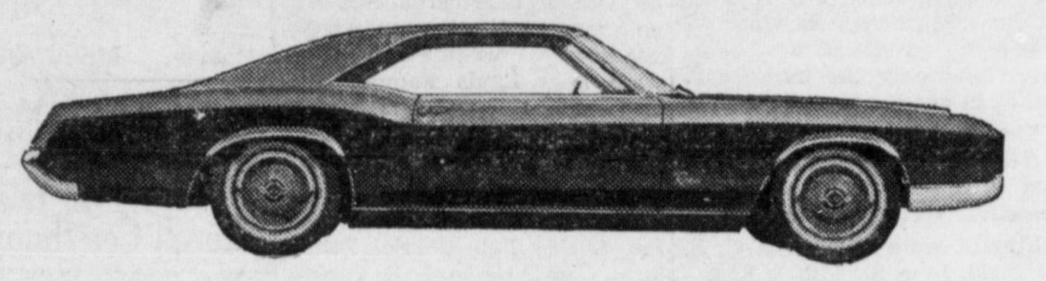

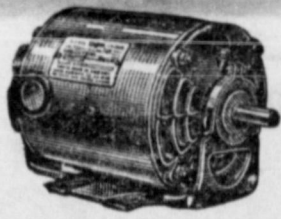

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

GIVE FINGERLINGS A CHANCE

Farmers and ranchers planning to stock their ponds this spring should remove adult fish from the pond before stocking with fingerlings. Additional stocking of a pond previously stocked is seldom the solution to poor fish problems. Larger fish will eat the Bass fingerlings. Adult bass will eat catfish fingerlings. One common mistake often made after stocking fingerlings is putting in a few large fish that some one has caught. These larger fish will eat the fingerlings.

Adult fish populations in private ponds can be removed by the use of rotenone. Rotenone is not a poison. Since the fish are killed by suffocation, they are safe for human consumption. Five pounds of 5 per cent rotenone powder per acre foot of water is the usual recommendation. In warm water (65°F or above) where thorough and even distribution can be made three pounds of rotenone per acre foot is usually sufficient. Mix the rotenone powder with enough water to make a thick paste. Then add water to increase the volume until you have a mixture of about the density of milk.

For the best distribution, pour the rotenone behind a boat with an outboard motor. In small ponds that are inaccessible by boat, the mixture can be sprayed from the bank. Once adult fish are removed, you can be fairly certain your new fingerlings will grow to a catchable size in a short time. Your local county agricultural agent, Ronald Gooch, has details on rates and application methods.

STATE CAPITAL
Highlights
AND Sidelights

Both ultra-liberals and ultra-conservatives have indicated they want a place on the 1966 general election ballot.

Texas liberal spokesmen hint they may run a candidate for governor and perhaps one for the U. S. Senate if Atty. Gen. Wagener Carr is the Democratic senatorial nominee.

Conservative party already has adopted a resolution of intent to nominate state candidates next year.

CANDIDATES ANNOUNCE — Two new candidates have announced for statewide office.

They are Sen. Galloway Calhoun of Tyler for attorney general; and State Rep. Paul B. Haring of Goliad for railroad commissioner.

Haring will take on Commissioner Byron Tunnell of Tyler.

Tunnell was appointed by Gov. John Connally last January to fill the unexpired term of Ernest O. Thompson, who resigned because of ill health.

Secretary of State Crawford Martin of Hillsboro and State Sen. Franklin Spears of San Antonio announced earlier for attorney general.

NEW WEAPON FOUND — A significant new weapon has been acquired by the State of Texas against a lawsuit to abolish the poll tax as a voting requirement in this state, reports Attorney General Carr.

U. S. Senate Judiciary Committee has made available to Carr testimony of federal Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach purportedly acknowledging the Texas poll tax is not used for racial discrimination.

Carr maintains that, in view of testimony, Congress could not have had Texas in mind when it authorized suits against the levy as a voting requirement under the new voting rights act.

Case is set for trial December 1 in Austin.

REAPPORTIONMENT OVER-RATED? — Equitable reapportionment of the Texas Legislature will bring no major switch toward liberalism, according to the University of Texas Institute of Public Affairs study.

Both theory of constant urban-rural conflict among lawmakers and assumption of big city liberalism are mainly myth, study concludes.

Votes on 45 selected roll-calls were carefully analyzed. Reapportionment, the study maintained, will bring few if any major policy changes in the State Legislature. A number of experts and would-be experts strongly disagree.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED — Terrell Blodgett of Austin, director of the Texas Economic Opportunity Office will join the administrative staff of Governor Connally on December 1.

Blodgett will be replaced by State Senator Walter Ritcher of Gonzales.

Connally also announced these

E. C. Pannell of Fort Worth, A. M. Wills of Longview and Raymond L. Tollett of Big Springs to the Board of Regents of North Texas State University.

Robert W. Kneebone of Houston, reappointed to Texas Youth Council.

W. G. McCampbell Jr. of Goliad to San Antonio River Authority.

BOLLWORM CONTROLS INSTIGATED — Planting and plow-up dates were established in Pecos, Ward and Reeves Counties due to "serious increase" in pink bollworm infestation, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Voluntary program in that area calls for February 15 as plow-up date for destruction of all cotton stalks, gin trash and overwintering places. Texas Department of Agriculture will supervise a mandatory control program the following year.

No cotton will be planted before April 10, 1966, under agreement of cotton farmers.

POVERTY PROGRAMS — Eleven more Neighborhood Youth Corps projects have been approved by Governor Connally.

New programs will be conducted in Dallas, Eastland, Mathis, Mercedes, Olton, Orange, Paducah, Robstown, Slaton, Sweetwater and the Uvalde area (comprised of Uvalde, Kinney and Real Counties).

Washington officials have submitted a revised project, sponsored by the Texas Farmers Union, to Governor Connally for his approval. Connally vetoed an earlier proposal.

SUPREME COURT RULES — Sanford Independent School District lost its suit to collect \$10,322 in taxes from H. B. Zachry Co. of San Antonio when the Supreme Court okayed an earlier decision.

Court ruled the construction equipment sought to be taxed was only temporarily situated in the school district. It's taxable only at San Antonio, Court said.

LAVON ENLARGEMENT APPROVED — Texas Water Rights Commission voted to enlarge the storage capacity of Lake Lavon from 100,000 to 380,000 acre feet.

Lake Lavon serves Dallas, Farmersville, Fate, Forney, Garland, McKinney, Mesquite, Milligan, Murphy, Nevada, Plano, Princeton, Richardson, Rockwall, Rowlett, Royse City, Sachse, Sunnyvale and Wylie.

SALES, BUILDING DOWN — Both building and retail sales in Texas took a drop during September, according to University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Sales were off 2.2 per cent after adjustment for seasonal variation, September drop off follows a decline of 15.4 per cent in August.

Building permits were down 33 per cent below September, 1964.

Big drop is in non-residential building, down 53 per cent from August. September index was within three per cent of monthly average for 1965, excluding the August peak.

AMENDMENTS ADOPTED, REJECTED — Texas voters split down the middle in the November 2 elections. They approved half of the 10 amendments presented, disapproved the other five.

Amendment No. 4, proposing four-year-terms for state wide officials, was vetoed by almost 50,000 votes. It received more attention than any of the others.

Also defeated were proposals to grant state representatives four-year terms; extend the veterans land program; authorize salary increases for Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House and raise lawmakers' expense allowance; and exempt certain charity hospitals (Hermann Hospital, Houston) from ad valorem taxes.

Voters approved amendments to raise state property tax five cents for college building purposes; provide more state leeway in meeting matching fund requirements of federal programs for needy; liberalize teacher retirement system investment authority; establish an \$85,000,000 loan fund for college students; and provide for compulsory retirement of judges at 75 and authorize machinery for removing judges who are ill or incompetent.

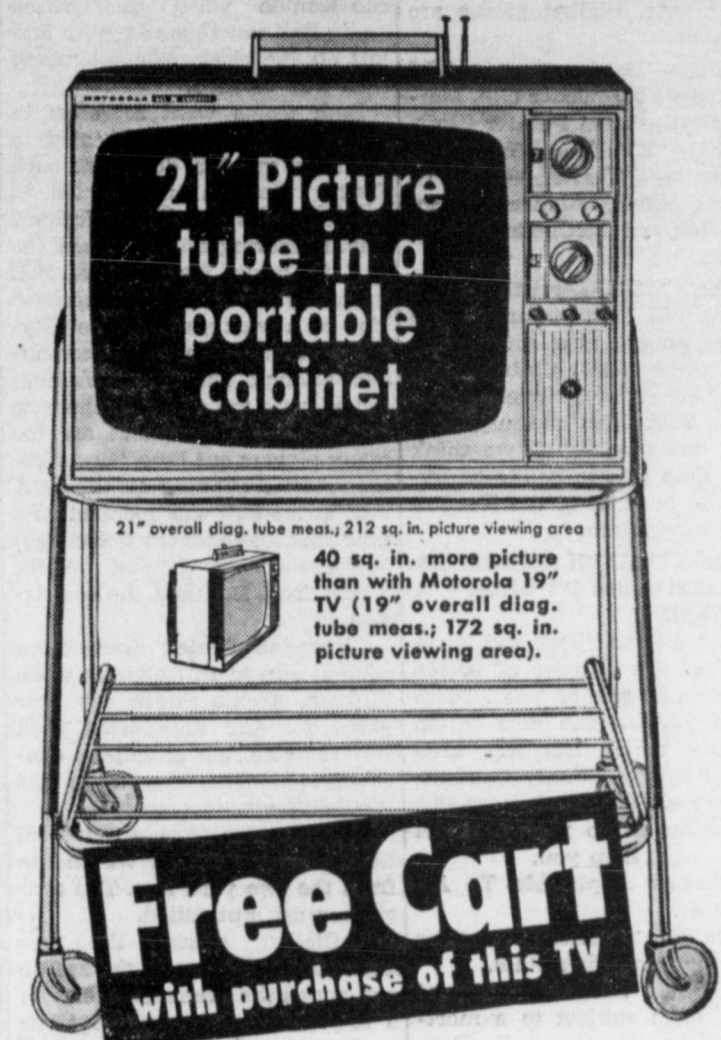

All farmers who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1965 are eligible to vote, so don't let this date slip—be sure to go and vote. Polling places are as follows:

A & C — Donley County ASC Office; B — Paymaster Gin, Martin; D & E — Sid Pointer Store, Lelia Lake; F & G — West Texas Gin, Hedley; West H — W. O. Hommel Home, Alanreed; East H — Bernard McClellan Home, McLean.

There will be an informational meeting on the new cotton program at the Lion's Club Hall at Hedley on Friday, November 19 at 7:00 P.M. You are urged to attend this meeting as we think it will help you to better understand the purpose of the November 23 referendum.

INFORMATION IN TRANSFER OF ALLOTMENT BY SALE OR LEASE

Below are conditions and limitations on the transfer of cotton allotments by sale or lease. These were a part of the new cotton handbook which has just been received by the County Committee. They would like to pass this information on to you in hopes that it might help you.

I Conditions Applicable To All Transfers

A. Do not transfer allotments to a farm in another state.
B. Do not transfer allotment from a farm subject to a mortgage or other lien, unless the lienholder agrees to the transfer.
C. Reduce the acreage to be transferred if the receiving farm has a projected yield more than 10 percent higher than the projected yield of the transferring farm.

D. Do not transfer acreage allotment reapportioned to a farm from released allotments.

II Conditions Applicable To Transfers By Sale and Lease Only

A. Do not transfer allotments by sale or lease to any farm which did not have an allotment determined for the farm for 1965, and for the current year.
B. Do not transfer allotments to farms outside the county unless cotton producers have voted to do so.

C. Do not approve transfers which would cause the total cotton allotments on the receiving farm to exceed the 1965 allotment by more than 100 acres.
D. Do not approve transfer by sale or lease of allotment acreage apportioned to small farms to establish minimum farm allotments.

III Conditions Applicable To Sale Only

Do not approve a transfer by sale of allotment from a farm if any transfer by sale to the same farm was made within the three immediately preceding years.

Broncs Lose To Rockets 20-12

The sluggish Wellington Skyrockets had to fight for their lives Friday night as they slipped past the Clarendon Bronchos, 20-12, in the final game of the season for both teams.

The win left Wellington in second place in the District 2-A standings, behind the champion White Deer Bucks and ahead of third place Clarendon and Memphis.

Wellington scored first in the opening quarter following a Broncho fumble when quarterback Andy Bell ran 14 yards with 5:33 left on the clock. The attempted kick was blocked.

Both teams went scoreless in the second period, but early in the third quarter, defensive back Jackie Neeham intercepted a Broncho pass from quarterback David Mooring and returned the ball 55 yards for a score. Bell passed to Neeham for the conversion on a trick play. As the players were lining up for the conversion attempt, one of the Wellington players yelled to Neeham to "get off the field, there are too many players out here." Neeham started running off the field. Just as the ball was snapped on a fake kick, Neeham cut to his right and was alone in the end zone for a pass from Bell and the conversion.

Clarendon dented the scoring column also in this quarter when fullback Archie Smith ran four yards for the touchdown with 6:57 showing. An attempted conversion pass from Mooring to Mac McClellan was incomplete.

Final quarter scoring saw Neal Roberts carry over for Wellington from the two yard line. The conversion attempt failed.

McClellan scored the last Broncho touchdown of the season and ended the evenings efforts on a 16-yard scamper with 5:44 left in the game. The conversion failed.

The Skyrockets outgained Clarendon in yards rushing, 256 to 83, but the Bronchos led in passing 102 to 19 yards.

Clarendon did not make a first down in the first half and netted a total of minus 6 yards for the first 24 minutes of play. In the second half the Bronchos picked up 10 first downs and gained 83 yards.

Senior end Richard Thornberry had one of his finest nights in the punting department as he boomed five punts for a 40.2 yards per kick average.

Defensive standouts for the Bronchos were Thornberry, Larnce Gardner, John Sommers, Smith and Mooring.

Clarendon was playing without the services of two-way guard Mike Horton, who sat on the sidelines with an injury he received in the McLean game.

Two back-to-back 15-yard penalties by Wellington started a Clarendon drive midway in the second half but the Bronchos were tagged with a 15-yarder and the drive was stopped.

Clarendon is 4-6 for the season while the Skyrockets closed it out with an 8-1-1 record.


