MARVIN JONES IS APPOINTED TO U.S. COURT OF CLAIMS

WILL CONTINUE TO SERVE UNTIL END OF CURRENT SESSION OF HOUSE

Rumors of Cong. Marvin Jones' appointment to a judgeship for several months became a reality Tuesday. President Roosevelt appointed Jones to the U. S. Court of Claims Tuesday. The salary is \$12,000 a year and a life-time job. He will accept.

Jones began his political life when he defeated John H. Stephens for his present position in 1916. He-became chairman of the Agricultural Committee in 1931 after being a member of that committee since 1920.

Mr. Jones has announced that he will serve out the present session. He will be succeeded as Chairman of the Agricultural Committee by Cong. Hampton P. Fulmer, democrat, South Carolina according to seniority rule.

Prospective candidates to succeed Jones are Deskins Wells, newspaper man of Wellington; Louis Goodrich, former district attorney of Shamrock; Mayor Ross Rogers of Amarillo; E. T. "Dusty" Miller, Amarillo criminal lawyer and several others. The position pays \$10,000 a year.

Jones has been a strong man in the New Deal administration, a personal friend and adviser of the President, and always got what he asked for if within the power of national leaders in political life.



WHITE FRIENDS INTERCEDE FOR SUSPENDED SENTENCE GIVEN ACCUSED PAIR

That it pays to have an otherwise good record when trouble comes, was amply proven when two colored men entered a plea of guilt to felony charges and were given suspended sentences in District Court Monday.

Mitchell Jones, charged with "asault and attempt to murder" upon. the person of Maggie Walker, drew a five year prison term. Evidence played. Music lovers and interested disclosed that it was a misunderstanding typical of the colored race. White friends interceded in behalf of the accused to get the sentence suspended pending good behavior.

Johnnie B. Granville, answering to burglary charge wherein he was accused of entering a colored man's cafe, owned up to the evidence. His past good record caused white friends to ask that the sentence of three years given him be suspended pending good behavior.
