

Donley County Commissioners Court voted a 25 percent across the board tax increase for county property owners at their regular session Monday, July 12.

The measure carried with a majority of three commissioners voting for it. Pct. 1 Commissioner Gene White voted against the increase.

To the county tax payer, the assessed value of real property (ie. land and improvements) will be increased 25 percent for taxing purposes.





Lab identification proved the wound to feed on live flesh until about half an inch this week that screwworms in length. They then drop to now exist in the City of the ground where they Dalhart.
