## Donley County Museum Opens August 1st

The Donley County Museum was opened to visitors in ceremonies Sunday afternoon upstairs in City Hall with Mayor R. L. Gilkey cutting the ribbon to the museum with Judge R. E. Drennan and Will Chamberlain, director, standing by.

First to register were Briscoe County Judge and Mrs. M. G. Moreland of Silverton, Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Allard, Briscoe County Historical chairman, Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Garrison, Mr. and Mrs. Quinn Montague and Pauline Montague of Silverton. All are members of the Briscoe County Historical committee. They are also making plans for a museum at Silverton.

Those making important loans to the museum to date include: M. P. Gentry, picture of Al Gentry, first Sheriff of Donley County who served until he died, also five other pictures of old Clarendon.

Thomas D'Spain, a skull and mandible of a Gripphipus from the 1961 J. W. Gidley horse quarry; 1 block of volcanic ash, 1 block of Diatomaceous earth, all from his ranch.

Mrs. Jerome D. Stocking—loaned to the museum in memory of the late Jerome D. Stocking—1 mastadon Ramus, 3 mammoth teeth, 1 rhino ramus, 1 partial horse caninus bone, large picture of Dr. J. D. Stocking, the first doctor in the Panhandle who served six counties, coming here in 1885. He also founded the first Drug Store here.

Mrs. Finley donated wire from the Goodnight drift fence, first built in Donley County.

Mr. Chamberlain stated that as soon as space will permit, we will have an Art Display, Early Furniture, ranch tools and other departments as we grow with a dedicated curator in charge of each department.

We wish to thank everyone for your interest in the museum and your continued cooperation will be most appreciated, Mr. Chamberlain stated.

Flip Breedlove, secretary and manager of the association, stated that Jake Hess, program member of McLean, had contacted Mr. Thornton in Denver, Colo. and that he will arrive by plane the afternoon of the nineteenth in Amarillo.

Other dignitaries in the cattle business who will attend include Henry Elder of the Texas Hereford Association; Marshall Selman, president of the American Hereford Association; and Paul Swaffar, secretary of the American Hereford Association. A. H. L. Anderson of Miner, Montana, secretary of the American Galloway association is expected to be present, also Stanley Anderson of the American Angus Association. Breedlove said that the officers and directors of the association sent invitations to the barbecue to registered beef cattle breeders, bull buyers of the association, and persons who have worked in the promotion of the organization.

## Vandalism At Post Office Serious Offense

Postmaster Mike McCully reported Tuesday morning that ten youths between the ages of 8 and 14 years were caught in the act of vandalism in the U. S. Post Office.

Vandalism had occurred on seven previous nights so a stake-out was used to catch the youths in the act of breaking out the glass windows of mail boxes, scattering literature etc.

"We don't know as yet if any mail was taken from the boxes during the episodes and will not know until post office patrons report lost pieces of mail", postmaster McCully stated. In most instances, the youths pushed the mail out of the boxes into the floor to the inside portion of the post office. This vandalism has been reported to the Post Office Inspection Service for further investigation, he added.

McCully stated that ten youths caught in the act were implicating more in connection with previous nights. Parents should take inventory and know where their youngsters are when they are out after night. Vandalism or any other harmful act in connection with the post office department is a serious offense any time, McCully added.

We have been leaving the lobby of the post office open at night for the convenience of postal patrons but we will have to lock it up if such vandalism continues, he concluded.

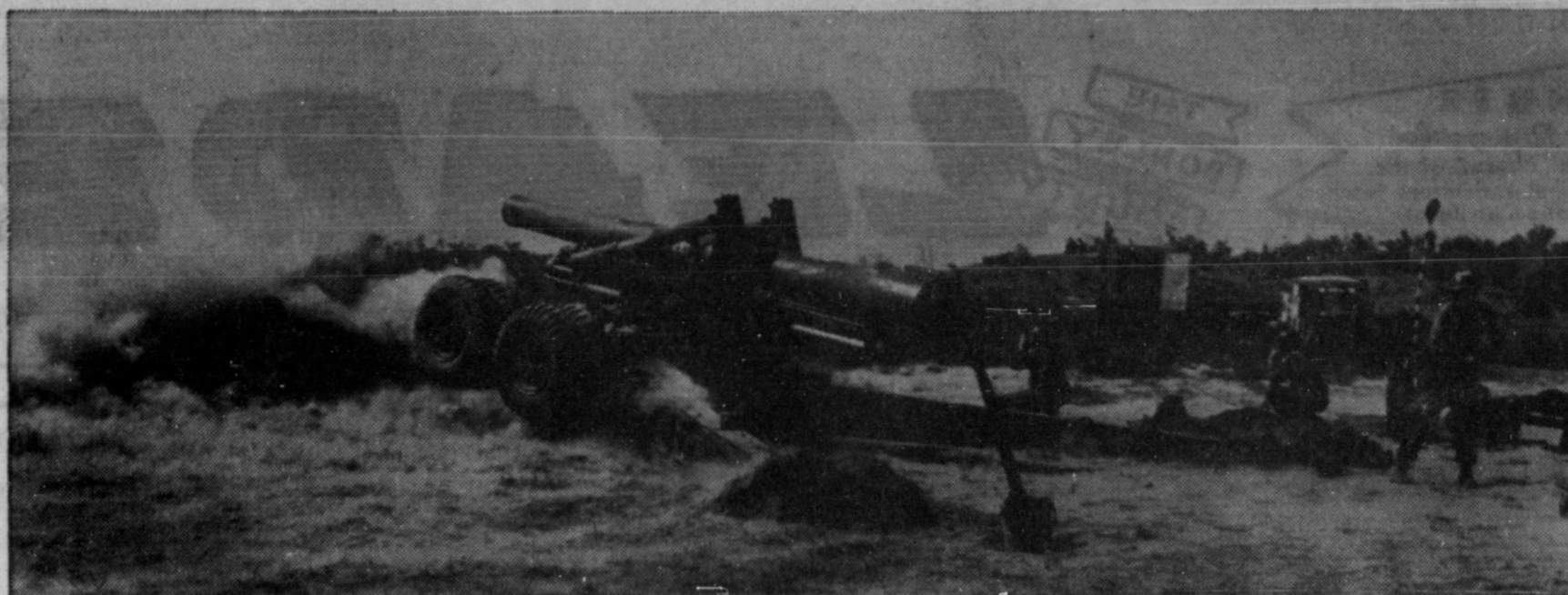

Guard Cannoneers Send a Big One Whistling on Way to Target



For Army Guard artillerymen, the rewards of training occur when the firing battery goes into action during Annual Field Training. Weekends during the year, gun crews run through steps of the drill until each man is letter-perfect in his assignment. Meanwhile, other Army Guard redlegs sharpen communications, target plotting and fire-direction control talents, so that when a battery moves out to the range, every man understands exactly what is expected of him. It takes a 12-man crew to aim, load and pull the lanyard on this giant eight-inch howitzer, which can fire a 200-pound high explosive projectile nine miles. In wartime operations this artillery "old soldier" can be armed with a nuclear warhead. This is one of several weapons in the current arsenal, which gives the Army National Guard combat forces a nuclear capability.

You've heard the slogan, "Take a boy fishing." I go for that! But, as in everything else, there's a right way and a wrong way to go about it. A boy wants action. If he's fishing, he wants to catch fish. If he doesn't catch 'em often, he's going to tire of the inactivity real soon. So introduce him to the bream . . . better known as the perch. It's a natural-born, boy-type of fish.

Bream are present in considerable numbers almost everywhere. They bite anytime of the day. They go for all kinds of bait. Worms, of course, are the favorite bait for this kind of fishing. Tackle should consist of the simplest ingredients . . . a pole, a line, a bobber, a very light weight and small hook. Select a light cane pole that the kid can handle. A 6-foot pole should be long enough to start with. Rig it up right for him and

explain how and why you do it. Tie on about a 6 foot cord and fix it to the pole, with a series of half hitches extending back a foot or so from the tip. At the end of this line make a small loop. Into the loop tie some very light nylon leader, and let it extend to the other end of the pole. The hook should be tiny, and a little split shot will do for a sinker. Put a bobber on some three or four feet above the hook, depending on how deep the bream are. If you're serious about this kid-fishing business and really want to succeed at it, you will have gone out ahead of time and discovered a good fishing hole where the bream respond willingly. When you get there with the youngster, you'll have to bait the hook for him, at first. Show him how it's done. Be very patient.

Pretty soon he'll be wanting to do it himself, and you'll let him do it. Caution him, of course, that the hook is sharp and will stick his finger if he isn't careful. Now here comes the big deal—he drops his bait in the water, at the spot you have previously selected for him. Don't make light of it. This is a big-time operation for him. Pretty soon his bobber is going to start moving and maybe submerge. He'll want to yank the thing hard enough to toss the fish into the next county. Instruct him to take it easy. Just give a little yank to set the hook, and then bring the fish in gently. So the boy has caught a fish. Listen, that boy is just as happy as if he had set a new record for tarpon. His first fish! Take it off the hook for him, demonstrating how that's done. If it's a fair sized bream, so much the better. But the kid isn't going to want to toss it back re-

gardless of its size. If he won't go for the story that you should put him back to grow big for another day, and if you can't talk him out of keeping the little one for a pet (the fish will be happier in the creek)—why then, keep him. Maybe when the stringer is full, he'll be willing to release the midgets. By all means, make sure that those fish are fried and eaten for supper. Show your youngster how to pull out the back fin and get the little filets from each side, dodging the bones. Imagine what he's going to say when it comes to time for show-and-tell at school next week: "We had fish for supper, and I caught them myself." If you manage to get a picture of him and his string of fish, to go along with the story, you'll have the proudest kid in the block. Now what happens? Nothing, as long as the boy gets a big bang out of catching bluegills the way you have taught him. But when he begins to lose the first blush of excitement, it's time to try something different. My recommendation is that you remove the bobber from his line as the next step. Explain that it's even more fun to feel the first nibble of the fish himself, by the tight line method, rather than depending on the bobber to guide him. So the next question is—how deep does he fish? Now here's where you get a bit tricky. Tell him that the big fish are sometimes down deep. Have him let his bait all the way to

the bottom, leave it there a little while, and then bring it up very slowly, jiggling it a little along the way. He's still going to catch his share of bream, but you and I know what else is going to happen. One of these days he is going to snag something bigger—a catfish, a gaspergou, even a bass. Don't forsake the bream all at once. Fish for them the way you have always done. But spend a little time casting, too, and thinking about bass. Of course, you can fish for bream with the spin-cast outfit. Also you can use the old cane pole for a set line. Bait it with a gob of worms and let them rest on the bottom. You and the boy have started out the simple, easy way. You have wandered no farther from home than the creek, and you have brought home a string of

fish pretty regularly — mostly bream, with an occasional catfish. Soon you're going to be ready for a new thrill. My suggestion for this one would be a fishing dock on the lake where the crappie and white bass are biting. Now the cane pole can be discarded. Or put away for another time. Substitute minnow for the worm. Tell him how to hook the minnow through the lips and lower it, with his spin-caster, down to the bottom. Have him reel in a few turns and wait a while. Then have him reel up slowly, jiggling a little. If you're in the right place at the right time, you're going to catch crappie and white bass, maybe a catfish too. Once that young sprout gets a two-pound white on the line, they are both hooked. He's a fisherman then—for good.

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.**  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: "Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature. The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present. The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) of bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for

not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; and shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchaser's agent, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board which have heretofore been validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same. "In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds. "Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the

moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes. "All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes here-in provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time said moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund and be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund. "When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, and may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there shall be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violation of any contract to which said Board is a party. "The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund. "The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to

Texas veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1965, and who upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and who, notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. "Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board, may be used by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monitoring, recording fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, recording, and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds. "All moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the Constitutional Amendment adopted on November 6, 1956, shall be credited to said Veterans' Land Fund and may be used for the purpose of purchasing additional lands, to be sold as provided herein, until December 1, 1965; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on such bonds shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1965, all moneys attributable to such bonds shall be set aside for the retirement of such bonds and to pay interest thereon; and when there are sufficient moneys to retire all of such bonds, all of such moneys then remaining or thereafter becoming a part of said Veterans' Land Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein. "All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board (a 'series of bonds' being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds heretofore issued and sold

shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein. "This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary. "Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature. "This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption. Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1965; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law"; and "AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1965; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of same Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and shall be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith. Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this state.

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.**  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing loans to students at institutions of higher education; creating the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund and making provisions relating thereto. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows: "Section 50b. STUDENT LOANS. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Eighty-five Million Dollars (\$85,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called 'Texas College Student Loan Bonds,' shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purposes of this Section. (b) All moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund to be administered by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successor, to make loans to students who have been admitted to attend any institution of higher education within the State of Texas, public or private, including Junior Colleges, which are recognized or accredited under terms and conditions prescribed by the Legislature, and to pay interest and principal on such bonds and provide a sinking fund therefor under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. (c) While any of the bonds, or interest on said bonds authorized by this Section is outstanding and un-

paid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year. (d) The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. (e) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. (f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature. Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for loans to students at institutions of higher education to be known as the Texas Opportunity Plan." Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Motorists beware—range fire season is just around the corner as dry weather conditions persist over most areas of Texas.

The grass you see when traveling along the highway is the rancher's winter hay crop, like money in the bank to him. The stockman has worked hard to produce this grass, so help him keep it by preventing grass fires from a carelessly flipped burning match or cigarette.

Grass is more than just "cow-food." Besides producing tasty steaks and lamb chops, grass produces food and cover for deer and quail, prevents muddy water from running into lakes and streams and killing fish and making water recreation unpleasant. Not only is grass important to

the rancher, but you also have a stake in it. Take a look at what it has to offer you. When hunting season rolls around, you want a fat buck or a large covey of quail for the dog to point. Without grass and cover these will not exist.

The old fishing hole offers some pleasant hours of fun to you—unless a careless passerby caused a fire that filled the lake or stream with silt from an unprotected range area. Your favorite picnic spot can be turned into a charred wasteland by careless smokers or campers.

Keep these things in mind when you start to throw that next cigarette or match out of the car window. Help the rancher and help yourself. He put those fire precautions there to protect his most valuable natural resource—grass.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 47 proposing an Amendment to Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide four-year terms of office for State Representatives. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 4. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new House of Representatives shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the members elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the members of Class A shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of Class B at the expiration of four years, so that one-half of the members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. Except in case of an election to fill a vacancy, and except in the first election following each re-apportionment, a person who has been elected to the House of Representatives shall not be eligible to be a candidate again for membership in the Legislature until the term for which he was elected has less than one year remaining." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives." Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the constitution and laws of this state. Sec. 4. In the event the Constitution Amendment proposed in this Resolution is adopted by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, the Governor of Texas is directed not to issue a proclamation for the election and not to publish notice thereof for the Constitutional Amendment proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 1 of the 59th Texas Legislature, since the provisions of said House Joint Resolution No. 1 are included in this Resolution. But, should this proposed Amendment be rejected by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, then the terms and provisions of House Joint Resolution No. 1 shall remain in full force and effect and shall be proclaimed and published and submitted to the electorate in November, 1966, as provided in said House Joint Resolution No. 1.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT. PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 57 proposing an Amendment to Section 4, Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of, disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct, upon recommendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions hereby established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that said Section shall hereafter read as follows: "Section 1-a. (1) Subject to the further provisions of this Section, the Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Justices and Judges of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age and disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed. The office of every such Justice and Judge shall become vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of seventy-five (75) years or such earlier age, not less than seventy (70) years, as the Legislature may prescribe; but, in the case of an incumbent whose term of office includes the effective date of this Amendment, this provision shall not prevent him from serving the remainder of said term nor be applicable to him before his period or periods of judicial service shall have reached a total of ten (10) years. (2) There is hereby created the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, to consist of nine (9) members, to wit: (i) two (2) Justices of Courts of Civil Appeals; (ii) two (2) District Judges; (iii) two (2) members of the State Bar, who have respectively practiced as such for over ten (10) consecutive years next preceding their selection; (iii) three (3) citizens, at least thirty (30) years of age, not licensed to practice law nor holding any salaried public office or employment; provided that no person shall be or remain a member of the Commission, who does not maintain physical residence within this State, or who resides in, or holds a judgeship within or for, the same Supreme Judicial District as another member of the Commission, or who shall have ceased to retain the qualifications above specified for his respective class of membership. Commissioners of classes (i) and (ii) above shall be chosen by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, those of class (iii) by the Board of Directors of the State Bar under regulations to be prescribed by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, and those of class (iii) by appointment of the Governor with advice and consent of the Senate. (3) The regular term of office of Commissioners shall be six (6) years; but the initial members of each of classes (i), (ii) and (iii) shall respectively be chosen for terms of four (4) and six (6) years, and the initial members of class (iii) for respective terms of two (2), four (4) and six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. Commissioners may succeed themselves in office only if having served less than three (3) consecutive years. (4) Commissioners shall receive no compensation for their services as such. The legislature shall provide for the payment of the necessary expense for the operation of the Commission. (5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually elect one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement or removal of Justices or Judges shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members. (6) Any Justice or Judge within the scope of this Section 1-a may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature. (7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to misconduct or disability of particular Justices or Judges, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court. (8) The Commission may, after such investigation as it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal or retirement of a Justice or Judge, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the report and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefore, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal or retirement, as the case may be, of the Justice or Judge in question and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission. (9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order removal or retirement, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary. (10) All papers filed with and proceedings before the Commission or a Master shall be confidential, and the filing of papers with, and the giv-

ing of testimony before, the Commission, Master or the Supreme Court shall be privileged; provided that upon being filed in the Supreme Court the record loses its confidential character. (11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any judge against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the judge in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed. (12) No Justice or Judge shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal. (13) This Section 1-a is alternative to, and cumulative of, the methods of removal of Justices and Judges provided elsewhere in this Constitution." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such judges in cases of disability." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such judges in cases of disability." Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT. PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing Amendments to Section 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; and certain statutory state officers; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication. RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 4, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election." Sec. 2. That Section 22, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the state in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the state in which the state may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the state, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature." Sec. 3. That Section 23, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution." "Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state, at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution." "Section 5. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be construed so as to extend the term of office of any officeholder previously elected to a two-year term." Sec. 6. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

**FOR LABELS ON IMPORTED MEAT**

At last, the Department of Agriculture is moving another step toward a goal I have been advocating for many years—a goal of protecting producers of this nation against excessive imports. The Department also is taking another worthy step to provide further protection to Americans who purchase imported meat and meat products. While most products processed for sale within the United States must bear "established numbers" identifying specific plants in which

they were prepared, no such requirement has been in effect for imported products. Now under its authority granted by the Congress in laws governing meat inspection, the Department will require this kind of identification on imported products so that they may be readily identified as to source. In addition, the proposed new regulations will require that the "principal display panel" of the product bear in English the true name of the product and the name of the country of origin. Designations in English are not now required.

Last year and again this year, I introduced in the House a bill proposing a Federal law to require that imported meat and meat food products bear a label showing the country from which it originated. I am certainly

pleased that the Department of Agriculture is strengthening its own position in this regard. However, the Department's regulations affect meat and meat products as they reach ports of entry—not as they reach grocers' shelves—for the majority of meat imports. It is estimated by officials of the Department of Agriculture and men acquainted with the meat processing industry that while country of origin labeling regulations affect 75 to 90 percent of imported meat as it reaches this country, the labels identifying exporting countries remain on no more than 20 percent of these imported products on supermarket shelves. The reason is that substantial quantities of the imports consist of manufacturing types of meat—meat combined with U. S. meat in the manufac-

ture of frankfurters, boloney, soup and the like.

Meanwhile, I am going to continue my efforts to obtain enactment of a responsible and effective Federal labeling law, one whose provisions would apply uniformly across the United States. I think it is proper that consumers be fully protected as to quality of food products, with standards of inspection and identification applied equally to imported and domestic products. In addition, I believe it to be proper for imported products to be fully identified as to countries of origin.

Years ago, U. S. labor organizations took the lead in urging the Government to establish standards by which foreign goods being imported to compete with U. S. manufactured products could

be identified. It was the position of these organizations that American consumers would be deceived if, unknowingly, they purchased imported articles thinking they were made in this country. The law has supported this view that, all things being equal, American consumers prefer American-made products. The Federal Trade Commission enforces, on a case-by-case basis, the right of American manufacturers to challenge importers of competitive foreign goods not identified as to country of origin.

It is my conviction that the same theory should be applied to meat and meat products. The housewife in the supermarket is able now to tell from the label whether certain canned hams

and meats came from the United States or abroad, but most meat products are not so identified. In the bill I have proposed, labels identifying the importing country would be required on all meat products consisting of more than half, by weight, or meat from abroad. This would remove the doubts shoppers now face as they inspect the selections at supermarket meat counters.

Beef cattle prices are much improved now over the situation a year ago. Our cattlemen were in trouble then because of an increased level of beef imports. I am glad to report that imports for the year ended June 30 were approximately one-third lower than during the previous year. WALTER ROGERS

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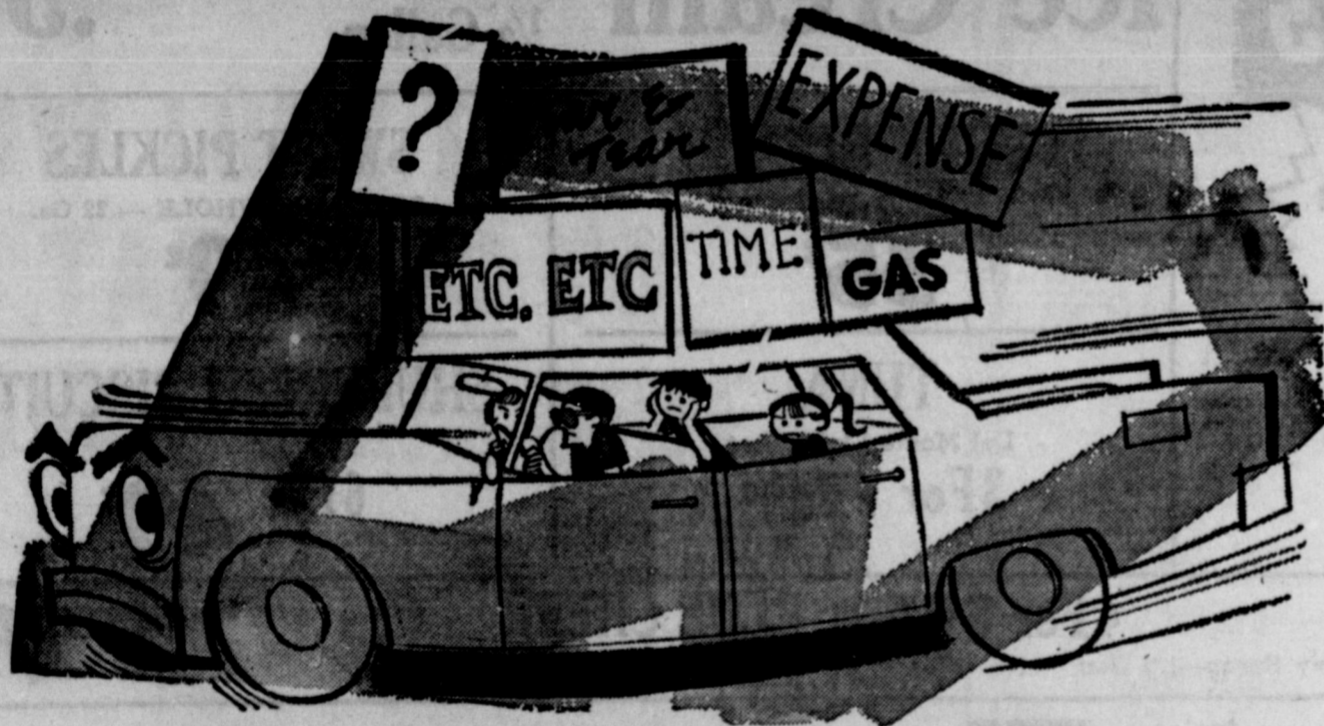

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# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Not even prolonged spring rains were enough to dampen Texas tourism this year.

Attendance at tourist attractions the first six months of 1966 increased 14 per cent over the same period last year.

A mid-year survey by the Texas Tourist Development Agency shows that 14,069,333 visitors were counted by 18 attractions and the state parks, with some places showing a 25 per cent increase in out-of-state visitors.

Largest single increase was reported by the Fort Davis Historic Site in far West Texas. Although the fort still is undergoing restorations, the tourist load there increased almost 50 per cent.

Other leaders in the visitors' increase were the Old Stone Fort at Nacogdoches, Big Bend National Park, and a replica of the

original Fort Bliss in El Paso.

**SCREWORMS BACK** — A combination of mild winter weather and inattentiveness on the part of livestock producers is believed to be behind a sudden spiral upward in the number of screwworm cases reported last month.

In a joint report the Texas Animal Health Commission and the U. S. Department of Agriculture reveal that 129 cases were confirmed between May 30 and June 26. Only 35 cases were reported in the entire Southwest in June, 1964.

**FEDERAL MONEY** — Austin, Corpus Christi, San Antonio and Houston are hub-cities in areas given top priority in a matching-fund program for construction of facilities for the mentally retarded. They will get first shot at

some \$500,000 in federal funds soon to be available.

Priority list, which will be one of the controlling factors in the allocation of the federal funds by the State Health Department, is part of a plan now in the hands of the US Surgeon General. He has authority to approve it or ask that changes be made.

Applications for funds first go to the State Advisory Council for Mental Retardation Facility Construction. Applicants must have their half of the funds for any proposed project in hand, in liquid assets.

**AG OPINIONS** — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has ruled that: A county may not legally operate a "translator system" to bring TV to its people.

Garza County cannot close the county hospital, but it may lease or sell it.

A prisoner "laying out" fines at \$3 a day in the county jail may not get credit on two cases at the same time. In other words, the two jail terms follow each other instead of running concurrently.

**TRAINING MANPOWER** — Texas Industrial Commission is urging Texas communities to look into benefits of the Manpower Development and Training Act as a way of adding impetus to industry attraction.

In Texas, the act is administered jointly by the Texas Education Agency and the Texas Employment Commission.

Industrial Commission has scheduled six Industrial Planning Seminars to explain the Act. They will be held in August in Austin, Dumas, McAllen and Sweeney.

**NYC PROJECTS APPROVED** — Neighborhood Youth Corps job projects continue to get approval all over the state. Gov. John Connally announced final clearance for grants in the following areas:

Aspermont, Denton, Snyder, Del Rio, Quinlan, Mineral Wells, Robert Lee, Comanche County, Beaumont, Breckenridge, Matador, Waco, San Angelo, Round Top-Cormine, Fort Worth, Hempstead, Roma, Lubbock, McKinney, Hemphill, Amarillo, Texas City, Bridge City, Mason, Childress, Groesbeck, Quanah, Laredo, Eagle Pass, Wichita Falls and Mt. Vernon.

**COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS** — Lt. Gov. Preston Smith has made several committee appointments.

To the Texas Legislative Council, research arm of the Legislature, he appointed Sens. Neveille H. Colson of Navasota, Louis Crump of San Saba, George Parkhouse of Dallas, Murray Watson of Mart and J. P. Word of Meridian.

Sen. Jim Bates of Edinburg will head the Senate Investigating Committee. Other members are Sens. H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock, Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo, Grady Hazelwood of Amarillo and Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi.

Sens. Culp Krueger of El Campo, Criss Cole of Houston and Charles Herring of Austin will serve on the Legislative Study on Multiple Use and Pol-

lution of All Waters of Texas, with Krueger as chairman. Three representatives and five private citizens also will serve on panel.

**COURT SPEAKS** — Third Court of Civil Appeals, invalidating part of Texas Regulatory Loan Act, has held small loan companies dealing in bonds and securities are subject to inspection by State Banking Department.

Forty-four Allied Finance Companies sued the Banking Department claiming they are exempt from its examinations. Appeals court instructed district court to reopen case as to penalties against 40 of the Texas-based concerns.

An Austin district court enjoined Texas Railroad Commission from enforcing order that natural gas purchasers must extend lines to all producers in a field. Rio Grande Valley Gas Company, ordered to run its lines to West Port Isabel Field, brought the suit.

**BOUNDARY MEETING SET** — First formal meeting of new Texas-Louisiana boundary commission will be held here August 10.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler expressed hope a line between the two states finally can be agreed on for submission to their legislatures and congress. Agreement would prevent litigation and permit both states to be able to identify their land for purposes of oil and gas leasing and other useful purposes, he said.

Texas members of the commission are Sadler, Attorney General Carr, Sen. Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin, Sen. Jack Strong of Longview, Rep. David Crews of Conroe, Rep. Charles Wilson of Lufkin, and Larry Temple, executive assistant to Connally.

**REDISTRICTING SUIT FILED** — Nine Republicans filed a mo-

tion to intervene in a federal court challenge of constitutionality of the new congressional redistricting act.

They charged the Texas Legislature failed to create 23 districts of equal population as ordered by the court in 1963 and that the redistricting act "constitutes an extreme and indeed classic case of gerrymandering against certain political and metropolitan groups."

Inequalities were cited in Dallas, Bexar, Jefferson, Orange, Ector and Midland counties. Districts, the new plaintiffs maintained, vary from 9.7 per cent above the average to 9.7 below. They asked the court to apportion the state into proper districts after an investigation supervised by a master in chancery.

### AMERICAN CONSUMERS WILL DECIDE MEAT INDUSTRY'S GROWTH

American consumers—193 million today and more tomorrow—will decide if the beef industry is to grow and prosper, John B. Armstrong of Kingsville predicted here this week.

Armstrong, a livestock producer and an official of the Santa Gertrudis Breeders International, told participants at the third coordinated Beef Improvement Conference at Texas A&M University that per capita consumption of beef has jumped 47 pounds per person since 1935—up to an estimated 100.5 pounds in 1965.

Last year, per capita consumption of all hit a new record of 174 pounds, compared with 142 pounds in 1935, he added.

It has been estimated that about 85 percent of the retail purchasers of food in the United States are made by women. "It's comforting to beef producers to know that on both 'his' and 'her' food list, beef

ranks first," Armstrong told the approximately 500 men and women attending the conference.

"There are now 41 percent more people in the United States than there were 30 years ago. And we're producing 143 percent more meat. Supplying that much more meat to 193 million Americans has resulted in an annual production of beef, veal, pork and lamb approaching 33 billion pounds. Beef production alone will reach nearly 19 billion pounds this year, or 4 billion pounds more than total meat production in 1935," he said.

While increased consumption of meat can be attributed in part to a higher standard of living plus the fact that Americans just plain like meat, it is doubtful that these factors alone would have moved consumer demand to its present high degree of enthusiasm.

A major factor, Armstrong said, has been that more Americans have been learning more about how best to enjoy and utilize meat products—and why meat is essential to good health. Research and education programs for consumers will become increasingly important in the future, he predicted.

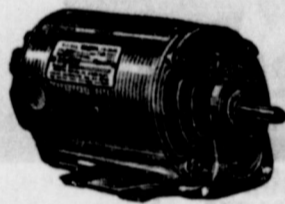

# FARM NEWS

from County ASCS Committee

## SOYBEANS ON DIVERTED ACRES

Regulations state that any soybeans seeded on diverted acres for a cover crop must be plowed under not later than September 30 of the current year.

We do have a few producers who have soybeans planted on acreages diverted under the wheat and feed grain programs. Let us remind those producers that soybeans are not an approved substitute crop and must be plowed under by September 30, 1965.

**ADJUSTMENT CREDIT** shall be given only for plowed up areas which are regular in shape and with not more than four sides. One side or one end of the disposition area shall be parallel with the rows or field boundaries when plowed up in a square or rectangular pattern. This means that even tho' two or more areas are connected they may have to be counted as more than one plot. The above requirements do not hold true, however, when the crop in an entire field or subdivision is destroyed, or when the adjusted area is between terraces or a field boundary and a terrace within a field.

If you have any questions concerning excess acreages and plow-ups, be sure to come by the office and discuss them with us before September 1, 1965.

## FAILURE TO PLANT COTTON

Producers who fail to plant 75% of their farm's cotton allotment due to conditions beyond their control, may maintain crop history by filing a statement here at the office by September 15 giving reasons for not planting.

Do not fail to file this statement as it is very important to you and your farm.
