

New home, business construction underway

Many Clarendon citizens are using the warm summer weather as a good time to build or renovate homes and businesses.

Three Clarendon businesses currently have renovation projects underway including Donley County Abstract, Greenbelt Ford and the Clarendon Rest Home.

A large building job is now being completed at the Donley County Abstract office across from the Donley County Courthouse. Biggest project is the addition of a 25 ft. by 26 ft. office space at the rear of the present building. Existing office space is being converted to a large document storage area and vault.

The addition also requires outside stuccoing and painting plus new sidewalks.

Inside the office, central air and heat has been installed and new carpet is being laid along with recessed fluorescent lighting, paneling and a lowered acoustic ceiling.

The work, being done by local contractors Earl Morrow, Durwood Ray, Junior Putman and Wesley Mills, will be completed with the next three weeks.

Business renovations at Greenbelt Ford include moving the existing Parts Dept. to the rear of the building. The move will increase present showroom space and allow the addition of two offices, all requiring new carpeting. Work should be complete within the next two weeks.

Some changes at Clarendon's Rest Home were required by Life and Safety Codes imposed by the Federal Government.

These included adding solid-core doors; an emergency lighting system composed of a back-up battery light system; and a new smoke and fire detection system. Inside, owners at the home are also adding linoleum flooring and painting rooms and hallways. The home's outside was re-stuccoed and painted along with adding a new composition roof. The work, begun this spring and expected to be completed in mid-August, has been done by local contractor Lawrence Thompson and contractors working for Osburn Furniture and Appliance in Clarendon.

Four new homes have also been added to Clarendon lately with all but one complete.

Two were constructed by Clarendon Builder W.W. Lovelady. Individuals built the remaining two, both through Bell and Bell Construction of Amarillo.

Both homes by Lovelady are three bedroom, 1 1/2 bath, brick construction, located on Clarendon's west side. One is now complete with work expected to be finished on the other within the next two weeks.

Individual owners of new homes are retired stock farmer H.L. Riley and Clarendon Postmaster Bob McCombs. Riley's three bedroom, 1,400 sq. ft. home should be completed by Sept. 1. McCombs' house was finished July 9 and he and his family are now moved in. The house, located at 7th St. and Collinson, is brick exterior with three bedrooms.

Along with business renovations, many Clarendon home owners have undertaken improvement work on their houses this spring and summer.

Miss Inez Skinner of 204 W. 4th St. added a 11 1/2 ft. by 13 1/2 ft. utility room to her home. The room, completed two weeks ago by family members, will house a washer and dryer. Outside work at the house included re-shingling the south-side composition roof.

Another recent renovation was finished July 17 in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Pittman, Koogle and 3rd. A bedroom area was enlarged to a fullsize sitting room-bedroom area complete with a three-quarter bath addition. Paneling was also added to the room along with an outside redwood siding to the exterior.

Workmen on the job included contractors Fred Day, Clifford Short and Billy Jack Land. The Pittman's son-in-law B.J. Jordan of Belen, N.M. also did some construction. A complete renovation is now underway in the James Swearingen home, 419 McClellan. The home was purchased last year from Mrs. Swearingen's parents Mr. and Mrs. W.G. Barker. Swearingen is doing the work in his spare time and hopes to be finished by this fall.

Work includes paneling in three rooms along with adding ceiling tile and carpet. Complete kitchen renovation includes adding cabinets, new floor covering and paneling. Still planned is some outside work on the home.

Another major construction job is being done at 311 Montgomery in the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Tucker. Remodeling is underway throughout with two living areas added upstairs, both 6 ft. by 19 ft. These areas will be taken up with one bath and a bedroom. Downstairs, new sheetrock was laid throughout along with textoning and painting. Acoustic ceiling tiles were also installed.

A new downstairs bath and kitchen were re-done with linoleum and carpeting laid throughout. Work on the project began this spring with all work under the supervision of Clarendon contractor Jerrel Grant. Construction should be completed within three more weeks.

Local contractor Clayton Mann has been in charge of renovations to the home recently purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Bivens. Work has included adding central air and heating plus the addition of a one-half bath. Inside walls have also been re-done with textoning, paint and wallpaper. The Bivens should be moving into their new home within two weeks.

A roof is currently being added to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Hawkins. Lumber used in the job is comprised of wood Hawkins salvaged last summer when he wrecked the old Clarendon Hospital Building. The sloping roof is being added over the current flat composition roof. Carrol Kennedy and Ronny Deen of Lelia Lake have contracted out the repair job.

John Bass, longtime Clarendon carpenter

Craftsman makes windmills work of art

Even for a master builder like John Bass of Clarendon, constructing a perfect working scale model of a wooden windmill from memory was a difficult task.

More so when confronted with the problem of re-creating all the mill's 150 or so parts down to a one inch-equals one foot scale from the raw material of wood and metal. Not to simply create a display, nice to look at, but a working model complete except for flowing water.

Bass' windmill must have a sucker-rod moved up and down by the rapid turning of large windmill blades. This pin-wheel fan should revolve completely around the mill's stand, complete with a safety guard wind tail to slow the mill's turning when the wind is too strong.

Bass' answer to why he began such a task, "I just didn't know any better." But his grandson, Tony Bass of Amarillo, calls it a labor of love.

According to John Bass, "the grandkids have always been after me to build them something." A builder in Donley County since the 20s, Bass has built many houses here including the Clarendon First Methodist Parsonage and homes owned by Clarendon citizens Heckle Stark, C.J. Van Zandt and Paul Hardin.

He retired in the early 70s to his farm home outside Clarendon with his wife Terra. They celebrated their 60th Wedding Anniversary June 27 this year.

An unrelated building project offered Bass by local stock farmer Forrest Sawyer gradually evolved into the larger project of "building something for the grandkids."

Sawyer wanted to reconstruct the collapsed wooden tower of an Axtel Company Standard Windmill at his ranch north of Clarendon. All the metal parts were there, scattered among the rotted and broken wood of the tower.

The mill, originally built in Fort Worth, has been out of production for many years. In fact, Bass said, no windmills are made in the United States today. Most metal parts are imported from South American builders.

The project sparked an idea—build a replica of the Standard mill for each of Bass' grandchildren and great-grandchildren. "The first thing you do is figure out what you want," Bass said, "then how to do it." The "how to do it" is the remarkable part of Bass' story.

The windmill model consists of approximately 150 parts, all which had to be scaled down to a one inch-equals one-foot scale. Some of these parts when reduced are no larger than a housekey. Nails used in the tower are no larger than tiny pins. Numerous bolts securing metal parts are just slightly larger. These require holes drilled approximately the size of a pin-head. The tiny nails, bolts and nuts could be located. The rest had to be made.

Wood used was cypress as in the original mills. Bass fashioned these pieces from the saws he had used for years as a builder. The metal pieces, however, required a blast furnace, home-made by Bass in the dirt-floor shop behind his house.

Bass said he first tried sand-casting the 22 metal parts. This proved too inexact a method so Bass cast 22 molds for the parts and built the blast furnace.

Pieces removed from the molds have to be filed smooth to insure precise movement. "That's the time consuming part," Bass said. Actual work of assembling the pieces is done under Bass' supervision.

This summer, Clarendon College history teacher Lowell Carlson has been doing the work.

Carlson said a complete mill can be assembled in one day if all parts are available.

Fashioning new parts as well as the frequent need to replace easily broken drilling

dies slows down the work. Carlson said, "Each mill we've completed, because they are handmade, has a personality all their own. Some fit so well they'll spin in a breeze you can hardly feel."

Bass originally planned to make 25 mills for close friends and family. The time and effort he's already put into them plus urgings from grandson Tony Bass, an optometrist in Amarillo, have prompted him to expand this to 250 planned mills. All

Four-county jail plan being studied

A jointly financed and operated four-county jail facility may be in the future for Panhandle counties Donley, Collingsworth, Hall and Wheeler.

Representatives from the County Judge and Sheriff offices of these counties met in Memphis Wednesday, July 21, and granted a Dallas based architecture firm the go-ahead to conduct a

feasibility study of the facility. The firm, Corgan Associates Inc., will undertake the study to determine what type of jail facility would be needed and where would be the best place to locate it.

Donley County Judge Billy Christal and Deputy Sheriff Clyde James attended the Wednesday meeting as local representatives. Financing to build the facility would come

in part from the Texas Criminal Justice Dept. (CJD), according to Christal. To build such a facility, three stages must be completed. Stage 1 is the feasibility study. Stage 2 entails an architect drawing of the proposed jail and Phase 3 involves constructing the facility.

Christal said CJD will pay all expenses for Phases 1 and 2. He also said CJD promised

those attending Wednesday's meeting the department could probably furnish 50 percent funding for the building's construction with the four counties providing the remaining monies. Christal said county funding would probably have to come from a bond vote of the people.

As part of the approved feasibility study, individual amounts of money required by each of the four counties to construct the facility would be calculated. Amounts would be based on past county usage of jail facilities, with counties handling more prisoners paying a larger percentage.

All existing jail facilities in the counties would be retained as holding jails or jails which may retain prisoners for no longer than 72 hours. Holding jails do not come under as strict state regulations as long term jails.

Most county jails in Texas will not pass all current penal standards set by the state. Discussion concerning the four-county jail was begun this past February by county officials. Wednesday's approval of the feasibility study was the first action taken towards actual building.

If constructed, money burden for operating the jail would be allocated among the four counties according to individual usage.

3. Record - 25 points
