
For taking top honors, Riley was presented an. engraved silver platter commemorating him as top fidler of the contest.

Legislation by the State of Texas requires that all such landfills be licensed by the State's Dept. of Health. Deadline for applying for this

permit was April 1 this year. Howardwick Mayor Glen Doty said he was first contacted about applying for the landfill in April by



If, under this Buy-and-Sell Agreement, proceeds are not payable to the insured's estate and the insured has no incidents of ownership in the policies on his life, the proceeds are not includible in his gross estate. For example, if a provision in the Agreement prohibited the insured from surrendering, borrowing or changing the beneficiary, he would have no incidents of ownership in the policy. Therefore, under the Buy-and-Sell Agreement, the proceeds from the policy would not be a part of the gross estate. However, the value of his partnership interest or corporate stock is included and subject to Federal estate tax

Several famous castles were visited, the 900 year-old Chateau Chillon at Montreux. The site of Munich, Germany is very interesting as it is a very old city, perhaps a thousand or more years old. The main plaza is a very famous place and the site of the Glockenspiel, a huge clock tower and the 'larger than man-size figures' that move twice each day with the playing of the carillon chimes. This site draws large crowds every day.
