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Big Turnout Urged For Amendment Election Tuesday, September 7th

Texas voters going to the polls Tuesday, September 7th, to vote will be voting on a constitutional amendment of great importance to the people in rural areas and small and medium size towns of the State.

The amendment to be voted on for approval is Senate Joint Resolution 44 that will permit the State Legislature to increase the membership in the State Senate from 31 to 39 and thereby avert the possibility of decreasing the voice of rural Texans in State government affairs.

Unless the amendment is approved at the election, the remaining alternate will be the adoption of another re-districting plan which would take away voting strength in most of the small and medium populated counties of Texas and add to the voting strength of urban areas.

By adding eight new senate positions (increasing the Senate membership to 39) such as proposed in the amendment to be voted on Sept. 7, equitable re-appointment, as ordered by the U. S. Supreme Court, can be met.

It has been pointed out that unless the amendment passes, many rural areas of the State will be left without adequate representation because of the increased size of many districts and the varied economic and geographic factors.

As an example of the wide expanse of the districts, one case was cited in regards to one West Texas District (No. 25). If the amendment fails to pass, the district will be expended into an area of 44,321 square miles, an area bigger than 17 states.

Let us be mindful that this same situation can happen to our area, a rural area. If this amendment does not pass our voice in the State Legislature will be weakened allowing larger cities to dictate and determine policies and laws in the future.

A total of two absentee ballots have been cast in the constitutional amendment election so far that will be held September 7. Deadline for voting absentee is Friday. The amendment, if approved by the voters, will increase the Texas state senate to 39 members from the present 31. It has been endorsed by members of both political parties.

674 Students Enroll In Public Schools

According to Supt. K. D. Vaughan, a total of 674 students registered in all departments of the public school system as of Monday afternoon of this week.

A total of 477 students registered in the elementary grades and Junior High. There were 58 in the first grade; 61 in the 2nd; 63 in the 3rd; 62 in the fourth; 62 in the 5th; 72 in the 6th; 57 in the 7th; and 62 in the 8th.

A total of 197 registered in Senior High School. There were 95 freshmen; 52 sophomores; 42 juniors and 38 seniors.

At this time a year ago, a total of 707 students had registered in all grades with 504 students in the elementary grades and 203 in Senior High. This shows an overall drop of 33 students.

Armed with average offensive speed and an above average passing attack, the Clarendon Bronchos will open the 1965 football season in Broncho Stadium at 8 p.m. Friday against the strong Gruver Greyhounds.

Gruver had an easy time of it last week when they played the Class AA Phillips Blackhawks in a practice-scrimmage game at Phillips. The Greyhounds boast a well-balanced attack spearheaded by halfback Frank Silva, 165 pounds, and will be six point favorites to down the Bronchos. Clarendon's scheduled scrimmage against Lefors never came about because of a mixup in schedules. Lefors came to Clarendon a day early for the scrimmage and the Broncho coaching staff was at Phillips.

The experience gained in a scrimmage could be the main factor in Friday's game here.

Clarendon's starting backfield will average 160 pounds while the front seven will check into the game at an average weight of 162.1 pounds per player. No figures are available on Gruver.

Clarendon could have one of the finest backfield combinations in Panhandle football circles if they come along as is expected. Experience and ability will be the key. The Bronchos running attack will be based on quarterback David Mooring and fullback Archie Smith. Both have been cited as being the best in the Panhandle at their positions.

Backing them up will be tailback Odell Louis and wingback Mac McClellan.

In the line, head coach Jeff Walker will have starting ends John Sommers and Richard Thornberry, tackles Pat Perkins and Gale Grey, guards Pete Campbell and Mike Horton and center Bill Monk. If needed, Walker can count on the services of center Barry Tyler, utility back Larnce Gardner and quarterback Irvan Mears.

Next week the Bronchos will be hosted by the Claude Mustangs who will play Silverton there this week.

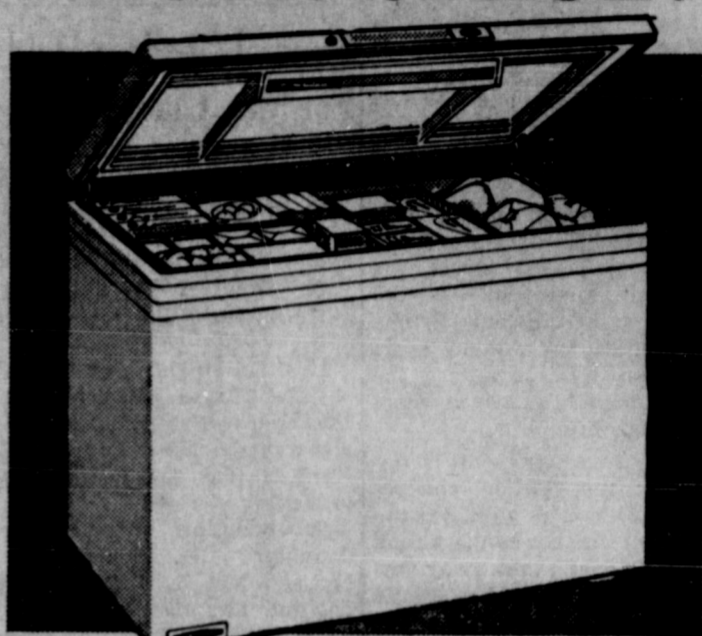

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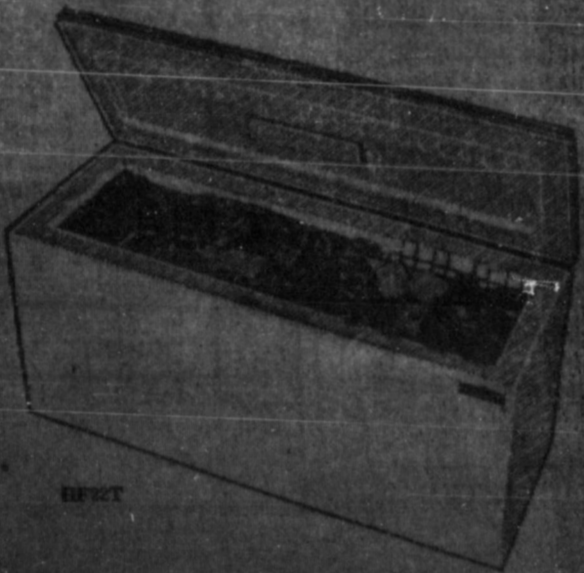

TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS CAUSE MOST ACCIDENTS

"Violations of the Texas traffic law will be apparent in nine out of every 10 accidents which claim a human life over the Labor Day Weekend," said Col. Homer Garrison today in a statement concerning the upcoming holiday.

Col. Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said that DPS statisticians estimate that 35 persons will die in traffic during the three day holiday.

"To combat carelessness and attempt to hold down these needless deaths," Garrison said, "the DPS will conduct the regular special emphasis program, 'Operation Motorcade.' From 12:01 a.m. September 4 through 11:59 p.m. September 6, the Department will use every man at its disposal to reduce traffic accidents."

As a part of "Operation Motorcade," a tabulation of fatal accidents will be released from DPS headquarters in Austin three times daily to focus attention on the dangers of holiday travel. Garrison also noted that an additional 150 men from other DPS uniformed services will be on duty to supplement the activities of the Highway Patrol.

Garrison pointed out that almost all the accidents during the 1964 Labor Day Weekend, which

killed 39 persons and injured hundreds more, had violations of the law as contributing factors.

"The most common violations," he reported, "was the failure to yield right of way, followed closely by violations where the driver exceeded a safe speed for existing weather or road conditions."

Other common violations contributing to accidents were:

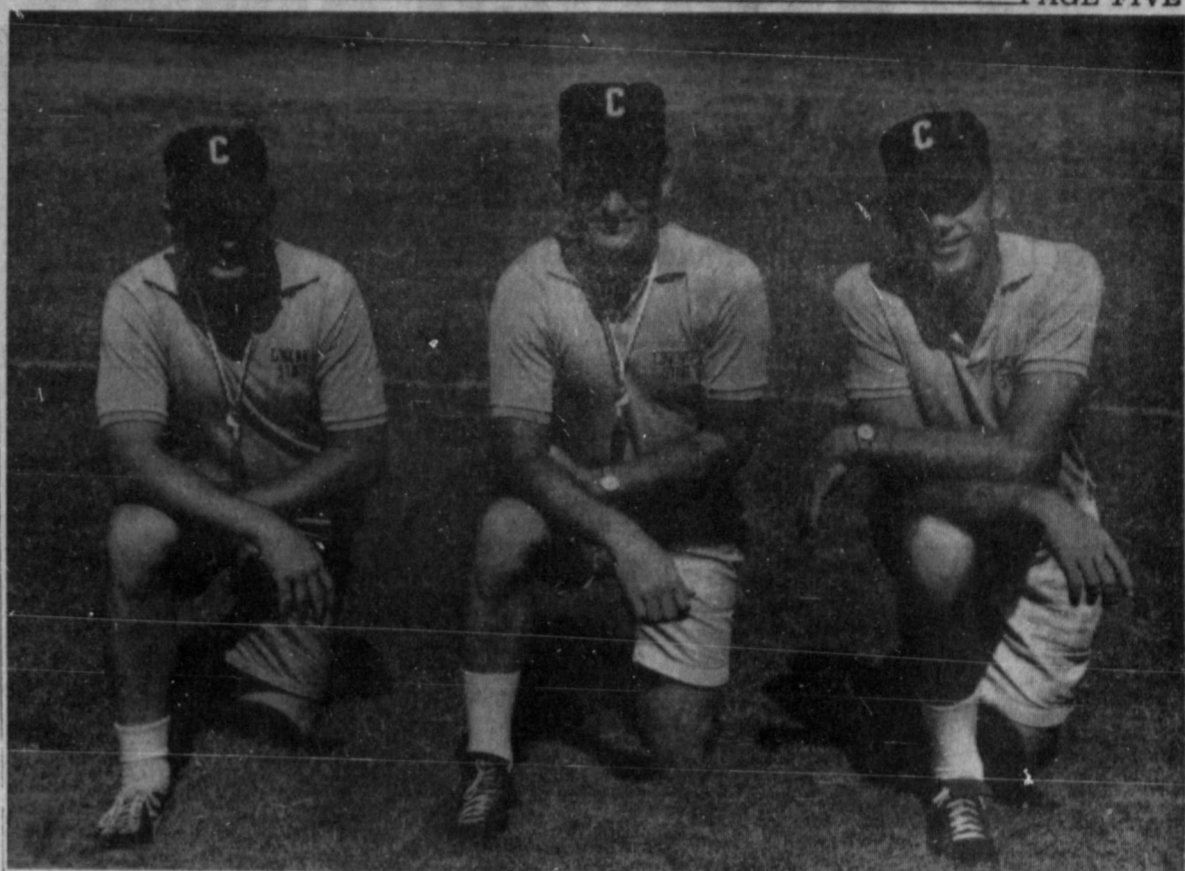
- ... exceeding posted speed limits;
- ... failure to stop or turn in time;
- ... driving while intoxicated;
- ... driving on the wrong side of the road.

Labor Day, 1965, can tell a different story from last year's" Garrison said. But we must have the help of every motorist in observing traffic laws and in driving sanely to avoid this tragic loss."

Several other state agencies and public service organizations will participate in efforts to cut down on death and injury during the holiday period. Among these are the Texas Highway Department, the Texas Safety Association, and the Texas Motor Transportation Association, and the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The Highway Department will carry on a continuing information and education program stressing the freedom of mobility enjoyed by drivers of today and instructing motorists in freeway driving.

The Texas Safety Association will conduct a public information program stressing the need for courtesy and caution. TSA Vice-president W. F. (Bill) Leonard of Dallas will coordinate the efforts of over 12,000 members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce over the state in operating "rest stops" for fatigued drivers to whom free coffee will be served; and the Texas Council of Safety

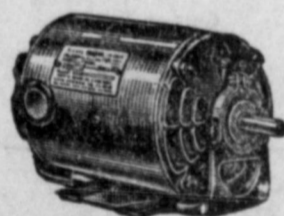

D. C. HOME RULE IS BAD LEGISLATION

Washington, D. C., is unique among U. S. cities because every American citizen "owns" a share of it and has a very vital stake in the events that take place here. Because it is the Nation's Capital, every citizen can regard Washington as his city, regardless of his place of residence. Washington is the U. S. Federal City. The Federal Government is its reason for being, its major industry, and the major employer of the people who live here. The site of the city of Washington was an unpopulated woody marsh when George Washington, whose nearby home at Mount Vernon gave him a familiarity with lands along the Potomac River, selected the location for the Federal City. The founding fathers had determined that the seat of our National Government belonged in a Federal City in which no subordinate governmental authority could hold power.

Now, Washington is again caught up in the emotional cry of "home rule!" The objective, home rule advocates will tell you, is for the residents of the District of Columbia to be permitted to govern themselves. They want Congress, which was given authority by the Constitution to direct District affairs, to hand its powers over to an elected city council. At the same time, they want Congress to continue to provide massive sums to support District of Columbia government in the style to which Washington residents have become accustomed—and a style of city government, I assure you, that many U. S. cities wish they could emulate.

"Home rule" sounds good. It is an emotional appeal to the normal American sense of fair play and belief in democracy. Yet, "home rule" as proposed in the bill which has passed the Senate and may come before the House is repugnant to the Constitution. In effect, it creates a new State, with this exception: The Federal

Government will finance it. I find these provisions of the "home rule" bill among the most objectionable:

It provides a built-in, automatic formula for computing the Federal dollar support of the district government. The formula is based upon amounts the Federal Government would pay in private taxes, personal property taxes, and business taxes, if it were a private industry. In addition, the Federal Government would continue to pay the District of Columbia water and sewer charges. To apply this formula, the D. C. assessor would be called upon to place an assessment on the U. S. Capitol. How would he do it? On what basis? Would he use current market value, the original cost, or the cost of replacement at today's prices? All three are well recognized methods of valuation. Imagine the D. C. assessor's problem in applying them to the Capitol, the White House, the Library of Congress, other Federal buildings in this city. The Federal Government would, under the terms of this bill, have to make a payment to the D. C. Government tantamount to an ad valorem tax, even on post offices within the District of Columbia and on flags flying over the Capitol.

Completely opposed to the Constitution, in my view, is the provision of the bill that provides for a permanent annual appropriation of Federal funds based on the above formula. It is an unconstitutional delegation of the appropriation authority of Congress and of the House of Representatives, which is the only body of Congress which can originate general appropriations bills.

I object also to the provision which provides for an elected D. C. mayor, 14 councilmen from 14 wards with 5 more councilmen elected at large—with complete control of the Washington police department. I object to the fact that the bill makes the U. S. President a kind of supermayor, requiring him to oversee the acts of the city council and giving him, not the Congress, veto power over them.

Our government is based on a dual sovereignty philosophy. In other words, each of the 50 States

State AFL-CIO is leading the opposition. It charges that the proposal is a "pig in a poke" offering no guides as to where the new districts will go.

"Committee for Fair Representation," made up primarily of trade and industrial association representatives, contends that Texans would get "proper representation" with out jeopardizing the interests of sparsely-settled areas by adding eight new members to the Senate.

Lobby groups acknowledge they favor the plan because increased membership would cut down a senator's work load somewhat and make it easier to communicate with him.

The enlargement amendment, which triggered one of the 59th Legislature's most bruising battles, was intended to take some of the sting out of legislative redistricting by making it possible for most incumbent senators to keep their jobs.

Big city forces are divided, while most rural interests tend

are separate and distinct sovereignties. Joined together, they constitute the Federal Government—the Federal sovereignty. To believe in "home rule" for the official Federal district is to do violence to the basic doctrine of our dual sovereignty governmental form. D. C. "home rule" is extremely bad legislation.

CRIME NEWS STUDY — First three members of the Legislature's 11-member "Interim Committee To Study News Media Proceedings in Criminal and/or Civil Courts" have been named by Lt. Gov. Preston Smith.

They are Sens. Dorsey Harde-man of San Angelo, Culp Krueger of El Campo and Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi. Yet to be named are three members from the House of Representatives, three from the news media and two from the State Bar of Texas. Panel resulted from controversy over deletion of a provision from the new Code of Criminal Procedure which would have severely restricted pre-trial news coverage. New code takes effect January 1.

Study committee was authorized to take a sharp look at existing coverage.

• Texas Western College cannot use money appropriated by Legislature for tuition scholarships to aid students living in Juarez, Mexico.

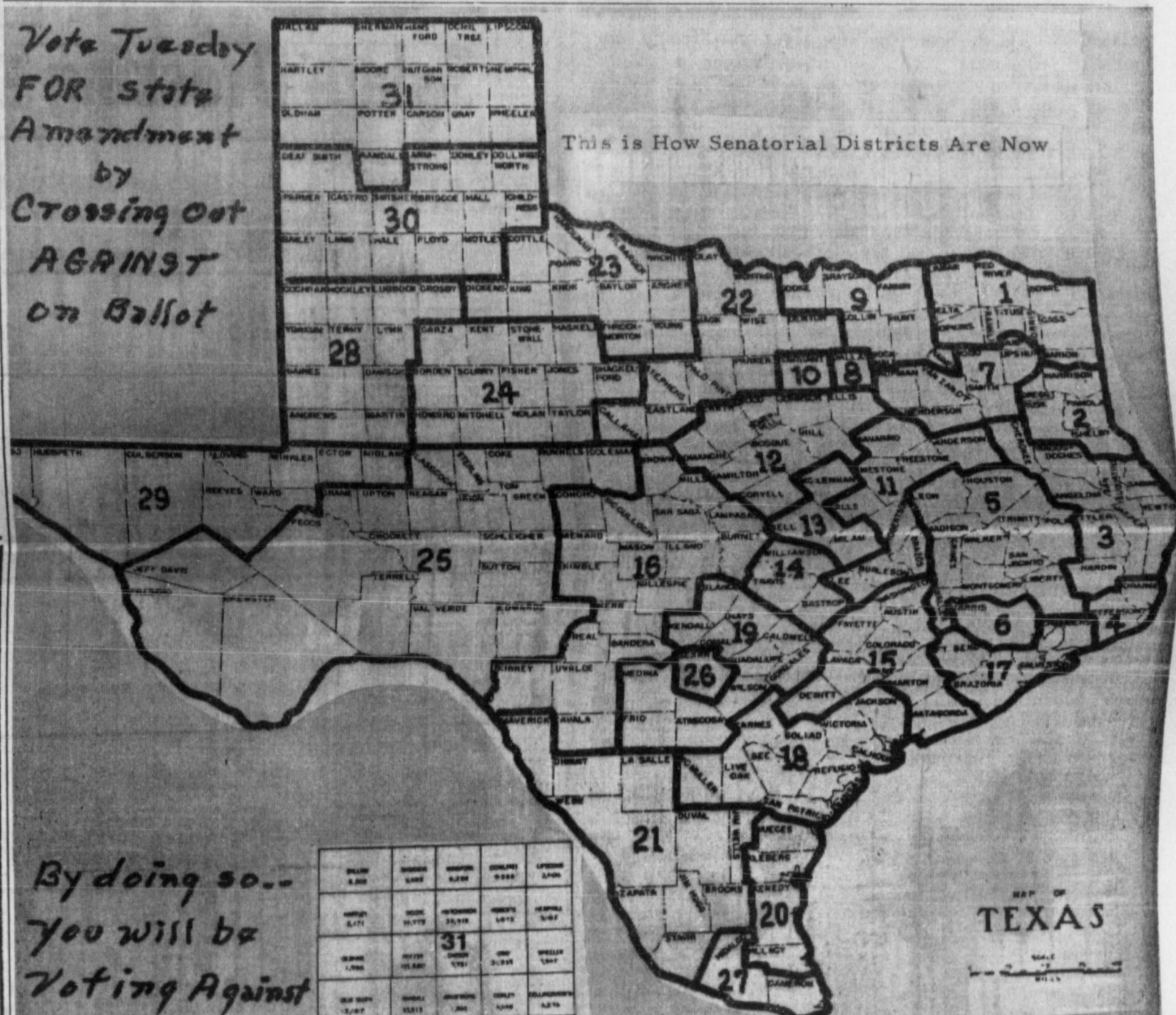

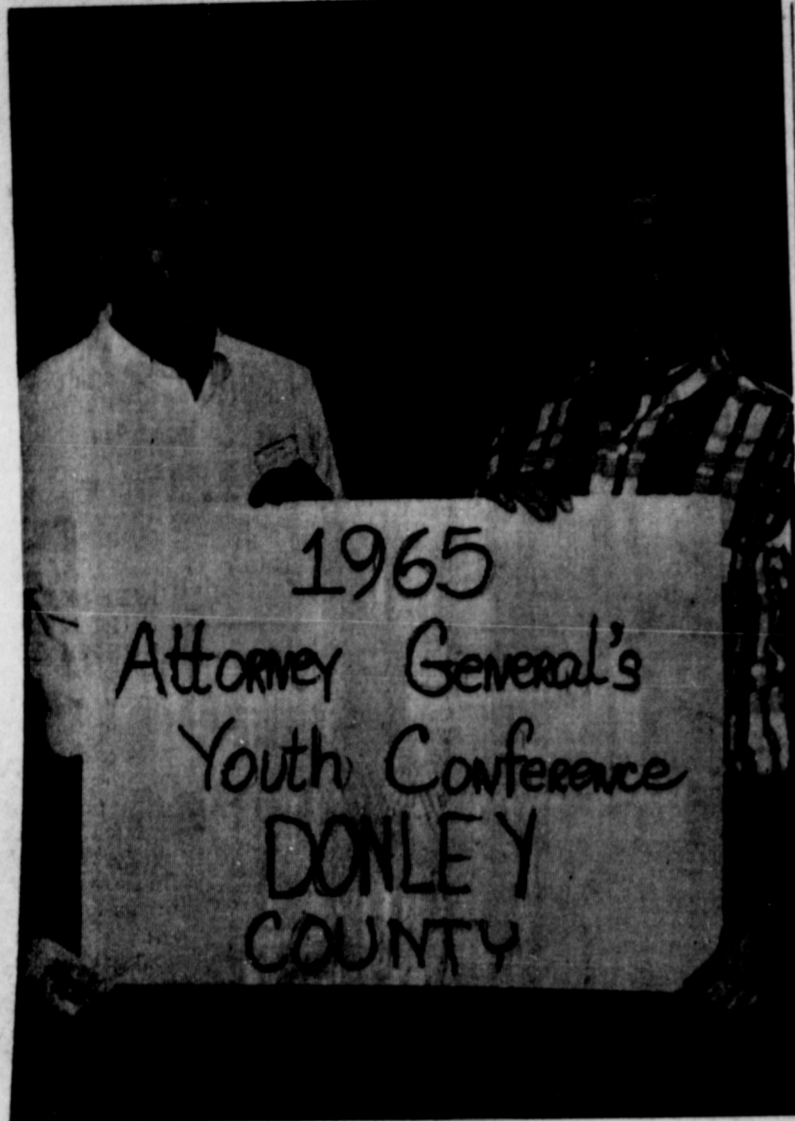

FAILURE TO PLANT 75% OF COTTON ALLOTMENT

Any farmer who failed to get 75% of his cotton allotment planted for reasons beyond his control should file a request in writing to the County Committee not later than September 15, 1965, asking that this provision be waived in order for the history credit to be protected.

However, farms with soil bank contracts will have history protection up to an acreage equal to the amount of the designated CR land.

ELECTION MATERIAL MAILED FOR COMMUNITY

COMMITTEE ELECTIONS

The following material has been mailed to each known eligible voter in our county:

1. Two ballots
2. Two plain envelopes — Seal your ballots in them
3. Two envelopes in which to mail ballots back to county office with the name and address of the eligible voter shown on the reverse side and a certification that must be signed.
4. An instruction sheet which states:
 - a. The extra set of voting material is for voter's wife.
 - b. The wife's ballot must be returned in a separate envelope.
 - c. Each must sign the certification on the back of the envelope containing his or her ballot.

d. A ballot will not be counted if the certification is not signed.

e. Two or more ballots returned in the same envelope will not be counted.

f. You do not have to have a poll tax receipt to be eligible to vote.

g. You do not have to pay postage on the envelope when you mail the vote in.

h. It takes only a few moments to vote.

i. Vote for five persons.

j. Write in a name if you wish.

Be sure that you vote and mail or bring your ballot to the county office on or before the 8th of September. (Wednesday)
