"We don't know as yet if any mail was taken from the boxes during the episodes and will not know until post office patrons report lost pieces of mail", postnaster McCully stated. In most estances, the youths pushed the mail out of the boxes into the floor to the inside portion of the post office. This vandalism has been reported to the Post Office Inspection Service for further nvestigation, he added.

### SOYBEANS ON DIVERTED ACRES

Regulations state that any soybeans seeded on diverted acres for a cover crop must be plowed unded not later than September 30 of the current year.

We do have a few producers who have soybeans planted on acreages diverted under the wheat and feed grain programs. Let us remind those producers that soybeans are not an approved substitute crop and must be plowed under by September 30, 1965. PLOW-UPS

Adjustment credit shall be given only for plowed up areas with not more than four sides. One side or one end of the disposition area shall be parallel with the rows or field boundaries when plowed up in a square or rectangular pattern.
