## **Big Turnout Urged For Amendment** Election Tuesday, September 7th

Texas voters going to the polls Tuesday, September 7th, to vote Funeral Services Held will be voting on a constitutional amendment of great importance For Mrs. Gladys Bolin to the people in rural areas and small and medium size towns of

The amendment to be voted on for approval is Senate Joint Resolution 44 that will permit the State Legislature to increase the membership in the State Senate from 31 to 39 and thereby avert the possibility of decreasing the voice of rural Texans in State government affairs.

Unless the amendment is approved at the election, the remaining alternate will be the adoption of another re-districting plan which would take away voting strength in most of the small and medium populated counties of Texas and add to the voting strength of urban areas. Under this plan, Houston would get three additional State senators. Dallas two, and San Antonio one. This would be accomplished by expanding the senatorial districts in sparcely populated areas.

By adding eight new senate positions (increasing the Senate membership to 39) such as proposed in the amendment to be voted on Sept. 7, equitable reapportionment, as ordered by the U. S. Supreme Court, can be met. Under this plan, the big cities would have equitable representation, yet not at the expense of rural Texas.

It has been pointed out the unless the amendment passes, many rural areas of the State will be left without adequate representation because of the increased size of many districts and the varied economic and geographic

The district will be 400 miles across at its widest point, and to visit all 21 counties in the district, a person would have to travel 1, 100 miles. The same situation will exist in other districts in a lesser degree.

Let us be mindful that this same situation can happen to our area, a rural area. If this amendment does not pass our voice in the State Legislature will be weakened allowing larger cities to dictate and determine policies and laws in the future. Election day comes immediately following Labor Day. Voters planning Labor Day vacations extending beyond Tuesday should vote absentee.

A total of two absentee ballots have been cast in the constitutional amendment election so far that will be held September 7.

Deadline for voting absentee is Friday. The amendment, if approved by the voters, will increase the Texas state senate to 39 members from the present 31. It has been indorsed by members of both political parties.

Early this year, the city of Clarendon received an award from the Texas Safety Commission in behalf of the Jaycee Rest Stop.


College President, K. D. Vaughan, reported that a general faculty meeting was held Wednesday morning and everything was shaping up for a busy, fruitful school year ahead.

It's time for farmers and ranchers to file their claim for refund of federal tax on gasoline used for farming or ranching purposes, says County Agent Ronald Gooch. This claim will be allowed only if filed on or before Sept. 30, 1965. The period covered by this claim is from July 1, 1964, through June 30, 1965.

Any farmer or rancher needing form 2240, which is used for filing for the tax refund, can obtain them by contacting the County Agent's office.

Any farmer who failed to get 75% of his cotton allotment planted for reasons beyond his control should file a request in writing to the County Committee not later than September 15, 1965, asking that this provision e waived in order for the history credit to be protected.

However, farms with soil bank contracts will have history protection up to an acreage equal to the amount of the designated CR land.
